

The importance of the AV

May is a significant month for the AV. If you're reaching to stifle a yawn please read on, as I'm side stepping the referendum on the electoral process on 5th May. Instead I want to draw attention to the 400th Anniversary of the Authorised (King James) Version of the Holy Bible on Monday 2nd May 2011. The importance of this Bible translation is that it redefined the English language. Some modern day expressions owe their existence to this Bible translation. Think of such phrases as 'a drop in the bucket', 'a lamb to the slaughter' and 'a fly in the ointment.' These phrases owe their existence to the Authorised Version.

The background is fascinating. The bishops had banned the English Bible in 1408. The genius of the translation was due to its deliberately memorable phrases which were designed for public reading. It was also a significant marker in the development of the English language. The AV was one in a succession of English versions of the Bible published as a result of a new emphasis on a return to sources. There had been an upturn of interest in researching the original manuscripts (mainly in Hebrew and Greek), to produce an accurate English translation rather than one from the inaccurate Latin Vulgate. When William Tyndale saw at first hand the ignorance of the clergy he declared: "If God spare my life, ere many years pass I will cause a boy that driveth the plough shall know more of the Scriptures than thou dost!" His lifelong aim was to enable ordinary people to read and understand the Holy Bible. The invention of the printing press made it possible for large numbers to be made.

Modern versions have built upon this Bible version, updating its language and knowledge to bring an understanding of the Word of God to an everyday audience. Drawbacks to the AV concern its accuracy and its

obsolete language. In the last 400 years much earlier manuscripts have been found which are closer in time to the original texts. Historians work by the principle that the earlier the text, the nearer it is to the original. In terms of language the meaning of words changes e.g 'charity' is nowadays associated with shops raising money to provide humanitarian aid.

In the AV the word charity concerns the all-encompassing, compassionate love that God has for us, and that we should have for one another even when it is at personal cost. So, a reliable Holy Bible such as the New International Version (as we use in our churches) has just been republished to improve its accuracy, or the English Standard Version (deliberately closer word for word to the original manuscripts) enable us to read in the language of the day.

Why worry about the translation? The risen Jesus said that the entire Bible spoke about Him (see Luke 24v27). So we will naturally want the very best translation to learn as much about Him as possible. The Holy Bible is the main way that God's grace comes to us as: 'All scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work' (II Tim 3v16-17).

I hope that this is a book you turn to frequently and that it will inspire you to pray and strengthen you to serve the risen Lord Jesus Christ.

Things we say!!!

We often use important or pertinent phrases in a rather offhand manner, either not understanding their real meaning or their spiritual importance.We have a chalkboard in the kitchen on which we write 'to do' things, and as you can imagine it's rarely empty!! But the other day I was able to 'wipe the slate clean' and as I did it and uttered those words it struck me that I'd said something very important, but in a fairly glib manner......and it stopped me in my tracks. It was so easy to do and so easy to say and yet, in my 'chalkboard' life my slate has been wiped clean, all the 'wrong' things I've ever done or said, gone, forgotten, just as easily as I waved the cloth over the chalkboard. But of course there was a price to pay. Jesus paid that price, for me, by giving up His life on the cross. "For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more" Hebrews, ch8 vs12. *Phil Tunstall*

It's true – there were about 5 nights where I huddled under a doubled-over blanket wearing a cardigan (that I'd packed away ready for my return to UK) over the top of my nighty! At times it was quite windy but the rest of the time was hot with temperatures up to 36.

I thoroughly enjoyed having Anya and Danielle with me. They fitted in brilliantly and both want to go back.

As well as experiencing working with My Sister's company, the girls visited compounds, the women's allotments, 2 secondary schools, the capital city of Banjul and travelled on both public transport and donkey cart.

A highlight for me was going into Pirang Basic Cycle School and teaching art to Grade 9, tho' the ages ranged from 13 to about 17. I can't wait to go again. Here is Danielle's report of that visit:

"The school had no colours, games, toys or materials to stimulate young minds – but at playtimes, the children still had fun, playing football with an old plastic container, and chanting and dancing.

Classrooms have a blackboard and rough wooden desks. The only resources were textbooks for children to share; there was a library, but no books; and there was no art equipment, so our gifts of paper, paint, brushes and pencils were very welcome. We had a fun lesson and they produced some great work. All school children have to pay fees and sadly many children do not have the opportunity to go or only sporadically."

Art lessons, as well as science, take place on the blackboard – the pupils just copy stuff into their notebooks, so although they had learnt the theory of mixing colours, they had never done it and it was fun watching their faces as they actually saw red and yellow mixed together and produce orange! There was not an art room until the 2 teachers built one themselves out of reclaimed wood and corrugated iron.

Danielle again: "We visited a youth-led church in Kitty (Balanta tribe) This was an eye-opening experience! The church had about 12 people (more with children) and they all worshipped and made a joyful sound using voices, drums and traditional rhythm."

We've brought back some lovely new things that the women have made, which hopefully you will get a chance to see and also hopefully buy! Thank you for all your prayers and support, *Pam* Ian Botham, Man Utd, the Saddlers or Jesus Christ? Who made the greatest comeback?

In the Headingley Test Match of 1981, stripped of the captaincy and in some disgrace, Botham bats with amazing belief and confidence to score 149 Not Out and scupper the Aussies after England looked dead and buried.

In 1999, Man Utd, 1-0 down after 90 minutes, come back to score two goals against Bayern Munich in injury time and win the Champions League Final.

