What to do when worried

Worry eats its way through the day. Like a teenager that never seems to have had enough food (the fridge raiders!), worry has its main meal but then grazes on and off through the day (and night). Its appetite is huge! But there is a way through it.

There may be big things that dominate life. We've been living under the cloud of the pandemic far longer than ever expected. The health threat has been ever present and serious with the inevitable challenge to physical performance and the knock-on effect when it has led to a death. That is worry enough. It didn't take long before it caused many other problems. Turmoil at work for many people has suddenly put their daily lives on a shaky footing. Where income is less predictable, has shrunk or even dried up, then changes have been swift. Add to that the practical problems of childcare, looking after elderly relatives and restrictions on simply meeting up with others..... Worry? We do!

We find some powerful direction about how to avoid worry in the New Testament. Jesus teaches us to trust in our heavenly Father for our daily needs of drink, food and clothing; but also, to seek first His kingdom and righteousness rather than to slip into worldly ways (Matthew 6v25-34). The same teaching is developed by the Apostle Paul. He wrote this pithy two liner: *'Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus'* (Philippians 4v6-7). There are no bounds to what we can bring to God as we pray: pray about everything. Our whole lives matter to God – as we show our trust in the one who hears and answers prayer to meet our needs He will do so. But He also gives us peace. *(continued)*



What to do when worried

We may be in the midst of the perfect storm of things that threaten our lives. God gives us a peace that we won't find anywhere else, or from anyone else.

I hope this encourages you to put your trust in God in the circumstances you face. We will worry less as we pray more.

How YOU saved Bible mission

in the year of the pandemic

In March and April 2020, a survey among Bible Societies painted a worrying picture of how Covid-19 was impacting their work: around 30 were in 'critical' condition, and another 65 were 'at risk' if restrictions continued for much longer. Basically, two-thirds of Bible Societies worldwide were facing serious difficulties.

'I was in despair and had sleepless nights,' admits Valente Tseco, General Secretary of the Bible Society of Mozambique.

Covid was adding to the suffering caused by the devastation of two cyclones in 2019. Also, Mozambique, just like the Sahel region that we are currently supporting in an appeal, was beset by war and Islamist terrorism. Valente and his team were determined to continue making Scripture available but things were getting very difficult as lockdown restrictions hit and Scripture sales plummeted. How would the Bible Society be able to keep operating and pay salaries? How could it pay its bills? And yet, how could it not continue its work of making God's word available to people at this most crucial of times?

Future path of Bible ministry

Ivone Sequera was delighted to get a Bible in 2020.

These worries were echoed in every region of the world as Bible Society leaders grappled with similar scenarios. Their fate would determine not just the future path of Bible ministry in individual countries but also the ability to advance Bible ministry globally.

As the skies darkened, sister Bible Societies rallied together and set up the Solidarity Fund, also known as the Rescue and Recovery Fund. The aim was, and still is, to ensure that Bible Societies whose operations have been particularly badly hit are able to keep their doors open so that God's word continues to be made available at this pivotal time and into the future.

Eighteen Bible Societies have contributed so far, with their gifts totalling almost £3 million. In England and Wales alone, though our Solidarity appeal, people like you have so far raised an incredible £630,000. A Scripture donation programme worth £363,000 is supplementing this financial support and helping Bible Societies to get back on their feet.

All of this, of course, was made possible by the generosity of Bible Society supporters, not only here in England and Wales but also the world over. Without your kind giving, Bible Societies would have had to permanently close their doors in many countries, depriving those nations of a local base for Bible mission, and delaying or denying access to Scriptures for countless people.

Help for 60 struggling Bible Societies

The amount raised so far takes us close to our mid-range target of £3.7 million, which could support 50 Bible Societies in total. However, it is hoped that the fund will reach £5 million and provide help for 60 struggling Bible Societies.

Eight months on, more than 35 Bible Societies who would otherwise have struggled to survive have received support, with more applications in the pipeline for consideration by the Solidarity Fund Oversight Group.

'We feel relieved, happy and blessed!' said Valente when he received the news that the Bible Society of Mozambique would be receiving both funding and Scriptures. 'This means that God won't allow Covid-19 to stop the plan for his people to get his word.

'We'll restructure our Bible Society to ensure a sustainable and healthy organisation, boost our online Scripture distribution and fundraising and implement projects that were halted by the pandemic.'

