## Making a world of difference!

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It's a full-on programme. Eleven days of top-quality action. The Commonwealth Games starts on 28th July with an opening ceremony and will be closed on Monday 8th August. It has some big aims: *"Birmingham 2022 will shine a light on this vibrant corner of the Commonwealth and work to improve health and wellbeing. This is an event that will help the West Midlands to grow and succeed, be a catalyst for change, and foster the spirit of friendship, athleticism, and competition"* (from the Birmingham 2022 website).

Every four years since 1930 (other than during WWII) the event has grown. It now involves competitors from 180 countries who compete in 'the friendly games'. The event will bring people together, improve health and wellbeing (assuming spectators are inspired to get active!) and help the region to grow and develop.

There will be a good spin off for this country and beyond. We tend to be a little too sedentary as a society, so it will help stimulate us to be physically more active. It will no doubt encourage a rising generation to excel in sporting activity through the hard graft involved in the necessary skills of setting targets, working at self-discipline, practising, or refining technique, and also growing in mental skills. There are numerous benefits to being involved in sport. It makes a world of difference for the individual and those that they meet.

If we are truly concerned about our wellbeing then consider the Apostle Paul's wise words to a younger colleague whom he mentored so that he withstood the challenges of life as a leader: *"For while bodily training is of some value, godliness is of value in every way, as it holds promise for the present life and also for the life to come"* (1 Timothy 4v8). It's a reminder to us of how we can be so concerned about physical state of health, that we can neglect our spiritual selves.

Are we going to invest spiritually so that we train ourselves in what is of long-lasting value? Reading through the Holy Bible in larger chunks, or one of its 66 books could be a route for us. ### **GOOD NEWS AND ANSWERED PRAYERS**

Tim and Kate were living in their 6th rented house/living space since coming back to the UK last July, when Kate wrote: 'It was just two weeks before the contract was finishing in our rented accommodation and we still didn't know where we would go next. That weekend Tim said, "I think God is going to lead us to the home that he has for us". so we spent the morning praying and fasting. We had been looking on 'Right Move' unsuccessfully, every few hours for the past few weeks, but when we looked again a house had come back on the market in Milnthorpe 5 mins walk from our friends and the church.

We had seen the house last summer but it had been more than we could afford, BUT miraculously it was now back on the market with a significant drop in price. We decided to try to get a viewing straight away but the agents could only offer us a viewing 8 days later. Concerned that it would be snapped up in that time we decided to just go round. We stood outside the gate a bit apprehensive and prayed, then I nervously went in. The rest is history, as the lady was so happy to see us as her sale had recently fallen through and we made an offer the following day. All being well we will move in at the end of May.'

Kate started, after Easter, teaching Year1/2 in a village school in Caton around 25 mins from Milnthorpe. In September Kate will become the permanent Reception teacher and SENCO for the school. Also, Kate's Mum has been out of hospital since March. It has been a really difficult time, especially for Kate's Dad who is doing much of the caring for her at home, but thankfully, things seem to be slowly improving.

Grace is part of a wonderful youth group at church and has made many friends. She is sitting her IGCSE exams this year and has a place in September at Queen Elizabeth 6th form to do A-levels. James is finishing his first year at Norwich Uni., and Rebekah is completing her final year at Norwich, before going to Germany to do a Masters course in October.

- The family to settle quickly into their new home; that it will become a place of welcome and fellowship, as well as a suitable office for Tim's work.
- A co-worker for Tim to manage UK Jigsaw so Tim can focus fully on His work with Jigsaw Philippines and CMS Southeast Asia.

2nd	Pray for Curtains Up (Berkshire) that started July 31st and SLAM (South Wales) that started yesterday; these are both camps for children 11 years and older
3rd	Pray for Harriers (Norfolk) that started on July 30th and Make The Difference (Derbyshire) that started on July 31st; these are both camps for 15 years and older

17th	Thank you again for standing with us through Jonathan Jr's healing process and the final miracle in a Uganda Hospital Theatre.
18th	Jonathan Jr is now back at university and Jonathan and Robinah are back in Botswana. After this period of struggle to get good medical treatment, pray that their work will get back on track
19th	Pray for Rev Dr Edward Turitwenka, who hopes to continue the work started by the Beesigomwes.
20th	J&R hope to retire in July 2023 but this depends on their house being ready. At the moment it is only a building plot, building work has not begun
	<i>Mission Aviation Fellowship fly medical personnel, supplies and missionaries to far-flung, often inaccessible settlements.</i>
21st	MAF pilot Glenys Watson recently flew 8 medics and 25kg of medicines to Indagen in Papua New Guinea. During the next 3 days they treated 600 patients, carried out 38 surgical operations, and conducted 71 eye consultations
22nd	Pray that MAF will be able to take the Aerial Health Patrol back to Indagen soon, as well as visiting other isolated regions. Indagen has no roads at all and the nearest hospital is a two-day walk over 3 mountain ranges
23rd	Pray for the monthly South Maasai medical safari in Tanzania. Pregnant women and children walk up to 20 miles to be vaccinated against measles and diphtheria

