

4 This world is *not* enough!

What is there to look forward to after the January sales? If we live as though this world is the only home we'll ever own, then we will concentrate on making it as comfortable as possible and try to build heaven on earth. But disappointment and distress soon lead to disillusionment or despair. Jesus' disciples have a special responsibility. For when Christians dilute the faith and wrap themselves in material comfort, they fail to engage the world with the good news of Jesus Christ and never fulfil the commission to *make disciples*.

Twenty five years ago a prominent Christian leader wrote about the importance of discipleship: 'The vast majority of western Christians are church-members, pew-fillers, hymn-singers, sermon-tasters, Bible-readers, even born-again believers or Spirit-filled charismatics – but not true disciples of Jesus. If we were willing to learn the meaning of real discipleship and actually to become disciples, the church in the West would be transformed, and the resultant impact on society would be staggering. This is no idle claim. It happened in the first century when a tiny handful of timid disciples began in the power of the Spirit, the greatest spiritual revolution the world has ever known' (Watson 1981, *Discipleship*). How are we shaping up in 2006? Have we yet realised that this world is not enough?

While the apostle Paul was in prison he wrote: 'For me, to live is Christ and to die is gain' (Philippians 1v21). Paul and Silas were imprisoned due to the hostility aroused by their preaching, which resulted in the conversion of people like Lydia, an immigrant trader in the prized purple cloth. Paul's words get to the heart of discipleship: it is a life that has Jesus as its central and overriding guide and is assured of entering his presence in heaven. This exposes our restless consumerist attitudes and challenges short-term goals. Paul holds up a far greater purpose in life and keeps in mind a glorious destiny. It is a great anchor for the soul.


During the run-up to Easter we will have a study course on DISCIPLESHIP. The course draws out lessons from Paul's letter to the Philippians. Paul's own attitude to suffering and his behaviour in the face of difficulties has led to it being known as 'the epistle of joy.' He provides both challenge and reassurance. It paints a radical picture of what it means to be a Christian: having a Christ-like humility, being single minded about the future in the light of eternity, being




anxiety free as a result of an active prayer life, and able to do all things by the strength given to us by God.

I hope that you will take part in this special Lent course and grow in your joy as a disciple of Christ.



often walk past a rather sad-looking church building in London. It's on a prominent corner with lots of passers-by. But the stone-work is grimy and the notice-board never changes. I've never seen anybody at all go in or out. Recently, last time I passed it, there's been a large bright new plastic banner above the notice-board, saying: 'Sunday School this Sunday at 10:00am', and, even better, a picture of an excited child.

This year I believe that God is calling us to focus on the children and young people's work of our diocese, and to plan boldly. It continues to concern me that in some parishes I visit the young are so few. This should not be. 'Let the children come unto me,' said the Lord, and England needs its young people to be brought up to know Jesus and his love.

We may be a post-Christian society but equally we are a post-atheist society. Religion of all sorts is everywhere. Church schools have never been more popular. Uniformed organisations like Scouts and Guides, and Boys and Girls Brigades meet a crucial need. Parents long for their children to be brought up with right values and good foundations for life.

Last year, for the first time, the diocese organised a Christian tent at the V Festival - a large rock festival near Telford. And we were amazed at the hundreds of young people who wanted to come in and try different ways of praying and to ask deep questions about faith and about God.

I believe the rather neglected-looking church building that I mentioned at the start will attract young parents and their children with its bright new banner. The question for the elderly congregation inside is: 'Will they come again?'

A young woman told me how on moving to a new area away from this diocese she started prospecting for a church for a christening. She tried five different churches and nobody spoke to her in any of them; nobody helped her with the heavy buggy up and down the steps; crucially there was no crèche in any of these five churches and no sermon that she thought would interest her young husband. So there is work for us all to do if we claim to be the Church for England!

How do we respond when strangers appear? How welcome do we make people feel? When God welcomes us he does it with open arms and accepts us as we are. When we welcome new people do we welcome them as they are or do we expect them first to become like us? Is that screaming child at the back of church a nuisance or a blessing?

