Once we visited the United States and I suffered a minor culture shock. We'd arrived after 'Labor Day.' When we came across an ice-cream cafe we discovered that it was closed. It was out of season. We were in holiday mode, but the season had changed.

In the USA 'Labor Day' falls on the first Monday of September. It commemorates the workers' contributions to national strength, prosperity and well-being. It also marks the unofficial end of summer, a long weekend to visit with family or friends and the last day of the vacation before a new school year begins. It owes its origins to the labour union which advocated 8 hours for work, 8 hours for recreation and 8 hours for rest.

It is perhaps a failing of the Christian church to downplay work. Yet it is part of our Creator's plan for us to engage in work, rest and worship. The blueprint for human life is found in the first book of the Bible which opens by stating how everything belongs to God: 'In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth' (Genesis 1v1). It later teaches that work is a key aspect of everyday life: 'the LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it' (Gen 1v15). Our work is a vehicle for serving God and the wider community as we put our skills to good use. This helps us to understand two problems of modern life. The dignity given to work accounts for why being without work not only challenges us financially, but also is frustrating. Additionally, we were made to serve God but not to become a slave of the work we do, although the demands of employers today are very challenging. Ultimately, our value and self-esteem are to be found in relation to God and *not* to be rooted in our work. To use a building site analogy, we must first get the foundations sorted if we want the structure to stand firm. We are made to worship God: get this right and it helps to get the priorities in life right.

So, let this Autumn be the time when you put first things first: to work, rest and worship. Work where you can to put your skills to profitable use. Rest when you can to attend to relationships and recreation. But do not neglect to worship the LORD: for we were made to know Him and give our whole lives to His service.

Earlier this year we made a purchase that has utterly transformed the Cranston family's seaside holidays. The flimsy plastic spade was superseded by an all shifting all digging deluxe steel version! Castles with moats that fill naturally can be dug in a matter of minutes (at least that's what it seems like!) Holes to Australia; boats; sculptures; and even a 'marble run' with boules as marbles are all projects that have been attempted with varying degrees of success. Civil Engineering modules weren't so futile after all!

And yet, as every sandcastle builder knows there is a certain futility about building sandcastles. However grand, however many turrets or ramparts it has, the incoming tide is a leveller. Literally! Sandcastle building is very much a miniature illustration of what the writer of Ecclesiastes observes as he considers life lived under the sun. So often his reflection leads him to the conclusion that in the grand scheme of things, life is meaningless. As surely as the tide levels the sandcastle, so death levels us, thus what benefit is there in toil and hard work?

For those who see nothing beyond our material world this is a tricky question to answer. Yet for those who, like the writer of Ecclesiastes, can discern God in the seasons of life, there is recognition that the pleasure and satisfaction that is derived from a hard afternoon's digging is a gift from God. There is also acknowledgement that ultimately everything we do will be judged not by admiring passers-by or even by those who benefit from what we've done, but by God.

Indeed having told us that 'much study wearies the body' (an apt line for a new academic year!) the writer of Ecclesiastes concludes by suggesting that it's our duty to honour and respect God and keep his commandments because ultimately whatever we do will be judged by God. Put like this honouring, respecting and obeying God could seem as onerous and wearisome as much study! But Isaac Watts surely captured the correct understanding of what the writer meant by 'our duty', in the words of the hymn 'When I survey the wondrous Cross'. The last verse reads:

Were the whole realm of nature mine,

That were an offering far too small,

Love so amazing so divine

Demands my soul, my life, my all.

