A testing time

Lent should not be a joyless experience! The six-weeks run up to Easter is traditionally a time of repentance in the Christian church. It is often used as a special season in which to dig deeper into the Bible's teaching as we ask the Lord Jesus to search our hearts and purify our lives. Such testing and training leads to living a more Christ-like life: a life that brings Jesus honour and helps us to discover joy filled life.

Too often Lent is narrowed down to overcoming gluttony: cutting out chocolate or cakes for a few weeks. This can be counter-productive if it sends us on a guilt trip or leads to growing pride over how well we are doing. It could also be smoke screen to avoid the bigger issues of examining our sinful desires or motivations. Hiding our sins will not lead to becoming more like Christ.

One sinful motive to face up to is 'greed, which is idolatry' (Colossians 3v5). It's surprisingly easy to slip from just aiming to meet our needs into pandering to greed. Greed may be for material things, but it can also be a greed for power or fame. Greed longs for more, but fails to be satisfied and so it is sucked in by the advert that says 'take the waiting out of wanting.' Yet it is like a cancer to the soul. This is why the apostle Paul commands us in his letter to the Colossians to set our minds on heavenly things and to put our earthly nature to death. Also, Jesus' parable of the rich fool teaches how futile it is to store up treasure on earth, which we leave to others when we die. Prudence for this life is encouraged, but the wise person lays up treasure in heaven, investing for eternity.

The following words are searching: 'If anyone has material possessions and sees his brother in need but has no pity on him, how can the love of God be in

him?' (I John 3v17). If we have genuinely received the grace of God then we will reflect this in a change of outlook towards the needs of others. Jesus longs to set us from greed in order to learn contentment, the importance of a simple lifestyle and the value of self-giving. Such a lifestyle leads to lasting joy.

No one likes having their flaws exposed. It is uncomfortable having our faults pointed out. But if repentance is the path to *joy* (see January article) then it must be for our good. The Scriptures are given to rebuke us and correct us, as well as teach us and train us in righteousness (2 Timothy 3:16). As a new series I want to examine a number of Bible verses that we don't believe. By "we" I mean the Church generally in the West. By "don't believe" I mean – we know such-and-such a verse is in the Bible, and we're not so arrogant as to say "I don't think God inspired that bit" – but we don't put it into practice. Parts of the Bible we do not obey are parts of the Bible we do not *really* believe.

Often these parts of the Bible are those passages that speak about how we should live now. As one church leader put it:

Presenting the teaching of Jesus – especially when it comes to violence, sex and money – always creates a strong reaction. Many people with a "church" background are happy to see Jesus as eternal fire insurance but have never really taken Him seriously as the Lord and Master of life right now. We have been amazed at how few people really believe that Jesus is right about violence, sex and money.

Let me put you on the spot: how would you summarise Jesus' teaching in these areas? Do you agree with Jesus, or are the words of God the Son only one opinion among many?

If you have suggestions as to which verses I should cover, let me know. I have my blind spots, so there will be plenty of areas of my life that haven't truly been exposed to the life-giving light of Christ.

In my caving days, after a long trip underground the re-emergence into daylight would sometimes make our eyes water. The light was a shock after several hours in gloom. But this wasn't reason enough to live in a pothole! God's Word is a lamp to our feet and light to our path. May it shine with ever increasing brightness in your life.

Tim Vasby-Burnie tim@vasbyburnie.net Children are continually trying to negotiate with their parents the boundaries that have been set out for them of what they can and cannot do. Some times these negotiations are very healthy and happen simply because the child has a different personality, with different tastes and interests. In this case it is good to allow them to pursue different sports, hobbies and interests even if it is not our personal preference or what we would like them to do. Other negotiations are motivated by a young persons ignorance and self-centeredness and the things that they want are dangerous and harmful not only to themselves but to others around them. These requests are far more complicated because of the serious consequences that will follow if we allow our children to pursue them.