Ivone Sequera was one of many Christians to benefit from the support given to the Bible Society in Mozambique. 'The pandemic closed the church and I didn't have a Bible. This Bible came at the right time in my life,' she said.

Pray: Please pray for Bible Societies whose operations have been badly affected by the pandemic. Ask God to give them wisdom, creativity and strength as they seek ways to continue to serve the audiences in their nations in very difficult circumstances. Pray also for ongoing fundraising efforts that will allow more Bible Societies to receive the help they need.

Thanks

Thanks should be very much part of our relationship with God which we call prayer. The letter T in the idea of "acts" of prayer reminds us of this.

A couple are quietly celebrating their fiftieth anniversary. One of them gives a beautifully wrapped present to the other with the simple words "Thanks for everything".

However, in every relationship there are times when things will not have been as close as we would have wished. Even in the most loving human relationships there will be disputes and even angry exchanges. So what does the person mean when they say "thanks for *everything*"?

They are really saying that when *everything* is taken into consideration, they are still filled with thankfulness. For this reason the root word thanks often has the additions "full" and "fullness". When we know how much we are loved, in spite of any difficulties, we are literally overflowing with thankfulness.

St. Paul says this when he uses the analogy that our relationship with Jesus should be like a plant rooted in good soil (Col:2:6-7)

So then, just as you received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him, strengthened in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness.

In our precious quiet moments with God can we meaningfully say to Our Heavenly Father "Thanks for everything"?

So in the analogy what about the present that was given at the fiftieth wedding dinner? What can I give to God? The answer is ourselves..... but we should be "gift wrapped"!

On several occasions Paul writes that we should be Christ like, and not motivated by worldly desires. (So in Romans 13:14a) I give myself the God, but wrapped in Jesus.

Rather, clothe yourselves with the Lord Jesus Christ,

“Giving” is another additional word added to thanks, making the word “thanksgiving”. The great act of worship that Jesus instructed us to do “in remembrance of me” is an act of thanksgiving – That is the meaning of the Greek word Eucharist. This is something we do together. It’s as if we move from our deeply personal loving encounter, and join a party with other members of the Christian family who are all carrying in their hearts the words “thanks for everything”. Indeed in some versions of the Eucharistic prayer we say “it is indeed right, and our duty and our joy, that we should at all times and in all places give thanks and praise to you Holy Father, Heavenly King”

“Duty and Joy”. Thanksgiving can sometimes be seen as an irksome duty. But we should not be like disgruntled children having to write letters of thanks to aunties and uncles for their birthday presents. Our thanks to God is not just an imposed duty. The Eucharistic prayer reminds us that it is also be a matter of great joy.

In our daily lives we frequently say “thanks”. It’s polite, but can be a mere formality said almost automatically. Alone or with others our thanksgiving to God should never be casual. Whether our thanks is about a very specific matter or much more general, it should be from the very depths of our being.

However it is expressed in our daily actions and words thanksgiving should be a heartfelt expression of our Love to God **“for everything”**

1st	Heather Johnstone leads the Rehema Project in Mara, Tanzania, where many women have lost their jobs due to the pandemic. Rehema has provided start-up grants so women can start their own businesses and earn money to feed their families
2nd	Catriona and Steve Bennett, anaesthetist and surgeon at Gahini Hospital, Rwanda, give thanks that the hospital is busier than ever helping people and ask for prayer that their work be a witness to God's love for the people of Gahini
3rd	Emil and Reem Bourizk are in Northern Lebanon serving local families, some of whom don't know where their next meal is coming from and many of whom don't know Jesus. Pray for Emil and Reem to be a loving presence
4th	Kailean and Kim Khongsai, working to build bridges among different faith communities in Southall, London, say "It is still unclear what our new normal will look like. But let's take it as an opportunity to start anew and make sure our post-pandemic world is sustainable and just"
	<i>Stephen and Tabita Bell are planting churches in Croatia</i>
5th	Pray for new pastor Teofil as he takes over running of the Dubrava church. The church building has been completed after several years work and the congregation is now paying the wages of the new pastor. These are the signs that Stephen and Tabita can move to a new work in Varaždin
6th	Stephen, Tabita and Benjamin are now at Capernwray Bible College (Lancashire). Due to lockdown, they have to attend lectures remotely from their rented house 2 miles from the college.
7th	Pray for other Capernwray students not allowed to return after Christmas. One student is stuck in her home town in USA and has to get up at 2am every day to attend 6 hours of lectures
8th	Varaždin – We are moving Sept 2021 to this town 50 miles north of Zagreb and we already have a great relationship with Pastor Jonatan (Tabita's cousin)

