There has been a lot of hype and hot air in the last few months. Viewers of the television show called 'The X-Factor' (the singing competition with its round by round elimination of singers), may be relieved that the end is in sight. Who will have the X-factor to impress the judges, woo the public vote and so be propelled into stardom? After a long and turbulent competition, with upsets, gossip and surprise comebacks, the contestant's emotions are ready to erupt as the winner of a record contract is identified.

It has been a fascinating and popular piece of media that continues to attract huge viewing figures. The line that runs, 'I'm a nobody and just I want to be a somebody' is a powerful sound-bite and leads to callers hoping to make 'the biggest dream of my life' come true. Yet this is media creation and it is plugging into the celebrity culture that continues to roll on and on. Today, being a media star and entering the list of the rich and famous is held in high esteem.

This Christmas we celebrate the arrival of the Son of God onto the world stage. The judges didn't warm to him, but the public recognised his sheer quality. His entire life showed that this one person had the true X-factor which would have an impact on the world. Jesus Christ stands out in history as the one who uniquely came from heaven to earth. In his earthly ministry his voice brought life and light. Listen to a summary of the importance of Christ: 'we see Jesus, who was made a little lower than the angels, now crowned with glory and honour because he suffered death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone' (Hebrews 2v9). The wonder of Christmas is that Jesus didn't stand on the world stage for either fame or fortune, but for our forgiveness. The one who lived in heaven came to earth to suffer death in order to bring us the gift of life.

You may get caught up with X-mas, but why not come and join us celebrate Christmas – where Jesus is at the heart of the celebrations? When we discover why this is the case then we can celebrate all year-round. This is a glorious discovery!

I look forward to seeing you at a service and hope that you have a happy Christmas.

I've just finished a 7 minute phone conversation with a chap insistent that he could massively benefit my life. He was trying to sell a house alarm system that would send a legion of guards running to our door in the event of a fire or burglary. £1500 worth of equipment, all for an installation price of just £200! With hindsight there were a number of responses I could have made but in the heat of the moment my reply was incomprehensible to him! I told him that he was working on the pretence that my possessions were the most important thing to me and that saving money was the 'be all and end all' of my life. But this simply isn't true. "There is more to life than possessions and discounts" I told him. Well, I might as well have been speaking Chinese! Such a perspective failed to even register. In the end he got so exasperated with me saying that I wasn't even up for a free trial that he hung up!

Now don't get me wrong, the Bible encourages us to be prudent. Insurance, alarms and precautions are not bad things but it's also important to keep life in perspective. The fact that my cold-caller could not relate to my ultimate indifference over my possessions is typical of our society. There is blatant disregard for the tenth commandment as companies and businesses encourage us to covet their latest products or deals – especially in the run up to Christmas. Few take heed of Jesus' words in Matthew 6:25-34, not to worry about food, clothes or possessions with the result that many are in debt because they've been unable to resist the 'buy now, pay later' spin. As Christians we should not be amongst that number.

Paul reminds Timothy in 1 Timothy 6 that "godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and we can take nothing out of it."

These verses encourage us to be focusing on godliness and contentment rather than me and more. As Christians we're in a battle against wave after wave of advertising that effectively says "this life is all there is, so treat yourself—you deserve it!" Such a mindset is a lie. The truth is that for those following Jesus, the best is yet to come and we can't take anything with us! So to quote Mother Teresa we should "live simply so others can simply live."

As I've been writing this, the post has arrived bringing Tearfund's latest newsletter. The lead article is on former Nepalese slaves who are viewed as outcasts and have little in the way of job prospects or shelter. I think the cheque book may come out after all!

We invite all to join in our Christmas services as we celebrate the wonder of the birth of Jesus Christ who is called Immanuel — which means God with us. We have a range of services and hope that you will feel welcome to the church you attend, whether you are new or not, as we join in the song of the angels who sang: *glory to God in the highest!*

Carol Concert at Christ Church

Stone Choral Society Carol Concert at Christ Church Thursday, 15th December at 7:30pm Tickets available on the door £7 incl. refreshments Accompanied children free After the success of Advent Windows last year, the theme chosen for 2011 is Christmas Stories from Around the World. The first Christmas story from the Bible will be told in eight windows, beginning appropriately with the Annunciation from Luke 1:26-38 on December 1st. The other stories from 14 different countries will include Leo Tolstoy's Papa Panov and The Little Match Girl by Hans Christian Anderson. An unusual window will focus on the story of the Christmas Truce in Wold War I. Once again, schools, youth clubs and other organisations are partnering with some of the shops to create the windows.

We plan to have the stories actually told when windows open and we are hoping to have the windows opened by people from the different nations. At the time of going to press we have found some of them, but are still looking for reps from these nations: France / Germany / Belgium / Austria / Russia / Mexico / Denmark / Czech Republic / United States / Israel / Palestine / Turkey

On three Saturday mornings December 3, 10 & 17, we will be telling the stories and singing some carols at the Crown Hotel between 11:30 and 12:30. On Christmas Eve, there will be a carol singing and storytelling journey through the town, starting at 9:30 and finishing at Christ Church at 11am for the opening of the final window by the Bishop of Stafford.

Here are ways that you can get involved:

- 1. See if you can track down any representatives from those nations living in the area.
- 2. Encourage people to come to the opening of the windows which will be at 11am each day, except for 20th December which is 10am.
- 3. Especially encourage people to join the carolling and storytelling journey on Christmas Eve.
- 4. We had 200+ on Christmas Eve last year so we would welcome offers of help with making soup, biscuits etc.
- 5. Above all PRAY!

The Advent Windows project is a gift from local churches to Stone which we pray will in some way also "open the windows of heaven" to many in Stone at this Christmas season.

