The Fish

At the start of Jesus' public ministry he went down to the shore of Lake Galilee. There he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the lake, as they were working fishermen. He said: '*Come, follow me, and I will make you fishers of men*' (Mk 1v17). Ever since then the fish has been used as a Christian symbol.

The Greek word for fish IXOY Σ (*ichthus* or *ichthys*) was the recognised sign of Christians. The *ichthys* is seen in 1st-century catacombs in Rome where Christians were able to bury their dead in secret, during their persecution by the Roman Empire in the first few centuries after Christ. They used the fish symbol to mark their meeting places and tombs, or to distinguish friends from foes. It is thought that when a Christian met a stranger in the road, the Christian sometimes drew one arc of the simple fish outline in the dirt. If the stranger drew the other arc, both believers knew they were in good company. You might see the symbol as a car sticker to signal that the driver is a practising Christian.

The Greek capital letters $IX\Theta Y\Sigma$ may often added to the fish symbol as shorthand for some Christian truth. Each letter comes from the first letter of five Greek words:

Ίησοϋς Χριστός Θεοϋ Ύιός, Σωτήρ

(sometimes written for ease of reading as *Iēsous Christos, Theou Huios, Sōtēr*).

The meaning is a neat summary of some key foundations of Christian faith:

Iota (i)	is the first letter of <i><u>I</u>ēsous</i> for " <u>Jesus</u> ".
Chi (ch)	is the first letter of <u>Christos</u> for "anointed".
Theta (th)	is the first letter of <i>Theou</i> for "God's".
<u>Upsilon</u> (y)	is the first letter of yios for "Son".
Sigma (s)	is the first letter of Soter for "Savior".

The point is that through Jesus Christ, God's Son and our Saviour, we can be forgiven, we can know the living God, we can be part of a community connected to one another by faith in Jesus. His followers are to be fishers of men *i.e.* to join the family business of gathering people to live under the reign of King Jesus. For one day he will return to be our judge and to take his faithful people home to heaven.

This is what we explore together in our meetings especially on Sundays. This is what we hope you will come to investigate and delight in more and more. We have a special Harvest Festival service at the end of the month, which is an easy way into the life of the church. Why not make this term a time to make a fresh start with God?

Traidcraft - What we do

Our mission is to fight poverty through trade, practising and promoting approaches to trade that help poor people in developing countries transform their lives.

Established in 1979 as a Christian response to poverty, we combine a trading company and a development charity.

We build lasting relationships with producers, support people to trade out of poverty and work to bring about trade justice.

I wonder if we British don't really value rest and relaxation? We seem to make a virtue out of unceasing work; we boast about how busy we are, as if the hectic pace of our lives is proof that we are important and significant. We feel guilty when we're not working and we're suspicious of anyone who lifts their nose from the grindstone for too long. In France, the whole country basically shuts down for the month of August and everyone heads for the beach or the mountains. While the number of public holidays in Britain is eight; on the continent it's ten or eleven. Despite working more hours, it is debatable whether our country is any more productive. Indeed, Britain has one of the highest records for workdays lost due to sickness in Europe.

In our fast paced world, tales of emotional exhaustion and spiritual bankruptcy are not uncommon and stress is a recognised illness. People feel stretched and overloaded – indeed it is expected of them! I noticed a recent advert on TV that promised to keep you looking fresh, even after sixteen hours. It seemed to be applauding those 'tough people' who worked sixteen hour days. Crazy!

We were not, however, designed to be forever on the go. Fast paced lifestyles and little sleep rob us not only of energy but also of relationships. This seems to be a particular danger in the Church where it is all too easy for work and ministry to become the other woman or man in a marriage. We rob ourselves, however, when we desire autonomy or when we imagine we are indispensable, declaring that we can manage alone, that we don't need anyone or anything else to help us. As Charles de Gaulle once said: 'the graveyards are full of indispensable men'.

Jesus may have worked long hours teaching and healing but he knew that he needed to draw aside, to step out of the rush and away from the demands laid upon him. He knew of his need to find peace and to reconnect with his Father, gaining spiritual energy and sustenance in solitude. Exhaustion is a fact of life. The prophet Isaiah reminds us that even young people grow tired and become weary. He tells us that the remedy for weariness is rest, waiting on God, waiting to be filled with his strength. So if the prophets recognised the need for spiritual refuelling and Jesus prioritised time alone with his father, how much more do we need it? *(continued on next page)* We need to relearn this... I need to relearn this! More than that the world needs us God's people – his Church – to model a healthy rhythm of work and rest for we live in a world that is a long way out of balance. In our society, young and old seek oblivion in alcohol; anti-depressants are amongst the most prescribed medications. People are yearning for real rest as the lie of consumerisms' ability to satisfy in any meaningful way is being exposed. This deep recession gives us an opportunity and a choice. It could mean that we go on blindly working harder and harder to obtain the things we have grown used to possessing; or it could mean a time to take stock and count our blessings for what we enjoy – what Archbishop David Hope called an opportunity to model a lifestyle of 'enoughness'.

