Snap happy?

Following the Easter holidays you might now be sorting through snaps of your family and friends. The camera never lies, or so they say as the rest of the family squeal with delight at snaps that record your best and worst moments!

Software enables us to improve things a bit: enhance the colour, cut out distractions, slim the waistline or improve the exposure. If you accidentally erase a good picture, you can recover it. Digital technology always leaves a permanent record.

About 10% of all the photographs ever taken were shot in the past 12 months. The popularity of camera phones plus digital technology enables us to store loads of photographs and brings an end to piles of albums. The recent trend for 'Life-blogging' will increase the number of photographs: every 30 seconds a picture is taken whatever you are doing. The device is no bigger than a postage stamp clipped onto your clothing. You can record all those memorable moments and also those best-forgotten moments! Upload to server and your 'life-blog' grows daily. What more could you want? One thing that comes to mind is a permanent erase for my bad bits! But what if there was someone who had an accurate record of every moment we have lived, every thought we have had and every word we have uttered?

There is a full and accurate record of our lives in heaven. Jesus knows everything about us, but still offers us a new start. His death and resurrection makes possible a permanent erase for our sins: whether these were deliberate or accidental. Jesus' death, resurrection and ascension identify him as our Judge (who we're answerable to) and our Saviour (who alone can rescue us from sin and death). Jesus makes it possible to have a new start: *'For as high as the heavens are above the earth, so great is his love for those who fear him; as far as the east is from the west, so far has he removed our transgressions from us'* (Psalm 103v11-12). His death also serves to purify us: *'How much more, then, will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself unblemished to God, cleanse our consciences from acts that lead to death, so that we may serve the living God!* (Hebrews 9v14).

This is truly wonderful! You may not be entirely happy about what the holiday snaps reveal, but we can delight in what Jesus' blood erases forever!

O little town of Bethlehem...

“O Little town of Bethlehem how still we see thee lie...” Well, that wasn’t exactly my experience as we finally passed through the checkpoint and got behind the 8m high wall that cuts the town off from Jerusalem and the West Bank. Car horns were tooting and street-shop vendors shouted their offers to passersby. The hustle and bustle of life was clear to see, as were the signs of poverty and oppression faced by Palestinians living there. Surrounding hillsides where shepherds once watched their flocks by night were covered with rubbish and the rubble of what had been ancestral homes. The silent night was broken by dogs barking, cocks crowing and Muslims being called to prayer. On the place where the lowly cattle shed stood now stands a church containing ornate and elaborate iconography.

Modern day Bethlehem is a far cry from the quaint little town that is pictured in so many of our Christmas carols. And yet during my week’s visit to learn about the experience of Palestinian Christians at the 3rd Christ at the Checkpoint conference organised by Bethlehem Bible College, I discovered that some things haven’t changed. Just as in the first century, residents of this town experience oppression and injustice. The theme of the conference in Bethlehem echoed the prayer that Jesus taught us – “Your Kingdom Come”, but so often our lives as individuals and nations are far from the reality of this – pain and suffering, oppression and injustice abound.

Of all the places and in all the ages, God chose a small backward town under Roman occupation and the rule of a puppet king to reveal himself in person to mankind. It was though Jesus that glimpses of what life in God’s Kingdom looks like were seen: a Kingdom of peace, prosperity, justice and generosity, where suffering and sadness are no more and abundance and plenty abound. And yet the King of this kingdom is a king who serves rather than subjects and who dies rather than defeats.

Just 6 miles north of Bethlehem lies Jerusalem, where, on a now not so green hill Jesus was crucified. There he took upon himself the punishment for all the pain and suffering, oppression and injustice that individuals and nations have caused, so that we might experience the peace his Kingship brings. It begins with peace with God as we recognise and turn from our own guilt and sin and leads to peace with others as we follow in Jesus’ footsteps.

The road to true and lasting peace for individuals and nations is not a straight forward one, indeed until Jesus returns it won’t be fully realised. But despite this, our calling as Christians is to give the world a window into the beauty and peace that his Kingdom will bring. I hope that you may you know something of that peace for yourself as we celebrate Jesus conquering death and opening the gates to his eternal kingdom.

Lichfield Cathedral

It's the start of the early summer visitor season at Lichfield Cathedral.

We welcome roughly 200,000 visitors and pilgrims every year. Nationally over 11 million adults visit one of the 42 English Anglican cathedrals - that's almost 27% of the population. When you add school visits, education and cultural activities and begin to count overseas visitors, the numbers soar. Cathedrals therefore have a wonderful missionary potential, not only to be the shop window for the rest of the church, but to help people on the fringes of faith, or outside any religious or spiritual affiliation, explore the God dimension.

We know from the enormous number of candles that are burned and the stack of prayer requests that we receive every day, that the cathedral is offering open access to faith, allowing people unpressured space and opportunity to explore their hope, longings and, all too often, bottled-up grief or hard-to-express joy.

