# Proceed With Caution

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**T**he Bible encourages us to be cautious, but also enterprising. **Cautious** because, as any chemistry student in the laboratory knows, it's easier to make a stink than a sweet smell. As the Old Testament writer puts it: *'as dead flies give perfume a bad smell, so a little folly outweighs wisdom and honour'* (Ecclesiastes 10:1). It takes far less to ruin something than to create it. So, we are to proceed with caution. Yet we're also to be **enterprising**: *'Whoever watches the wind will not plant; whoever looks at the clouds will not reap'* (Eccl 11:4). Events can overtake our best plans: some things we can do nothing about, but also some things require firm decisions. We might say the conditions are rarely right for taking new initiatives, but we are to put our trust in God as we engage in a venture of faith. A recent example of this was setting up a youth worker post when we did not have all the conditions perfectly settled before we started. Yet, if we hadn't taken this step we might never have started.

So, what comes next? The Teacher reminds us: *'as you do not know the path of the wind, or how the body is formed in the mother's womb, so you cannot understand the work of God, the maker of all things'* (Eccl 11:5). As we cannot clearly see the way ahead, we are to try various means to spread the gospel: *'Sow your seed in the morning, and at evening let not your hands be idle, for you do not know which will succeed, whether this or that, or whether both will do equally well'* (Eccl 11:6). We are to be faithful in sowing the seed of the gospel and trust in God to work out His sovereign purposes.

My hope for this benefice is that whatever plans we make we will be a gospel centred and purposeful church. For what makes the church unique is the gospel - the good news of forgiveness through Jesus Christ for all who repent. That means setting our sights on living by the gospel and to praying for the spiritually lost to come to know the great Shepherd and overseer of our souls. Paul wrote: *'I planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God made it grow'* (1 Cor 3:6). Everything depends on God's word, the seed of the gospel, which is God's powerful means of bringing about His purposes. We must patiently resist **either** being slaves to innovation, as if the presentation is more important than the content; **or** blinded by the culture of instant success, by judging something according to whether it has an immediately observable result. What is popular doesn't necessarily serve the Kingdom of God. Our role is to be faithful in proclaiming the gospel message and praying for God to bring forth fruit in His time. So, let's sow the gospel message, water it with prayer and look to God to bring forth fruit.

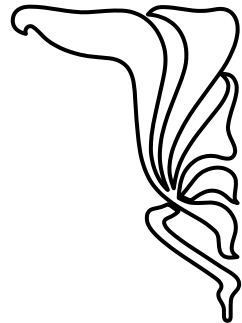

## Book Review

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**E**very December in our Christmas letter to friends I always list my highlights of the year, including my favourite Christian book.

I have already chosen this year's, **Saddam's Secrets**, which I bought in April at Spring Harvest. It's the story of General Georges Sada, an Air Vice Marshall and military adviser to Saddam Hussein, the first Iraqi to fly a Russian MIG, the commander in charge of interrogating the 40 Coalition pilots downed during the 1991 war - and an Assyrian Christian.

In the book he tells how he:

**B** Defied Saddam's son, Qusay, who wanted the captured 40 pilots killed.

**B** Advised Saddam Hussein against launching his top 98 fighter planes in a chemical attack on Israel - and how the president was stopped.

**B** Escaped death by 17 seconds when an American missile hit his base HQ at the very start of Operation Desert Storm.

**B** Was invited to a meal by Saddam Hussein (the president usually eliminated his opponents by poisoning their food) and was told: "Seventeen times you have disagreed with my decisions (one challenge usually meant immediate death) - "and seventeen times you were right."

**B** Knows where Iraq's weapons of mass destruction are today, how they got there and who smuggled them out of Iraq.

**B** Became spokesman for the newly-elected prime minister of Iraq, director of the Iraqi Institute of Peace and a leader of the Evangelical church in Baghdad.

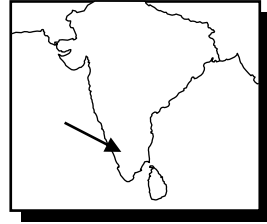
General Sada is one of the great Christian heroes of the last 25 years and I am just glad no one said to him: "How can you be a Christian and work for Saddam Hussein?" If he hadn't, the history of the world might have been totally different.

The next weeks will be a little chaotic for them as they say their goodbyes and prepare to come home. The early weeks will be spent with family relaxing and reflecting on the past months.

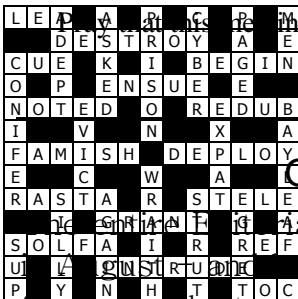
They are coming to Christchurch on **25th June** to meet everyone again.

## Who are . . . AICMAR?

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AICMAR is a postgraduate biblical research library and resource centre that aims to advance evangelical scholarship, promote biblical preaching and apply biblical truth to

The **African Institute of Contemporary Mission And Research** is an organisation that we are considering supporting as a church.

contemporary African issues. Based in Butere, Kenya, it serves the academic and spiritual needs of theological colleges and church leadership throughout East Africa and beyond.

**Supporting scholarship** An evangelical and interdenominational organisation, AICMAR works in co-operation with others pursuing similar goals. It welcomes all scholars researching in the fields of Biblical Studies and Contemporary African Issues. It does not offer its own degrees but facilitates those taking degrees at other institutions by providing a research library and, in future, qualified supervision.

