the **nativity** story.

Thanks to a new movie you could learn a lot about Christmas without setting foot in church! A film called 'The Nativity Story' is due for release in December. Although it uses artistic licence to come up with a manuscript that will market well, it covers the birth narrative of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

The film is a piece of cinema entertainment. It was shot in Matera, nestled in the hilly arch of Italy's boot (the Heely Land?), as opposed to the real events taking place in ancient Israel (the Holy Land) two millennia ago. The producer admits to giving a Catholic spin to Mary, and puts her on a pedestal, but many other aspects of the film remind us that she was just an ordinary young woman. It strays from the actual story in that the film uses artistic licence to include a fictional account of the extended family of Mary and Joseph, with a predictable romantic element en route to Bethlehem. But, as one reviewer has put it, the characters are seen wrestling with some of the fears, doubts and anxieties, all within the framework of faith in God. The actress who plays Mary is a New Zealander who turned just 16 before filming and plays Mary as a pregnant 14 year old, but it reminds us that this is a real story about how a miraculous (divine) conception changed the life of an engaged couple, and that of the world.

Despite some of these odd elements the film does help to put back into the public realm an ancient story that is nonetheless <u>true</u>. Too often people give me the impression that they think the New Testament account of the life of Jesus is fiction: on a par with Superman, or Willy Wonka's Chocolate Factory - stories which have moral value, but are only thought to be true by the gullible.

The <u>real</u> nativity story is found in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke, with a condensed version by John (while Mark jumps straight into Jesus' adult ministry). It's a story that is entirely trustworthy, because the four Gospels are reliable historical documents - much more reliable than other historic records which historians do not doubt the reliability. They record the life of Jesus Christ right from the news of his mother's pregnancy through to his birth, life, death and resurrection.

The nativity story introduces us to the most significant event in history as announced by the angel: "she [Mary] will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1v21). This is why we celebrate Christmas, and we invite you to join us this year as we give glory to God in the highest!

- · More than 4,500 languages still wait for even one book of the Bible

- Every 5 seconds someone goes blind but the Bible in Braille exists in only 30 languages

"Although in some parts of the world the Bible plays a central role, in many others it is ignored or seen as irrelevant. And in too many areas its message has still hardly been heard at all or has virtually disappeared from the day-to-day reality of people's lives.

All this means that our work has to be done with more energy, creativity and innovation than, perhaps, ever before. We are still, as ever, totally committed to **making the Bible and Scriptures available** where there are none, but, to this core task, we have added new activities. We are working in four key areas of society that carry great influence - in the **arts, media, education and politics.**United Bible Society:

"In our fight to end Bible poverty we are working in partnership with over 140 other National Bible Societies. We do so as part of a world-wide fellowship called the United Bible Societies with a central support function that improves our effectiveness and increases our efficiency.

Vital too are our **partnerships** with other mission agencies around the world, and our **partnerships with our supporters**, individuals and churches, who's sacrificial giving, prayer and sheer hard work makes what we do possible."

On Tuesday November 7th after lunch- a coach of 33 excited children and 3 (excited!) teachers left Stone heading for Lichfield. It was the day of our eagerly anticipated "Music Share Concert" at the Cathedral.

The children were in awe of everything which the Cathedral had to offer from the moment of our arrival— from the initial sighting of the 3 famous spires as we entered Lichfield, to the gasps of wonder as we stood outside and marvelled at the vast size of the building and at the skill of the craftsmen so long ago. On entering, they were amazed at the lofty heights and were enthralled as we were able to take albeit a brief tour around.

In the Cathedral School, we met the children and teachers from the two other schools whom we would be singing with and also the 15 or so Cathedral Choristers who would join us. Immediately things got off to a good start as we shared a snack of juice and biscuits together—guaranteed to break the ice, encourage "bonding" and develop the team-work which we would need to work together successfully as a choir! Following this, we returned to the Cathedral to begin rehearsals in preparation for the evening Concert. The children responded well to Alex Mason and the accompanist as they practised items as diverse as African chants, Maori, American, English and Irish traditional songs, a Beatles Medley and songs from the musical "Oliver". They learned a great deal in a short time from these talented and enthusiastic professionals. Rehearsals drew to an end as the time for Evensong approached.

