## Do you have something worth boasting about?

During the summer vacation there is a lot to talk about and the time to do it. Holidays give the chance to reflect on a year's achievements and to share news with family and friends. Someone in the family may have sat exams and be awaiting their results nervously knowing that they will determine what they can do next. We may think over the progress made at work and weigh up what is the best move we can now make for the future. Perhaps we've just moved house and it is the home of our dreams. Then again we might have developed our skills for a particular hobby or musical instrument. We love to hear about such things and encourage people to excel. But we tend to shrink back from those who boast.

In the Bible there is a great celebration of human achievement. Just think of the inspirational leaders, the good and godly kings who stood out against evil, the courage shown by otherwise unremarkable people, the deeply loyal friendships, and the artistic or poetic skills to express the glory of God. Yet the Bible discourages boasting about almost anything in this life, as it is a symptom of a self-delusion. Here's what one of the Old Testament prophets said: 'This is what the LORD says: "Let not the wise man boast of his wisdom or the strong man boast of his strength or the rich man boast of his riches, but let him who boasts boast about this: that he understands and knows me, that I am the LORD, who exercises kindness, justice and righteousness on earth, for in these I delight," declares the LORD (Jer 9v23-24). The words were spoken to people who thought that they would survive come what may, but whose trust was in false and unreliable props. All these things will pass away - our minds become forgetful and the exam certificates are lost, our strength gradually diminishes, our wealth is lost or left behind when we die. There is only one thing to boast about: knowing the Lord God. To know the Lord God is to know the one who shows kindness, who exercises justice and righteousness. The covenant making God is active and involved. We can boast about knowing the God of the Bible because His character is compellingly attractive.



As you enjoy the long summer evenings what fills your mind and conversation? Is your greatest delight the fact that you know the God of the Bible? Is there just a chance that you might say something to family, friends and holidaymakers as to <a href="https://www.why.gou.no.nd/">why.gou.no.nd/</a> worship the Lord? So then, let he who boasts, boast of the Lord!



# **Scripture Union?**

Scripture Union is a nondenominational, Christcentred, international movement, founded in 1867, working in partnership with individuals and churches across the world

#### Read the Bible

Scripture Union published the first systematic Bible reading portions as *The Children's Scripture Union* in 1880 and, five years later, introduced daily readings for adults.

Since then, hundreds of thousands of people of all ages have relied on their Bible reading guides. Through the generations, their writers and contributors have been consistent in their passion to help Christians explore and understand the truth of God's Word.

Bible reading notes produced at present include:

For adults: Daily Bread, Closer to God, Encounter with God For children and young people: Tiddlywinks (under 5s), Snapshots (age 8+), One Up (age 11+)

For teenagers and young adults: Airlock, DAYZD, Bible Bits to ignite your life

### **Evangelism**

The summer programme provides over 100 holidays across England and Wales for children and young people and they are always on the look-out for volunteers to hep run them (3,000 needed next year). Why not think about it? They also run children's activities at **Spring Harvest** each year.

## Mission Partners - Rebecca in Pakistan

**1** teach in a school for girls. They are aged between about 14 and 20, and they are studying for their Matric, the equivalent of a GCSE exam. What are their lives like and what kinds of needs and hopes for the future do they have? Many of them have a home in one of the villages surrounding our city. They are familiar with the work and routine of rural life - the crop harvesting, the planting. Now, while school is closed, many of them are back at home in their villages helping with the daily tasks.

When people use English here, many are functioning in a third or even a fourth language. Their mother tongue is the language of the village. There are at least four or five distinct languages in these areas and many people can function in two or three! Next people learn Urdu, the language of the country. Why is English important in an area like this? Because the school curriculum is in English - without English children can't access the curriculum. However, many don't have the opportunity to talk with fluent speakers - they rely on learning from text books. Rote learning plays a much greater part in learning here than it does in the West.

What does the future hold for these girls? To many education is a key and is very important to them. I asked my students recently about what they want to do in the future. Many of them want to have professional jobs: one wants to be a lawyer, another a banker, another a doctor. The profession of choice at the moment is a pilot in the army! Yet despite the rapid changes which are happening because of the improvements in travel and communication, this is still a deeply conservative society. In practice, in the northern areas, the domain of women is the home, and that of men is the outside world.

The girls have their own ideas about the changes they want to see in their society. Recently I asked them to suggest three things which they would change about our city if they were able to. They wanted to have: peace in the city. Improvements in the electricity (which is erratic) and the water supply (also erratic). Rubbish bins in the bazaar. A swimming pool. Some animals to put in the zoo (the city also has a zoo - but alas no animals). A park for ladies.

Most of us would agree that these are good ideas and we'd love to see these changes! There are also many good things here which we wouldn't want to change. However, many women and men are searching for a better future, for themselves and for this area. So we teach English, but more importantly we try to listen, plant some seeds, watch and wait for the unknown future, having the certainty that transformation is possible.

Why "A"? Well this is most certainly an 'indefinite article', and, if you like cryptic clues, it is also 'the end of an era'.



## What's He Got Up There?

A Sunday school class was being taught the story of Solomon's wisdom. The children were asked to think what they might ask God to give them if they could ask for whatever they wanted. One little girl just went into a trance as she excitedly pondered the question. Then she looked at the teacher with a little bewilderment and said, "But I don't even know what He's got up there."

Sometimes we are hesitant to ask God for anything specific for the same reason. We are aware that God can do so much more than we ask or think, how do we even begin to know what to ask for?

Our biggest concern is that we ask for something inferior when God has something much greater that He wants to give us. We ask for health; God is offering His strength. We ask for financial assistance; God is offering His riches. We ask for loved ones to live a few days longer; God is offering eternal life. We
