The more options the better. Right? Well, not really. When it comes to religion there are all sorts of options and many pitfalls. As to the Christian church we live in an age of multiple church movements. How can we distinguish between what is true from what is false? We have to assess spiritual experience. History shows that orthodox statements of faith or creeds alone have not been enough to avoid a shipwrecking of faith. What people say and teach is to be coupled with how they go about the practise: 'Watch out for false prophets...A good tree cannot bear bad fruit, and a bad tree cannot bear good fruit. Every tree that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire. Thus, by their fruit you will recognise them' (Mt 7v15-20). We are to be wise about what we believe (doctrine), but also to look at what we do (praxis) as the fruit of this teaching.

The writings of Jonathan Edwards\* (1703-58) help us to be discerning over new movements or teachings by applying seven key principles:

- 1. *Non-signs*: strange experiences do not necessarily mean it is of God in fact, they don't tell us one way or the other!
- 2. *Spiritual origin*: the devil can counterfeit spiritual experience, but there are certain things that the devil can't or won't do *e.g.* God alone will convict us of sin
- 3. *New sense*: the work of the Spirit of Christ gives us the eyes to 'see' and ears to 'hear' spiritual truths of scripture.
- 4. *Esteeming truth*: a greater esteem for the Holy Bible, so that we are attracted to its teaching rather than repelled by what we read.
- 5. *Humble love*: a love for others is the greatest commandment (Mt 22v37-40) and is characterised by self-sacrifice.
- 6. *Discernment, not judgment*: we may look to see if someone is truly following Christ, but Jesus alone can distinguish between the sheep and the goats.
- 7. Passion, not passivity: we are not to be gullible about a new movement which is not authentically Christian, but then again we can forever hang around on the sidelines and never commit ourselves to joining movements that are doing Christ's work! (continued on next page)



So, where does the rubber hit the road? For Christian movements it is not the style, the gifts or the numbers that are key, but the character of those involved. Lent presents a time of review and change: engaging more deeply with the Bible's teachings, to ask the Lord to scrutinise our lives and direct us to become more like him and engage in his work with enthusiasm.

The PCC met on Wednesday 19 January 2011 and the following matters were reported on, discussed and/or decided.

- · Investigations are proceeding into the replacement or renovation of the large noticeboard that overlooks Christchurch Way. The style is likely to be similar to one that has been seen at a church in Eyam.
- Work to prepare the 2010 financial accounts is well underway and it expected that draft final accounts will be available in February. We have received a letter from the Diocese with regards to financial issues. After some discussion it was agreed that we currently follow the majority of the suggestions but some changes could be introduced. Ideas include publishing a summary of the Diocese accounts and the church accounts in the magazine.
- The timing of Cornerstone, the Sunday group for 15 to 18 year olds has moved to 6.30pm. This group of young people are planning a mission trip to Romania.
- · We have recently experienced some costly maintenance issues with the two boilers in church. We are to approach the Archdeacon for advice on how to take forward the replacement of the heating system.
- Further discussions have taken place on centre access and disability issues. It is now not felt that some of the improvements we were considering would meet the criteria of grant that we were to apply for. This includes the upgrading of the pathway that goes across the rear church yard to Bromfield Court and the creation of some additional hard standing parking at the end of the church centre. We would still like to investigate having the foyer doors powered to assist with opening, for those in wheelchairs and with pushchairs and for people who find the doors too heavy to manoeuvre.

The next PCC meeting is on Monday 14 March 2011 at 7.30pm.

#### **FAIRTRADE**

#### Fairtrade Fortnight – February 28th – March 15th

Christ Church was registered by the Fairtrade Foundation as a Fairtrade church in 2005. At the moment 44% of churches in Lichfield Diocese are Fairtrade registered and whilst the diocese is aiming for 50%, Lichfield Deanery has passed a resolution to achieve 100% by November 2011. As a Fairtrade church we undertake to:

Use Fairtrade tea and coffee after services and for all meetings for which we have responsibility

Move forward on using other Fairtrade products e.g. sugar, biscuits Promote Fairtrade during Fairtrade Fortnight and during the year e.g. our monthly sales

Our February Sale is on the 27<sup>th</sup> and there will also be a sale at the Parents and Toddlers Group on February 28<sup>th</sup> at the start of Fairtrade Fortnight.

Ruth will be holding an event at Oulton on March 7<sup>th</sup>. This year's theme is 'Big Buzz' - to help bee producers in Africa and Latin America increase sales of fairtrade honey. (Only 12% of the honey sold in the UK is home produced.)

#### What is Fairtrade?

It aims to transform the lives of poor producers in the developing world by enabling them to use their skills and resources to trade their way out of poverty by:

Creating opportunities for poor producers

Ensuring trading practices are fair – in payment and prices

Ensuring children are not being exploited

Ensuring there is no discrimination

Ensuring safe working conditions

#### What is the Fairtrade Premium?

This is the amount paid in addition to the Fairtrade price for investment in social, environmental or economic development projects. How the premium is spent is decided democratically by producers within the farmers' organisation or workers on a plantation. It may be used on education, healthcare or farm improvements; to increase yield or improve processing facilities. (continued on next page)

Here are some examples of how the Fairtrade premium has been used: Joyce Chirbouro and her family from Malawi now have access to electricity for the first time thanks to the Fairtrade premium on sales of sugar. Tea plucker Adriano Kalili from Kerala, India has been able to build a 3 bedroom house for his family thanks to the fair wage he receives. The Fairtrade premium has helped to provide the roof.

South African farmer Llewllyn Adams has access to community equipment with the Fairtrade premium on his raisins.

Traidcraft, the company who supply our goods, was launched in 1979. It has achieved significant growth in recent years and is the UK's leading Fairtrade company. It also runs Traidcraft Exchange – the only development charity specialising in making trade work for the poor.

Traidcraft Exchange helped Jabiri Nasaro in Tanzania to increase the number of his beehives from 38 to 160 so he can now afford to educate his children. It also helped farmers in Elsteenskull, S Africa to become the world's first supplier of fairtrade raisins and has now helped MiFruta in Chile to become the second. Ruth donates any profit made on sales during the year to Traidcraft Exchange.

Fairtrade is continuing to grow rapidly worldwide; there has been a 40% growth in E Europe and S Africa since 2005. There are 750 Fairtrade towns worldwide including Rome, San Francisco and London and closer to home Stafford. They undertake to use fairtrade products in municipal purchasing, schools and retail outlets and promote via local media.
