

⁴ Every aspect of life is to be under the Lordship of Jesus

Followers of Jesus become mature disciples as faith is applied to everyday life. This is unlike a New Year resolution that a person may try for a while, fall behind and then give up. Discipleship is about a growing relationship of trusting and obeying Jesus. It's a revolution, rather than a resolution! This relationship with Jesus overflows into all dimensions of life.

The idea of whole life discipleship runs throughout the Bible. The message is like the words in a stick of rock - wherever you cut it you find the same message! So, the books of the Law teach: 'You shall not do as they do in the land of Egypt, where you lived, and you shall not do as they do in the land of Canaan, to which I am bringing you' (Lev 18v3). The Wisdom literature commends godliness: 'blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked, or stand in the way of sinners or sit in the seat of mockers' (Psalm 1v1). Prophets call for faithfulness: 'Let the wicked forsake his way and the evil man his thoughts. Let him turn to the Lord, and he will have mercy on him' (Isaiah 55v7). Jesus said: 'when you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners to be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward in full' (Matthew 6v5). The Apostles wrote about the costly redemption paid for by the Lord Jesus and the response we should make: 'Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God, this is your true and proper worship. Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is, his good, pleasing and perfect will' (Romans 12v1-2).

We are not in this alone as the Lord Jesus provides us with instruction,

helps us face life's challenges and the gift of his Spirit enables whole life discipleship.* I hope that you can join us each Sunday in 2015 to learn how to follow Jesus and bring every aspect of life under his Lordship.

The reformation was instrumental in making the bible open and accessible to all, regardless of status, gender or educational background. Indeed, it is the reason why we have such a wide range of translations of the bible that are easy for us to understand and study.



Whether your background is Anglican, Presbyterian, Lutheran, Methodist, Baptist, Nondenominational, or Roman Catholic, the modern beliefs and traditions of our varied churches stem from those Reformation events that occurred over 500 years ago. Come and learn *why* you stand where you stand.

With a world class team of scholars, historians, pastors, and theologians, Dr. Peter Lillback

leads us through an eve-opening

journey around the world in fascinating 20 minute segments. From Luther's Germany and Calvin's Geneva to Spain, England, Scotland, and beyond. We will also take some time to think about and discuss our modern society, economy, government, and church, and how their roots are in the Reformation. We will clearly see how the Reformation shaped the world we live in today.

No don't worry – I hate the fact that on Boxing Day the Cadbury Crème Eggs are out on the shelves too!

However once we are into the New Year I can look forward to my annual trip to Spring Harvest! Spring Harvest is held every year at Easter time – it is a huge Christian Conference, full of good teaching and excellent worship. I started going in 1999 so 2015 will be my 16th year and I can recommend it as a way of giving your walk with Jesus a tremendous boost. I know that many from Christ Church go to Keswick in July each year and it is very similar to that, just earlier in the year.

I started going when our children were 10, 13, 16 and 19. Then for the next 6 years Reece, the eldest continued to come, he loved it. Sophie the youngest and Hannah the next one up also loved coming and they always brought a friend (often an unchurched friend) with them and had a great time. For children it is wonderful as they get excellent age appropriate teaching and worship as well as an introduction to mission and can use all the Butlin's facilities – swimming pool, fun fair etc. – Yes it is held at Butlin's in Minehead and Skegness. Don't panic – over the years Butlin's has upgraded and modernised so the accommodation is very good and as everything is on site it is very safe for children, and with the beach close by – Minehead is a particularly beautiful part of the world in Somerset. Once there we seemed to only see the children at breakfast and tea! A small group of us from Shawbury church went each time. (John and Vicky were not keen – it is not for everyone! John loves the music, but does not like big seminars and rousing talks so much).

The whole of the Butlin's site is taken over by about 9000 people of all ages from 0 - 90 plus. The staff of Butlins love that we are there – they say that the weeks of Spring Harvest have such a different feel than the rest of the year there. Butlin's is transformed and through the event so are many who go – a unique experience that is there to equip the church for action in the 21^{st} Century.

Once the children went off to college etc. I continued to go - now for the last 9 years as part of the pastoral team – some would say a busman's holiday doing counselling while away, but I love being able to listen and talk to guests and help them on their journey with Christ

Being part of the prayer ministry there is a real privilege, although it is interesting saying prayers for people at the back of the big top with 4000 people singing!!!! It is wonderful to see people develop in their faith and to come to a more peaceful place through listening and prayer.

Each year there is a teaching theme and all the site – every age group – engages in an age appropriate way with the bible teachings and theme – this year the theme is **'Immeasurably More'**, based on Ephesians 3 20-21:-

'Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we can ask or imagine, according to the power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever Amen!'