	<i>Scripture Union provides Bible notes and runs activities for young people. Their online game “Guardians of Ancora” takes the gospel to gamers. “Revealing Jesus” is aimed at the 95% of UK under-18s not connected to any church</i>
9th	Latest resource for “Guardians of Ancora” is a 24-session programme on the life of Jesus based on Bible stories in the app. Pray that this will reach young people who join in the game
10th	Tabz and Hettie are part of Southport and Area Schools Work Trust, doing lots of work in local schools linking up with local churches. They are using the Revealing Jesus framework
11th	Hannah Legge works in Midlands area, training Faith Guides to use “Revealing Jesus” with young people
12th	The outlook for SU camps is still uncertain in 2021. Pray that conditions will improve and camps will be possible in some way or other. Pray for leaders as they think about this, and potential campers who need a boost to their faith. This Easter, online activities will happen and bookings are being taken now
	<i>Our CMS Link Missionaries Tim and Kate Lee helped to set up JigSaw Kids Ministries in Manila (Philippines)</i>
13th	As Jigsaw is now visiting hundreds of families where they live to deliver regular parcels containing Bible materials and sewing materials and activity packs for children, pray that God’s word will reach people even in lockdown
14th	Pray for the new ministry in Quezon City Manila, in a community of rubbish collectors. Many of these people cannot read and Jigsaw is organising literacy classes
15th	Disabled children are suffering more than normal during the pandemic, being unable to come to central groups. Pray that Jigsaw will be able to visit disabled children in their homes and take necessary materials and medicines to them

16th	Please continue to pray for all the funds required for Jigsaw's ministry. Please pray for extra funds and resources to come from the Philippines, Asia and from the UK. Funds needed for, increased emergency response, medical supplies, health care, food and wellbeing, ongoing operational costs, IT resources and educational support
	<i>Jonathan and Robinah Beesigomwe live in Gabarone, Botswana. Their organisation is "Bows and Arrows Ministry", and they work with older schoolchildren and young adults.</i>
17th	Robinah has started a Sunday School at a local church for 55 children. Church services are limited to 50 people so there was no room for the children. Now they have their own activities
18th	One 5-year old girl attending the Sunday School is dumb and extremely shy. But now she comes to the front mouthing the words of the songs and waving her arms with the other children. Pray with Robinah that she will be healed and be able to speak
19th	Pray for a newer car for Ministry. The trail of smoke is scary and mechanics not excited to repair it. We keep praying God keeps Noah's spanner in action. Faith car is 21 years old this year
20th	Pray for farm land after mustering growing Safflower and training a team of thirty to reduce poverty
	<i>Mission Aviation Fellowship fly medical personnel, supplies and missionaries to far-flung, often inaccessible settlements</i>
21st	MAF flew two babies from Dukana in the arid North of Kenya, to Kijabe hospital in the Rift Valley, for emergency operations, with a nurse administering oxygen in the cramped cockpit of a Cessna 206. Sadly, one baby died but the other baby recovered, becoming the youngest baby in Kenya to survive open-heart surgery
22nd	Pray for the Oksapmin school in Papua New Guinea, where MAF have been involved from the start in 2007 when MAF flew in building materials. A school project about MAF brought out many stories from the children about help with medical emergencies, new teachers and textbooks arriving by aeroplane and other incidents important in their lives.

23rd	MAF has helped the Sahara Conservation Fund to locate highly endangered Nangerdama gazelles in the vast area of Chad, Niger and Mali. Fewer than 100 animals from this species survive. Flying with SCF experts in the cockpit, some gazelles were located and then tranquillised for inspection. One sick animal was then flown in the Cessna 182 for treatment at SCF base camp.
24th	The Kuron Peace Village in South Sudan has no Coronavirus and the local minister Bishop Paride Taban wants to keep it that way. No visitors at all are allowed. Bishop Paride has started a small secondary school underneath a tree, and MAF has flown in materials, food, cooking oil, fertiliser, face masks and buckets for sanitation, so that the isolated village can survive.
	<i>The Bible Society's Bible-a-month club is delivering Bible resources in The Gambia, a small country on the West African coast with a population of 2.2 million</i>
25th	Give thanks for good progress on the Jola Bible translation, which will soon be available in audio, new reader booklets and through worship songs
26th	At the beginning of the pandemic, Bible sales plummeted. Pray that new methods such as audio Bible passages will get the Word out again
27th	Pray for the safety of Bible Society staff as they continue to work during the pandemic. Face masks and PPE are provided to all staff and everybody involved in projects
28th	Pray for hundreds of girls and young women learning to read in Bible Society classes