As daylight faded, the candles were lit to prepare for Evensong. In their flickering light we were able to share a time of reflection and to focus on the beauty of the stained glass windows as we listened to the wonderful tones and colours of the organ and waited for the Clergy to begin the Service.

When Evensong began, the candle flames seemed to dance to the crisp, clear voices of the Choristers as they sang "Magnificat—The Song of Mary" and "Nunc Dimittis—The Song of Simeon" with breathtaking musical quality and skill. We were able to join in singing 2 well-loved hymns. We heard Old and New Testament readings. We prayed for the 3 schools who were represented and for all the visitors who would arrive to hear our concert later that evening.

Following Evensong, we were treated to a super tea (including 2nd and 3rd helpings if required!) provided by an army of dedicated volunteer helpers. It soon became evident that this excellent meal had put us in good voice for the ensuing hour of singing—during which our children sang our solo contribution to the Beatles medley,"Yesterday", with a great sense of feeling. All in all, this was a visit which teachers and children will never forget. One comment from a Year 3 boy the following day "It was the best night of my life.." says it all.

The excitement continued for Year 4 children the following day when they spent the day taking part in practical workshops at The City Museum and Art Gallery in Hanley. The medium which they were working in was clay, and from initially making a sketch of their partner's face, they were then shown how to transfer this to a 3D clay sculpture beginning with a clay tablet and 5 small balls of clay. Their results were astounding and the whole school listened as they were able to tell us exactly how they had undertaken the task.

The day was only half way through, as the afternoon was spent learning about the skills of an archaeologist. They were shown how meticulously an archaeologist has to work on site, making an accurate grid of the area and causing as least disturbance as possible. They were presented with broken pieces such as which may have been excavated, and helped to piece them together again, looking for clues in the pattern, design etc. Finally, they were allocated a large sand tray to "excavate" carefully with a partner, using tools and a steady, careful hand(!) to discover what lay hidden underneath.

What an eventful week for these children!

The weeks fly by. Do put the date of our Christmas Presentation in your diary. You are warmly invited to join us on Wednesday December 13th at 7.30 pm in Church. "A journey ends, a journey begins"

Finally, we welcome the findings of Mrs Heather Peake, our Diocesan Inspector, who conducted the Diocesan part of our recent very successful Ofsted Inspection. The Summary Judgement of her report states;



From our American Correspondent

Dear Friends

I am writing to you today from Oriental, a very small town on Pamlico Sound, North Carolina. We have done a lot of open water boating in the last few legs of our journey, helped by our two American pilots who've taught us about charts and markers and how to use the VHF Radio. The river estuaries going off Albemarle and Pamlico Sounds are often 4 miles wide and you can hardly see the shores. It has been a pretty daunting experience but I have been supported by a poem Barbara Sutliffe gave me before we left.

Pilgrim:

When your ship, long moored in harbour Gives you the illusion of being a house; When your ship begins to put down roots In the stagnant water by the quay; Put out to sea! Save your boat's journeying soul And your own pilgrim soul. Cost what it may.

We are now having a few days in harbour, though not long enough to put down roots, surrounded by shrimp boats. Every so often they fire up their boilers, belch a cloud of black smoke and leave port, returning a day or so later to their factory pier. The shrimp are processed by young Mexican women who come over on short-term contracts to do this menial job and send money back to their families. One of the churches here has notices outside in Spanish as well as English.

We are moored in a slip next to the main road and have become one of the main (forgive the pun) attractions of Oriental. At St Thomas' Episcopalian Church this morning some members of the congregation couldn't wait till coffee.....Peace be with you, what sort of engine have you got? Peace be with you and how does she handle in a beam sea? I feel our Lord would have understood – fishermen won't have changed much over the centuries!

God bless you all and I pray that your pilgrim souls are having as rich and rewarding a journey as ours are.
