Forgiveness: rare, but revolutionary

There is a big difference between forbearance and forgiveness. We speak of bearing with other people, not simply when someone is looking up details and we are hanging on for an answer. Forbearance takes great patience in order to put up with someone's foibles. If in doubt, just ask my wife! Forgiveness involves dealing with the wrong in a merciful way, granting a pardon, so as to achieve reconciliation. When we forgive it will lead to restoring the relationship. When we don't forgive it leads to an erosion of the relationship and ultimately a cycle of alienation can set in.

Various novels look at this theme. One tells of how a marriage disintegrates over the failure of the wife to replace soap in the bathroom. In the husband's mind this was a very big issue. His wife refused to admit that she forgot to replace it. Neither would ask for forgiveness, so they slept in separate bedrooms for seven months and ate in silence!

The daily and worldwide need for forgiveness means that where forgiveness is practiced it introduces a revolutionary change into hostile situations. Where forgiveness is withheld there will be a real alienation, with a growing bitterness that hangs over as a legacy of the past.

Jesus told a story about a servant who owed a huge fortune to his master. The master confronted the servant asking to be repaid or else be thrown in jail. The servant pleaded for mercy to be let off the debt. The master agreed to free him from his debt. Later the servant met a colleague who owed him a very small sum of money. He was aggressive in asking to be repaid. The colleague said he wasn't able to pay and asked to be let off. The servant refused and got him thrown in jail until he paid up. When news got back to the master he was furious and tore him off a strip before throwing him in jail to be tortured. Jesus said: *"this is how my heavenly Father will treat each of you unless you forgive your brother from your heart"* (Mt 18v35).

Followers of Jesus are those who have come to know the forgiveness that reconciles us to God: the biggest debt of all has been cancelled. It makes giving and receiving forgiveness possible and also revolutionary.

How strong are your roots?

During a lull in the recent stormy weather I took a stroll around Downs Banks, picking my way through the carnage of broken branches and uprooted trees. It was an impressive sight, trees that only days before had stood proud and majestic now lying crumpled and flattened never to rise again.

The prophet Jeremiah, who prophesied during a particularly stormy period of Israel's history, likened the locus of our trust to the locus of a tree's roots. In Jeremiah 17:5-8 he says:

⁵ This is what the LORD says:

“Cursed is the one who trusts in man,

who draws strength from mere flesh and whose heart turns away from the LORD.

⁶ That person will be like a bush in the wastelands; they will not see prosperity when it comes.

They will dwell in the parched places of the desert, in a salt land where no one lives.

⁷ “But blessed is the one who trusts in the LORD, whose confidence is in him.

⁸ They will be like a tree planted by the water that sends out its roots by the stream.

It does not fear when heat comes; its leaves are always green.

It has no worries in a year of drought and never fails to bear fruit.”

My stroll around Downs Banks showed that while seeds had taken root and flourished for many years, the soil and their root structure were unable to cope when the storm blew in. Likewise if we are to cope with the storms that life brings we need to send roots down into soil that will sustain and nourish us even through the most testing of times.

As Jesus heads out into the desert to do battle with the devil in the period that we call Lent, it's clear that his roots were nourished and strengthened by the soil of God's Word. Three times he refutes the devil by quoting the Scriptures the first of which reminds us that *“man does not live by bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God.”*

You may be flourishing at the moment but where will you be when the storm blows in? Are your roots and the soil in which they are located equipped for it?

6 **“How good and pleasant it is when God’s people live together in unity!” (Psalm 133)**

These words *in the original Hebrew* finish the wonderful piece of music commissioned by the very English dean of Chichester Cathedral from a notable Jewish American composer in 1965. Leonard Bernstein was asked to write for a most traditional setting where the choir, expert in worshipping with plainchant and traditional hymns were open to adopting the latest musical style from Broadway.

We don’t get to commission great composers very often but we do get to commission people who are “the right person, at the right place, at the right time”.

Back in January, a great crowd of people from *Tamworth’s* many different churches joined together with the local MP, Mayor and others to celebrate the projects that ‘God’s people living together in unity’ operate together which provide such important service to the local community – helping those with addictions; a foodbank; a school for those who are unable to fit in a mainstream school; a housing project for young people; and debt and money advice. We saw three central values of our faith being lived out here that as a diocese we summarise as reaching new generations, transforming communities and practising generosity.