## Return Ticket

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Last month I tried to encourage us to keep persevering in our private prayers in spite of the difficulties. Wandering thoughts are a common problem. Somehow, we need a quick and practical way of coming back to prayer when our thoughts wander.

If we go away on a trip using public transport it is comforting to know that we have a return ticket. Bible verses and phrases are ideal to help us return to our prayers. You can find verses to help throughout the Bible, particularly in the Psalms.

So why not try writing out a Bible verse in big print and displaying it prominently near your place of prayer? When your mind wanders and you realize that you are "on your travels" once again, pick up your written out verse and read it. Doing this will kill the wandering thoughts and act like the return ticket bringing your mind back to your prayers. A weekly change of the "ticket" will counteract any tendency to take the Bible verse for granted!

Here are some examples to get you started.

*"The Lord is near to all who call on him, to all who call on him in truth" (Psalm 145:18)*

*But as for me, it is good to be near God.*

*I have made the Sovereign Lord my refuge. (Psalm 73:28a)*

*Jesus came and stood among them and said "peace be with you" (John 20:19b)*

*In the same way, the Spirit helps us in our weakness. We do not know what we ought to pray for, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us through wordless groans. (Romans 8:26)*

If, (like me!) you have to use the verse quite a lot, you will find that after a couple of days it will be fixed in your memory. We speak of a simple tune "getting on our brains". The same thing can happen with our Bible verse and this has a second very broad practical advantage.

Everyday situations can all too easily make us irritated, worried or apprehensive. Then again we may suddenly find ourselves concerned about someone. If we have our return verse "on the brain" it may well come to the surface at such times and transform the situation into an opportunity for prayer.

If you are trying this for the first time remember you certainly won't be the first person to do it. You will be joining thousands of Christians who always carry a "Return Verse" in the pocket of their heart and mind, to be used whenever needed to return them to God in prayer. *Roger*

## Sermon by Archbishop of York

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*On Friday 3 June the Archbishop delivered the sermon in St Paul's Cathedral during a service to mark and celebrate Her Majesty the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. This follows in full..*

*'Bring your supplications and thanksgivings to God' says St Paul. 'Then the peace of God will guard your heart and mind... and keep on doing the things that you see in me.'* (Philippians 4.6,7 & 9)

Of course, the 'me' in that sentence is Paul himself. But Paul is only worth following because he is following Jesus. And Jesus is worth following because Jesus shows us who God is, and what our humanity could be. And there are many occasions in the gospels where we see Jesus himself, faithful to his vocation, seeking out places of replenishing so that he can learn God's way.

*'I only do what I see the Father doing',* says Jesus (see John 5. 19). *'He is close to God's heart',* says St John (see John 1.18).

Sometimes I wonder whether the whole Christian faith is best understood as an invitation to dwell there ourselves. And the purpose of the Christian faith is to know and to do God's will. Sisters and brothers, dear friends, we gather today in great rejoicing to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen, but we do it against a backdrop of such suffering and uncertainty in our world.

For me, the best leaders - like Paul, like Jesus - are those who know how to be led. People who lead for others, not themselves. People whose heart's desire is to serve the common good and build up the common life; who don't try to do it all themselves, or act in their own strength alone; people who take a longer view; and who seek out places of replenishing, even places where they might learn the mind of Christ.

And I say this today, knowing that in Her Majesty the Queen we see an example of this kind of service; a staunch constancy and a steadfast consistency; a faithfulness to God, an obedience to a vocation that is the bedrock of her life.

## Sermon by Archbishop of York

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No, bedrock isn't quite the right image. Faith in Jesus Christ is a fountain, and it is a well. It is the well from which we draw deeply and replenish ourselves through all the challenges, joys, and vicissitudes of life.

And it is a fountain, overflowing with immense joy. Joy, that we can live in the assurance that we are loved; joy, that God has a purpose for our lives; and, joy, that through Christ's dying and rising we have the promise of life eternal.

