Beyond belief?

We live at a time when almost anything passes for Christianity. One author records how, while on a radio programme, a caller stuck in traffic on the Santa Monica freeway rang in and said: "I am sitting here in traffic holding onto my crystals and feeling really close to Jesus, and I am wondering, what is the connection between these crystals and Jesus?" The author replied – "nothing, except that he made those crystals!"

To add to this confused outlook there are many novel claims, or sensational revelations, about Jesus currently in circulation. Interest is heightened by the claim that the Church has suppressed these claims due to the scandalous nature or devastating effect such knowledge would have on traditional views about Jesus.

We could scoff at such claims made in books like Dan Brown's 'The Da Vinci Code' as yet another work of fiction. But the remarkable popularity of such books shows that there is a sea change in thinking. Many people are soaking up what is in fact beyond belief. The new wisdom is portrayed as being found within (a self-help religion), rather than coming from outside (recognising our need of the Saviour).

During our morning services after Easter we will explore some of the claims made in 'The Da Vinci Code' and investigate whether they stand up to scrutiny against the historic evidence. The Christian faith has always been attacked, but it has always rested on evidence that demands a verdict.

At Easter time we will remember once again that Jesus' death and resurrection are **not** beyond belief, but are historic facts. The resurrection of Jesus unveiled how the Truth has broken into the world. The resurrection is the ultimate proof of Jesus' identity as explained by the apostle Paul: 'declared with power to be the Son of God, by his resurrection from the dead: Jesus Christ our Lord'

(Romans 1v4). In Jesus we find the truth and nowhere else. In the light of this we are to trust him as our Saviour and live with him as our Lord.

I hope that you have a great Easter.

The children were highly competitive and thoroughly enjoyed it, but the adults seemed even more so – well done to Paul for a hard fought victory (I was second!).

Thanks to everyone who worked hard to make these events such a success, and all those who supported in every way, particularly the church youth who really helped out this year! Look out for more fun and games soon at Christ Church!





Kelly and Cecilia's visit to Hebron School

Hebron is a co-educational, Christian residential school with some 350 students ranging from 5-18yrs, situated in 20 acres of woodland. The School follows the English National Curriculum.

Kelly Maltby and Cecilia Wilding flew out to Ootacamund in the Nilgiri Hills, South India, at the end of January for two weeks to visit three families our church supports at Hebron School.

The majority of students are children of Christian workers, both Indian and expatriate, with a sizable minority of 'business students', covering 21 nationalities at present. The staff are both Indian and expatriate. There are a large number of staffing vacancies from the summer – see the School's web-site **www.hebronooty.org** for details if you are interested.

Our aims in visiting were to encourage the families we support, and to see the situation for ourselves so that as a church we can be more knowledgeable in our prayers and support for them. These aims were abundantly achieved.



We were made very welcome and quickly felt at home, although I was only just taking the quickest routes by the end of our time there. The School is a three-dimensional maze, built on a steep hillside! We arrived just at the start of the second of the two terms in the year.



The Baron family have been supported by us for many years, firstly when they were in Faisalabad, Pakistan, and then at Murree Christian School up to the armed attack there in 2002. Following a year with the senior Murree students in Chiang Mai, North Thailand, they moved to Hebron. Dagmar is Head of Science in the School and teaches Chemistry and Biology. It was good to see Dagmar in action teaching in the labs, although I felt a bit ashamed when I couldn't answer some of the questions! Ralph has taken a year out to do some advanced computer studies. Their older daughter, Helen, is studying law at Oxford. Their younger daughter, Sarah, is on a gap year in Pakistan and starts Medical Studies in the autumn. Simon is still at Hebron and does his GCSEs this year. They live in a flat just off campus and entertained us on a number of occasions. Dagmar's a good cook! While Kelly entertained friends visiting from Bangalore on the first Saturday, Ralph & Dagmar took me on a tour of the surrounding countryside. The Nilgiri Hills are a

tea and vegetable-growing area and there are terraces of tea bushes and vegetables everywhere. The countryside is beautiful.