The difficult job for the parent is to discern what areas of life our children are free to choose for themselves and what areas of life are so essential, so important that they are non-negotiable. Children must abide by these nonnegotiables, even, especially, if it is against their will. For example, when your child decides that they do not like eating fruit and vegetables you force them to because it is essential that your child eat their greens (or whatever colour they are) so that they grow to have strong and healthy bodies. If your young one decided that they did not want to go to school you would make them go because without an education they will find it very difficult to communicate and get by in society. Children learn very quickly what the non-negotiables are in their families and although they might try and push the boundaries from time to time, on the whole they learn to respect these practises and even grow to appreciate and even value these important things for themselves.

Parents, your children have been looking to you since the day they were born to observe and understand for themselves what life is all about. Your nonnegotiables, right or wrong, are the starting point and foundation your children are building their life upon. They trust you to make the big decisions for them. If you make your children do something, they know it must be important.

Jesus once said that He is the way you should live, He is the truth you must know, He is the life you must receive. Jesus even said that we can only get to the City of God and meet our Heavenly Father if we first meet with Him. If this is true then this makes Jesus the great non-negotiable for every family in every walk of life. For the sake of your family's freedom and happiness in this life and an eternal home in the life to come, make following Jesus daily the great non-negotiable for as long as your children live under your roof.

Epiphany Message 2009

What is it that marks out the people of God and makes us different?

The Old Testament answer is that it is God's active presence with us. So Moses says to God: "Is it not in thy going with us that we are distinct, I and thy people, from all other peoples on the face of the earth?" The New Testament answer is really the same. Jesus says, "Lo I am with you always to the close of the age." YHWH has become Immanuel—God with us.

Outwardly Christians are pretty much the same as everyone else, but inwardly we have the active presence of God. "The kingdom," says Jesus, "is not over here or over there because, look! The kingdom of God is in the midst of you."

So all we do as Christians comes from the inner nourishment of God's active and invisible presence. And that means that it's a first duty of every church to nourish itself in its invisible life and to teach others to pray.

The apostles knew that, which is why the letters in the New Testament are as much prayers as they are teaching. "I do not cease to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers," says, for instance, the letter to the Ephesians. It's a first duty of clergy and lay leaders to give thanks for the people in their congregations, to pray for them, and to teach them about the inner life.

"More things are wrought by prayer than this world dreams of," wrote Tennyson and churches that major on prayer know he was right.

I remember a fashionable theologian of the 1970s saying that he felt sorry when he went into the study of a parish priest and saw the little line of booklets on prayer and spirituality on his shelf. He felt that the reason the vicar had to keep on buying these books was the same reason other people keep on buying on dieting: they don't actually work!

But the fashionable theologian was wrong. I'm glad when I see a little line of books on prayer on someone's shelf because I know how good books on prayer can nourish one's inner life and build the "transforming friendship" which is our invisible relationship with the Lord.

It's no coincidence that healthy churches seem to be the ones in which prayer is being nourished: vigils, half-nights of prayer and fasting, times of adoration, missionary prayer meetings and so on.

I have asked the advice of our director of parish mission, our spirituality, worship and renewal groups and then I've requested the faithful team who put together our monthly Prayer Diary to make it available in A5 format so that we can slip it into our Bibles and use it in our daily praying.

I have also asked for a simple 'rule of life' card to be made available so that each year we can set simple and practical patterns for our walk with Christ. I hope that both the new format for the Prayer Diary and the rule of life guide will be ready by Easter. *(continued on next page)*

So my invitation to the diocese this New Year is to have a look at the prayer life of your parish or chaplaincy. Is all the visible activity, all the evangelism, all the giving out to the community, properly sustained by the invisible life below? Miracles still happen where people pray fervently and I am often conscious of being borne along by the prayers of churches and individuals and I am very grateful for it.

For the last few years I have asked parishes to set aside Ash Wednesday or another suitable day as a day for concerted prayer and fasting for the diocese. This year I invite you to do the same. We give thanks that we are able to have two extra curates again this year and that we were able to strengthen our reserves substantially just before the credit crunch. The policy of the last five years has really worked and put us in a good position

But there is much to pray for. As the psalmist says: "May the Lord answer you, may he grant you your heart's desire, may he fulfil all your plans."

May we be marked by knowing Christ's active presence in us and among us in 2009. Jonathan Gledhill, Bishop of Lichfield

The PCC met on Wednesday 19 November 2008 and the following matters were reported on, discussed and/or decided.

