Encourage one another.

We began the year with a covenant renewal service: a time to recall God's pledge of love and rededicate ourselves to follow Christ. But keeping our side of the covenant is put under pressure by the various hurdles in life.

The Bible reminds us that God is faithful. It encourages us to approach God with full assurance that He will provide us with the necessary spiritual resources we need to persevere. Christian faith is not a solitary exercise, but a group activity as members of the church encourage one another. The theme of perseverance is strong in the letter to the Hebrews: 'Let us hold unswervingly to the hope that we profess, for He who promised is faithful' (Heb 10v23). The message is don't give up, but hold fast! When the tide is out on the beach you will find a good illustration of holding fast. Seaweed is secured to the rocky seabed by the aptly named 'hold-fast.' The holdfast makes it possible for the plant to survive the force of waves and sea currents, which would otherwise tear the plant from its place. Christians are to hold fast to Christ – to never loosen our grip of the faith in him, but to faithfully persevere.

Members of God's family are to encourage other believers to continue in the life of faith and witness, despite difficult circumstances or harsh opposition.

Hebrews instructs us: 'and let us consider how we may spur one another on towards love and good deeds. Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another – and all the more as you see the Day approaching' (Heb 10v24-25). Members of Christ's body are to show care to one another: to advise when at a loss as to what to do; to comfort the afflicted; to challenge the complacent; to remind one another of the sure hope that is ours in Christ.

The incentive for all this is 'the Day approaching' i.e. the future return of Christ. His return is certain (as it is based on God's promise) and will be sudden (the timing will take people by surprise). In view of the limited time we have before

His return as our Saviour and Judge, we are to commit ourselves to encouraging one another in the faith. It's a ministry that all of us are to exercise both as a privilege and a blessing.

The Lent course called 'Six Steps to Encouragement' will help us to understand this ministry. I hope that you can take part – for that would be a great encouragement in itself!

Letter from the Bishop of Lichfield

This month we come with the wise men to Bethlehem and, as we worship, the star reminds us that Jesus came to be a light for all the nations. We renew our Epiphany calling to "preach to the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ."

First, a big thank you to everyone who has contributed to the turn-around in our diocesan finances. Eighteen months ago each monthly Bishop's Staff Meeting was dominated by the need to tackle the diocesan debt and to cut stipendiary clergy posts; it was bruising for the Area Teams and depressing for the parishes. But for the last three or four months we have sailed through the item on finance, we have almost reached the end of the planned cuts and have increased the number of ordinands. Of course the pensions' time bomb is still in front of us; if it were not for that we could be planning an increase in clergy. My prayer is still that we will be able to stabilize the numbers in 2007-8 and start a modest increase in 2008-9.

Second, thank you to all who contributed to the latest version of *Going for Growth*, which was unanimously endorsed at the last Diocesan Synod. It is of course more a vision document than a detailed strategy simply so that it can be up to each parish or cluster to wait upon God for those creative ideas that will enable us to share the unsearchable riches of Christ with our neighbours.

Our aim at all times is to know more of the riches of the love of God and to celebrate his love at work in our communities. From this we hope:

- to help more adults become disciples of Jesus Christ
- to disciple more children and young people
- to enable churches to have greater impact in their communities.

How that happens will look different in urban and rural parishes, rich and poor – to say nothing of our particular traditions. But as we spend time together with God he will start to make plain to us what action we can take so that we can be good news people and so that our Mission Action Plans can be properly rooted.

Letter from the Bishop of Lichfield (cont)

Three special opportunities which are worth considering this year are:

- 1) The 200th anniversary of the **Abolition of the Slave Trade**. We can be proud of the decisive part that Christians played in the campaign to abolish slavery and do something together to stop the new people-trafficking round the globe. We can invite people to consider God's action in the rescue of his people from slavery in Egypt through the blood of the lamb and his action to rescue us all from the deeper slavery of sin and death through the cross. The Archbishops of Canterbury and York are inviting us all to go on a march to mark the occasion.
- 2) The 200th anniversary of the founding of the **Primitive Methodists at Mow Cop**. We can celebrate with our ecumenical partners this special outpouring of God's love which particularly touched the workers of Stoke and we can pray for God to revive us in our generation.
- 3) The **Back to Church Sunday** national campaign. I thought this a gimmick when I first heard of it, but experience all over the country (see the report in the current *Spotlight*) seems to indicate that there are lots of people out there just wanting a proper invitation and a proper welcome to a service where the love of God is offered in a way they can grasp, for them to start coming back to church regularly.