Bin Twinning

Many of you will be familiar with Toilet Twinning. Christ Church has a twinned toilet, sponsored by the Parents & Toddlers group. Tap Twinning was next helping communities to have their own clean water supply. These 2 projects focussed on hygiene & sanitation.

Bin Twinning was launched in 2020. It raises funds to set up social enterprises tackling the mounting waste crisis. 2 billion people worldwide have no waste collection service. These schemes will organise a waste collection service in a community. Each family will their waste collected, disposed of safely & recycled - preventing disease & protecting the planet.

I have twinned my recycling bin with a 3 year rubbish/ recycling project being set up in Port-au-Prince (the capital of Haiti). At the moment, the only ways they can dispose of their rubbish is to burn it or dump on the street or in the river. Children are often injured playing in the rubbish. Toxic fumes are breathed in by all the residents & many suffer from breathing problems.

Through the project:

- A weekly door to door collection project will be set up for up for 4,000 households.
- Organic waste will be converted into compost.
- Plastic waste will be recycled into paving bricks for roads & driveways.
- Young people will be encouraged to change their attitudes towards waste & plastic pollution.
- Local government will be urged to do more to reduce the amount of waste generated & improve waste management services.

Just do the Next Thing!

This was in the February 2011 Christ Church magazine and it seems most appropriate for the current times (apart from visiting a shut-in)

Greetings!

I was encouraged today with a very simple word from the Lord:

"Just do the next thing!"

Sometimes the "next thing" is to write a letter, make a phone call, or visit a shut-in. Sometimes, the "next thing" is to stop and pray, read the Word, or write in your journal. Sometimes, the "next thing" is to clean your desk, or the car, or your room (that's usually just for kids, but not always!), or maybe it's to put away the dishes, take out the rubbish or mow the lawn!. You get the idea, the "next thing" is often a simple action that seems so insignificant, that it just doesn't appear to be a "God thing", so we brush it off. When in reality if we will simply just do the "next thing", then the next thing is easier to do, and then it's easier to do the next thing, and the next, and the next. Until all those little "next things" make up your whole day!

I was also reminded that if the church would adopt this "do the next thing" attitude, then it could move from feeling overwhelmed with a daunting task and just focus on the "next thing". Actually, this is what Dr Conrad Lowe taught us in the Church Consultation Seminars he taught. I have taken that phrase and applied it to my own life and we have repeatedly used it when we do church consultations. We have become overwhelmed with the big picture that we have become paralyzed to do the simply, insignificant, "next thing", so we oftentimes just keep doing what we have always done, hoping to get a different result. They say that is the definition of insanity!

Oswald Chamber's timeless devotional, **"My Utmost For His Highest"** has helped me see that this is indeed a spiritual truth that God wants us to learn. Consider these two quotes:

"We look for visions from heaven, for earthquakes and thunders of God's power... and we never dream that all the time God is in the commonplace things and people around us. If we will do the duty that lies nearest, we shall see Him."

"When the Spirit of God comes, He does not give us visions, He tells us to do the most ordinary things conceivable... whenever God comes, the inspiration is to do the most natural, simple things—the things we would never have imagined God was in, and as we do them we find He is there."

Chambers referenced the scene in I Kings where Elijah is running from King Ahab. He is hungry and tired and very depressed. (Ever been there?) In that scene God sends an angel to him who says simply, "Arise and eat" (I Kings 19:5). What was Elijah's "next thing" he needed to do? Get up and eat something! Sometimes just moving forward in the most basic way is all God needs from us. With our obedience comes the solution we are seeking. I hope this thought will help you or someone else who is feeling overwhelmed and even depressed. What "next thing" is God asking you to do? Get up, do whatever it is, and find Him there. I am praying for you and keep asking the Lord to give you wisdom in the simple things!