- Following further discussion on the GAFCON statement, it was agreed that the PCC supports the 14 statements of Anglican identity and stands by the Jerusalem Declaration as stated on 29 June 2008.
- Our ministry amongst older people has extended through Bromfield Court with a monthly meeting being held there.
- Debt Support. We are to investigate the provision of a 'budget coaching' scheme through Red2Black. On completing their workshop session, individuals would be able to act as a 'first port of call' to signpost those seeking help to the most appropriate service for their needs.
- The provision of an after school club at the middle school is being considered in an effort to reach young people aged 11 and upwards to the youth club age. The current lunch time seekers club only really attracts years 5 and 6 (ages 9 to 11). Your prayers for this venture were requested.
- We have recently received a legacy from the estate of the late Doreen Price which is to be used for the general use and benefit of Christ Church, Stone. This has been put into a high interest deposit account until a suitable and appropriate use has been identified.
- It was agreed that we investigate the possibility of purchasing a commercial dishwasher for the kitchen in the church centre. This would be especially useful for events such as the recent Christianity Explored course.
- Adam Rushton's prayer letter (publicity flyer) has been finalised and is now being sent out in a street by street distribution. This follows the idea of praying for people living in different streets each week, as we currently do in the weekly service sheet. We received our first prayer request on 19 November.

- more than 90 passed ABRSM music exams last month and two of our students were awarded trophies for the top performances in singing and overall performance in South India.
- Academically our students came top in the June 08 exams in a number of subjects at GCSE, AS and A Level and our own son, Simon, was the top A Level student in India across 3 subjects.
- Many students completed Duke of Edinburgh awards, including several at Gold Level.
- We saw an increasing involvement from students in community service locally, including raising funds and working to improve conditions in local children's homes.
- We had notable successes in inter-school Sports including winning the Hockey and Swimming and great individual wins in Athletics and Cross-country.
- We are equally excited by a steady growth in Christian maturity and commitment among students and by the way that so many go on to be salt and light in universities around the world.

Praise the Lord with them for these notable achievements at such a small school.

Our kids are all really well and keeping us amused and busy. James is quite a star football player and in a recent tournament he scored four out of the five goals for his team. She is always sketching away at something and we are quite amazed by her ability to put together clothes to look like a very trendy nine year old. Jigsaw has been keeping us busy last year. We have tried to focus on strengthening what is already there. This has meant writing new curriculum's for the kids clubs, updating contracts, rewriting job descriptions, new finance systems, completing our registration with all the relevant authorities and a myriad of other things. Alongside this the literacy project was started in 2008.

This has been excellent so far and already after just four months of classes kids are being able to read and write for the first time. The community has really accepted Jigsaw as a permanent feature and the literacy classes have been well received. Jigsaw was also able to purchase a brand new van this year from the support raised by one link church and my parents. This has been an excellent addition to our work and has meant greater flexibility in what we do and most importantly has enabled us to take groups of kids out for the day. These trips out have really cemented relationships between staff and kids and also between the kids. For many of the kids the trips out were their first time out of the area they live in. Thanks to so many generous donations that Jigsaw has received we were able to purchase a present and provide a fantastic party for each child that comes to our various projects/clubs.

We have on our registers now 950 kids! The team worked tirelessly in December buying all the gifts, wrapping them, planning and preparing the parties. During the week of the parties the kids workers were getting up early to cook all the food and then doing the parties – sometimes two in one day! So to say thank you to the staff we organised a big party for them all on the 22nd. We treated the staff to all their favourite Filipino foods that they could never normally afford and organised games with good prizes. Each staff member received a hamper of Christmas food to share with their families.

Well this was supposed to be a Christmas letter but we never got round to sending it so now it's a New Year letter. Happy New Year to everyone.

Nefyn, a village with a sweeping sandy bay, is on the Llyn Penninsula in North Wales. Over 45 years ago Manchester Area Crusaders organised a camp for boys on a Farmer's field; since then there have been camps for several weeks every summer. 2009 is no different and will see the same field transformed for five camps for children, nine to seventeen-years-old, catering for about forty children on each camp, meaning 200 kids will hear about Jesus, join in fun and games, whilst making new friends.

