Another year of what?

The advertiser proclaims: “New Year. New you!” The phrase is used to sell us cream to smooth out wrinkles, diets to help us get trim, exercise regimes that enable us to become fitter, or new techniques to help us perform better.

The reality is more like: “New Year. Same you!” We may be pleased that our skin looks a bit better, that we can now wear a favourite item of clothing, run for the bus and recover before we need to get off again, or even have confidence to give an important presentation at work. But, if the truth were known, we behave in the same way and struggle to be the sort of person we really want to be, let alone the sort of person God wants us to be! Yet, with God, change is possible.

The Bible teaches us that there is one key relationship that changes us for good. This relationship also opens up the future to become the sort of person God wants us to be. Having described Jesus as being like light shining in a dark world, with many rejecting him, there is an amazing change in those who receive the light of Christ into their lives: *‘Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God – children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband’s will, but born of God’* (John 1v12-13). Those who believe and trust in Jesus begin a new life and a real relationship with him. Such people have been given a new birth to become the children of God. It means we can speak to God as our Father in heaven. This new life is neither the result of being born into the right family or ethnic group, nor a reward for something we have done. It’s a gift that we don’t deserve. We are spiritually born as rebels, so new birth is a gift from the One who loves to give!

Those who have become God’s children are to accept his loving words of encouragement, instruction, discipline, correction and wisdom. We can’t live as we once did. We can become people who are being changed to be the sort of people God wants us to be. Can I invite you to explore the idea of saying: “New Year. Changed you!” as we come under the rule of Jesus? Now that would make this year something special!

A message to ponder

So there we are! The shepherds have returned to the hillside, the wise men are on their way home and the decorations are on their way back to the attic. The fanfare of Christmas 2013 is slowly receding into the distance. 2014 has begun!

But as the treadmill of life cranks up again and growing children, complicated family situations and new targets at work compete for our energy and attention, let me take you back to that Bethlehem hillside for a moment. Luke tells us that the shepherds did two things on their way back to the sheep.

1. They spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child (2v17)
2. They glorified and praised God for all the things they had heard and seen (2v20)

The shepherds had good news and they wanted to share it and respond to it. Of course the treadmill of life continued much as it had done for the last 20 years; the sheep still needed worming and checking for ticks, they still needed constant watching, protecting and leading to new pastures. But as a result of that first Christmas night and their encounter with Jesus the shepherds had a new focus and perspective on life. Their praise and their message rang out.

Luke tells us that people *were amazed at what the shepherds said to them* (2:18), but he doesn't tell us what the longer term impact was.

Was their amazement a nine-day wonder? A message that induced a period of festivity a trip or two to the synagogue, a celebratory meal, but was ultimately all forgotten once the baby in the manger had disappeared. Or perhaps it really did spark a fresh renewed faith and on-going commitment to God - that is until the soldiers butchered baby Matthew next door in their hunt for Jesus. Or maybe some of them, like Mary pondered and treasured the news in their amazement and like the shepherds responded in praise and an overwhelming desire to pass it on. We simply don't know! But what we do know is that all of those are still responses to the shepherds' message today. As 2014 gets underway with all its hopes and dreams, struggles and troubles, how amazed and affected will you allow yourself to be at the good news of a Saviour being born to you? I hope it's something you'll ponder and treasure every day of this New Year!

A Twittering Bishop

I had to be persuaded to go on Twitter... and then I needed a lot of help. First problem: I couldn't recall my Apple ID. Just too many passwords connected to different appliances for one butterfly-brained bishop to remember. After the kind and patient Diocesan Director of Communications sorted out my password issues, I still had to get over my technophobia. My daughter, Fran, came to my aid. Seeing how I used my smartphone only for texts, emails and phone calls, she sighed: 'Dad, you are a *Luddite* when it comes to technology. Why don't you swap your iPhone 4 for my iPhone 3. You're only using 5% of what that phone does...here, let me show you...'

Then I was concerned about the matter of substance: 'Why would I want to go on Twitter? I'm bound to say something to embarrass the family.'