I was privileged to commission the newly formed Tamworth Street Angels who, *like similar groups around the country*, give up their sleep to show Jesus’ love to clubbers and revellers in the town centre. *Street Angels began as a project of Churches Together in Halifax, and its founder, Paul Blakey MBE was our preacher.* One hundred and twenty Street Angel projects are now running around the country and have been lauded by police forces and councils for having a large, measurable, positive impact on communities. In fact, just as the Psalmist says, they are helping people to live together even at the end of an evening of excess, disappointment or trouble.

We’re beginning the season of ‘giving up’ things – a tradition of Lent. So what to give up? For us Christians, it is about self-denial, yes, and making time for deeper prayer and repentance too.

But Lent isn’t simply about giving up something for a while, just to start it again when Easter arrives. We certainly shouldn’t be giving up good service to our neighbours, though we may wish to postpone excessive meetings about that work. *(continued on next page)*

In 2012 sales of fairtrade goods in the UK rose to £1.5 billion, an 18% increase on 2011.

What is Fairtrade?

It aims to transform the lives of poor producers in the developing world by enabling them to use their skills to trade their way out of poverty. It also seeks to challenge injustices in trading structures and practices that often lead to the exploitation and marginalisation of poor people.

Key Elements

To create opportunities for poor producers

To ensure trading practices are fair – both in payment and prices

To ensure children are not being exploited

To ensure there is no discrimination

To ensuring working conditions are safe.

What is the Fairtrade Premium?

This is money paid on top of the minimum price that is invested in social, environmental and economic developmental projects. How the premium is spent is decided democratically by a committee of producers or workers on a plantation.

Lihogosa Primary School in Tanzania is near the Kibena tea factory, which supplies our fairtrade tea. The school was built using the fairtrade premium. It also paid for six out of the seven teachers' houses. The school, which has 175 pupils, has benefited from teaching materials, a photocopier, printer and furniture - all funded by the premium.

Our fairtrade goods are supplied by Traidcraft – UK's leading fair-trade company which was established in 1979. Mags Vaughan (Roger and Sally's daughter) was appointed as the new chief executive in July 2013. She says 'It is a great privilege to be the first female chief executive of an organisation that does so much to help women around the world.'

Swajan is an example of a company helping women. It combines two of Bangladesh's famous traditions (papermaking and embroidery), to create the beautifully decorated handmade paper cards which we buy. 850 women, from both rural and urban areas, are employed to do the embroidery. When her husband lost his job, Rumi started to look for work and she approached Swajan. After a short training course she was employed and has worked for the business for three years. *(continued)*

‘ I feel happy and secure working at Swajan. My husband has been able to get a loan to start a small shop. Now I am thinking of sending my 4 year old daughter to school.’

Fairtrade Fortnight is from **24th February** to **March 9th**. The Fairtrade Foundation is focusing on the plight of banana farmers. UK supermarkets have halved the price of bananas (UK’s favourite fruit) whereas farmers costs have doubled, trapping them in poverty.

***Cheap bananas threaten farmers future,
Make a difference in Fairtrade Fortnight.
Sign our petition.
Together we can make bananas fair.***

At the moment 33% of bananas sold are fairtrade – the campaign hopes to increase that percentage.

Who is Croatia?

There's a Balkan saying that translates as "Stretch your legs as far as your carpet extends". ECM Trustee Mike Wilson and his wife Daveen recently visited there and came back saying, "God can extend our carpet far beyond even our imagination." Listen to them describe two couples they met on this trip.