**Conferences** AICMAR runs a number of conferences which train and equip church leaders, and Forums to debate current African ministry needs:

**Library** The Chadwick Library is rapidly developing into a significant theological research library. Already being referred to as the 'Tyndale House of Africa' it is at the heart of AICMAR's research, study, public lectures and expository preaching conferences. To enable continued growth, in 2004 the library was moved into a new dedicated building capable of housing 30,000 volumes, together with the library's many academic journals and electronic resources.

A more secluded Reading Room will, when fully furnished, enable 25 readers and researchers.

## The Northern Men's Convention

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**I went to the Conference** at the Armitage Centre in Manchester with Paul, Thomas and Dave Rowlands. (Paul, Dave and I went to the same event in 2004.) There were about 600 men, aged 18 to 80, all sharing the love of the Lord.

The theme of the Convention was 21<sup>st</sup> Century Holiness. The aim of the day was that we should leave at the end awestruck by what God has already done for us and committed to living in the way God wants us to.

**A Holy God** The first session, led by Bill Bygroves, a Liverpool pastor and chaplain of Liverpool FC, showed that we need to understand that God Himself is a holy God before we think about our own holiness. "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty: the whole world is full of his glory" (*Isaiah 6:5*).

**A Holy People** The second session was led by David Gibb, a vicar at the oldest church in Leyland. As Chairman of the North West Partnership, his aim is to see new churches planted in the region. He taught us that God's plan has always been to have a 'holy people' and "to live such good lives among the pagans, that though they accuse you of doing wrong, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day he visits us" (*1 Peter 2: 12*).

**Holy Possessions** After the lunch break, I attended the Seminar entitled 'Dirty Cash? (Holiness & Possessions)' (I am a member of the Finance Team!) We learned that to have a holy attitude to possessions is to have a Biblical Christian attitude to them. Is this the key? "Christians should share what they have so that every Christian has sufficient" (*Corinthians 8: 13 - 15*). To have money isn't wrong, it's a question of how it is used.

**Holy Life** The final session 'Holy me, an impossible dream' was led by Liam Goligher, a pastor in Richmond. His talk was based on Romans 13: 14, teaching us to live holy lives. "Clothe yourselves with the Lord Jesus Christ, and do not think about how to gratify the desires of the sinful nature".

I certainly felt that the day was a marvellous experience, and the day was enhanced by meeting men from other locations and other denominations.

## Meet our Mission Partners!

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**O**ur **CMS Mission Partners**, Tim and Kate Lee and their three children, Rebekah, James and Grace have been living in Manila, Philippines since May 2003. Together with members of a local squatter church they have formed an organisation called Jigsaw Kids Ministries, which shares the love of Christ with children and families at risk from poverty and abuse. Currently Jigsaw works with over 800 children and their families, all of which come from the slums, squatter camps or street.



**Jigsaw Ministries** runs kids clubs for children 0 - 14, youth Bible studies, feeding programmes, school sponsorship, homework clubs and assists in medical/social emergency situations. One of Jigsaw's visions is to empower local people, therefore all 17 of their staff come from the communities where Jigsaw works.

**Tim's role** is that of director and facilitator. His main focus is on developing the projects to reach further into the communities, ensure sustainability, and train and encourage staff (most of whom have no formal qualifications). Tim trained as a primary teacher and has since worked in Sudan (where he met Kate), Brunei and the UK. He took a course in Development Studies in Birmingham whilst training to be a Mission Partner at Crowther Hall.

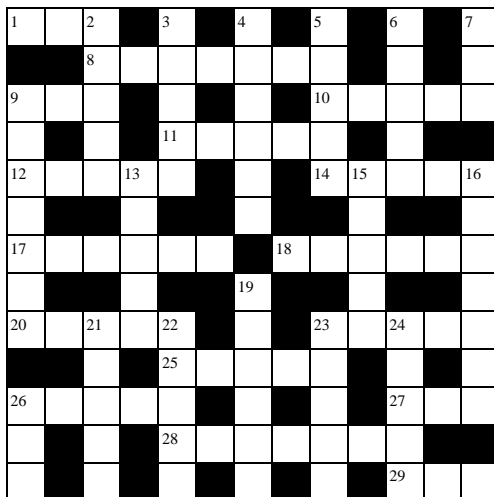
**Kate's main role** is administration and accounts. She also helps at some of the kids' clubs and assists in their planning of educational activities. Kate also trained as a primary teacher and, like Tim, worked in different countries before they felt God's calling to the Philippines.

**James, Rebekah and Grace's role** is to break down barriers with their smiles and blond hair and they are well loved by all the kids and staff that they come to in the Jigsaw centres. Seeing the Lees as a family has helped build relationships and trust within the communities where Jigsaw works.

The Lee family will be visiting Christ Church on Sunday morning 11<sup>th</sup> June - come and meet them!

## LESSONS FROM LEGO

We might understand life better if we each received our own LEGO kit at birth! When you are old enough you can learn a lot from LEGO, like the following:

All LEGO men are created equal (1.5625 inches tall), what they become is limited only by imagination. There is strength in numbers - when the bricks stick together, great things can be achieved. Disaster happens, but the pieces can be put back together again. Every brick has a purpose. Some are made for a specific spot but every one will fit somewhere. No one is indispensable. If one brick is unavailable, another can take its place.

There are lessons for the church here. Unity is a biblical concept; when Christians stick together, great things can be accomplished. And every Christian has a purpose. As Paul describes it in I Corinthians 12, some of us are eyes, some are hands, still others are feet, but we all have a purpose and a role. But while it is true that 'no one is indispensable', each one of us is needed and the body suffers greatly if we don't do our part

The greatest comparison, though, is that we are indeed a building shaped by God's own hand. Every Christian is a part of that building - not a plastic building block, but a "living stone".
