The summer is full of special events. From Edinburgh to Reading huge crowds will enjoy festivals of orchestral or rock music, stage or street drama, or even the rediscovery of a community picnic. The summer holds many treats to enjoy that and point to things greater than everyday life. One of the most exotic festivals at the end of August is the Notting Hill Carnival. It owes its existence to Black immigrants from the Caribbean, especially Trinidad, who felt on the edge of society. It brought together people who felt that they faced racism, lack of working opportunities, poor housing conditions and low self-esteem. In the 1960's the sound of the steel band was first heard - its infectious style of music and rhythm encouraged great celebration. As steel drum music floated down London's streets it was like music from another land.

These festivals are attractive for the sheer enjoyment of live artistic performances. There's also a sense of occasion as large crowds travel to be part of a temporary community, united by a common passion.

A Christian understanding of such highs of enjoyment is that they point to something far greater. A hint is found in the Psalms (a collection of praise and prayers set to music, but only the lyrics remain): 'Sing praises to God, sing praises; sing praises to our King, sing praises' (Ps 67v6-7). Here's the exuberance of God's people. It overflows into a desire that others are drawn in: 'May all the peoples praise you, O God; may all the peoples praise you. May the nations be glad and sing for joy, for you rule the peoples justly and guide the nations of the earth' (Ps 67v3-4). God's Kingdom and perfect rule will last forever. These blessings come to us through Jesus Christ and are overwhelmingly good. Even the most general of blessings is like music from a distant land, or like a fleeting smell of an appetising aroma that makes us want more! One day there will

be an enormous gathering in heaven of God's people who are drawn from every tribe and nation assembled around the divine throne. This will be the finale, but also the future for all who are followers of Jesus Christ.

I hope that your summer has many enjoyable occasions. I hope too that you will join us as we meet together in anticipation of the great day that awaits.

Jesus strived to bring togetherness and unity amongst his followers, despite there being those on the sidelines who were anxious to see his downfall. They wanted it not because they felt it would be best for God's kingdom, but because it would be best for their own political careers.

In these months since coming to Lichfield I have found a real heart throughout the Diocese for taking the mission of God forward. Thank you, not just for the warmth of your welcome to the new girl, but also for the way you have continued to give sacrificially to the common purse despite hard economic times and your desire to do new things at parish level. Additionally, so many people have been open and honest with me about their perceptions of life in the Diocese. Such openness has helped me understand better some of your frustrations and hopes for change.

I want people to know that the Diocese administration is here to empower Parishes – that is why we have issued the leaflet "Putting Parishes FIRST" and re-structured the team to give us the best chance of making that happen. He broke down barriers, built relationships and transformed the lives of those he came into contact by giving them hope and purpose. That is the common task before us all.

If we put the life of the Parish and our communities first, I believe we will continue to see growth and health and most importantly a unity in the spirit. Now that's coalition!

Bible-a-Month Club

The **Bible a Month** Club makes the Bible available around the world month after month after month.

By joining the Club one can give a Bible to someone every month

- Provides **free or low-cost Bibles** for some of the billion people who live on less than 60p a day.
- Helps **translate the Bible** at a time when more than half the world's languages still wait for even one book of the Bible.
- Brings **the Bible in Braille** to blind people. Around 314 million people globally are blind or can't see clearly.
- Provides **the Bible in audio** to reach those who live in cultures that don't or can't read.

The Bible-a-month Club is just one of the activities of the Bible Society. Here are some others:-

Translating Bibles

For the past 200 years, Bible Societies across the world have worked to make the Bible available in the languages people need most. As a result, they have been responsible for more than **300 of the 450 languages** that now have a translation of the whole Bible. This has made the Scriptures accessible to more than five billion of the world's population.

However, more than 4,400 languages still wait for even one book of the Bible. This means millions either have no access to the Bible at all or can only encounter it in something other than their 'heart' language.

The big picture is that there are 6,912 languages in the world. Of these –

- 451 languages have a translation of the whole Bible.
- 2,479 languages have part of the Bible.

This leaves 4,421 languages still waiting for even one book of the Bible.

Bibles for Refugees

Bible Society works with **dedicated specialists** to provide refugees with the Scriptures in languages they can understand.

We never hand out Bibles indiscriminately. And are always **sensitive to the risks** that come from such diverse groups of fragile and vulnerable people living so closely together.

We also work in partnership with agencies working to meet the refugees' physical needs and with churches and mission agencies determined to meet their spiritual needs.