If you're like me, it will be an evening fishing on the river; if you're like the Archdeacon of Salop, it will be playing with your model railway in the attic: a walk in the park; reading a good book; playing games with your children and grand-children, listening to the radio, visiting neighbours and friends – there are so many simple and inexpensive ways to discover re-creation.

As a creator of community, the church is called to model the true worth of human beings as men and women made in the image of God. Making room for the marginalised and the newcomer, providing opportunities for people to meet, relax, play together and strengthen friendships, is a wonderful way to help people belong and feel cherished. In these simple acts we proclaim good news to our neighbours: 'you have great worth, regardless of how much or how little you accomplish. You have value because God is your Father and, in Christ, you are loved as his very own.'

The PCC met on Wednesday 14 July 2010 and the following matters were reported on, discussed and/or decided.

- The revised Mission Action Plan was approved. This covers the work of the whole benefice and is set out under the 4 primary purposes defined by the diocese; *Growing together* through worship and prayer; *Growing up* through teaching and nurture; *Growing more* through outreach and evangelism; *Growing out* through justice and care
- Mrs Gill Latos was appointed as the Child Protection Coordinator and is supported by Mrs J Hipkiss who coordinates the CRB checking process
- We have been awarded an extension to the faculty until April 2012. This will allow us sufficient time to complete the works that we planned, including improvements to the chancel.
- It is hoped we can get the shops in the town to put together a series of Advent windows in December. The idea is that each shop will take 1 day each and dress their windows with a Christmas theme. Number 24 will be at Christ Church and will be a living nativity scene.
- There will be a service at Lichfield Cathedral at 3.00pm on Sunday 26 September 2010 to welcome the new Bishop of Stafford, The Revd Canon Geoff Annas. There are 'no restrictions on numbers' but admission to the service will be by ticket only. Order by e-mail or post by 31 August to Emma Williams. Tickets will be sent out by 10 September.
- Since the installation of the new church entrance it has been noticed that the new doors are awkward to open for those in wheelchairs and with pushchairs and too heavy for the children and elderly. We are investigating automatic opening for these doors. In addition, as reported previously, we would like to improve the pathway that goes across the rear church yard to Bromfield Court. Linking this path to the front of the church we would also like to create some additional hard standing parking at the end of the church centre, where the small grassed area is. This would provide some spaces closer to the building. We are to apply for a grant to help fund this work as adaptations to improve accessibility under the requirements of the Disability Discrimination Act.

The next PCC meeting is on Wednesday 22 September 2010 at 7.30pm.

We had been following the River Douglas ever since we had come off the Lancaster Canal via the River Ribble and the tidal Douglas. Before the Rufford branch of the Leeds and Liverpool canal was constructed goods were brought up the Douglas as far as Wigan and you can still see remains of locks and weirs. On Thursday we found ourselves in the most beautiful valley with the river just across a field from the canal, quite safe for the dogs to run free, the first blackberries ready to pick, Utopia! We decided to have a day moored up with no boating, just greenery. We both agreed it was one of the very best moorings we'd ever had in 15 years of boating.

On Saturday morning we reluctantly pulled up our mooring pins and headed for Wigan Pier. Gradually the glorious countryside gave way to ruined industry, bankrupt car dealerships and derelict garages, fine old pub buildings with their roofs destroyed, and there we were, mooring up to a row of rings just by the Pier itself. A noticeboard explained that the Pier had been a coal staithe but that its real site was not known so in the 1980s students had built a guesstimate.

We walked along the towpath with Jim and Jess and found it littered with cigarette ends and empty packets warning of DEATH. Whether you are new to the Stone area or have been living here for some time you are welcome to come to this church. The church is made up of adults and children who want to know more about the living God, who has supremely revealed Himself in Jesus Christ and continues to speak to us through His Spirit-inspired word, the Holy Bible (which can be read online at <u>www.biblegateway.com</u> and we recommend a modern translation e.g. the New International Version or English Standard Version).

We are a Christian church, because at the heart of what we believe is the fact that to know God personally we must put our trust in Jesus' death for our forgiveness so that we can be reconciled to God. We are part of the Anglican church, the basis of its Trinitarian belief is summarised in the Book of Common Prayer with its 39 articles, though we unite in Christ irrespective of denomination. We are an Evangelical church, as we see that the Bible is God's word for us and so is to inspire all that we do. This church was established with the help of the renowned Charles Simeon.

Our church meetings help us to grow in our understanding of what the Bible tells us about God, and this is something that we encourage others to investigate especially through our *Christianity Explored* course (see details on the national website <u>www.christianityexplored.com</u>). If you would like details of when the next local course is starting then please contact the church office.

We have children's and youth activities running during the Sunday meetings and also during the week, such as our Tuesday evening youth club. Adults may be further involved through small groups which meet for Bible study and prayer, a midweek communion service and a monthly prayer meeting.

Our community involvement includes links with the local schools: Christ Church First, Oulton First, Christ Church Middle and Alleyne's High.

We also have links with the Church in India, The Philippines, Croatia, Botswana and Pakistan.