Now we all know that Her Majesty likes horse racing and I imagine Your Majesty will be watching this on the television. I don't have any great tips for the Derby tomorrow, but since the scriptures describe life as a race set before us, let me observe that your long reign reflects the distance of Aintree more than the sprints of Epsom. Certainly, less dressage than most people imagine. But with endurance, through times of change and challenge, joy and sorrow, you continues to offer yourself in the service of our country and the commonwealth. Your Majesty, we're sorry you're not with us this morning in person, but we are so glad you are still in the saddle. And we are all glad that there is still more to come.

So, thank you for staying the course. Thank you, for continuing to be faithful to the pledges you made 70 years ago. Thank you for showing us how service and faithfulness matter. People of all faiths and no faith and people of goodwill can learn from this.

Sometimes people say to me that the Christian faith is just a prop. I couldn't agree more. I'm not ashamed to say I lean on Jesus Christ, that I'm trying to live close to his heart. That I need his wisdom and his hope. And if you will forgive such presumption, this is what I also see in Her Majesty the Queen.

And to the people of our great nation, on this great and historic day, I say this: we are indeed living in a time of uncertainty and challenge, and we would do well to consider where we will find the replenishing we need.

## An island church

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While on holiday we visited the Church of Scotland church in Brae (Shetland) for the 10am service. Lynn, the minister, read the reading and said the prayers as well as preaching.

After the service we spoke to Lynn and several of the congregation over tea and biscuits. The Church of Scotland is selling off twenty out of thirty-one churches in the Shetland Isles, which is a very sad thing. Nearly all churches on the outer islands have now closed. At the moment twelve are still in use as one of the designated churches has not yet closed. Lynn and two other clergy look after all twelve. Considering that the remaining churches are spread across four islands connected only by ferry, that is quite a challenge. Lynn lives on the island of Yell so had to catch a ferry to come to Brae which is on the "mainland", followed by a 30 mile drive. She had two more services that day, on different islands.

After ten minutes, Lynn departed for her next service so we spoke to members of the congregation for a while. Local communities had been upset by closure of their churches, even though very few people had attended the churches. During the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries everybody walked to church (of course) so there was a kirk in every settlement. In the mid 1800s many were demolished and a few were rebuilt. The church we visited dated from 1846. In the 1800's only two families lived on the island of Noss but there was a kirk, now a ruin. Noss is now a bird sanctuary and two nature wardens are the only human inhabitants (with over 25,000 gannets).

Some of the recent church closures are understandable. The church on Out Skerries, for example. The small group of three islands is a 2.5 hour ferry journey from Lerwick. Population of Out Skerries has fallen from 65 in 2013 to just 35 people in 2022. The islands are only 200 miles from Norway but 800 miles from London. There is a tiny airfield but in bad weather both air and ferry crossings are impossible. One of the three islands is now uninhabited. The secondary school was closed in 2014 when there were 3 pupils, meaning that teenagers must travel to Lerwick and live in boarding accommodation Monday to Friday. The primary school had only one pupil in 2016 and has now been moth-balled. So the church outlasted both schools.

On arriving at 'Royal Stoke University Hospital' on Monday 30<sup>th</sup> May I was pleased to find that finally the regulations which patient visitors have had to follow for so long had been relaxed to much like arrangements before the pandemic started. It would be difficult to exaggerate how thrilled that patients and visitors alike were by this news!

Also on that day I found a 'Mr Whippy' van serving free ice cream cones with sauce and flake to staff as a THANK YOU for all their hard work! I had one on my way to 'The West Building' and another on my way back to 'The Chaplaincy Office'. You can imagine my excitement when he was there outside 'County Hospital' the following day. However, as he handed me my cornet, he said "Didn't I see you up at Stoke yesterday?" How could he remember me, I wondered, out of the hundreds of people he had served? (*NB: Answers to that question are not required or particularly welcome!*) I found out that there is also to be a 'free cooked breakfast' day at both hospitals but unfortunately neither is on a day which fits in with my working pattern – what a pity!

'The Jubilee' Celebrations were also in full swing and staff had put in a lot of effort. There was bunting everywhere and in places it had been made from paper Union Flag serviettes folded diagonally over string – very bright, cheerful and inventive but inexpensive to make in quantity. In some wards there was even a CROWN placed over every bed! I saw a nurse wearing a headband with 2 Jubilee flags standing up out of it and sitting at the head of one ward was 'Her Majesty' surveying her subjects down each side of the ward! Although I took her photo I am advised that it would not reproduce in this magazine .

I continue to be amazed by the lengths to which hospital staff are prepared to go to help their patients feel part of what's going on in the wider community. They certainly deserve our thanks and support.