Owen & Tracy and their three boys were due to go to Murree Christian School but the armed attack intervened. They ended up going to Hebron instead where they are now into their second three-year contract. They welcomed us to use their home as a base while at Hebron and we visited them a lot. The boys live with their parents but are attached to a dorm of their age. Owen teaches Std 6. Kelly spent much of her time acting as a classroom assistant with Owen's class and built up a great relationship with the children. Tracy is Head of Art and I spent a lot of time in the art room where I learnt to value art in a way I had not done before. Ben is now in Std 12 (LV1) and is doing AS Levels, while Steffan & Jonathan are not into exam years yet. All three have good friends in the School and seem happy and settled. A highlight of our time with Owen & Tracy was a visit to a river in an out-of-the-way place where a field-work project was being planned. We had a picnic by the river, and were excited by the finding of a large paw-print in the river mud identified as belonging to a tiger! Were big cat eyes watching our every move from the undergrowth above?



Dom, Clare and Erica live very centrally in an upstairs flat. We spent quite a lot of time with them and were made very welcome. Dom is doing a great job as Erica's main carer and tries to fit in some computer work in the two hours when she is in Play-Group each morning. I went to the Playgroup most mornings on arrival at the School and helped a little with the eight toddlers there. They seemed a happy group but are in need of new equipment to replace some which is getting almost too old to use. I felt quite at home following toddler groups here at Christ Church. Clare continues teaching Technology, although doesn't find this easy when it's not her first subject and she has to learn some things from scratch – but she's doing a great job. I went to see her in action in the technology workshop on several occasions.



All three families are very grateful for our support and send greetings back to the Christ Church family. Their up-to-date prayer requests are in the Mission News and Prayer Diary in the centre of this Magazine.

Thank you for praying for us on our visit. If you would like to know more, I have written a report of our visit tracing a day at Hebron, and I would be happy to let you have a copy.

This was a great opportunity to see how Dom, Claire and Erica have settled into Hebron life, to get to know the Humphreys family better and to meet the Baron family. I spent an enjoyable time with all of them.

I spent most of my time at the school helping in Owen Humphreys standard 6 class (ages 10-11). This was an enjoyable and rewarding experience, meeting and working with children from all over the world who have grown up with a unique experience of different cultures. I was made to feel welcome by everyone I met at Hebron, both teachers and pupils alike and the pupils seem to genuinely enjoy being there.

We stayed at King's Cliff hotel. It is an old colonial villa with log fires in the bedrooms and a communal lounge where a band entertains the residents and diners every evening. The staff were terrific and couldn't have been more helpful and friendly. As we discovered during our stay, the restaurant serves fantastic food.

Whilst I was in southern India I had the opportunity to meet with some friends from Bangalore. They made a 9 hour journey to visit on my first weekend. We undertook part of the journey on the famous Nilgiri Blue Mountain Railway and saw breath-taking views of the mountains.

With the help of the school travel office I took the opportunity to take two days off to visit Mysore in Karnataka state and the famous Maharajah's place. The journey there and back involved tackling the 36 hairpin bends on the road through the Mudumalai Wildlife Sanctuary. On the journey to Mysore I was lucky enough to see wild elephants in Bandipur National Park. The interior décor of the palace is a lavish display of oil paintings, stained glass and marble and gold.

The National Memorial Arboretum

Inspired by the Arlington Cemetery and National Arboretum in Washington DC, USA, the National Memorial Arboretum was created as a living tribute in this country to all those who died in the conflicts of the twentieth century and beyond.

The Arboretum is easy to reach from Stone, being situated just off the A38 between Lichfield and Burton on Trent, one mile east of the village of Alrewas. With over 50,000 trees and over 100 Memorials or plots, all of which have a story to tell, it is a wonderful place of peace, contemplation and reconciliation. Each day an act of Homage is held in the chapel - the only place in the country where this ceremony is performed on a daily basis.

The NMA opens each day at 10.00 am and entry is free. You are advised to wear stout footwear for a visit, and for those who need them there are both manual and motorised wheelchairs available. There is an information centre, bookshop and restaurant.

On a visit you will encounter members of the volunteer group "Friends of the National Memorial Arboretum", who help with meeting, greeting, retailing, guiding and maintenance of the plots.
