

You will be my witnesses.

The holiday season for families sees the scattering of people to the four corners of the earth. You may think that I exaggerate, until I tell you that a brief survey of holiday destinations at school assemblies confirms this time and time again. We have unrivalled freedom to travel to exotic locations and explore a fascinating world. The price of air travel has revolutionised where we consider as a suitable location for a time of 'R & R'.

One interesting facet of taking a vacation is the sort of people you meet. Holidays are great for meeting people from all walks of life. Of course you never know when you might get the chance to share your faith. This may be sitting next to a talkative traveller on the plane, a friendly waiter in your hotel dining room, the family next door on the camp-site, meeting someone who is a tourist from a country where talking freely is really rather difficult, the person who is emigrating to 'make a fresh start'.

We sometimes think that we have to hold special events or be specially licensed for service in order to do this. But in fact all Christians have been commissioned for service. Jesus said to his disciples: 'you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth' (Acts 1v8). The PCC met on Wednesday 20th July 2005 and the following matters were dealt with.

for the visit together with prayer items and specific times to pray.

- Youth Worker The Vicar reported that Thomas Nash has accepted our invitation to become our Youth Worker from the beginning of September. His commissioning service will take place in the evening of Sunday, 4th September 2005.
- Rock Café This continues to attract 30-40 young people on a Friday evening. The young people have requested that it should stay open over the summer holidays and this was agreed provided that it can be adequately and appropriately staffed. An operational policy is being drawn up for the Café.
- FAIRTRADE Christ Church is now registered as a FAIRTRADE Church which means that we are committed to using Fairtrade tea and coffee for all church meetings, and to moving towards using other Fairtrade products as we are able, such as sugar, biscuits and fruit. Fairtrade products are marketed in such a way that producers are paid a fair price for the produce they grow,
- **Church roof** This needs urgent repair as louvres from the belfry have damaged tiles and more might fall soon and do further damage. The PCC agreed that this work should be put in hand in the very near future. Scaffolding will be erected to do this work.
- The PCC is continuing preparatory work towards defining our Mission Action Plan – that is, defining what God would have us do as a church to reach out to those around who don't yet know Him.

Next PCC meeting: Wednesday 7th September 2005.

Who are those missionaries...?

Almost as soon as Stephen became a Christian, he felt that God was calling him to go to a place where people had not heard the gospel. At the time (early 1980s), the most atheist country in the world was Albania. To be known as a Christian in Albania at

the time was to invite certain imprisonment, if not worse.

Enver Hoxha, the leader of the country, was paranoid about contact with the west, and had built 10,000 pill-boxes to defend the country. All churches, mosques and monasteries had been closed, emptied and converted to museums to Enver Hoxha himself. Stephen prayed for a sign that this was really the place where God wanted him the next morning he heard the news that Enver Hoxha had died in the night!

Stephen joined European Christian Mission and went to Yugoslavia in 1986 to learn Albanian. At the end of 1990, Albania was in a sorry state with extreme poverty due to the refusal of the government to have any outside contact. ECM sent in food parcels and other gifts (although still not allowed into the country), and eventually a government official came to ask how they could express their thanks. ECM asked whether they could come to Tirana (the capital city) and teach about Christianity. The surprising answer was an invitation to use the football stadium for an enormous Christian meeting.

About 10 Albanian-speakers, including Stephen, travelled to Tirana and spoke to thousands in a huge meeting. After that, they formed the "God loves Albania" organisation and were allowed free entry into the country. Soon, the government collapsed amid chaos and looting. Albania became bandit country. ECM continued their work, starting 3 churches and doing what they could to help. For a few years ECM ran an orphanage and for a few weeks, Stephen ran a refugee camp for 1000 exiles from Yugoslavia. The church initially grew very rapidly despite problems with gun-runners and other criminals. Later, the churches struggled amid disillusionment with the west and inroads by other faiths. However there are still thousands of new Christians worshipping in the new churches. Stephen met Tabita Sijanta, a young christian volunteer who lived in Stuttgart, in Germany and they were married in 1992. They rented a house in Fier and carried on the work in Albania. Stephen looked after 3 churches near Fier, all in rented or borrowed premises (one church used the Communist Party headquarters). Due to problems with local authorities, it became necessary to construct their own church building, and this became Stephen's ambition. After some years raising money, work began in 1999 and the opening of the church in 2000 was a great day. The building incorporated a teaching area, a store and a church. Local Christians did much of the work.

In 2000, Stephen and Tabita left Albania for the birth of their third child Benjamin, and while they were in England ECM decided they should not return but should move to Zagreb in Croatia. Due to the gunlaw still operating in Albania, it had been hard to keep their house and family safe, so the move, while a surprise, did make life easier. In 2001 Stephen, Tabita, Sheona, Joshua and Benjamin moved to Zagreb. They joined a group of Baptist churches and earlier this year, they started a new church in Sesvete with two other Christian workers John and Lynn Lehn. The first church service in February attracted 190 worshippers in rented premises and attendance has settled down at 50 adults.

Stephen and Tabita are now searching for a house close to the new church. As I was writing this, I received a phone call saying they have found a house and hope to put in an offer depending upon a loan they hope to get from the HSBC. They hope that in September the children will be able to attend schools in Sesvete. Stephen has been learning to speak Croatian (Tabita already knew the language because her grandparents live in Croatia) and can now preach in Croatian. The children also are all learning Croatian. 

Feba Radio – talking people's language

Why is radio such an effective means of spreading the Gospel? *Anthea McNeil* explains.

A man in southern Sudan was going to visit a friend when he "suddenly heard the radio talking in Dinka." He was so excited at discovering the radio could "talk" in his own language that he rushed to sell a cow and buy a radio.

When was the last time you were excited because your radio "talks in English"? Probably never – we take it for granted, as we do all the means of communication available to us.

Now contrast our attitude to radio with that of so many Feba listeners. Way out of reach of other means of communication, they see radio as a prized possession – a link with the wider world.

Prized Possession

I talked with colleagues working closely with listeners and asked why radio's important. Norman Brierley, Development Director for Eastern Africa, says, "Radio is a good medium for talking to one person and many individuals at the same time." This one-toone intimacy, broadcaster to listener, means people respond – and can therefore be counselled – personally. Norman also mentioned the radio's value in overcoming geographical, religious and other barriers.

Reaching unreached people and getting the message into inaccessible places are among many common reasons for using radio. Developmental Director Johnny Pierre: "In the Middle East – except for a few countries – people do not have access to churches, Bibles or missionaries. In such a 'closed' region,



radio can share the Gospel in a non-threatening, secure, and

personal way." Johnny also refers to people listening "in families and larger groups". A listener in Yemen confirmed that about 250 people from his tribe listen to Feba's programmes.

We've been thinking about radio's immeasurable value to rural listeners, but what about the vast number of people in the world's cities, where millions live untouched by the Gospel? Here the impact of community radio, with its emphasis on public access and listener involvement, is a tremendous vehicle for Christian outreach.

New community stations

The ethos of community radio is entirely in line with our aim of staying close to the listener's world. We are already involved in community-based ministry in India and south Africa and through Feba Kenya's station, *Baraka FM*, and our involvement with *Power FM* in Uganda.

Through radio, Feba can reach millions of lost people, whether they live in cities or remote villages. This listener in the Middle East thinks it's doing a good job: "I want to express my appreciation for the wonderful programmes which make the Arabic listeners satisfied and not want to listen to other stations, or even watch TV or Satellite."
