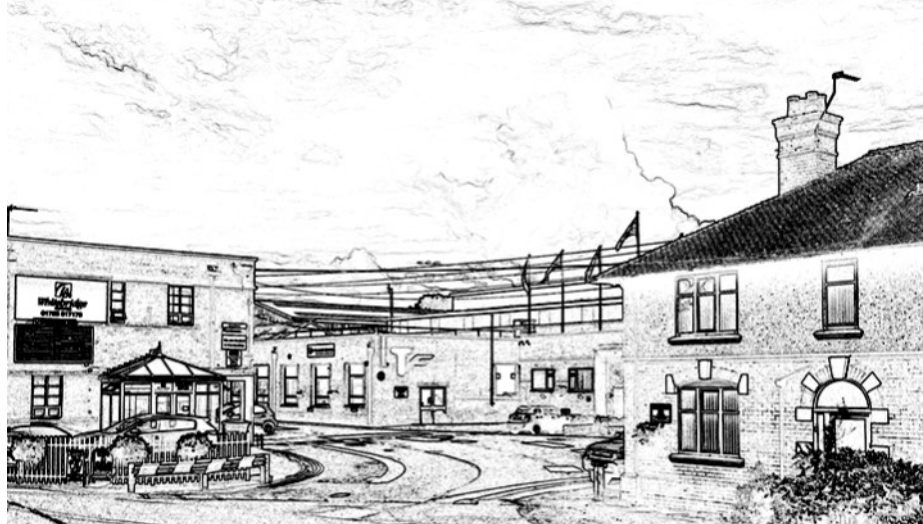

Freedom Day!

We waited for so long and now 'Freedom Day'! We've endured so many curbs on life. The long-awaited date in mid-July was set to bring freedom from restricted seating, social contact and geographical mobility; it was the day to throw off restraints which have hampered hobbies and sports; it would enable large gatherings to be held at last; it spelt a return to some sort of normality. Maybe even singing.

One of the most inspirational of phrases in the Holy Bible is when Jesus talks about freedom: 'Then Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, *'If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free'* (John 8v31-32). Jesus here draws a contrast between the ugly reality of how sin promises us freedom, but is a big deception. Sin controls and corrupts us so that we end up becoming its slave! It is the truth taught by Jesus that liberates us.

Jesus' further claimed he was doing the will of his Father in heaven. Objections were voiced by the Jewish religious leaders who said that their spiritual ancestry could be traced back to their ancestor Abraham. But Jesus replied that biological fatherhood is not as important as spiritual fatherhood. When we move from knowing about God to knowing God personally, we will delight in being his children: 'Jesus answered them, *"Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there for ever. So, if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed"*' (John 8v34-36).

What sort of freedom do you enjoy? Freedom from all restraints sounds so very appealing, but it is a trap. True freedom comes from knowing the loving boundaries set by our heavenly Father, which enable us to enjoy life in all its fullness.

This idea is found in an ancient prayer: *'Eternal God, the light of the minds that know you, the joy of the hearts that love you, and the strength of the wills that serve you: grant us so to know you that we may truly love you, so to love you that we may truly serve you, **whose service is perfect freedom**, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen'* [Augustine of Hippo 354-430 AD].

I hope that the latest relief from restrictions will bring many blessings during the summer months, but also that you will discover the wonderful reality found in Christ who alone can give us freedom day.

Time-ly vocation

Spoiler Alert! If you are intending to watch the recent BBC prison drama 'Time' on catch up then read no further, at least until you have watched it...

Jimmy McGovern, the screenwriter responsible for the recent gripping prison drama 'Time', also brought us 'Broken', the equally compelling story of a Catholic priest working in a tough northern urban estate parish. Both series are notable not only for their fine acting and the highly authentic 'feel' to the worlds they depict, but also for their willingness to engage squarely with key theological concepts such as sacrifice, forgiveness and atonement. McGovern understands Christianity from the inside, shaped by his formation in the Catholic faith, and it shows.

