There is a great deal of celebrating at Christmas. The arrival of Jesus celebrates the coming of 'Immanuel – which means God with us' (Matthew 1v23). But what if he had never been born? Putting aside the fact that it would dent the accounts of the retailers, there are a lot of things riding on his birth!

The world would look and sound very different. We'd miss many of our community buildings – the churches and cathedrals, the establishment of schools, the development of health care and the hospice movement to name just a few. There would be a gap in works of art: paintings, sculptures, stained glass windows and embroidery. It would sound very different: a huge array of music and song is inspired by Jesus – not just Christmas carols, but also Handel's Messiah, stage shows and songs that top the charts. We'd even lose a massive amount of literature: novels, biographies, poetry and prose. The law of the land would be different as many are based on principles found in the best selling book which is the Holy Bible.

If Jesus had not been born we would not have his perfect life and teachings which not only show us the difference between right and wrong but also reveal the character, love and will of God to the world.

If Jesus had not been born we would have no way to be forgiven for all the wrong we have done or the right that we have failed to carry out. We would then not be able to know peace with God for only through Jesus can the forgiveness of sins be proclaimed as certain for all who humbly trust in his death on the cross: *'you will give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins'* (Mt 1v21).

If Jesus had not come then there would be no way of going to heaven when we die, as his own death was a self-sacrifice

for others, so as to open the way to heaven: 'For my Father's will is that everyone who looks to the Son and believes in him shall have eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day' (John 6v40).

Lots of things rely on the birth of Jesus: it is part of history and shapes daily life. Will you give time to considering its significance this year? (continued on next page)

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n First Holy Communion of the New Year (with LICC speaker Andrew Belfield) When our son, Sam, was born, my wife never got to the hospital. I remember it like yesterday:

Her waters break at 6am; I hear the groans, follow the sound to the bathroom and find Mandy on all fours. The contractions are every minute. I ring the hospital: 'Far too risky to drive her in' and 'sorry, there's an ambulance strike' and 'no, the emergency ambulance isn't available, it's just gone out to another call. Please wait for the midwife to get to you'.

Mandy is still groaning on the bathroom floor; contractions every 45 seconds now. So I help her back to our bedroom... yes, in between contractions. By this time, Fran, our 16 month old daughter, is wide awake and not wanting to miss out on the action. Trying not to panic, I stand at the top of the stairs brushing my teeth and ponder what to do next! Inspiration strikes – wake up the next door neighbour, Irene. Brown Owl of the local Brownie pack and she's had 3 daughters of her own, Irene will know what to do.

Our house fills up with neighbours: Irene's teenage daughter takes control of Fran, her husband brews tea in the kitchen, I attend to Mandy's breathing and Irene assumes the role of midwife. No pain killers, a bit of yelling, some anxious looks, many silent, heart-felt prayers and Sam is born just as the emergency ambulance driver appears in the bedroom. Where's the midwife?' he asks?

'You're it!' I reply.

An extraordinary birth in an ordinary place. Crowding around mother and son in the bedroom - neighbours, family, ambulance driver and midwife who arrives moments after him – we all have a cup of tea to celebrate.

I wonder if something similar happened 2000 years ago with a more extraordinary birth. Caesar calls a census in the Roman Empire. Everyone must return to their home town to be counted and so Joseph and Mary travel the 80 miles south from Nazareth to Bethlehem. Luke tells us there is 'no room for them in the inn', when they get there.

Immediately we think of an old English pub, heaving with people. We even invent an innkeeper to point Mary and Joseph round the back to a stable.

But in reality it's unthinkable, in a culture where hospitality is taken so seriously, that Joseph's family would not find room for him and Mary, especially with her expecting a child. The word, 'inn', translates as 'guest room'. What is most likely is that there was no room in the *guest room* of Joseph's uncle's house because that was taken by another, perhaps an elderly cousin and his wife, also in town for the census. Therefore, the baby is born in the main room – where the rest of the family slept on a raised shelf – amongst the household animals which would have been brought in for the night.

Jesus has an ordinary birth. He is born amongst animals because all ordinary families in that culture at that time have their animals in with them at night. Jesus is laid in a manger – a feeding trough- because it is there. A bit like today, some babies are put in an open drawer of a chest if there is no cot. I bet there was also a bit of a family celebration. Maybe more than a cup of tea!

Christians believe in a down-to-earth God who cares for us and what happens in our lives – worries about trouble with someone we love, fears about the test results from hospital, anxiety about paying the bills. God is with us, hears us when we cry out and has room for everyone in his heart. Can we make room for him in ours?

⁹ New 'Green' Communion Table Frontal & Lectern Falls

Praise be to God for the gifts and talents He has given each one of us. To Him be the glory!!!

On Sunday 2^{nd} November, the Banner & Crafts needlework group presented a new set of 'green' furnishings to the church, to replace the very worn and faded set that has been in use for longer than most people in the church can remember.

It has taken a team of 10 ladies and two men almost a year to complete this work. More than 300 hours of work has gone into designing, sewing and constructing these furnishings. The design is based on an original A4 drawing created by George Holden.

The drawing had to be scaled up, using the computer, to make full-size patterns for cutting and sewing. The frontal alone required 44 sheets of A4 paper sellotaped together to make one pattern. We used approximately 18 metres of cloth (including 7 shades of green material), 20 reels of thread, and 12 metres of black cord to complete the work.