More News from the new Dugo Sela Church (Zagreb)

(following on from the report in the December magazine) There are quite a few wonderful stories. Soon after our Brazilian missionaries Emanoel and Francine arrived, they had not one, but two translators. Valentina – his first translator – is a believer working in distant Dubrovnik, whose parents live just 19 km away in Vrbovec. Both her parents regularly came to all the housegroups and just last week her father Josip professed conversion! Emanoel now wants to start a church in that town! But that is not all! The second translator is *Kristina*, the daughter of leading believers in the Radiæeva church. She had apparently learnt really fluent Portuguese watching Brazilian soap operas on Croatian television! She and her husband Ivan have now become members of the Dugo Selo church and she translates Emanoel when he preaches, although Emanoel can now speak Croatian quite well, even having lead two bible studies recently. A new couple, Stjepan and his wife Ana live in Dugo Selo, and since we opened the church are regular and key members. Their three children, two elder teenager girls and older brother *Matej* also bring some life. They all want to be involved in various ministries. Stephen Bell

This year the Advent Windows commemorated the centenary of the WW1 Christmas Truce. Helen Bowes, organiser of the project, hoped each window would feature a poppy and the words 'Peace and goodwill to ALL people'.

Window 1 - Birchall & Watson - Silent Night

A good crowd gather to see the opening of the first window – including two dogs, Lynne carrying her little dog, Moses and Monica had her dog on a lead. Just before 11 a.m., the staff came out in their Christmas jumpers. The staff led by Linda, decorated the window themselves. Helen introduced the project and then asked the Mayor, Cllr. Cathy Collier to open the window. We sang Silent Night – the note given by a lady at the back of the crowd.

Then we had a chance to look at the window in detail. It featured the trenches – sandbags and barbed wire (knotted boot laces) and many poppies. The story of the Christmas truce was included and the carol was printed in German and English. Letters from soldiers serving in local regiments had also been printed. We asked Linda about the artefacts; they had belonged to her own family – her grandfather's Bible, a Christmas card, a tin, tobacco and cigarettes. There was also a chocolate bar produced by a certain supermarket in a 1914 style wrapper, brought in by a customer.

A very special 1st window!

<u>Window 8 – Mayfair Dry Cleaners – Good King Wenceslas –</u> <u>Oulton 1st School</u>

I didn't see this window opened but it was a beautiful window. The Nativity scene was in the centre – reminding us that it is Jesus who brings peace and hope to us all. At each side were the two opposing sets of soldiers. Behind the German soldiers was King Wenceslas in his castle, with a fall of poppies as at the Tower of London. The barbed wire was represented by mini candle lights but there was real barbed wire too.

Sheila

The Diocese serves a population of 2.097 million, the 5th largest by population in the country. The Diocese serves an area of 1,740 squaremiles, the 9th largest by size in the country. The Diocese has 265 Benefices, 425 Parishes and 573 Churches. The Diocese has 502 clergy in active ministry – 142 women and 360 men.

On average, each member of the clergy serves 3,660 people.

Attendance

In 2013, the latest year for which statistics are available, churches in the diocese had an average weekly attendance of 39,800; of which 25,400 were on a Sunday.

These average attendance figures do not include Christmas and Easter when attendance is much higher - up to double that in an average week.

Baptisms

In 2013, the Diocese baptised 5,928 people - a slight fall from 2012 but more than in 2011.

Confirmations

There were 790 confirmations in 2013.

Marriages

In 2013, the Diocese performed 2,143 weddings.

Education

The Lichfield Diocesan Board of Education is the second largest in the Church of England with 206 Church of England Schools. Of these, 47 are Voluntary Aided; 157 are Voluntary Controlled and two are Foundation Schools. Some 44,000 children and young people are educated in Church of England schools in the diocese.

There are 196 Primary schools, six Middle schools and four Secondary schools in seven local education authority areas: Staffordshire, Stoke-on-Trent, Shropshire, Telford & Wrekin, Wolverhampton, Sandwell and Walsall. 73 schools received Denominational Inspections (statutory inspection of anglican schools) in 2006/07 and 19% were judged "Outstanding", 60% "Good" and 21% "Satisfactory". No school was unsatisfactory. On average, over the period 2003-06, in Key Stage 2 SATs results Church of England schools in the Diocese of Lichfield outperformed all schools in the seven relevant local authority areas by 8% **Funerals**

The Diocese held 4979 church funerals in 2013, as well as 3572 in crematoria and other locations.
