

Work, rest and pray

I brought back a souvenir from holiday last year, which cost nothing but has been invaluable. A family were on the beach near to us. The parents made a brief visit to paddle in the sea. Their two young boys happily played on the beach during a bright but cool afternoon in very a poor summer. But something wasn't quite right. The father was agitated: "Next year we're going abroad! The weather in this country is unreliable. We'd get much better value if we went to the Mediterranean – the boys would simply love doing water sports and riding around on the Banana Boat".

I personally thought that the two boys, aged about 5 and 3 years old, would struggle to enjoy water skiing. In fact, they were happy as sand boys milling around on the beach. No doubt, from the children's point of view, time spent with dad and mum was what made the holiday special. The location was far less important. That was my souvenir.

Earlier in the year The Relationships Foundation published the findings from a study of working time and family well being. It found that the UK has one of the highest proportions of men working long hours of all EU countries. This is associated with poor physical and mental health outcomes, high levels of stress and tensions over work-life conflict. Rising stress is estimated to cost employers £3.76 billion per year. But the more worrying cost is that around 30% of employed people report that their job prevents them spending enough time with their partner/family, the third highest in Europe. Parents do not appear to make up for time lost by working atypical hours (*e.g.* the weekend) by spending more time with children on another day or at other times. These findings clearly point to the need for time off together and the researchers recommend that the country legislate to provide worker with one weekend day off.

The command to keep the Sabbath day holy, by stopping all usual activity to engage in worship and rest, brings us great blessings and would address these issues of concern uncovered by the research.



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The Psalmist testifies that God's commands are good: '*How sweet are your words to my taste, sweeter than honey to my mouth!*... *Righteous are you, O LORD, and your laws are right. The statutes you have laid down are righteous; they are fully trustworthy*' (Psalm 119 v103, 137-138).

So, I hope that you enjoy any summer holidays that you have planned, but I hope most of all that you make time to spend with God. Time together is precious, especially for children and parents, but time for worshipping the LORD is vital! *Paul Kingman*

You will find sun worshippers all over the world. Some are only looking for bronzed skin, others think some sun-god can make their crops grow. In an ancient world tempted to worship things like the moon, sun and stars the book of Genesis shows that these are created objects, not divine beings. However – the sun is a fantastic preacher, and like all good preachers the subject of every sermon is Jesus Christ.

Psalm 19 begins by marvelling at the way "the heavens declare the glory of God" and King David gives us an example (verses 4-6):

In the heavens God has pitched a tent for the sun, which is like a bridegroom coming forth from his pavilion, like a champion rejoicing to run his course. It rises at one end of the heavens and makes its circuit to the other; nothing is hidden from its heat.

The sun is like a mighty bridegroom emerging from his pavilion in shining armour, sword at side, ready to marry his bride. In this way the sun proclaims Jesus, the true Bridegroom, victorious in battle over sin and death and now awaiting the glorious wedding feast when he is united to his bride, the Church. That's what we should think about whenever we see a sunrise and enjoy the warmth of the sun on our face! And just as nothing is hidden from the heat of the sun, so nothing is hidden from the love and life-giving mercy of our Saviour.

A few weeks ago I rediscovered my love of blues music. The music is great, feeling blue is not, yet feeling the sun on our face can often lift our spirits. The same is true of Jesus: he is the Sun of Righteousness who rises with healing in his rays (Malachi 4:2).

So go outside and enjoy the sun. Give thanks to God for his wonderful creation. Then turn your heart and mind to Jesus and bask in his goodness. A sun tan will fade, but the Lord's love endures forever!

⁷ Occasional church attendees are not hypocrites

Thirty-eight million people go each year to a Church of England funeral service, according to the statisticians. Millions more come to weddings and baptisms. Research by the Church of England 'Marriage Project', which is coming to our diocese as soon as possible, shows that the majority of English people want God to bless them and their families. The metropolitan pundits in the broad sheets who constantly sneer at organized religion are out of touch with the deep spiritual desires of most people in our nation.

But the Church has a problem too. When people come to us with their spiritual needs and desires we often don't know what to do with them and sometimes send them away with a flea in their ear. We are quite good at making them feel hypocritical if they want a church wedding or a christening; almost always they want to be serious in making their promises but we don't quite hear them.