The project was paid for using some of the money left to the church by John Brewer. In acknowledgment of this, there is an embroidered label on the back of the Communion table frontal: *Created using part of a legacy left to Christ Church by John and Pearl Brewer. 2014*

Great! It's Autumn Watch from Leighton Moss RSPB Reserve

It's that time of year again and back comes this enjoyable and informative round-up of what's going on in the world of wildlife. I had great fun tuning into the BBC's Red Button early morning Autumn Watch Extra programme during the last week in October. It's a stunning setting on the Moss of this reserve based along the Lancastrian coast.

There was lots to see including deer, starlings, barn owls, long-eared bats, spiders and a wide range of migrating birds not to mention transformation of the leaves on the Lake District trees. One morning at sunrise I found myself listening to the quiet voice of the cameraman welcoming visitors to the Moss. They included red and fallow deer (stag & hinds), moorhen and swans as they arrived with the cygnets as big as their parents.

I loved the duck Jacuzzi made by the dabbling mallards with their antics filmed by an underwater camera as they dived for their breakfast. The water rail had its eyes on the otter's sprats and braved the ducks to get to them but became rattled when another water rail had the same intention. He did not want to share his sprats. After a good feed it was time to rest up in the reeds. At sunset over the marshes I was treated to a live display of thousands of starlings swirling around before settling down to roost for the night.

1954 was a "great" year for me when Billy Graham first arrived in London to begin his Greater London Rally. The Rally was relayed to us in my home parish on a huge screen and had a big influence on me for the future leading along with others to full-time parish work. The Good News of the Cross of Jesus with His saving power was always at the heart of the team's message.

It was wonderful to see these boys being lifted up and celebrated when in their lives up until now they have known so much rejection and suffering. Pray that the boys self esteem would grow and that they would also come to know that Jesus is always on the sidelines cheering them on and delighting in them. Thank God for Filbert and his love for the kids. Pray that God would bless him and equip him for his work.

Ebola crisis

Please keep the Ebola crisis in West Africa in your prayers. We are thankful that Senegal is Ebola free, but Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone need much prayer. 90 people filed into the newly rented building and celebrated! There is now a Gospel Centre in this town, where 25,000 live and where there has never been an evangelical church since it was founded 800 years ago!

Faith in Christ never goes disappointed!

Easy to say sometimes, but great to see! Just a few weeks before the planned Easter we had nothing, except an empty rented room. But we had been in this situation before, 9 years ago when we started with the Dubrava churchplant. So we formulated a list, well soaked in prayer, but now we needed action! The "Grandmother church", Radiæeva Baptists happily donated 600 euros, a new digital projector was also donated. The Mother church, Dubrava Baptists helped with 40 chairs and Tabita's German church in Stuttgart gave 1000 euros. How was the rent to be paid? Emanoel's Brazilian sister Emily lives in England, and her Swindon Brazilian church had happily promised 200 pounds a month towards the rent! Stephen had preached there November 2013, sharing the vision and her brother Emanoel's desire to "plant a new church, and quick!", so all was nicely provided for - as usual - by our God. Incidentally, the Brazilian pastor of the church has invited Emanoel and myself, together with ECM President Johan Lukasse and British Director Kent Anderson to speak at their conference 17th - 19th April 2015! They really want to help mission work in the Balkans!

<u>Major Evangelism in Dugo Selo, December 2014</u> This Christmas, we really want to "push forward!" in Dugo Selo. The church has formed quite well, with a core group of 30 coming on Sunday evenings. This involves a good number from the Dubrava church. Now we have seen one conversion and we want to see more. Sunday evening 14th December we invite ECM's Frank Bosch and the Mjuzikids and his clown act, which depicts the Gospel Christmas message. We will hire the main theatre in town with 300 capacity. 6 days later our translator Kristina (an international concert pianist, no less!) will come with 15 other musicians and hold a concert in the same hall. After both events I will speak for 5-10 minutes, outlining the Christmas message, sharing the joy of the Gospel and inviting everyone to our "Christmas Worship" at our church the next day 21st December.

I want to update the news from Simpetru that way to rejoice with me and with the church there about what God is working there for His glory.

Early this year I sent to you several prayer requests to pray with me and with the church in Simpetru. I must say that God was merciful and He blessed us in the spiritual part of my requests but not that much for the building projects we pray for. Here are several things I want to mention and to give THANKS to our Lord and to you for your prayer support.

- 1. One point I asked you to pray for Cornelia and Radu who were living together but not legally married. I can say that they not only got married this week but Radu asked to be baptized also. This is a great joy for me and the Grace of God brings a family close to the Lord. Praise God.
- 2. Then I asked you for a children's minister for Simpetru. We were blessed by God with Ripas family Dinu and Margareta. They are doing a sacrificial ministry with the children in Simpetru.
- 3. I asked you to pray for a children's orchestra. I want to let you know that the orchestra is there. Not with a huge number of children but they already performed several times in Simpetru and in other two very small churches. The sound is wonderful to God's Glory.

Please continue to pray for the building projects we want to do in the future. I just want to remember them here:

- 1. We need to replace the wood windows to the building. Those windows do not help us too much to keep the bugs, and the cold out of the building. In autumn is coming a lot of insects come in the main part of the building and they fly around the lights like crazy.
- 2. We need to replace the fence and the gates of the road side.
- 3. We need to restore the outside walls plaster and to paint them in a nice colour.
- 4. We have a room which is not used at the moment and we are thinking to transform that room into a guest room. I think that room can be good for the children's ministry also.