Nefyn Camps are part of <u>Urban Saints</u> (formerly 'Crusaders'), a national Christian youth organisation, whose aim is to introduce young people to the Bible and Christian teaching, whilst they enjoy themselves in a safe and friendly atmosphere.

In 1978 I attended my first 'Nefyn' - one of the first mixed camps, as part of a Posse from Sandbach Crusaders. In the intervening years I have been to a dozen or so more camps, first as a camper, then junior tent-leader, before assisting on the committee and organising activities on camps, or just a weekend working party to erect or pack-up the tents. One of those work-parties saw the installation of a toilet-block, putting an end to the nighttime treks to a hole-in-the-ground and washing in cold water (Ah! The good old days!) Nefyn holds a special place for me, with the work of God so evident in the lives of the young people and leaders.

Marriage and having our own children meant my that involvement took a break, but in 2005, I was able to return as 'warden' – keeping up the canvas, cleaning loos, and general practical help, whilst our son, Philip, enjoyed his first camp; he has returned each year since; his place for 2009 already booked! Amazingly the leader at the camp, Andrew Philips, who also spoke in the evening meetings, had been a camper on several holidays where I had been his leader! He is now a school evangelist working in some of Manchester's more interesting places.

The campsite has pitches for football, basketball, unihok and crocker (a bizarre, but fast & furious game of cricket, placed with a football and rounders bat). A large marquee has space for meals, meetings, indoor games (including pool, table football, table tennis) and craft activities.

A permanent, well-equipped cookhouse, staffed by volunteer cooks, is kept busy feeding the hungry kids (and leaders). The safe & sandy Nefyn beach is only a few minutes walk from camp and is a regular part of supervised camp activities.

Optional activities vary from camp to camp and may include canoeing, climbing, golf, high ropes course, horse riding, mountain biking, and pottery...

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A Camp: 25 July - 1 August 2009 for 15 - 17 year old.
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B Camp: 1 - 8 August 2009 for 11 - 13 year olds.
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C Camp: 8 - 15 August 2009 for 9 - 11 year olds.
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D Camp: 15 - 22 August 2009 for 13 - 15 year olds.
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E Camp: 22 - 29 August 2009 for 12 - 14 year olds.
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For 2009 the cost is excellent value at just $\pounds 105$ - which includes return coach transport, from Lymm, with the main party. An additional charge may be payable for some of the optional activities.

For more information, speak to Andy or Philip Stone. Philip is going on B camp this year: Andy is taking David to his first Nefyn - C camp. Andy is also trying to persuade a few others from Christ Church to come along as leaders.

Sermon series for February to April

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¹⁷ In the Bleak Mid-Winter, cold congregation moan, Pews stood hard as Iron, feet as cold as stone...

This winter has reminded us that global warming does not always mean the weather is warmer; the average temperature locally was less than 4° C in December, dropping below minus 3° C on several occasions. 2009 started even colder, with the average for the first week of January minus 1.5°C.

Despite our best efforts, the temperature inside Christ Church is directly proportional to the temperature outside. Monitoring has shown that, with the heating on full, on the coldest of nights, the temperature barely rises inside the church, with the heating only serving to prevent the building from getting colder, only raising the temperature as the day starts to warm.

The rising cost of gas, not to mention an environmental impact of producing CO_2 , was the reason for reviewing the heating settings for the Church; last year the cost of heating the Church was a significant outgoing, so some minor adjustments were made to prevent the heating from being on constantly. In fact, the low temperatures this have meant that the heating has been ticking-over most nights and the settings reviewed to help make the building more comfortable for services.

The size of the building, lack of any insulation, the old heat distribution system (I don't think there is anyone old enough to remember it being put in) means that the modern boilers are, on very cold nights, fighting a losing battle. Currently the heat is delivered to the church by just five radiators, with the large pipes running around the church and in the floor forming another surface area to give off the heat; changes to the church have seen some of these pipes covered, reducing their effectiveness.

To improve the heat given out from the under-floor pipes, the channels that are accessible have been cleaned and material added to reflect more heat into the church, rather than just warming the bricks.