They don't know how to put their spiritual experiences into our Christian language and so we dismiss their awkward or embarrassed attempts to say what they want. And then weddings are inconvenient because they disrupt our cricket and Saturday sermon preparation!

All the evidence shows that most people are far from hostile to the church; they are just not in a position to respond to an "all or nothing" commitment straight away. Adults who become Christians almost always do it in stages. They need to know Christians they can trust who will accompany them on a journey of faith, marked by several steps of commitment on the way. The man who said, "I'm a regular churchgoer, vicar, I come each Christmas," was not just being flip. Underneath the joke was a serious desire to have God in his life.

Most parishes work hard at building up a fringe of people who are "not yet Christians." The parents and toddlers club, the after-school club, the hospitality events, the open days - all these work well in many places. But there are still thousands of children wanting to join uniformed organisations attached to our churches but can't because of lack of leaders.

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A vicar from another diocese said to me recently that mission for him was getting the Sunday morning Eucharist right. I know what he means. Wesley said from his own experience that the Holy Communion was a converting ordinance. But in practice, whatever our style or tradition of Sunday service, we have turned in ourselves, concentrated on the detail, and made our "fringe" much smaller because our main services are less accessible.

When Jesus gave the Sermon on the Mount he made sure that the crowds were in earshot as well as the committed disciples. The demise of matins has left a gap where the civic guests or the seeker after truth or the six times a year person used to feel welcome. If we are going to go on calling ourselves "parish churches" we have a duty to wrestle creatively with this gap we have created and find a way of filling it.

The parish communion movement was not meant to make us into an exclusive sect but in some places that is the unintended consequence. It need not be so.

Thousands of anecdotes tell us that undemanding friendship can help people see that the spiritual longings which they don't know how to verbalize can be met in Jesus Christ. Do you have a welcome pewleaflet for mourners at funerals?

'Since coming to Sudan, I have realised that, although the actual war is over, there is still a long way to go before peace reigns in people's hearts, especially children.

'While on a peace building and trauma healing course, I met with a couple of women to explore the possibility of running trauma counselling sessions with local children.

'A week later, we began visiting children in a local orphanage. During the session we used a book which contains stories designed to help children feel more comfortable talking about their own experiences. The stories centre on a brother and sister living in an unspecific location, who suddenly have to flee their home. Forced to live as refugees, they get separated from each other, watch loved ones die and endure fear, loneliness and hunger. In other words, these stories reflected real life for many of the children we were counselling.

'One of the sessions was about taking our pain to Jesus, and asking him to come and heal us. The children were asked to draw or write either some wrongdoing they wanted to confess, or horrors they had seen. Then one of the leaders picked up a wooden cross, and the children formed a line and followed her outside. We took the papers, laid them at the foot of the cross and burned them.

'While the words and images of pain dissolved in the flames, we held hands and sang "cast your burdens onto Jesus" slowly and quietly. It was an overwhelming sight.'

Meals with Jesus

In the Tuesday housegroup, we have been studying "Meals with Jesus" in Luke's gospel. Focus Radio produced the studies, and they can be found on the internet. The meals took place in Levi's home, Simon's home, Mary and Martha's home, in the homes of two pharisees, Zacchaeus' home, at the Last Supper and on the road to Emmaus. The feeding of the 5000 isn't included in the studies, though it definitely relates to a meal.

Some of the meals became very fraught as Jesus spoke his mind to the pharisees. We don't learn much from Luke about what was eaten. What we do learn about is the joy that people experienced as they allowed Jesus not only into their homes, but also into their lives (see how Levi and Zacchaeus changed). There were also challenges from Jesus, especially to Peter and to the pharisees.

Allowing Jesus into our homes is not an easy thing, but the result can be life-changing. Dave Bell

Whether you are new to the Stone area or have been living here for some time you are welcome to come to this church. The church is made up of adults and children who want to know more about the living God, who has supremely revealed Himself in Jesus Christ and continues to speak to us through His Spirit-inspired word, the Holy Bible (which can be read online at <u>www.biblegateway.com</u> and we recommend a modern translation e.g. the New International Version or English Standard Version).

We are a Christian church, because at the heart of what we believe is the fact that to know God personally we must put our trust in Jesus' death for our forgiveness so that we can be reconciled to God. We are part of the Anglican church, the basis of its Trinitarian belief is summarised in the Book of Common Prayer with its 39 articles, though we unite in Christ irrespective of denomination.