As a diocese, we are going to be considering what kind of central support we should be giving to the parishes and their youth work over the next few years. Our schools and specially our church schools will of course play a central part in this. But interesting strategic questions face us.

Do we, for instance, need a youth and children's missioner working across the diocese? Or should we appoint a youth officer and trainer for each Area. Or should we ask gifted people to start youth congregations in different places and use them to inspire and train others?

I'd be grateful for some concerted prayer, perhaps on Ash Wednesday again. It was really good to see so many churches responding to the challenge to organise concerted prayer for growth last Ash Wednesday. For instance, a church in the Staffordshire Moorlands kept their building open all day with a rota of people offering a continuous chain of prayer.

I hope that PCCs everywhere will pray and think about what steps to take to fill our churches with children again, to disciple children in the community through midweek activities and worship and to reconnect the young people of England with Jesus Christ and with his Gospel which first formed our nation.



Better Choices There were 2 workshops for Kweneng District Church Youth and Hope of Glory Church Youth in Gaborone with over 50 youth learning to make choices in life.

Life at the CrossRoads We helped to conduct

three teacher conferences this year. Our partners - The Baptist Mission have taught 12,000 students using CrossRoads, sharing the Gospel in schools. We are also working with the Gaborone District and evangelical Fellowship of Botswana as well as Ministry of Education to provide some answers to stemming the spread of HIV/AIDS and other social ills through biblical principles. Pray for the coming year plans that seem to promise more opportunities and openings.

Pastors Partnerships In another development, we had a partnership conference with pastors of different denominations. It was a joy to hear the resources and strategies God has given to the body of Christ to help fulfil the Great Commission. We all agreed, this came a little too late, but our God is able and there will be opportunities to share.

Prescription for Hope Working with Evangelical Fellowship of Botswana we saw 120 pastors, women and youth leaders attending a four-day conference sponsored by Samaritan Purse. We taught about "Marital Faithfulness" and "Character Development" between us. A pilot project engaging the Church in an effort to give Christian answers to the moral dilemma facing our country today was launched.

Great Commission We have been training three people to be full time Christian workers. This was the first time to run the Great Commission Training Centre for Campus Crusade for Christ in Botswana. Many students were reached with the Gospel and many gave their lives to Jesus Christ.

Partnership Development We have been given a sabbatical for one year to develop more partnerships with Christians and Church groups and will do a ministry with couples. Pray that it will not take too long to find them. We believe the Lord has all it takes missionaries to stay focused on their call.

We have been blessed being part of Christ Church and being so well taken care of by the Church and its members. Our Missionary work in Botswana and beyond would have been more challenging without your involvement. Thank you and may God richly bless you all.

Who are ... Causeway PROSPECTS?

Relieve it or not . . .

D1,200,000 people in Britain have a learning disability - what we used to call mental handicap. That is roughly 2% of the population. They are no longer locked away in institutions, as was the case for 150 years. Instead people with learning As a church we support PROSPECTS in our prayers and in our giving, and a PROSPECTS group meets monthly at Christ Church.

disabilities now live where you and I live. They share our streets and shops, libraries and pubs, buses and trains. Some live with their families; some live with other people who have similar disabilities.

Not in our Churches

They are everywhere - well, almost! By and large they are not in our churches. In spite of their presence in every community, every parish, people with learning disabilities are not to be found in most congregations. Their absence goes unnoticed, a matter of little or no concern to most, and even a relief to some!

If churches continue to adopt a "take it or leave it" attitude to their outreach, this state of affairs will continue. Many of the things Christians take for granted stand like barriers to people with learning disabilities: the ability to read, to reason, to think in abstract conceptual terms, not to mention our Christian jargon.

If a person with learning disability were to drop in to your church next Sunday morning, would they come back a second time? It is not that they cannot benefit from our church services but that, as things are, the benefit may be very limited.

What Causeway PROSPECTS does For more than a decade Causeway PROSPECTS has been helping Christians to bring the Good News of God's love to people previously overlooked by traditional forms of evangelism and ministry. There is now a network of Causeway PROSPECTS groups across Britain. Each month they provide fellowship, friendship and ministry to over 1,500 people with learning disabilities.
