A bouquet of flowers, a perfectly wrapped box of luxury chocolates, decorative red hearts and a romantic meal. Isn't that what Valentine's day is all about, right? Well, maybe not. So far as the history goes there is little that is certain. The day probably replaced a Roman fertility festival in the 5th century. Behind it is a saint called 'Valentine' but a choice of various characters all make convincing bids for the title.

A well-known legend concerns a 3rd Century Roman priest. While Emperor Claudius II reigned he decided that unmarried men made better soldiers and so he outlawed marriage for single men in his service. In secret Valentine performed marriages between young men and women and led to his popularity. But this was his undoing and as a result he was executed. Another legend suggests that Valentine fell in love with a girl who visited him while in prison. Before his execution he wrote a letter, signed "from your Valentine". The expression was used subsequently in a romantic way.

If we want to look at the nature of true love, we have to dig deeper than the romantic cards and gifts. Even though Valentine's Day is highly commercialized, the one thing it gets right is to remind us that love <u>does</u> something – to love is to act, or it is not love at all.

The practical nature of love is seen from the words of a passage often used at weddings, some of which reads: 'Love is patient, love is kind...it always protects, always trust, always hopes, always perseveres' (I Cor 13v4,7). The way it describes love is self-giving and self-sacrificial, this is the nature of God's love for us and to be shown towards others.

A similar theme is true when we look at what a love for God involves. It too is self-giving and self-sacrificial in terms of a devotion to Jesus, who said: 'If you love me, you will obey what I command' (John 14v15). 'You are my friends if you do what I command' (John 15v14).

The challenge is to ask: how do I express my love for Jesus Christ? Does it involve doing anything? Should it involve changing so that I readily learn to follow his way? Am I prepared to sacrifice something in the service of the one who voluntarily gave himself up for me?

Let's explore together this Lent what a true love for the Lord Jesus means.

The best thing about February is that it is a short month! It is dark and chilly and has no 'highlights' like Christmas to liven it up. Yet, under the earth things are starting to stir and in the fields there are signs of new life and the promise that warmer and brighter days are not so far away.

During 2015 I have the privilege of serving as President of the Staffordshire and Birmingham Agricultural Society which is based at the County Showground in Stafford. If you have never been to the County Show I would urge you to put May 27th or 28th in your diary now – it is interesting and brilliant fun for all the family whatever the weather is like! As well as all the livestock and competitions there are amazing demonstrations like sheep shearing and skilled blacksmiths replacing horse shoes and stalls selling all kinds of craft items.

For a 'city lad' like myself, involvement with the Society has been a real learning curve and I have nothing but admiration for the hard working farmers of this Diocese as they grapple with continuous uncertainties of the weather, milk prices and the challenges of bovine TB. All of this in an age when small farms are on the decline and the increase in larger organisations and the fewer market days means that farmers have less opportunity to meet for mutual encouragement.

Churches have a key role to play in rural matters and I get frustrated with some 'incomers' into our villages who do not seem interested in supporting their local parish church and who fail to engage with their new Community. It is indifference that has resulted in the loss of the village shop and pub and school and frankly will put at risk the future sustainability of many of our rural church buildings. The message is clear – use it or lose it! We must focus the resources that God has given us where there is opportunity for mission and growth. This is nothing new read Matthew 10: 14!

The encouraging news is that despite all the challenges, many young people are still going to agricultural college and want to work in our rural areas. Many Young Farmers I meet are incredibly lively and upbeat and I admire both their enthusiasm and their commitment. The Young Farmers support and encourage one another and I warmly commend the local groups to any young person who is looking to make friends and try new activities - you do not have to be farming to join!

It is essential that we find ways to keep the cost of housing in our rural communities realistic to enable these young people who WANT to engage to do so. Bringing young families back into our villages is essential if they are to have any future and their loss would be tragically detrimental to the life of this nation. I hope that this is one of the many areas about which we quiz our prospective MPs as we approach the coming General Election.

February brings new growth – it also offers the opportunity for new spiritual growth (Lent begins on Ash Wednesday – February 18th). Please pray for all who live and work in the rural parts of our Diocese and try to keep their needs in mind in the various discussions that will be taking place in our Lent Groups this year.

The National Memorial Arboretum is a place of reflection, remembrance and prayer, dedicated to those who have served, suffered or sacrificed for this country. To those who are remembered here, we owe a debt of unspeakable gratitude. This New Year is particularly significant, marking the end of one of the longest wars that our modern services have fought. There is a danger that the sacrifice and suffering of those caught up in war and disaster will slip from our minds. Each day brings its toll of bad news, of disasters inflicted on the innocent by war and disease.

In 2014 we saw so much of that in the Middle East, in north-east Nigeria, with the persecution of Christians and other minorities. And in the week before Christmas itself, there was the horrendous massacre of children in Pakistan

There is so much suffering that at the New Year it is tempting to look inwards in despair. But we are not a country that turns our back on the suffering and the weak and the helpless.