DIRECT NEWS FROM THE PHILIPPINES

For the past year the literacy program has had 53 students, but now there are only 3 continuing. WHY? Because — wait for it— 50 children students from the Jigsaw literacy programme have taken entrance tests into the local schools and passed with highest marks. Some of the children who had their parents with them saw the look of pride on their parent's faces as the teachers asked which private schools the children had been attending as their language skills were by far the best! Through your ongoing support, love, prayers and giving, Jigsaw Literacy programme has empowered children incredibly. Besides continuing the literacy programme for a new batch of 23 students, Jigsaw is also supporting the families of the former students in their new endeavour to look after their children and bring them to school. This support is given through the expertise of Jigsaws social worker and by providing them with school books and uniforms. It is amazing how your support and prayers are changing the lives of these 50 children and so, many more.

The GOOD NEWS is that a lot is happening and Tim hopes to put down information in his massive missive which should be sent next week.

One of the core values of Jigsaw is 'BEING THERE' for the children, day after day, week after week, month after month, never leaving them or abandoning them, 'NO MATTER WHAT.' Sometimes we know you must WONDER 'what is happening' is 'anything happening', we want to encourage you all that Jigsaw is 'BEING THERE' day in and day out for these such needy children and we want to thank you even in the quiet times for 'BEING THERE' for Jigsaw; Being there without thanks and without reward. It is this sacrificial ongoing 'Being there' for Jigsaw that you do, that allows Jigsaw in the Philippines to keep on 'BEING THERE' every day for these children. We praise God for your 'being there, no matter what' love.

ENTRANCE

Travelling north up the Shropshire Union Canal we passed through Chester and arrived at Ellesmere Port, the terminus. British Waterways let us out through the lock onto the Manchester Ship Canal and we turned west for Eastham Lock and the River Mersey. We had 4 nautical miles of estuary on the full tide and then we were to be locked through into Salthouse Dock.

We headed northwest, following the buoys on our chart and the landmarks on the Liverpool skyline, the most prominent of which were the Anglican and Metropolitan Cathedrals. The slender spikes atop 'Paddy's Wigwam' were a surprising contrast to the red sandstone bulk of the Anglican pile.

It is a great treat for me to worship in a cathedral with choral services. Terry spoke warmly of the Magnificat and the Nunc Dimittis and I was happy to go along with his suggestion. When I was a girl I sang in the choir of our village church in Clyro where the Rev Francis Kilvert had been curate and I always found Evensong the most moving of the services, especially in the winter. The church looked so welcoming and the collect 'Lighten our darkness' really meant something to a child – 'Defend us from all perils and dangers'. So off we trudged up the hill to Liverpool Cathedral.

It is built on a mound in the middle of a quarry and so has a sort of moat around it and as I looked up at the huge tower I felt a terrible weight above me. The size of the building was intimidating – it is the biggest UK cathedral and the fifth largest in the world. We went inside and there was more red stone and bulky sculptures. As we walked up to the choir stalls where Choral Evensong would be held the atmosphere was so unlike the feeling I get when I arrive at Christchurch, that of belonging to a family. I prayed that I would be able to feel God's presence.

The service began, the choir sang, nothing really seemed to connect with me at all until the Nunc Dimittis. As we reached 'To be a light to lighten the Gentiles' the sun's rays suddenly came streaming in through a high window and dazzled me and I knew that the Lord had once again answered my prayers.

Whether you are new to the Stone area or have been living here for some time you are welcome to come to this church. The church is made up of adults and children who want to know more about the living God, who has supremely revealed Himself in Jesus Christ and continues to speak to us through His Spirit-inspired word, the Holy Bible (which can be read online at www.biblegateway.com and we recommend a modern translation e.g. the New International Version or English Standard Version).

We are a Christian church, because at the heart of what we believe is the fact that to know God personally we must put our trust in Jesus' death for our forgiveness so that we can be reconciled to God. We are part of the Anglican church, the basis of its Trinitarian belief is summarised in the Book of Common Prayer with its 39 articles, though we unite in Christ irrespective of denomination. We are an Evangelical church, as we see that the Bible is God's word for us and so is to inspire all that we do. This church was established with the help of the renowned Charles Simeon.

Our church meetings help us to grow in our understanding of what the Bible tells us about God, and this is something that we encourage others to investigate especially through our *Christianity Explored* course (see details on the national website www.christianityexplored.com). If you would like details of when the next local course is starting then please contact the church office.

We have children's and youth activities running during the Sunday meetings and also during the week, such as our Tuesday evening youth club. Adults may be further involved through small groups which meet for Bible study and prayer, a midweek communion service and a monthly prayer meeting.

Our community involvement includes links with the local schools: Christ Church First, Oulton First, Christ Church Middle and Alleyne's High.

We also have links with the Church in India, The Philippines, Croatia, Botswana and Pakistan.

This magazine and the church website concern Christ Church in Stone, but we are linked with the churches in Oulton and Moddershall (see separate magazine and website).