At the beginning of this year most Walsall fans thought it a dead cert that the Saddlers would be plying their trade in League Two next season; but at the time of writing it looks as if *the Great Escape* is on.

Jesus of Nazareth, 33 AD, crucified on the Friday and buried in a tomb; but then seen up and about on Sunday, walking, talking and eating. Which is the greatest comeback?

Actually, it was Roger's phonecall that reminded me of the miracle of Easter. Six years ago, Roger and I were watching the Champions league Final on TV - Liverpool versus AC Milan. We watched the first half only and saw Liverpool being completely over run by the Italian team. At half time they were 3 - 0 down. Some Liverpool supporters left the ground. It looked like game over, so we switched off and went into the kitchen for supper.

Two thousand years ago there was a similar reaction on that first Good Friday. Jesus was crucified. For the disciples, the one, whom they had spent three years following, had failed. The one, whom they thought would change the world, was killed. As far as they were concerned it was all over. The dream was ended. So they went back home; heads down; defeated.

But of course it wasn't the end. Some times you just need a bit of faith.

In that Champions League Final, Liverpool came back from 3-0 down to win on penalties after extra time. When Roger and I turned the TV back on we couldn't believe it! It was an extraordinary victory: one of the greatest comebacks of all time. But not *the* greatest.

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Jesus Christ the Comeback King (cont)

That was made by Jesus of Nazareth. During Holy Week and Easter we remember how Jesus was arrested, sentenced to death and crucified. On the cross, the aliveness of Jesus Christ went down under the deadness that is our sickness and sin. Surrendering himself to death, he drew it into himself and absorbed it. Our sin was absorbed in Christ's forgiveness. Jesus has opened up a way for us. He transformed death into life on Easter Day. Dead on Friday; alive on Sunday. He burst out of the tomb to make the biggest comeback of all time.

So whatever your situation; however bad it may seem; do not give in. There is hope. That is the message of Easter – love is stronger than hate, good will defeat evil and life will overcome death. The Comeback King's promises are for everyone. He came back to bring us home.

One of the fun elements was gaining an insight into what we watch, and especially Paul and Sue.

Frankly I never thought that I would be sitting with some of these friends and be collectively engrossed in the Simpsons.

Our final session is Thursday 7th April and I am looking forward to concluding my learning points so that I can ' *become more like Jesus while watching TV*'.

The verse that has been a constant in each session is :-

Therefore, I urge you brothers (and sisters), in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God – which is your spiritual worship. Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test what God's will is – his good, pleasing and perfect will.

My main learning point will be to try to live as the above verse advises ; and also to be seen as doing so, with the wish to encourage others along their journey. I would be greatly surprised if the 5% of the population would recognise the above scripture, and this contrasts amazingly with the majority of the population who would know Dirty Den and Gene Hunt. This is our test, in our television dominated world to try to at least increase increase biblical knowledge to that of similar levels of Dirty Den and Gene Hunt.


The Lord's Prayer from Nicaragua

Five years ago, Eladio Simeón Pineda's community was a group of poor farm labourers. Then Christian Aid partner Soppexcca (pronounced so-pecks-ka) offered them credit to establish themselves as coffee farmers and supported them to work together as a cooperative. Eladio and the other members of the La Paz del Tuma cooperative now hope that together they will transform their own community.

Even though the coffee farmers of La Paz del Tuma have only been working with Soppexcca for a short time, their lives are already changing for the better. The credit which Soppexcca gave to Eladio and the other farmers has been vital in getting them started. The cooperative has a community fund that will be used to achieve the dreams which Eladio and his fellow farmers once thought were out of their reach. 'I hope one day we will have a school on this land, clean water and latrines,' says Eladio.

Eladio knows that transformation is possible. He is driven by the example of a nearby community, where Gustavo Adolfo Talavera and the members of the Los Alpes cooperative have been supported by Soppexcca for 12 years. In that time, they have successfully worked to establish a school and a health centre for their community.

The hopes of the people of La Paz del Tuma are hopes held for the whole community. Eladio works every day towards his dream of a purpose-built school, clean water and latrines for all the farming families of La Paz del Tuma.

Soppexcca's support for coffee cooperatives like La Paz del Tuma and Los Alpes allows communities to see a bigger picture, full of possibilities for the future.

You can be part of the story of transformation which is unfolding right now in Nicaragua. We all had a whale of a time!!!!!! – Pardon the pun!



- A monthly service has been initiated at Autumn House. The service is a brief hymns, prayers and talk arrangement at 2.30pm.Volunteers to take part and to chat would be great. It tends to be on the third Sunday of the month.
- Women and the Episcopacy, this subject was discussed as requested by the Diocese of all PCC's. We voted on the issue; " this Synod calls upon the House of Bishops to bring forward amendments to the draft Bishops and Priests (Consecration and Ordination of Women) Measure to ensure those that are unable on theological grounds to accept the ministry of women bishops are able to receive Episcopal oversight from a bishop with authority (i.e. ordinary jurisdiction) conferred by the Measure rather than by delegation from a Diocesan Bishop. After some discussion the vote resulted in the majority voting for the motion, with a few against and no abstentions.
- Improvements within the church centre continue to be made; unwanted children's furniture has been cleared out and a hand held small vacuum cleaner has been purchased to deal with minor issues, e.g. dropped broken biscuits.
- It was agreed to re-licence all the Readers en bloc