Once again I ask churches to set aside time on Ash Wednesday to pray about your own renewal and that of the church, so that we may all grow in grace together, by the leading of the Spirit, "that through the Church the manifold wisdom of God might now be made known" (Eph 3)

Imagine it was possible to travel anywhere in the world for one day! Supposing it was, let me take you with me to where I live, in the mountains of south Asia, and give you a whirlwind tour.

Our world is bordered by towering mountain peaks in every direction. You could say that we live in a mountain fastness - hemmed in by rock. But don't imagine that it feels shut in - all you need to do is to look up from the roof to see the ridges marching away to the sky and in the far distance, 70 miles away, the snowy pyramid which is the peak of one of the world's highest mountains, now visible, now invisible, sometimes glowing pink from the sunset, sometimes with wisps of white cloud trailing from the summit.

Back down to earth from these lofty heights - let me tell you something about everyday life. I live above a hospitable family from one of the local valleys who are always ready to make me welcome in their kitchen near the wood burning stove with a cup of chai. The garden is stocked with rows of vegetables, splashes of flowering colour in the summer, and a goat which helpfully eats all leftovers.

Early each morning I let myself out of the gate and down the track. School is a ten minute walk away, across the main road - on the way I am joined by schoolgirls in their green and white check uniforms. The bell rings and it's time to stand in the dusty yard and sing the national anthem along to a crackly rendition by a military band (that's on the days when the electricity is working).

Into class, I greet my class of 35 or so teenage girls and work begins for the day. They are very polite - "How are you ma'am?" We set to work - games, stories, essays, drama, vocab - there's plenty to do with the girls' final exams approaching. I see all of my four classes every day. The girls function with varying degrees of ease in English, for many of them it's a third or fourth language.

A tea break with the teachers and home again, this time with the cattle for company, and off to my language lesson and the rest of the day - more English lessons, prep for tomorrow. (continued on next page)

In the winter season, the sun dips behind the mountain at about 2pm, and it's light fades at about 5. The city folds up for the evening, shop fronts are closed and the cows find their way home. Downstairs, the children are busy in their textbooks and going to night school.

Back to the roof again. The snowy peaks start to glow in the moonlight and tower down as if standing guard over the valley. A galaxy of stars appears in the folds of the night sky.

The stars and the mountain peaks watch over our world as we sleep. Welcome to one day in our world. I hope your enjoyed the trip!

Dear Friends

We arrived in Savannah, Georgia, just in time to celebrate Christmas. On Christmas Eve we went to Midnight Mass in Christ Church (yes!), where we were given a candle on arrival. At the start of the service the church was darkened, then choristers moved down the aisles with tapers from which we all lit our small ones and passed the flame along the pews like the spreading of the Word. When we were all alight we sang *Oh little town of Bethlehem*. "Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light!" This memory will warm my heart for ever.

We were invited to spend Christmas Day with friends of a Stone Master Marathoner. Mac had been part of the peacekeeping forces in Bosnia where he had met Colonel Frank Williams III, and we were invited to Frank Williams Junior's for the Christmas meal. Our host was 84 and had fought for us all in World War II. It was a typical Southern-style occasion, a buffet meal with three generations of the family plus local hangers-on and foreign boaters.

Both Frank Junior and Frank III have their own jetties on the waterway and we were able to break our journey at their homes. This was an answer to prayer as there are long stretches of the Intracoastal Waterway in Georgia without marinas and we are travelling when the days are short. I had been really worried about how we were to handle this stretch of the trip, but as in so many cases during this adventure, when I put it in the Lord's hands he solved the problem for me.

We have travelled through most of Georgia now and just have Florida to traverse before coming home. The coastline of Georgia is only about 100 miles as the crow flies, but the Intracoastal meanders along rivers and creeks, crossing half a dozen sounds a mile or more in width. We cruise through marsh grass of a bright yellow, on a silvery blue satin water. Terry wrote the following passage about North Carolina but it applies even more to Georgia.

