"Happy New Year!" How do you know whether this proves to be the case? Can you measure a nation's happiness, or an individual's wellbeing? Recent public debates have drawn attention to how measuring economic activity doesn't deliver all that we need to know. After all, it's argued, it doesn't take account of wider social factors e.g. when economic success is at the expense of social problems. Others say that the whole debate is in order to sidestep the economic reality. Whichever political point of view we take, it is surely an issue which concerns us all.

The Bible says that our well-being results from our relationship with God. Jesus taught about true wellbeing. In media friendly sound-bites he commends those who are real about their relationship with God, so that it spills out into everyday life. These are the ones he commends. His teaching of the beatitudes [Lat: <u>beatitudo</u> = 'blessed'], comes in a series of statements that all begin 'blessed is/are....' These memorable oneliners are ideal for the media. Jesus' teaching is neither about happiness (which narrowly focuses on our emotional wellbeing), nor is it to do with chance or luck (which is an idea that stems from a belief in pagan gods thought to randomly determine a person's destiny). Rather, Jesus commends all who make their relationship with God a priority so that it transforms the way they live:

- ³ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.
- ⁴ Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.
- ⁵ Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.
- ⁶ Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.
- ⁷ Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.
- ⁸ Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.
- ⁹ Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.
- ¹⁰ Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven [Matthew 5v3-10]. *(continued on next page)*

The point is that true happiness or blessedness is found in relation to God: knowing God leads to living His way which makes us more like Him. This relationship brings amazing rewards to both the individual and to others. Knowing God means that we increasingly invest in eternal things for we have discovered what is truly valuable.

So, I hope you have a happy and blessed New Year!

John and John Butterworth went in the summer to a Christian Festival they had never heard of before tucked away in a village on the Welsh borders and they were surprised how good it was. This is Jan's report.

Surprised by joy was the theme of this year's Gorsley Chapel Flower Festival and Convention, where hundreds of coach-goers on mystery day trips end up experiencing the beautiful flowers and enjoying cream cakes and teas in a village nestling close to the Welsh hills.

But there was another mystery invitation at Gorsley this year, which European Christian Mission (ECM) invited people to experience. The Labyrinth was based in a sparsely decorated school, which had been turned into a tented tangle of intricate corners and connections so that visitors could experience a short but very profound spiritual journey and where I was literally 'surprised by joy'.

At the beginning of each individual journey, every person becomes a pilgrim by putting on a set of headphones and taking a lantern, lit by a small candle, before entering the spiritual maze ahead.

At each corner, the pilgrim has a different experience, and by using sound and light, is invited to continue through the maze. I found the short journey of 45mins challenging and uplifting and appreciated a learning how to worship in a new and profoundly different way.

This was something I could confidently invite my friends and work colleagues to experience; unlike my hesitation to invite them to church, which often seems too large a step for someone beginning on a spiritual journey.

Another surprise was that it was all jointly expressed in English and Polish, as the Labyrinth originated in Poland. During the festival, as part of ECM's Pole-to-Pole project, many Polish people visited Gorsley and journeyed through the Labyrinth as well.

Most people found the experience very moving, and it was very helpful that as you emerged into normality people were on hand to talk and support if needed.

The Labyrinth was extremely popular and every slot was booked from 8am until 7pm every day which demonstrated the value of this tool to help modern pilgrims to step back, reflect and meeting the Loving God in a most profound way.

⁷Author presents copy of his book to the Albanian Ambassador

Presenting a copy of my book, God's Secret Listener, to the Albanian Ambassador in London was one of those PR ideas I thought was worth trying, but I never expected it to happen.

I carefully worded my letter to the embassy to talk about the exemplary military record of Berti Dosti, whom the book is about, and how he was helping the youth of Albania by running a school teaching English to 700 pupils. I omitted to say the former army captain had become a Christian after secretly listening to the radio while on military duty for the Stalinist dictator Enver Hoxha and he was now the pastor of a lively church.

One Wednesday in October, I posted the letter and was shocked to receive a call on my mobile two days later on the Friday asking when I would like to come.

So on Thursday, November 18 Berti Dosti and I caught a taxi at Victoria Station and asked to be taken to be the Albanian Embassy at 33 St George's Drive.

"I have never been asked for that destination before," said a surprised taxi driver as we clambered inside.

There was another surprise waiting as we entered the smart large terraced house that had been the embassy's home for only four years. We were greeted by Flutur Shkurti, who recognised Berti as a distant cousin.

We were taken into the office of His Excellency Zef Mazi and were impressed how simply and neatly the embassy was furnished. It was nowhere near as lavish as I expected it to be.

However, I wasn't too surprised that the Ambassador, a nuclear energy expert who had worked in the Albanian embassies in Switzerland and Austria, had done his homework on Berti and they chatted away in Albanian about the church in their country.

His Excellency, who had been in the UK for four years, said he enjoyed British life and particularly our cathedrals and choral music.

The ambassador said he was looking forward in a few days' time to his annual dinner again with the Queen at Buckingham Palace. He said he was impressed that when he went with about 40 Ambassadors from the Balkans and surrounding countries the Queen always found time to talk to each of them individually.

Berti and I thought we would be at the embassy for only five minutes, but we had over an hour with the ambassador and we presented him a special signed copy of the book and he also agreed to pass another copy of the book on to the President of Albania, His Excellency Mr Bamir Topi.

At the end of the meeting, the Ambassador asked if there had been a book launch and I explained that we had had one in Shrewsbury.

The PCC met on Wednesday 17 November 2010 and the following matters were reported on, discussed and/or decided.

- · Letters are to be sent out to all groups who use the cupboard space in the kitchen asking them to review their storage as some of the space is being used inappropriately for the storage of non-kitchen related items.
- · Since the removal of the low walls and the pews in the chancel area it was agreed that this area should be carpeted. The new carpet will match in with the carpet on the staging area and continue the wooden strips up to the rail.
- The Lighthouse children's club (for Year groups 3 to 5, ages 7 to 10) restarted after the October half term. Kieran McKnight made a plea for additional helpers for this club. With the current number of children attending it is manageable but if numbers rise more helpers will be essential.
- When the communion table is in the forward position four people are required to administer the chalice during communion services. Permission is to be sought from the Bishop for five additional people to administer the chalice.
- It was agreed to support African Leaders with a Christmas gift of a book pack via the Langham Partnership.
- · Concern was expressed over the proposed revision to the admissions policy for Christ Church Middle School to move the criteria of a child being a practising Christian down the list to fifth position in considering whether a child should be offered a place at the school. This is to be raised at with Governors to try to elevate the criteria to higher in the list.
- Benjamin Hardee (an American student) will be joining us for 6 weeks starting in February 2011 on an internship. He is currently studying Theology at Bonn University in Germany. The aim of his internship is to allow him to experience as wide a range of work as possible.

The next PCC meeting is on Wednesday 19 January 2011 at 7.30pm.