To consider all that Jesus endured in our place surely should leave us joyfully and delightfully living our lives for him and in obedience to him. And by my reckoning that means that even futile sandcastles can be built for his glory! *Andy Cranston* 

### **Net Practise**

In cricket, net practise is essential for batsmen. For some time now, Kevin Pietersen has been having trouble facing left arm spinners. Has he given up? No. This summer he faced up to the weakness in his game and has spent long days in the nets practising, out of the public eye. Back in 2005, when Andrew Strauss was bamboozled in the first two Test matches by Shane Warne, the Australian spinner, he also went away and spent hours in the nets with 'Merlyn', a spin bowling machine. 'Merlyn' proved to be a bit of a wizard as Strauss then scored a century in the next Test match at Old Trafford, further good scores in the following Tests, and helped England win 'The Ashes' for the first time in 18 years. This summer, Andrew Strauss has again been struggling with his batting. As I write, he is undertaking extra practise at county level trying to regain his form in time for the Test matches against India. Sir Alex Ferguson famously said that 'success is 5% inspiration and 95% perspiration'. Natural ability is certainly necessary for success but perseverance is essential.

If perseverance is essential for a cricketer, it is crucial for a Christian. Not that we have to strive to gain God's affection, or fight to be rescued by him. No, as Paul reminds us in his letter to the Church in Rome, 'while we were yet sinners Christ died for us'. New life in Jesus Christ is a free gift from God. His overwhelming love for us and his Spirit within us are the pump and the lifeblood that send us out to live and work to his praise and glory in the world.

Growing as a Christian, however – walking in the footsteps of Jesus – demands some application. Persevering to make time to be in the presence of God – the source of our inspiration - seems to be the struggle that most Christians face. A survey carried out in 2001 found that only 23% of Anglicans pray daily. Many of us struggle to keep a daily discipline of prayer and quiet when we are open to God and the direction of the Holy Spirit. And if individually and corporately our relationship with God is weak, how can we, as a Church be guided by him and what, of substance, do we have to share with the world?

There is a difference between 'finding time' and 'making time' to be in the presence of God. 'Finding time' seems to be a matter of chance, 'making time' is a matter of will. We are being challenged to make it a matter of will. As a Church and as individual Christians we are so much in need of God's inspiration. Thankfully, we are not left floundering in our weakness. *(continued on next page)*  Bishop Jonathan has written a 'Rule of Life' as a simple guide to help us look at our spiritual life in a way that helps us grow; and a group led by Philip Swan, the Director of World Mission, is introducing 'The Order of St Chad' which will help us go deeper in prayer, mission and discipleship. Together with these, a Diocesan- wide venture to help us find ways to pray and grow as followers of Jesus is being planned for the New Year.

Called to make a difference in the world and called to become more like Christ day by day. We can't do the first without the second being a reality - both in our lives and that of our Church. When people meet the local church will they meet the Living God? The answer is probably: only if the local church is inspired by God. Persisting in prayer seems to be the path to God's inspiration. Brother Lawrence, a seventeenth century French monk taught that we need to practise being aware of God's presence: 'whoever practices God's presence will soon become spiritual. How can we be with him unless our thoughts are with him? How can he be in our thoughts unless we form a holy habit of abiding in his presence, asking for the help we need each moment of our life?'

If you are struggling, like me, or have fallen out of the habit then be inspired by Brother Lawrence, Andrew Strauss and Kevin Pietersen.

The Keswick Convention in the heart of the Lake District was enhanced this year by clear blue skies and strong sunshine. So, week two promised to be one of the best yet with both weather and Word in harmony.

The theme of 'Mission' encouraged the speakers to draw on texts across the Bible and this year's jigsaw approach beautifully illustrated both the purpose and continuity of God's plan for the world as a whole – clear from the dawn of time and strong on intention for all of us to play a part in mission.

The shape of the days began with a choice of four seminar streams where ideas and experience were exchanged. Options this year included; distribution of the Bible, ministry of parenting, Bible mission and church life. Following on was the daily Bible study session, usually focused on one book from the Bible but this year on the theme of mission across a range of O.T. and N.T. texts. Chris Wright drew out how dealings with Israel were part of and not separate from God's global mission to all peoples in all places. After lunch there was an option to attend sessions based on Isaiah and the call to mission.

