The board game ‘Pandemic’ (Z-Man Games 2007) is described in this way: ‘As skilled members of a disease-fighting team, you and the other players work together to keep the world safe from outbreaks and epidemics. Only through teamwork will you have a chance to find a cure’. It’s good to know that there is a possible cure as you play the game. The real world is fallen, so that sin and evil have tainted everything until: ‘the creation itself will be liberated from decay’ (Romans 8v21). Only then will there be a new heaven and earth free from decay.

Pandemic: trusting in the midst of fear

In China it's a very anxious time. Hospital operations are being delayed. The borders are being closed. Air travel suspended. The initial small health crisis is growing quickly to become a pandemic. The outbreak of novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV) was first reported from Wuhan, China, on 31 December 2019. This new illness can affect your lungs and airways. But because it is new means we do not yet know for sure how it spreads. Similar viruses spread in cough droplets. We hope and pray for a vaccine to be developed, but we *'mourn with those who mourn'* (Romans 12v15), as the virus causes havoc, hardship and heartache.

How are we to respond?

To pray for those suffering that the Lord will show mercy and for the medical help to be effective, growing in sympathy for those who are sick or who mourn.

Cry to the Lord in prayer who alone can rescue: *'The salvation of the righteous is from the LORD; he is their stronghold in the trouble'* (Psalm 37v39).

To send us to our Bibles as we see the limitations of this world and our lives, but the trustworthy words of God's promises.

Be thankful to the Lord knowing that our health is due to his mercy and our trials show our need of Christ: *'I can do all things through him who strengthens me'* (Philippians 4v13).

Put our trust in the Lord for our future: *'The Lord is good, a stronghold in the day of trouble; he knows those who take refuge in him'* (Nahum 1v7).

To repent and turn in faith to Jesus who said: *'I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?'* (John 11v26).

This is why we follow Jesus the author of life. We invite you to join us and do the same.

Archdeacon's Letter

Lent is a time for self-examination. The absence of flowers in church, the more sombre tone of hymns and liturgy, changes in the colour of vestments and altar frontals, our commitments to pray, fast and read the bible more diligently, all serve to create a space for thoughtful consideration of what our faith is calling forth from us in these present times. In what ways are we seeking to share the good news more deliberately, to join hands with others and roll up our sleeves for the good of our communities and to be good neighbours in order that as a nation we may discover a deeper mutuality and common cause?

This year on the First Sunday of Lent the set gospel reading is the story of the testing in the wilderness in Matthew chapter 4 verses 1-11. Reading it, I am struck by the fact that the passage opens and closes with two strong pointers that we might want to take as 'bookends' to frame our Lenten journeying. The first is the role of the Holy Spirit and the second is the ministry of angels.

In verse 1 Matthew writes that Jesus was "led up by the Spirit" into the wilderness, that is, 'up' into the Judean hills. The suggestion is that his wilderness encounter is not only to be testing and demanding but 'a time of the Spirit'. What we witness is the Spirit empowering Jesus to deepen and refine his sense of calling and mission just at the point where he faces very sharp challenges from the wiles of the devil. In the same way, as we seek to turn aside from the pressures of day to day life and the challenges we may face, through the grace and comfort of the Holy Spirit we can discover a space to think and ponder and wait upon God with renewed expectation and delight. Our Lenten reflections and activities are thus a time when the insight, encouragement, empowerment and comfort of the Spirit can touch us and refresh us deeply. It is a time when 'the still small voice' can speak to us – remembering that when God spoke to Elijah in this way (1 Kings 19 v.12), it was at a time for him of great vulnerability and deep discouragement. The Spirit overshadows us not only when we have the wind in our sails, but when life is at its most problematic. *(continued)*

Archdeacon's Letter

Paul encouraged the Christian community in Rome when he wrote that 'the Spirit intercedes (for the saints) with sighs too deep for words' (Romans 8 v.26). This is nowhere more so than in this time of seeking a closer walk with Christ in the wilderness, stress and distress of our lives.