The best heating is definitely body-heat – the Christmas school services, Carol Service and the Stone Choral Society Concert, all warmed the Church up wonderfully! To put the cost of heating in perspective - heating the Church alone for four weeks in December used 1368 m³ of gas (that's 48000 cubic feet or 15 Megawatt-hours), has cost

nearly £500, and produced 2.8 tonnes of Carbon Dioxide.

Leaving the heating on a higher setting during the week may make it slightly warmer on a Sunday, but would cost a lot more, with most of that heat going straight out of the building – those of you who passed the church after the recent snow would have seen the church roof unburdened by it, as the heat loss through the roof melts it quickly.

The Church Centre, being more modern, keeps heat better, but still uses a significant amount of gas to heat it, but with much more noticeable results.

Whilst on the subject of energy saving, the wardens have taken advantage of special offers at local shops to replace, where possible, incandescent lights with low-energy alternatives. This will result in reducing the electricity consumption of the Church and centre by nearly 3kW – the equivalent of a kettle – saving about 40 pence an hour.

Church Magazines, 1885

Pete Mason noticed that a set of Christ Church magazines from 1885 was for sale on the internet, and we have now acquired these. Unfortunately the seller offered no information about who might have kept them, but the first copy has a name - Mrs Eccleshall - written on the cover.

1885 was a very important year for Christ Church, the year the rebuilt church was finished. The first building became unstable and was extensively altered to become the building we now know. It seems that the church magazine had not been published for some time, but was re-started in January 1885. The price, as you will see from the following, was 1d per copy. Before you start calculating the ravages of inflation, let me add that the magazine comprised a single folded sheet, and that the 1d price was subsidised. Here is the vicar's letter from January 1885.

To the Parishioners of Christ Church, Stone

MY DEAR FRIENDS,-

I hope our Parish Magazine will be welcomed by all. It will come as a friend once a month, and give you information of events in our own parish and much besides that will be both interesting, instructive, and useful. I have long wished for this "missing link " to be forged, and am now encouraged to make it a reality by the willingness of my dear brother in the ministry to undertake the heavier part of the work connected with it. Once started, I hope its circulation will steadily increase. This will depend upon you. Let every house in the parish have its copy, let it be carefully read, let it be regularly paid for, and lastly, let it be persistently recommended to others. We want some Annual Subscribers of 2s. 6d., so as to enable us to fix the price of the Magazine at " One Penny." This will bring it within the reach, of all.

That it may prove a help, a comfort, and an encouragement to all, is the earnest desire of

Prayer requests in the weekly World Watch Prayer Link include the following:

- Sun 1st Following the breakdown of peace talks between the **Ugandan** government and the rebel group, the Lord's Resistance Army (LRA), the group has moved its attacks over the border into **northern Democratic Republic of Congo** (DRC). Please pray for the safety of those living in areas affected by the raids and also for those living in Uganda who have returned to camps they have just left, fearing the LRA will return. Please pray also that peace talks will resume and lead to a peaceful and negotiated settlement of the conflict.
- Mon 2nd Please continue to pray for the situation in **eastern DRC** where the crisis remains acute. Tearfund is supporting the work of three partners who are bringing aid and basic services to 250,000 displaced people. One of these services is counselling for those who have suffered sexual violence. Please pray for those who have suffered in the fighting and for the success of aid efforts to bring comfort to them. Pray also that peace talks will bring positive results.
- Tue 3rd Pray for peace and a swift end to the escalation of violence in **Gaza** that has claimed hundreds of lives. Tearfund does not work in Gaza but is supporting the prayers for peace of its Christian partners in Jordan, Lebanon & Egypt. Pray that voices urging restraint and calm will be heard on both sides and more humanitarian aid can reach those in need.
- Wed 4th Please continue to pray for the people of **Zimbabwe**, pray for food, medicine, hope and life. Please pray for protection for those who make the ruling power in Zimbabwe feel threatened, especially those who have been abducted, arrested or harassed.
- Thu 5th A coup in December brought a new leader to **Guinea.** Although the seizure of power has been condemned, Captain Camera has promised democratic elections within a year. Please pray that there will be a peaceful transition of leadership and that the people will be able to enjoy freedom and democracy. Please pray also that the Junta keeps its word.