'Nothing new there!' Fran replied, all too quickly.

'But I might get carried away. I'll tweet something stupid, let down the Church and then have to apologise profusely.'

'Ditto', she said.

'It is only 140 characters. I suppose, I won't need to say much,' I offered. Fran smiled: 'Yes, you're good at that.'

So, I ran out of excuses and now I'm a 'newbie'. You need a profile. Mine is: '@shrewsbishop: follower of Jesus, husband, father, c-of-e bishop, left-handed, right brained, lover of cricket, Chelsea FC, fisherman and country boy.'

Like learning to swim with my big toe on the bottom bouncing me along, I am only a tentative tweeter. But I'm becoming a more avid watcher and listener. And I have noticed a few things:

1. Twitter is the first for news now. The News Corporations follow Twitter to catch what is going on around the world. If you are linked to Twitter you seem to be in touch with a global community. For Christians, called to be part of growing God's Kingdom on earth, here is a vehicle for connecting directly with God's world.

2. It's a great place to learn stuff. There are links from people's tweets to articles, photographs and blogs. Twitter looks good for networking, research and as a learning tool. Following the right people on Twitter means we can pick up distilled wisdom. Followers of Jesus are called 'disciples' and Twitter looks to be a hub where we can enhance our learning as pilgrims in God's world.

3. There are a lot of people out there in ‘Twitterland’, engaging with one another, making connections and creating networks. Christians are called to be missionaries and here is an entire new mission field. How is the love of Christ best revealed, shared and embodied amongst the inhabitants?

4. Twitter is ideally a conversation not a broadcast. The most effective tweeters don’t just megaphone their message to everyone but listen to others, respond to their ideas and engage naturally. They seem to share directly and concisely what they think without imposing it. Called to an incarnational mission, we must understand the context we inhabit, learn the language and dialects, listen and engage with people where they are. You cannot build a community without being good neighbours.

5. Twitter is good for sharing information about community services and events that then get retweeted around various networks. Here in Shropshire, One vicar with one tweet managed to reach over 900 people within two hours concerning latest details about the local Food Bank and a Christingle for the Children’s Society. Called to create community in often remote rural areas, here is a way for the Church to be good news, draw people’s attention to resources available for the common good and bring folk together.

So here I am like a stranger in a foreign land. So much to learn – geography, customs and language. Feeling less like bold St Paul and more like the Mark who wanted to leave and go home, I wonder if there are some Barnabas- like friends to encourage me on this journey?

My daughter has got me started but @shrewsbishop definitely needs help.

Saturday November 23 was a still, autumnal day, and Fred rested on my workbench. The original Fred was a tiny light aircraft designed and built by a Stoke school teacher, Eric Clutton. After three months of building my red and white, scale model was due for its first flight. It is a faithful replica of the prototype and reminds me that we are all made in the image of God. My time and creative skills have been put into "Fred", and I wonder if I reflect the qualities that God has invested in me in the same way?

Before the flight, I had to check that the radio control was working. Was Fred picking up the signals that I was transmitting? By the same token, am I tuned in and attentive to the signals that God is giving me?

Ready to go, and Fred waited on the flying strip. First flights are always nerve wracking. Some models insist on going their own way, usually with disastrous consequences! Although God desires to steer us through life, He still gives us free will. When we do not listen and try to obey his commands, we soon get in a spin and crash!

The real moment of truth came when I opened the throttle. Under power Fred came to life. Christians are filled with the life giving power of God, through the Holy Spirit. Jesus said "I am going to send what my Father has promised, but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high" (Luke24:49ff) The power of the Holy Spirit really enables us to take off, as Christians.

Flying free and responding to my controls, Fred was in his element. But all was not well - it rarely is on a first flight like this. Fred was not behaving as I really wanted. Left to its own devices the model tried to climb too quickly and turn ever more steeply in one direction. So the next crucial phase was to trim the aircraft.

The Radio Control Transmitter has tiny sliding switches, which can make small adjustments to the way the model flies. I suspect that most of us have experienced those subtle nudges in our hearts to behave in a slightly different way. The Lord is continually, trying to sensitively "trim" our lives, so that we move in His direction.