"The Good Lord started with light, and then he divided the earth from the waters, and then he said Let the earth bring forth grass, and in North Carolina He stopped right there, and moved on somewhere else to do all the trees and stuff, and He forgot to come back to the Intracoastal Waterway.

First the channel, waves flashing and spitting, then yellow grass for ever, standing in water, the wind stroking it, sometimes a creek running away. Seas, seas of grass. Far off, higher ground before the ocean, then a scrubbed sky and an attenuated cloud five miles long like the sketch of the first cloud ever. Light, and more light, and blue and yellow and white and a touch of dark in the distance, and air, the first air, a wind that none has breathed. So it must have been at the dawn of the earliest light.

To set off such purity, such restraint, the Good Lord would have introduced a pelican, floating above the waves, relaxed, but no, He would have the pelican tumbling through the air just like that one – a clownish comma in the poetry of dawn, here on the North Carolina sea of grass."

We think of you all from the Georgia sea of grass. God bless you and keep you and make the light of his countenance shine upon you.

The church is made up of adults and children who want to know more about the living God, who has supremely revealed Himself in Jesus Christ and continues to speak to us through His Spirit-inspired word, the Holy Bible (which can be read online at www.biblegateway.com and we recommend a modern translation e.g. the New International Version or English Standard Version).

We are a Christian church, because at the heart of what we believe is the fact that to know God personally we must put our trust in Jesus' death for our forgiveness so that we can be reconciled to God. We are part of the Anglican church, the basis of its Trinitarian belief is summarised in the Book of Common Prayer with its 39 articles, though we unite in Christ irrespective of denomination. We are an Evangelical church, as we see that the Bible is God's word for us and so is to inspire all that we do. This church was established with the help of the renowned Charles Simeon.

Our church meetings help us to grow in our understanding of what the Bible tells us about God, and this is something that we encourage others to investigate especially through our *Christianity Explored* course (see details on the national website www.christianityexplored.com). If you would like details of when the next local course is starting then please contact the church office.

We have children's and youth activities running during the Sunday meetings and also during the week, such as our Tuesday evening youth club. Adults may be further involved through small groups which meet for Bible study and prayer, a midweek communion service and a monthly prayer meeting.

Our community involvement includes links with the local schools: Christ Church First, Oulton First, Christ Church Middle and Alleyne's High.

We also have links with the Church in India, The Philippines, Croatia, Botswana and Pakistan.

Missionary Prayer Requests

TEARFUND

Prayer requests in the weekly World Watch Prayer Link include the following:

- Thu 1st There have been violent clashes between police and activists during recent transport blockades in **Bangladesh**, ahead of pending elections. Staff working for Tearfund partner Koinonia, ask for our prayers as they have been unable to travel to their offices. Pray for peace and stability and that, after the elections, all parties will work together for the benefit of the country. Pray also for a rise in temperature in the north of the country where 110+ people have died recently in unusually cold weather
- Fri 2nd Pray for the people of Somalia whose problems have been increased by the recent US invasion. The country is also recovering from severe flooding. (1 million people have been made homeless.) Pray for peace so that aid agencies can reach those in need. Pray that both sides involved in the conflict can negotiate the best way to resolve the situation for the people of Somalia.
- Sat 3rd There is concern for food supplies in Southern **Sudan.** As people move back into the area, it is predicted that half a million people will be short of food. Please pray that this situation can be prevented and that all the people of Sudan will have enough food. Pray also for a peaceful solution to the conflict and for the safety of Tearfund partners working there.
- Sun 4th As living standards decline in **Zimbabwe**, (by 150% in ten years),

 Tearfund is asking us to pray that the EU will vote to renew its sanctions at this month's meeting The sanctions freeze assets held in the EU by Mugabe and his associates and prevent them from travelling to the EU. Pray that this campaigne will encourage the people of Zimbabwe, as they realise that they are not forgotten by the rest of the world.
- Mon 5th Fighting in the east of the **Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC)** is still continuing despite the peace deal. Pray for real peace in DRC and that rebel groups will stop operating. Give thanks that democratic elections have been held for the first time in 40 years. Pray for the new government trying to govern a vast, diverse and war-torn country. Pray for Tearfund partners and relief teams bringing help to people returning home to eastern DRC