What do you do with the Christmas gifts that you don't want? Those orange socks and the aftershave or perfume that would asphyxiate your parrot – if you had one! I find it really difficult because behind every gift, however unwanted, is a thought, a kindness. Just to reject those things outright and give them to a charity shop seems, well, ungrateful. Consequently, I have a drawer (I think Michael McIntyre calls it a "man drawer"). It's full of wonderful things – out of date foreign currencies, endless loose change, old receipts – as well as those unwanted presents, all for one day when those things might be useful.

Christmas speaks to us of God's gift to the world: the gift of His Son who entered our human mess to live amongst us with the hope that He might transform it. Regrettably, it is a gift that appears largely unwanted. We don't know what to do with it so we either reject it or feign polite acceptance. So we might attend Midnight Mass or remember to put our "penny in the old man's hat". Yet every year it comes around and we are vaguely aware that our celebration of Christmas is about a bigger reality than our attempts to celebrate it. Somehow we are trapped into thinking that this year will be the best yet, but it never is. Celebrating Christmas without some thought for the best gift is an empty business. Maybe next year...

Behind every unwanted gift is a thought, a kindness. Behind God's Christmas gift, Jesus, the Bible tells us that there is certainly a thought. "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." (John 3:16) Like so many gifts, his comes with lots of love, in fact more than we can ever get our heads around.

Obviously there's no "man drawer" to put this gift in! But maybe we could start by just putting this truth about God's gift into the storage compartment of our minds, that one day soon, maybe the truth about God's gift will be something we need. For many, Christmas is a great time, but for many it's certainly not. Those who are bereaved, those who are sick, those whose relationships have broken or are in the process of breaking, those who have lost their paid employment and so on.

There may be a time when this Gift from God will start to make sense and when it does Christmas will take on a new meaning. So will the rest of your life.

Have a very blessed Christmas and a great new year.

Church of England Temperance Society

From our Parish magazine, Dec 1885. Does anybody know whether the Temperance Movement took hold in Stone?

In a former number, we spoke of the importance of the Temperance question, and the great desirability of forming a Branch Society for the parish.

The subject was brought prominently to the front at, the men's tea party by Mr. Pearman and Dr.. Femie, the latter stating as his deliberate opinion from professional experience, that temperance was not only *most desirable* but *really beneficial*.


On Monday, Nov. 9th, a meeting was held in the Upper Schoolroom, of those members of the congregation interested in the work of Temperance. There was a good attendance, representing all classes. The chair was taken by the Vicar, who in his opening remarks dwelt upon the dual basis of the C. E. T. S., and its superiority over all others in the fact that its work was inseparably bound up with religion. The following resolutions were unanimously carried:—

- (1) "That a Branch of the Church of England Temperance Society be now formed for our parish." Proposed by the Rev. A. Pearman, seconded by Mr. H. Ravenscroft.
- (2) "That the management of the Society be in the hands of a President, Vice-Presidents, Committee of ten, with Secretaries and Treasurer." Proposed by Mr. W. Taylor, seconded by Mr. T. Harris.
- (3) "That in connection with the above there be monthly meetings for Lectures, Debates, and Recreation." Proposed by Dr. E. Fernie, seconded by Mr. W. H. Bishop.
- (4) "That a Reading Room for men be opened on Saturday evenings, from 7 to 10 p.m., with papers, games, etc., to be supplied with temperance refreshments." Proposed by Mr. J. Lamont, seconded by Mr. H. Millan.

The meeting throughout was of a most encouraging nature. It must now be our earnest aim to give effect to the resolutions. Ours must not be a society in name, but a real thing, whose power and work must be felt.

THE SATURDAY EVENING READING ROOM.

The room for reading and recreation was opened on Saturday evening, Nov. 21st, and the attendance was highly encouraging. It is in connection with the Men's Bible Class, and managed by twelve stewards, three of whom are responsible for its arrangement and control week by week. A table and set of drafts was presented by the Rev. D. W. Jenkinson, and a similar one by the Vicar., A friend, per the Rev. A. Pearman, gave a nice set of chess and leather board, and others lent magazines and papers. It is open from 7 to 10 p.m., and light refreshments are provided, and all men are welcomed.



Whether you are new to the Stone area or have been living here for some time you are welcome to come to this church. The church is made up of adults and children who want to know more about the living God, who has supremely revealed Himself in Jesus Christ and continues to speak to us through His Spirit-inspired word, the Holy Bible (which can be read online at www.biblegateway.com - we recommend a modern translation *e.g.* the New International Version or English Standard Version).

We are a Christian church, because at the heart of what we believe is the fact that to know God personally we must put our trust in Jesus' death for our forgiveness so that we can be reconciled to God. We are part of the Anglican Church, the basis of its Trinitarian belief is summarised in the Book of Common Prayer with its 39 articles and ordinal, though we unite in Christ irrespective of denomination. We are an Evangelical church, as we see that the Bible is God's word and so is to inspire all that we do. This church was established with the help of the renowned Charles Simeon and the patronage is the gift of the Simeon's Trust.

Our church meetings help us to grow in our understanding of what the Bible tells us about God, and this is something that we encourage others to investigate especially through our *Christianity Explored* course (see details on the national website www.christianityexplored.org). If you would like details of when the next local course is starting then please contact the church office.

We have children's and youth activities running during the Sunday meetings and also during the week, such as our Tuesday evening youth club. Adults may be further involved through small groups which meet for Bible study and prayer, a midweek communion service and a monthly prayer meeting.

Our community involvement includes links with the local schools: Christ Church First, Oulton First, Christ Church Academy and Alleyne's High. We also have links with the Church in India, The Philippines, Croatia, Botswana and Pakistan.