After five minutes, which seemed like a lifetime, I called out "Landing!" to warn other modellers on the field that I was about to fly low and close. Aero modellers have a saying "Take-offs are optional, but landings are mandatory". You might say it's a matter of some gravity, that eventually every flight will come to an end! This forces me to face a very personal question "will my landing be safe?" Will we land in "The place I have prepared for you" as Jesus promises in John 14:1ff, or somewhere "far out of the field".

Fred, I am glad to say, safely touched down where I intended. Without my creative love he would not have existed, without my control he would have crashed, and without power he would never have flown.

But you will say why "Fred"? It's a funny name for an aeroplane. Back in the sixties Eric Clutton named his creation Fred. It was an acronym for "Flying Runabout Experimental Design"! *Roger and Fred*

A series of presentations for the John Young Foundation by Roger Vaughan

For over forty years I have been involved in the Christian Ministry of Healing. These four talks attempt to deal with some of the issues which are related to this ministry which have had to be faced from time to time.

The sessions are to take place at Christ Church Centre, Stone

Wednesday January 15th 2.30pm –Healing and the “authentic voice of God”

This deals with discernment and how we can begin to work out if the "nudges" we get are really from God or not. What guidelines can Scripture give us, and what common pitfalls should we be trying to avoid?

Wednesday January 29th at 2.30pm.-The healing power of forgiveness

Christian forgiveness is a painful path, but a glorious way. Because it is painful and difficult we often try to short cut the process, for example, by using simplistic and unhelpful phrases like “Just forgive, and it will be fine”. This presentation seeks to address the difficulties, and outlines some practical steps to help us to become “forgiving people”.

Wednesday February 12th at 2.30pm-“All will be well” - healing and death.

This is a "head on" look at prevailing attitudes to death, and the way we use "semi-Christian" ideas in popular culture to cover up the enigma of death. An attempt to give simplistic answers has to be avoided. However, we all need to face the challenge of our death and set it against the background of our Christian Faith.

Feb 26th 2:30pm-“Breaking the mould” – Healing false thought patterns.

In today’s noisy, bustling and frantic world we face some serious questions. How free are we to live the life God intended for us? How often do we allow our lives to be moulded by the pressures of society, and our hidden desire for approval? Romans 12:2 would make a very good alternative title for this presentation!

(news from the Beesigomwes in Botswana)

Dear Partners at Christ Church;

Greetings in the most precious Name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Merry Christmas and best wishes for the New Year. We trust that the Lord has continued to be your all in all and a blessing at home and work.

Ministry news

Because of your commitment to keep us in the mission field, and God's faithfulness and grace, the Lord has continued to touch some groups and individuals in Botswana with what is increasingly becoming more visibly necessary for all - Family Life and Character Education. This was evidenced by the number partnerships formed. Churches and Schools used over 100,000 age specific and relevant books of hope that will last a few years donated by our partners - OneHope.

Believers Destiny Academy gave us an opportunity and support to not only teach about 1120 children in the school key character skills but also to reach out to other schools through peer educators. Teaching the same class one lesson per week made growth and follow up a joy for both teachers and learners. We also partner with Fair Grounds Holdings to run parenting, Marriage Fitness and Youth Empowerment meetings using their wonderful facilities at no cost.

In addition, God gave us twelve young Batswana that are slowly but surely learning to share the burden of reaching their country with the message of Hope on a part time basis. Some of them are potential missionaries. We are trusting God to provide consistent financial support that does not only cover transport but personal needs as well for them.

We also partner with Pumpkin Punch Pre-school to share moral and Spiritual character education. You need to see how much joy Robinah adds to the 2 - 5 year old children and the joy they add to her. She is amazed at how easily children can understand spiritual things when taught by someone who is able to go down to their level and use their style of learning.

We believe teaching children to change without targeting their significant other won't go very far. In October we launched the Family Programme to churches to use. It take 8 weeks in a church and or family setting to go through the programme. We provide for free both parent books and teachers' guide.