On Ash Wednesday we are invited into the 'keeping of a holy Lent' and Lent is indeed given as a time for 'holiness', thus for the making-whole of relationships, situations, our communities and nation and our own selves before God. This emphasis comes out in the closing words of the passage, for when the devil left Jesus, 'angels came and ministered unto him'. The angels signify the wholeness or making-whole-ness of the wilderness journey. They remind us that something holy and whole-making is being undertaken and it will be blessed and honoured. My own instinct is that the angels were always there, ministering to our Lord – which is the strong impression gained in Mark's account of the testing. The fact that Matthew marks their impact as being at the end, may indicate that only at the end of the testing does their presence becomes apparent. It is often only when we look back that we see how we have been upheld. Either way, that angels ministered to Jesus as he was being prepared for what was to come, points us to the fact that our own preparations for the joy of Eastertide are likewise times when God's messengers and messages are pressing to wing their way into our hearts and lives. Ours is only that we should open our hearts! Lent is a time to receive the ministry of angels – some of whom may be nearer to us than we might suppose or have noticed.

I hope and pray that this season of Lent may indeed be a time for you and your communities of deepening wholeness through the power and refreshment of the Spirit and because of the ministry of angels.

She is stressed and worried about how we will manage all things we need to do to organize the wedding, about the place the new family will live etc.

2. Please pray for Dina and Mihai her boyfriend. They need to do a lot in the following months to refurbish an apartment in Zalau (my old apartment) they need to do the all stuff for the wedding for bride and groom. Please pray for wisdom and patience.

3. Please pray for myself and for my health to be good to can serve the Lord in the places He called me to serve.

Sometimes I feel drain out physically after the all things I went through last months. My mom situation, surgery, ministry and family.

I need you also to pray for some ministry needs:

1. Please pray for the revival/outreach is running this week in Bicaz. Last night when we got the first evening of revival we got eight non Christians into our meeting. Since me and Vasile Sav started the ministry there and we got some nice regular meetings there is another church who started to visit the gypsies. This doesn't help the ministry at all as the gypsies are split and confused. Please pray that God to get involved into the situation. We do not want to do the ministry to trouble that church but I am sure if me and Vasile will stop going that church will do the same. We are not into a competition but some guys from that church probably think we are. Of course there are some good news too. One of the families who come to church regularly did a big step in faith. They lived together for 11 years and they has 5 children but they were not legally married. Last Thursday they did the legally marriage for the simple reason that they want to follow Christ in baptism. The man's name is Vasile and his wife is Nadia. Please pray for them to follow the faith and to be not disturbed by those guy who just want to hunt their souls.

3. I need you to pray for some funds from somewhere (I don't know from where) for food parcels for the families who are hungry. Saturday I talked with a gypsy lady and she was crying because she said she did not has food to her children. I know her and I know she do not lie. The food is very expensive in Romania and the shops use anything to rise up the food prices. Now they has a good reason to do that because of the China situation. This things hit mostly the poor families. The gypsies because the don't has education usually cannot find a regular job. Summer time they are doing small day jobs for some income but over the Winter there is no such jobs for them.

All the extra funds I got from you brothers were spent to help those in needs and right now I am really tight.

I think this is all for the moment. Anyway I wrote you a lot. Sorry for that.

You will be changing trains many times, so best to send your luggage on ahead.

Going to Mallorca? More challenging, but there are ferries from Portsmouth to Santander (23 hours 30 minutes each way, 3 sailings weekly) and Barcelona to Palma (7 hours 30 minutes each way, 19 sailings each week). Add in a few train journeys and your journey might take less than 60 hours. Google gave up on this one. The Portsmouth ferry won't accept foot passengers, you have to take a car, so journey cost is £662 for 2 people. If you can hitch a lift in a car on the Portsmouth ferry and then go as foot passengers from Barcelona, you might get the ferry costs down to £300 but then you will need train tickets, bound to be at least £100 each person. Again, best not to take luggage.

One might ask, “why is it so difficult to travel without flying?”. Go by plane and expedia will sort it out in a jiffy, often with ATOL protection– you can forget that with trains and ferries! Flights from Birmingham to Palma and a week in a hotel in Easter school holidays, just £471 each including taxes. Journey time 4 hours 50 minutes (changing in Munich).

Of course, true eco-warriors will say that trains and ferries are nearly as bad as planes, you should go by bicycle and sailing boat. Don't ask.