A significant shift has also taken place in the way cathedrals respond to these new mission opportunities. Once, cathedral guidebooks and leaflets majored on history and archaeology, the grandeur of the architecture and the treasures we housed. Whilst that is still important, it is more crucial to tell the faith story well: to interpret the building as it is used by a faith community and how this fascinating structure of stone and coloured glass is a vessel for the praise and worship of God.

Increasingly, we have interpretation panels all around the cathedral, and we guide people around the building so that they understand its primary purpose and can take their time to stand still and reflect. The response is overwhelmingly positive. We also find that having lay and ordained chaplains, and well trained guides and welcomers on hand helps to 'maximise' the experience for visitors. Questions can be answered and ministry offered.

We quieten the cathedral for prayers at mid-day and at 3 o'clock. We hold before God the needs of the world, we pray for all in the cathedral at that time and we ask God's blessing on each one. We always end with an invitation to return. Our visitors like the friendliness of the approach, the freedom they have to walk at their own pace. They are often intrigued by the sheer range of activity that the cathedral stages each day.

One good example is 'Holy Writ' - an exhibition of modern Jewish, Christian and Islamic Calligraphy which runs until mid-June. It's backed up by a range of learning activities: lectures on how each of the Abrahamic faiths read their scriptures; calligraphy workshops; community and school projects. All this is part of our vocation to make sure the Diocese and Region has access to interesting and exciting educational opportunities that help us deal with big questions and dialogue creatively with other faith communities.

Please look on the cathedral as a resource to strengthen and deepen our calling and mission. We receive no income from the Parish Share - financially we are independent of the Diocese - but we are here as a place where everyone in the Diocese can gather and be at home. You're always welcome. The cathedral is delighted to play host whenever it can, and be a partner in mission, worship and learning.

Fairtrade Sales - April 2013 – March 2014

Fairtrade sales last year at Christ Church and Oulton (with a few additional sales elsewhere) were £3,773. Ruth donates 10% of our sales to Traidcraft's own charity – Traidcraft Exchange. With the additional donations, she has been able to send £470 this year.

Traidcraft Exchange works to enable poor producers in Africa and Asia to grow their businesses, find markets and trade effectively.

The development projects benefit 2 million people directly and touch the lives of a further 24 million.

An example of a project in Asia – Fighting Child Labour in Crafts, India. This project is trying to help the 15,000 children employed by their parents in home based crafts, to get the childhood and education they deserve.

An example of a project in Africa – Bee Keeping Economic Empowerment, Tanzania (BEET)

In rural Tanzania, there aren't many opportunities for workers to improve their livelihoods and those opportunities damage the environment e.g. tobacco farming, logging. Beekeeping provides a sustainable income which helps the environment (and also provides valuable employment for women).

Christian Aid Week

Christian Aid Week is Britain/Ireland's longest-running fundraising week and has been a firm fixture in the calendar of many thousands of people each year since 1957. It is famous for the distinctive envelope that drops through the letterboxes of millions of homes each May – and for the massive impact that the week has made in the fight to end the scandal of poverty around the world.

This year's Christian Aid Week is May 11th to 17th

Christian Aid works with local organisations around the world to help poor communities find solutions to the problems they face and give them the support they need to make these changes. Last year Christian Aid Week raised over £12.5m. This money is being used to support some of the poorest communities around the world to create their own solutions to poverty. Here are 3 examples. In Kenya, text message technology and up-to-date weather forecasts are improving the crop yields and nutrition of farmers. In Bolivia, previously threatened rights to land for more than 1,000 families have been secured, while in Zimbabwe, a new dam has transformed lives.

Firstly we had to buy a new hard disc for our computer, losing most of our email addresses in the process! Then we were able to buy the new car PRAISE THE LORD! It is a 13 year old Chrysler Voyager, very comfortable and seats 7. A great answer to prayer! Thanks to all of you who gave. We have already driven it 25 thousand kilometres, often full of Brazilians, Ukrainians and Croatians... as well as our family. It is great for people carrying and excellent for helping people move house! The kids as well love it!

Wonderful happenings in Dugo Sela

Such a joy! After 4 years of hope and prayer, finally the churchplant is moving. Since Emanoel and Francine arrived with their 3 children from Brazil in May 2013 we have held housegroups every Friday at their house. Steadily people have committed from the locality and we have now rented a building for Sunday services. We have really seen God's hand at work. A couple in their 50's travel even 19km every Friday. On the 21st February 2014 26 people attended the Dugo Sela church.

We need to paint the whole premises, and also on our wish list are: digital projector, musical instruments, 2 loud speakers and microphones. But above all we need God's blessing and revival power! Please pray with us that the 100 square metres would soon fill! May God save many lost! The building is right on the main high street and the 200 pounds monthly rent has been generously provided by a Brazilian church in England!

Ukraine is knocking at Europe's Door!

As you well know, Ukraine is a great part of our Balkan vision, namely to see Brazilian and Ukrainian missionaries come from their revival countries and energise us here in Central-Eastern Europe and share the blessing. News from Christ Church Stone Monday 23rd February, 1966