It shows in his sympathetic but realistic portrayal of those seeking to follow a religious vocation whether priest (Broken) or nun (Time). The Catholic sister who works as a prison chaplain is a wonderful advert for the religious life but also for the ministry of prison chaplains in general, showing the distinctive role they have within the prison system and their unique capacity to be agents of healing and reconciliation. The scene where she enables the main character (Mark) to be present, remotely, at his father's funeral is both authentic and very moving. (*continued*)

It shows too in his understanding of humanity as fallen, as intrinsically flawed, but always within reach of the redemption which is transformative. A fundamental reason for the authenticity of Jimmy McGovern's main characters is that they are never black or white. Like each of us they make mistakes, sometimes terrible ones, which may be the result of character flaws or bad decisions or they may be occasioned by life circumstances which make ethical choices difficult. Whatever the cause, they are left, as we all are, to work through the consequences. And it is here that McGovern's Christian framework is so evident. In 'Time' the main character, Mark, an ex teacher, has caused death through dangerous driving (while drunk). There are no mitigating circumstances. Mark is haunted, in his waking and sleeping moments, by what he has done. He does not consciously seek forgiveness from the widow of the man he killed. He knows the slate can never be wiped clean. But he is focussed on hereafter 'trying to live a good life'. He writes to the widow. He teaches a fellow prisoner to write. From all we see of Mark we can have confidence that he will continue to seek atonement (a word resonant in Christian theology and actually used in 'Time') for the rest of his life.

Whether through the scenes set in the prison chapel or in the 'Restorative Justice' session the need to acknowledge guilt and the immeasurable cost of forgiveness is laid bare. In 'Time' we also see what it means to sacrifice yourself in a Christ like way for another, as the 'good' prison officer ends up going to prison himself in order to safeguard his son.

In a world where shades of grey are increasingly denied in favour of a black and white worldview, where those who have killed are portrayed as beyond the possibility of redemption, where the work of the parole board is undermined by politicians seeking to appease the baying of the populist press, those with a more nuanced understanding of human nature need screenwriters like Jimmy McGovern more than ever.

And from a specifically Christian perspective, at a time when religious broadcasting seems more marginal than ever and Christianity's place in the public square is ever more contested, to have prime time dramas scripted by people who have an informed understanding of Christian theology and what it might mean in practice to seek to live a Christian life is extremely important for the cultural transmission of the faith.

I think Jimmy McGovern is quite mature in years. Who will inherit the mantle of such as he? What a vocation to be called to! Or if empathetic, non-judgemental listening, rather than screenwriting, is your calling, there are always volunteering opportunities within your local prison chaplaincy team.

1st	EGYPT and SUDAN Local partner Habeeb Kamal has not been able to travel during the pandemic and instead has been discipling believers locally and connecting with churches online to preach. Praise God for the way he has been using Habeeb at this time
2nd	SOUTH SUDAN Lynn Treneary teaches English at Chaima Christian Institute in Maridi and works with evangelist teams and the Mothers' Union. Pray for Chaima Institute, which reopened with reduced classes in March.
3rd	PERU Pat Blanchard has recently returned to Lima and her work with over 100 children with disabilities through Shalom Ministries. Pray for Pat as she settles back in and listens to what God is telling her to do
4th	HONDURAS Pray for Steve Poulson and the team at Street Kids Direct as they seek to help young people who have missed a whole year of school. Pray for understanding, committed teachers who can help children get back into education

God's good questions!

If we can ask God "Good Questions" (as we explored last month) we should expect Him to question us from time to time. When we try to hide from God He searches for us, crying out "*Where are you?*" (Gen 3:9). If we attempt to escape life's problems, like Elijah, we may well have to face the question "*What are you doing here?*" (I Kings 19:9).

One of the phrases Isaiah uses to describe the Messiah is "*Wonderful counsellor*"(Isaiah 9:6). The best counsellors will often ask searching questions that help their clients come to terms with the problems they face. Jesus often used questions in this way.

Bartimaeus was reticent about speaking of his handicap, so he generalized with a cry for mercy. The question Jesus puts to him "*What do you want me to do for you?*" (Mark 10:51). gives the blind man the opportunity and courage to face his blindness and admit. "*Rabbi I want to see*". Only a few verses earlier, James and John are faced with the same searching question, and have to admit that they have been secretly nursing misplaced ambitions of sitting in glory with Jesus. Good questions often lead us to face the truth.

The request put to the Samaritan woman "*Will you give me a drink?*" (John 4:7) empowers her to enter into a deep discussion and relationship with Jesus. Obeying those little nudges that come into our minds, to show a loving action in some way, can do the same for us today.

The very first recorded words of Jesus after his resurrection are two questions to the distraught Mary Magdalene "*Woman, why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?*" (John 20:15).

It is a feature of nearly all the Resurrection appearances that Jesus renews His relationship with his followers by starting with a question.

For example, the two people on the road to Emmaus are helped to face up to their situation with two discerning questions. "*What are you discussing together as you walk along?*" (Luke 24:17). Cleopas gives an evasive answer "*Are you the only one visiting Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?*" Jesus does what any good counsellor would do - he gently probes with the question "*What things?*"

The most sensitive task that a counsellor faces is to ask questions that enable the client to relive a traumatic past event. This is a skilled process because, unless done sensitively, it can become re-abusive. However Jesus uses this method gently with Peter by a charcoal fire on the beach. The threefold request for Peter to state his love for his Lord gives Peter the opportunity to relive his shameful three denials at Jesus' trial by a charcoal fire and to move on. The process of restoration is underlined when Jesus reassures Peter that in future he still has a great ministry to carry out.