In the week just before Christmas I was in Sierra Leone, very briefly. There I saw the result of British generosity, of aid poured in to support a country torn apart by Ebola, and the extraordinary dedication of British service personnel, working with charities, funded by our aid budget. I saw the profound heroism of local people dealing with something that none of us understand which makes lethal the basic instincts of touch and embrace for the sick and the dying.

The week before that I was in the South Sudan, and saw again the open-handedness of the British people who have contributed to a programme that has saved one and a half million sufferers, war-battered, from starvation.

We are a country formed in a Christian heritage, which calls us to sacrifice and self-giving, to open-handedness and hospitality.

In the last year, travelling all over the world to see Anglican Churches and to meet their leaders, with my wife, we've seen the impact of this country both historically and today.

We started the year with assurance that God still needed us here through the renewal of our permits and opportunities to serve our District teaching Parent –Child communication skills and Character education. We just completed two workshops with parents, youth and children to help reduce teenage pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections. It was great to see the response and the desire of both youth and parents to respond to their need to be friends with each other by putting God at the centre of their relationship. This is in sharp contrast to the traditional way parents like to relate to their children this side of the world. We are also discovering some pastors who have a passion for the children of this nation, especially Pastor Bagopi of House of Treasure Church who hosted one of the workshops.

When parents, pastors and teachers work together and involve children in the process, the sky is the limit to how much this country can change. This will give us the opportunity to bring into some schools and churches the good old "Life at the Crossroads" principles of Relational skills, Character Connection skills, Sex in perspective, Life skills and navigating the future skills, this time with parent involvement and bathed in prayer.

Two great moments that opened my eyes: one was to attend again the annual unashamed movement prayer walk across Gaborone city. Imagine over two thousand people of all ages and Christian denomination crying to God together about a city and nation. The second moment was the opportunity to attend the Village Development Committee annual general meeting and to be one of them in planning a workshop for the village between 4 and 5 December. The power of such a system for the village cannot be over emphasized.

As I sat listening to the three of our team facilitating at the parent-child communication workshops on teen pregnancy and Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs) though mostly in Setswana, I knew our work is almost done. As we met the Speaker of the National Assembly to introduce these young people and update her on the programme she has been part of from the beginning, I was able to confidently say for the first time that the programme would not die if we left the country.

OneHope international continues to bless Africa, and through Family Connections, Botswana. Our Southern African team ran a regional workshop in Johannesburg in September learning, praying and planning together to touch more lives with the transforming word of our Lord Jesus Christ and Character education through the books of hope and Our Family. This year we had 165,500 books to distribute. The new requirement to train before distribution proved to be slow but much better. We are praying that more pastors will allow their Sunday school teachers, family life coordinators, youth leaders to be trained to use the free materials. Our premarital preparation provides for us to take the new couple on holiday as follow up in their first year of marriage.

Our son Timothy is working hard with children. "I Owe You Jesus Christ" (IOUJC) is known in some areas with children on bicycles and T-shirts sharing Christ and literature. This is what he says: "I have been asking many children bible questions and they get a sweet for every right answer. The questions are from bible stories I know, and though the children may not know, it gives them an opportunity to learn. I have even chosen to do an action of a bible character which the kids/participants guess. I'm excited about how the children like this and want to know more of the things that happened in the bible. It also gives me the urge to read and know more."

In February Robinah and I went to Uganda for the first time together in 11 years. It was great to attend Hannah's graduation and pray her into a job that she is currently training for in Nairobi. Robinah went back to Uganda to represent the family on Joel's graduation that took place on 5th December. God is a prayer answering God. We are praying he too gets a job and lightens the load. Martha has one year to go. Elijah and Prisca are proving to be great parents to Samantha just like their own parents. Jonathan Junior is ready for Standard seven. For the first time he spent Christmas with family friends in Zambia. Thank you dear partners for allowing God to use you to educate our children as he promised us in Isaiah 54.

Barry and Arthur's quiz evening was on Saturday 12th March. Tickets cost 50p. Proceeds went to the Clifford Project.

Nora Fox's funeral (which took place late in 2004) was recorded in the magazine. She was 92 years old when she died.

Christ Church 130 years ago

The parish magazine "Home Words" was issued, after a gap of several years without a magazine. It cost a penny a month.

The vicar was Rev. Walter J. Thompson. Rev. Arthur Pearman was welcomed as curate on January 8th.

Restoration work on the church was completed in January and the church was re-opened on Saturday February 21st by the Bishop. The Archdeacon preached on Sunday February 22nd.

Services were instituted at 7:30 pm on Thursday evenings in the Stonefield Schoolroom.

A mens' Bible class began on Tuesday February 3rd.

A new hymn-book was introduced, the "Hymnal Companion"
