Wise Words...

No vacancies

The scene is familiar. The significance may by-pass us. Let me sketch out the scene briefly. The population is swollen well beyond the usual headcount. The bustling crowds are proving to be a nuisance, while individuals feel harassed. The traders are out in force to catch the passing customers and not a few comments are made about how commercialism appears to have gained the upper hand.

The place is a small town but with an important history: Bethlehem. It was little more than an outpost, or satellite town, to the much bigger capital city of Jerusalem - about 7 miles away travelling north west. The population had swollen as a result of the census of the Roman world instigated by Caesar Augustus. This required people to return to their own town to register. Here a baby boy was born with a common name of Jesus, but a unique role as 'the Christ.' There were few places to stay in the overcrowded town. Joseph and Mary found it hard to find a place at an inn. The familiar sign 'no vacancies' that appears in B&B's today may well have had an equivalent in their day.

The interesting twist in the tale is the fact that later on in life Jesus again found it hard to find hospitality. He was not readily recognised as 'the Christ' and in fact his own people showed little enthusiasm to receive him. The sign 'no vacancies' was written on the hearts and minds of many people of his day. But a great promise still stands: 'Yet to all who received him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God' (John 1v12). What a wonderful reality! Simply having an open heart and mind to Jesus, receiving him as we would a guest, is what is required of us in order to become a child of God! What is the sign hanging outside your house and on your heart? Is it the message 'Santa stop here,' or 'Jesus come and live here'?

I'd love to see you during this special season at our services and would be delighted to hear that you have made room for Jesus, the Word made flesh.

Who are those missionaries?!

This month our mission contact is Rebecca Williams, the daughter of our former Vicar, John Williams. Rebecca spent her teenage years in the Stone area and went to Alleynes High School. She should have flown out to Pakistan for the first time the very day the first Gulf war broke out! After a delay, she finally went to Lahore on a short-term placement with CMS as a hostel warden. Following university, teacher training, and experience as a music teacher in Nottingham, she went to Redcliffe Bible College, Gloucester. During this time she went on a second placement to Pakistan for two months. Following these two visits, Rebecca discerned God's call to work in Pakistan long-term and applied to Interserve. Earlier in 2004, she went to Pakistan to visit various places where she might work. It was decided that, after six months Urdu language study in Lahore, she should work in the north of the country, teaching English as a second language. She flew out to Pakistan for a three year term in October 2004. Rebecca's article below gives us some idea what her day-to-day life is like as a language student.'

Lahore, and language learning

Salaams from Lahore! So here I am in the middle of a hustling bustling city of 7 million people - today it is at the height of busyness - it is the day before the Eid holiday and it's like Christmas Eve here. Everyone is rushing around buying last minute presents and supplies for next week.

My days, however, are usually quiet, at the moment I am busy trying to learn Urdu. I live and study and have my lessons in a family house with a garden enclosed by high walls. I almost feel as if I am observing purdah at the moment because so much of what I do is at the house. I have two teachers, who both travel here every day. A lot of what we do consists of simple role plays (Sir, I am going to the station. How much is that? It's 35 rupees. That's very expensive, I will give you 30. OK, let's go...etc etc.

I have got to the part in the book where a new writing system takes over and the words are no longer given in Roman script. This has slowed me down a bit. The teacher reads first. "Now you please read", so I try, stumbling over the dots and dashes.

The house where I live is a hive of hospitality - it is home to an extended family

and two language students - people, friends, guests are constantly dropping in and out and there is always something spicy cooking on the stove. Food is very significant in this culture and my landlady explained that she always has something prepared to offer guests who arrive unexpectedly - as they often do! Living with a local family gives me the opportunity to make contact with many people, and to find out first hand about the culture I'm living in. I have even learned something about cricket!

My greatest need in language learning is for practice. Sometimes I spend time talking to the cook, and watching her prepare food. She explains all the ingredients and processes to me. I am amazed at how labour intensive everything is - food just doesn't come pre-packaged and ready to eat, and it takes hours to prepare.

I am finding that language learning is also labour intensive, at times fun, at times frustrating. I am trying to get over the initial hurdles of communicating at a basic level in a new language, often in position where I don't understand what is being said. Sometimes things click, and when that happens it's good. So whether it's fun or frustrating, for now, this is the place to be. Lahore is once more starting to feel like home.


