Communications are getting quicker. A letter used to be a fairly good way of communicating and a next day delivery was impressive. Telegraph messages could send a message across the world. The 'facsimile' (fax), was so fast that a letter you'd typed could spew out in another location a few minutes later.

As the technology becomes more sophisticated so the messages are getting briefer. So, with a computer or mobile phone you can now e-mail, text or tweet. The last of these uses 'Twitter' which permits a limited number of characters to be used for communication. It is surprising how much you can say in a few words whether you intended to or not. But, if you had to sum up a profound message in one word, then it is a lot trickier.

People's names often have meanings. For those who have had the privilege of having children there is often a struggle to name them. It's worse for teachers due to the inevitable associations with former pupils!

When it comes to the birth of Jesus Christ, various names and titles are used. One of the most meaningful is the name or title 'Immanuel'. We are told the meaning by the Gospel writer: 'All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: 'The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son, and they will call him 'Immanuel' – which means, "God with us" ' (Matthew 1v22-23 quotes from Isaiah's prophetic message, Matthew supplies the meaning).

Immanuel is a stupendous word for the New Year! The presence of God with us was literally true in the birth of the infant Jesus. But is also true in the ongoing sense for us now. If we are a follower of Jesus Christ then

we can take this promise to heart: Jesus will be with us through all of the ups and downs ahead. That is worth remembering. It is worth tweeting. It provides us with an unchanging reality come what may.

May your New Year be filled with the hope that comes from knowing Jesus who is known as 'Immanuel.'



The privilege of prayer

The story is told of an explorer wandering through the jungle when much to his alarm he came upon a family of dozing tigers. Slowly he began to inch his way backwards hoping to avoid detection. All was going well until he stepped on a twig at which point the largest of the tigers sat bolt upright with menacingly wide eyes glaring at him. The colour drained from his face as he sank to his knees and cried out "God, save me!" With head bowed he waited for the end and was surprised when after several moments nothing happened. Slowly he raised his head and to his utter astonishment saw the family of tigers with eyes closed, resting on their hind legs and with their forepaws clasped together. At exactly that moment the smallest tiger opened its eyes and catching the explorers glance said in a gruff voice "Don't know what you're doing but Daddy's saying grace!"

Well, whether we find ourselves in the company of the explorer or the tigers, prayer is something most of us do at some point in our lives— even the great atheist Richard Dawkins was heard to do so on national radio last year! For as much as we like to think that we're the boss of our lives, deep down, if we're brutally honest, we know that we're subject to events and powers beyond our control. And when disasters or disease or death strike, it's only natural to want to appeal to the force or being that has control over them.

But the way and frequency with which we pray depends on our view of God. If God is aloof, impersonal and ambivalent then we'll pray much as the explorer did – when disaster strikes and with uncertain pleading. However, if we know the God to whom our prayers are address, we'll pray like the tiger family with confident gratitude for God's provision and goodness.

I suspect that most of us are familiar with the way Jesus taught his disciples to pray but in our familiarity with the Lord's Prayer I wonder how often we ponder the depth and magnitude of the first word Jesus uses? "When you pray, say: 'Father ...' Luke 11:2

It is utterly staggering that we are permitted to call the Creator of the universe, the Sustainer of all that is, Father. Regardless of what our human fathers are or were like, God is the perfect Heavenly Father. The Bible is full of stories that show us the depth of God's love, concern and compassion for his children and my hope and prayer for 2013 is that all of us discover more fully the care of our Loving Heavenly Father and as a result increasing turn to him in prayer. Why not seize the moment and start now?

2012 was a great year, what with the Queen's Jubilee, the Olympics and William and Kate's expected baby. It was a tough old year too with recession refusing to go away and more and more young people out of work or training. Is it all getting better or worse?

It's been like that for the church too. George Fisher's new way of calculating the statistics, which looks at all services during the week, shows clearly that overall the churches in our diocese are growing by around 2% per annum. But some tough decisions have had to be made as to where best to put our resources and where to do some pruning. The initiative called "Plain Speaking" has meant that every parish is clearer now about their situation in relation to their neighbours.

By now every Deanery and every parish should have a Mission Action Plan. Just about every deanery knows what the situation is, how many paid clergy we can afford and what kind of goals we should set ourselves for the year. Above all we can have fresh goals for prayer so that all of us are waiting to catch the wind of the Spirit.

In the story of the visit by the Wise Men to Bethlehem we read that "when they saw where the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy." My prayer for all the churches in our diocese is that we will know what it is for the Star to stop over our church so that we can be places of overwhelming joy for our neighbours as well as ourselves.

After bringing their gifts the Wise Men were warned in a dream not to return by the same route or see King Herod but rather to go back home by another route. My prayer is that we will see the guiding of the Holy Spirit in all our churches and that he will prevent us from going the wrong way.

Above all I believe God is calling us to stay steady with our five-theme vision. Of course, we will see all sorts of changes this year. Two of our most experienced archdeacons are due to retire and we have lost some of our most experienced clergy over the past few months. But we will face that loss within the framework of a steady vision: Discovering the heart of God, Growing New Disciples, Reaching New Generations, Transforming Communities and Practising Generosity.

"Following On" is a leaflet full of new ideas and courses for every kind of parish which I hope every congregation will consider.

One of my favourite Epiphany hymns has that beautiful line: "With gold of obedience and incense of lowliness, Kneel and adore Him, the Lord is his name." May we be so overwhelmed by joy that we bring our gold of obedience to worship him and our incense of lowliness to change our communities for the better.

