#### 4 Wise Words...

#### The Greatest Achievement

July will be an amazing month. The decision by G8 finance ministers to write-off more than £22.2 billion of African debts owes much to the campaigns that have dominated public awareness. An otherwise dull January saw the actress Dawn French (a.k.a. the Vicar of Dibley) process with 600 women clergy to 10 Downing Street to present a petition on the topic. Many other attempts raised the profile of this issue, building on years of protest.

But other things in life are more important to some, so it would seem. On the radio an interesting comment was reported concerning the G8 summit: 'Bob Geldof's greatest achievement was the reconciliation of the band Pink Floyd after 25 years of separation.' This comment has a greater importance than you'd think for both performers and fans, for which a performance on 2<sup>nd</sup> July is an exciting prospect. One quote from the band's website illustrates what a long running saga this has been: 'Any squabbles Roger [Waters] and the band have had in the past are so petty in this context, and if re-forming for this concert will help focus attention then it's got to be worthwhile' (David Gilmour, Live8 quote from the band's website). It's clear that we need something greater than ourselves to make differences smaller and bring about reconciliation, even if only temporary in this case.

A more significant event, by far, is the cause for great celebration on 10<sup>th</sup> July. We will commemorate the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the cessation of the War on a date that looks back to the end of war in Europe (VE Day) and forward to the anniversary of its end in Japan (VJ Day). Once again a greater event took individuals out of themselves so that differences were put to one side and a common cause was won. What joy it must have been to hear the news and see peace established. How indebted we are to those who laid down their lives to secure peace and reconciliation between nations.

Reconciliation is also the key feature of Christian faith – not primarily the reconciliation of people, or even of nations, but of humanity with God. What Jesus did when he died on the cross – taking the punishment for our wrongdoing and winning God's forgiveness for us – was to reconcile us to our loving heavenly Father and establish a relationship that will last for eternity: 'But now he has reconciled you by Christ's physical body through death to present you holy in his sight, without blemish and free



from accusation – if you continue in your faith, established and firm, not moved from the hope held out in the gospel' (Col 1v22-23). The unthinkable has been achieved. The Son of God paid the immeasurable cost for us to be at peace with God and free to serve His purposes.

#### Christ Church First School News

Amidst unseasonally cool June weather, an excited Year 4 boarded a Coach bound for Lichfield Cathedral. They had done much preparation in class prior to their keenly anticipated "Open Door" visit and now it was here. "Open Door" takes place annually in June, when Lichfield Cathedral literally opens its doors, welcoming groups of children from schools all over the county. The children then, led by many enthusiastic, multitalented volunteers, take part in workshops where they can experience such crafts as Cathedral Art, seed mosaic, tapestry and skills such as audio-magazine production, drama, quilling, calligraphy and many more. The day begins and ends with a shared time of Worship. Our children returned, fired with interest and enthusiasm and recounted their visit to the whole school during Worship. Quotes which summed up their feelings were "We were stunned by the size of the Cathedral"--- "We enjoyed it so much that we wanted to carry on". It was definitely a day which those children will remember for a long time

We are thrilled this month to receive news that we have been awarded "Artsmark Status". This is an award which is given to schools who can demonstrate a sustained commitment over a long period of time to Art in all its forms, along with Music, Dance and Drama. At Christ Church First School, we recognize the importance of The Arts in the development of the whole child and we are delighted that the work of a committed Staff Team with enthusiastic children has been recognized in this way. Events which we are looking forward to are the annual Teddy Bears' Picnic where Year 1 visit Birches Valley with their teddies (staff bring theirs too!) to share a picnic. This is a fun way of developing an awareness of important environmental issues with young children.

Whilst clutching my throat.


Lord please be my eyes,

### The Joscelynes' Mission to India

We are now making our final preparations to go to work in Hebron School in India. For those of you who don't know who we are, I'm Dominic, my wife is Clare and our daughter is Erica of 18 months. We have had a heart for mission for a while now, attending Bible College at Regents Theological College in order to prepare and now feel we are being obedient to God's will for us. Jesus' last command to his disciples resonates with us, "and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."



Our world is in a whirl and our flight date, the 26<sup>th</sup> July, is approaching with quickening speed. We have a house and garden to prepare for renting, visas to sort, vaccinations to coordinate, medicals for the school and Interserve, and other admin to do with finances etc. Will it get done? Probably not in our strength but with God's help the important bits will.

Many of you have been asking us what our families think about us going. They will find the separation difficult especially grandparents who will be separated from Erica. They are however extremely supportive and Clare's mother is already planning a trip—good for her we know it is not her choice of holiday destination.

If you get round to reading this before 17<sup>th</sup> July please join us at the morning service where we will be giving thanks for our daughter Erica and in the same service Christ Church will commission us for our work in India with prayer. Also at this service are the Humphreys who work at the school and are

supported by Christ church. They will be talking about their experience at Hebron.

#### What will we be doing?

Clare will work as a Technology teacher. This will be a challenge as this is her second subject. Prayer will be needed here. The teaching of mathematics has been mentioned. Some Art teaching, which is Clare's primary subject, is also on the cards. We believe that the best way to serve is to be flexible and work with the school in the areas where they have gaps.

I will initially be Erica's primary carer and am looking forward to spending quality time with her. I will also be a dorm parent for one day a week looking after a dorm of boys. Taking on a technical role with the computer network will fit in there somewhere. Exactly what this may in tale is not yet clear but the role of computers is expanding and I am hoping to be involved with the development of on-line learning at the school. I have also been thinking of ways in which my programming skills in web development may be put to communicating information to distant parents. I am sure will certainly be involved with technician work with the machines on site.

#### Are we going with a missionary organisation?

At the time of writing we are applying to the On Track Programme with Interserve. This will cover part or all of our three year contract at Hebron. We must get down to completing the paperwork associated with this. After the initial three years we will have decisions to make as to where we will be serving and if this is still on the mission field as planned we will be making application to be full Interserve partners or partners with another missionary organisation.

The PCC met on Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> May 2005 and the following matters were reported on, discussed and/or decided:

- Plans for the visit of the Boaters' Christian Fellowship from the evening of Monday 19<sup>th</sup> September to the morning of Thursday 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2005 are coming along well, and include visits to schools, a children's picnic, a Men's Fellowship Breakfast, a special evening event on Tuesday, and a number of other events. Look out for more details nearer the time.
- The young man offered the post of Youth Worker here declined the post in favour of a position elsewhere. However, we continue to look for the person of God's choice to work with us amongst our young people.
- As a church, we agreed to support Clare & Dominic Joscelyne and their 18month-old daughter, Erica, both financially and in our prayers, as they go out to work in Hebron School, South India, in July for at least three years.
- We are pleased that The Rock Drop-in on Friday evenings is attracting 40+ young people and may attract more in future weeks. The numbers coming mean that we are now needing to consider recruiting more leaders and how many our facilities can safely accommodate.
- In groups, the PCC undertook an exercise analysing the impact of the various activities of our church on the various age-groups. This is background work in preparation for the formulation of our Mission Action Plan.
- The church has decided to apply to become a FAIRTRADE Church. This means that we agree to use FAIRTRADE tea and coffee for all meetings for which the church has responsibility, to move forward on using other FAIRTRADE products whenever possible, and to promote FAIRTRADE during FAIRTRADE Fortnight in March each year.

The next PCC meeting takes place on Wednesday 20th July 2005