When the Holy Spirit - described in John 14:16 as "*another counsellor*" - puts challenging questions into our mind, it may not always be a comfortable experience! However God is love, and they are put there for our benefit. When we accept God's questions and respond appropriately to them, we will experience that the Wonderful Counsellor is also a Mighty God, Everlasting Father, and a Prince of Peace, who brings His powerful peace into our troubled lives.

"Home from Home Room" opening at County on 22nd June. The new room was open for us to see how beautifully it had been decorated and furnished to be like a living room in someone's home. The official opening was carried out by Mr & Mrs R Trigg whose company had donated a plaque for the door and Scott Purser, acting chief nurse. The official bit over, lunch followed during which the room was again open for viewing. Mircea Pestean works with a group of small churches in Romania, in an area of considerable poverty. We support Mircea through our mission fund.

Some of the churches which are partners with MM started to organize evangelistic meetings and there are some people who invited Jesus into their life. This is very encouraging and give us fuel to carry on our ministry.

Jigsaw food program going 'STRONG' bringing Joy, Life and Hope to more than 2000 children each week.

Thank you so much for your life giving prayers and support for Jigsaw's emergency feeding program which started in February. Poverty continues to worsen as households, children and adults are not able to get out and scavenge for resources or earn the small daily wages that used to sustain their households. As a result malnutrition and hunger are rampant throughout all the slum, street, and depressed communities that Jigsaw works in. For many Jigsaw's emergency food program is a life saving source of food and nutrition. Last month we asked for your prayers for funds to sustain this large ministry and we Praise God that your gifts and prayers have not only sustained the buying, cooking and distribution of food but has also enabled Jigsaw to increase its distribution to even more children. We are now providing meals for more than the 2000 children each week. Jigsaw has 8 meal distribution points, 6 in slum and squatter areas and 2 in street locations. The joy and hope the ministry is bringing is indescribable. Thank you for all your gifts and prayers that enable this vital programme to happen. Please keep in your prayers all the Jigsaw staff, who although we work to minimize their risk are still vulnerable to Covid. Thank you.

Online bible study miracles:

God is working in amazing ways through Jigsaw's online Bible groups. Over 100 ladies have joined the Bible groups in April and May. Inspired by this and with further lockdowns in the Philippines each Jigsaw team has started a weekly online Bible study. Jenny started the education sponsorship online Bible study in 3 groups for a 100 students. The literacy ministry started an online Bible study for families and students. Bible study groups have also been set up for the YALE (young adult life empowerment ministry) as well as Solid rock youth group for teens aged 13 to 18 and for Agape which is for young people aged 18 to 25. These ministries each week are amazing as they open the Bible to so many.

Jigsaw Community Ministries combatting fear and bringing HOPE. By Jeannette, Jigsaw new Director.

Today I had the privilege for the first time to join one of Jigsaw's community ministry teams as they delivered their 700 plus Jigsaw Kids at home packs in a tightly packed and very needy urban poor community. The poverty and suffering is so much, yet it was such a wonderful experience to see the children's smiles and eager anticipation for the arrival of the staff in the well known Jigsaw van. They waited patiently as the teams handed out the packs, each with their own name on. As soon as they received their packs they joyfully sped inside to open them and to start on their week's Bible, craft and literacy activities and to see what treasures were inside as they dived into their food packets.

One of the very important focusses of Jigsaw is celebrating each child's birthday with a wrapped up present with their name on. It is such a special thing with many children never receiving a birthday gift, or having their birthday celebrated before. How special and significant for 'your' birthday to be celebrated. It was so special to see the significance and joy as each birthday child for May received their wrapped up present and a small cup cake. The joy of the Lord really is such a strength.

When I see the impact of Jigsaw on these children's lives we wish we could expand Jigsaw for even more children. We see the security in the loving relationships with the Jigsaw staff, the significance of being known and being part of the Jigsaw community and the knowledge that there are people there to help them and their families as needed. The joy and hope in having their Jigsaw at home packs to look forward to each week brings such mental and spiritual strength and the health security of the food packs, all are such a huge help to both the children and their families. I would like to bring a personal thank you to all of you who pray and give to Jigsaw to make these wonderful ministries a reality. I can't express enough how important this is for the lives and future of these children, *thank you from all of us at Jigsaw and each child and their household.*