Emanoel and family

The request was for young, single Brazilians to go for two years to work alongside local (Baptist) pastors in Croatia, enabling them to fulfill their vision for church planting. But then God started extending the carpet even more, and gave a dream to an Assemblies of God pastor in Salvador, NE Brazil. In the dream, God told Emanoel to go to Croatia. He woke up, and wondered who "Croatia" was. The dream stayed with him all day and that night he researched it on the Internet, discovering that it was a country in Europe, and that it was 95% 'Christian'. "Why in the world would God want me to go to a country with that many Christians?" he wondered. But the conviction persisted, so he went back to the computer, and found that ECM was recruiting Brazilians for that country. He got in touch with Leonidas Duarte, Director of ECM Brazil, but Leonidas was not keen: not only was Emanoel married; he had three small children; he was Pentecostal; and he was black (Croatia has a very white population). But Emanoel persisted – God had TOLD him to go, so Leonidas flew up to Salvador, and by the end of a long lunch, Emanoel and Francine had been accepted for Croatia. By the time of our trip, they had been in Dugo Selo for four months. It has been hard – can you imagine moving from a laid-back vibrant seaside city in Brazil with a huge church family to a freezing, suspicious, rural village in Croatia with practically no Christians? But, and here is the carpet extending, they ALREADY have twenty folk meeting weekly in their home, and plans are well on the way to planting a church. Emanoel is laying aside his Pentecostal certainties; and his skin colour? No problem – apparently, everyone thinks he's Obama.

Romil and Elaine

Another carpet-growing story. Romil and Elaine, also a couple, went to a meeting of several thousand people in Brazil, where Stephen Bell and some Balkan pastors were speaking. One of these was Radovan Trajkovski from Travnik, Bosnia.

When Radovan saw Romil he picked him out from the crowd and told the translator to tell him, “God wants you in Bosnia”. Bosnia? Romil felt God was calling them to Portugal and he promptly put the incident out of his mind. One year ago he went on a group visit to Portugal, but first everyone went to the Balkans. As Romil got out of the car in Travnik, Radovan rushed up to him, tears streaming down his face, “I KNEW you’d come.” That was it – Romil’s heart was captured. He told Leonidas, “No need to look at Portugal; I’m coming here.” He went home to kiss his parents good-bye, collect Elaine, and after five months in Travnik he told us, “We thought we were coming to help Pastor Radovan, but instead, in him and his wife, we have found our spiritual parents.” Travnik is almost 100% Muslim and almost every building we saw was war-damaged – the suffering here was terrible. But Radovan has a vision to plant a church here, and now he has an Elisha to help him.

Caviar in the churchyard

At the end of December we visited Bristol for a couple of days including a Sunday. We visited a church I used to attend while I was a student there many years ago, St Philip and St Jacob, or Pip ‘n Jay’s as it is more commonly known. Malcolm Widdecombe became the vicar there in 1963 and made a commitment, that out of every £3 the church received, £2 would be given away. When I attended the church in the 70’s the evening service was always packed as we, along with hundreds of others, crowded in to hear Malcolm’s sermons, which were always about 45 minutes long.

When we were there on December 29th (2013), I spoke to one of the current congregation, who turned out to be involved in outreach work. I mentioned that often in 1976 I would be sat next to tramps who came into the services for warmth and shelter- maybe they listened to the sermons too.

Carbon Fast 2014

Each year recently, Tearfund has suggested that we undertake a “Carbon Fast” for Lent. The idea is that by using less energy (causing less carbon to be burnt), we conserve some of the Earth’s resources and behave in a less selfish way. This year, the scheme has been publicised by the Anglican Diocese of Bath and Wells, and takes the form of a list of suggestions, each scoring between 1 and 12 points. Their suggestion is that we should try to score 40 points during Lent 2014, which they say would reduce the average “Carbon Footprint” by 40%.

Choose your 40 points from the list below

Each point represents about 1% of a person’s average carbon footprint

Install solar water heating	3 points
Install 4kW of solar panels	7 points
Turn the thermostat down by just 2 degrees	4 points
Switch to low-energy lighting	4 points
Reduce hot water temperature so it isn’t scalding hot	3 points
Increase loft insulation, seal doors and skirting boards	2 points
Use a basin of water rather than a shower	1 point
Double-glazing if you don’t already have it	2 points
Cavity wall insulation	3 points
Heat one room fewer	1 point
Leave nothing on standby	12 points
Drive steadily, accelerate slowly, anticipate stops	10 points
Never drive to the shops, buy online	1 point
Sell the second car	7 points
Share the car to work	3 points
Support local farmers, eat local produce	3 points
Change to a vegetarian diet	5 points
Go Vegan 3 days a week	5 points

Other ideas include transport sharing/cycling and walking; reducing food waste; using green energy; eating local produce; improving insulation and energy efficiency; sharing meals and starting a Transition Street project or Caring Neighbours scheme.