One day two deaf men knocked on the door of the translation office in Mexico, by mistake. They thought it was a temp agency and they were looking for work. Rather than turn them away, the translation team took the opportunity to give them DVDs of Jonah, Philemon and Ruth in Mexican Sign Language.

The next day one of the men returned. He and his deaf family members had watched the DVDs and were very interested in learning whether there were more available! The team had also distributed the DVDs to churches and a home group for Deaf Christians, where they have been received with eagerness. Recently a deaf graphic artist who accepted Christ after seeing the Jonah video began working part-time with the team.

On Sunday January 6th we hold our annual United Benefice service at 11am at Christ Church, where we will together commit ourselves to the Lord and his church for another year. The beginning of a new year is a good time to take stock of where our lives are going, where we need to adjust our priorities to bring us in line with his will, and to seize the opportunities given even if we are interrupted in the process. *Ann*

Happy New Year!

From all of us who help to produce this magazine

Recent issues have carried articles encouraging daily devotional Bible reading, with suggestions of helpful explanatory notes that are available. I write as one approaching 90 who became a daily Bible reader in my mid-teens, some 75 years ago, using Scripture Union notes, currently their "Encounter with God" series. My understanding is that this (and maybe some other) SU syllabus covers the whole Bible every five years, so by this means alone I have read the Bible at least 15 times. Granted, as an ordained minister I have also been committed to its regular study.

My purpose is to tell how, as a result, I have become steeped in the Bible. In its own words, I have hid God's Word in my heart, and it is this regular daily reading that I consider has been the main help. This familiarity with Scripture has enabled me to develop a spiritual mindset leading to worthy as well as godly living. It gives me general guidance for daily living and occasionally guidance specific to a personal situation. There are also surprises from unexpected and seemingly superfluous passages or verses: 2 Samuel 23:20 being an example. I cannot overstate the value of daily devotional Bible reading to enable me to live increasingly closer to Jesus and to really enjoy the Christian life.

It is not easy to think of any single word of advice I can give to a Christian other than this: develop the habit and the sooner the better.

Christ Church 1889

Some of you may remember that a few years ago, a set of our church magazines from 1885 was spotted for sale on Amazon by an eagle-eyed reader. We read in those magazines that the church that the church was re-opened on February 21st 1885 after considerable re-building work. The vicar was Rev Walter J. Thompson, and a new curate, Rev Arthur Pearman, was welcomed to the church on Thursday January 8th.

New hymn books, "The Hymnal Companion" had been bought and were placed in every pew when the church was re-opened. After much debate, pew rents were abandoned in 1885 by universal agreement; however, later in the year the vicar mentioned that since these had formed part of his salary, he was feeling somewhat worse off. In December 1885, the Christ Church Temperance Reading Rooms were inaugurated, to encourage men in the parish to give up alcohol.

On the next page, we reproduce some of the news from January 1889.

Walter J. Thompson was still the vicar and the Rev E.J.C Ince was the curate (Rev Arthur Pearman left at the end of 1886). Two new schools had been built, and as a result, the church had still an outstanding debt of £200 at the beginning of 1889. The old school buildings were disused in January 1889. Now we have some church magazines from 1889!

News from Christ Church, January 1889

The WATCH NIGHT SERVICE was very well attended. After shortened Evening Prayer, the litany, "Father from Thy throne on high," was sung kneeling, and the Vicar then sought to guide the thoughts of those present on the subject of God's mercies, and their relations to Him in the past, and to humble resolves of renewed devotion in the New Year. At 12 o'clock, the Te Deum and "O God our help in ages past" were sung, and the interesting and solemn Service closed with the Benediction.

On New Year's Day, by the kind help of many friends, the MOTHERS' MEETING had their annual tea in the large School-room; it was a pleasing sight to see how the members had increased during the past year; about 110 were present. Useful and helpful addresses were given by Dr. Fernie and Mr. Bishop. The mothers warmly applauded the vote of thanks, proposed by the Vicar, to the subscribers and helpers.

On January 2ud, the PAROCHIAL TEA was held in the Schools, and though we did not number so many as on former occasions, the evening's enjoyment was in no way inferior. After a short address on matters relating to the Church, a varied musical programme afforded delight to all present. The statement is given below.

On January 4th, the STONEFIELD CHILDREN'S MISSION had their annual Tea, followed by a Magic Lantern Entertainment, exhibited by Mr. Frank Fernie, and it is needless to add, the boisterous youngsters appreciated the good things provided. Again we are indebted to the generosity of friends, and the kindness of the ladies who collected.

Yet another Tea on January 10th, when the YOUNG WOMEN'S BIBLE CLASS, at their own charges, met for their annual social evening. After tea, they spent a very enjoyable evening in the usual merry games, interspersed with music and recitations, and brought to a close by a few words of counsel from the Vicar, with singing and prayer.

Our monthly Meeting of the PAROCHIAL BRANCH OF THE Church of England Temperance Society, held on Monday, January 7th, passed off well. We were ably helped by many kind friends, who gave their services in a programme consisting of readings and music. The branch is making steady progress, and is in a healthy state. *Walter J. Thompson*

Whether you are new to the Stone area or have been living here for some time you are welcome to come to this church. The church is made up of adults and children who want to know more about the living God, who has supremely revealed Himself in Jesus Christ and continues to speak to us through His Spirit-inspired word, the Holy Bible (which can be read online at www.biblegateway.com and we recommend a modern translation e.g. the New International Version or English Standard Version).

We are part of the Anglican church, the basis of its Trinitarian belief is summarised in the Book of Common Prayer with its 39 articles, though we unite in Christ irrespective of denomination.