The convention came together again in the evening for a celebration of music, prayer and preaching. Music was supplied by Colin Webster's group, who introduced several new worship songs as well as playing some rousing favourites for the 3000 congregation to heartily join in. The preaching, from 6 speakers, was thought provoking and scripture based yet with several memorable lines such as;

'Mission can be like catching fish in a leaky bucket when good teaching and fellowship doesn't follow.' *Krish Kandiah* 

'Every church member is part of God's whole church mission and should remember they're, 'Re-entering the missionary field' each time they leave church.' Chris Wright

'We are meant to glorify God Almighty not settle for God All Matey'. *Steve Brady* 

'The clarity, sufficiency and supremacy of the bible are the norm for what the church does and teaches.' *Bishop Nazir Ali.*

#### Introducing the Two Saints Way Pilgrimage Route Project

When Pam & I first came to Stone in 2007, I was particularly intrigued by the foundational story of Stone about the martyrdom of Wulfad and Rufin, which is briefly told on the town railings at the top of the High Street. Some people dispute whether this actually happened, but important characters in the story like St Chad and St Werbergh certainly were historical and were key players in bringing the gospel to ancient Mercia. I soon found a number of sites between Trentham and Stafford which had links with the legend and so conceived of the idea of a story trail. One day I was talking with a medieval historian at Keele University and he pointed out that there had been a pilgrimage route between Chester (associated with St Werbegh) and Lichfield (associated with St Chad). That conversation was the seed of the idea which has now developed into the Two Saints Way Project to revive an 88 mile pilgrimage route.

The situation now is that good partnerships have been established with a number of organisations and a steering group meets regularly with representatives from both the cathedrals, the tourist boards, British Waterways and Staffordshire University. The route has been planned and approved by the Rights of Way officers and a draft guidebook has been produced and is being regularly used by pilgrims who have already started walking the route. We hope to waymark the route next summer. A new website is in operation and I do recommend you visit to get a better grasp of the project – www.twosaintsway.org.uk

In the past, route finding along pilgrimage routes was quite problematic, but you looked out for sign posts (if you could read) and you asked people. Shrines and piles of stones would re-assure you. More recently we use maps and guide books, but on the Two Saints Way, we plan to move one step further, by having the route accessible via mobile phone through the QR (Quick Response) code technology. The QR codes will be discreetly positioned on finger posts and interpretation panels and they will give the walker all the information he or she needs to navigate the route successfully. Furthermore this system will involve a wide range of interactive opportunities such as bringing up a reconstruction of the monastic settlement in Stone so that you can take a virtual tour of the site as it would have been a thousand years ago!

And what about Christ Church in all this? Well in medieval times, churches along pilgrimage routes were very important places where pilgrims could pause to reflect and be refreshed before they continued their journey. Often hospitality was also provided for pilgrims. This tradition continues on the famous Camino de Santiago in Spain. I am eager to find different kinds of accommodation possibilities including church hall floors for youth groups and maybe there might be folk in the church willing to provide B&B for a suggested donation for a pilgrim on a low budget.

Here are some other ways you could get involved:

<u>Adopt-a-mile.</u> In order to both raise funds and secure the longterm future of the Two Saints Way, we are encouraging individuals, churches, schools and other groups to adopt-a-mile of the Two Saints Way. It would be a great help if the church could help to engage the schools and others in the town to take this kind of special interest in the path. This could include for example a commitment to regular litter clear up along the route. For schools there will be a wide range of educational opportunities, including devising local circular walking route associated with the Two Saints Way.

- <u>Trialling the Route.</u> We would like more people to try out the route and check my route description or take photographs
- <u>Prayer.</u> We believe that the impact of the whole project and its effect on those who journey on it will be greatly enhanced through prayer. We view it as an opportunity for sensitive missional approaches and hope that many will come to the Way through walking on the Two Saints Way! We send out emails about five times a year with news and points for prayer.

I notice that I have started using "we" more often and this is appropriate because Tim Saxton is in on this with me and has been a great help. Where would I be without him when I have a computer problem!?

# Lichfield lifts Church Times Cricket Cup
