The New Year often leads to making new resolutions, especially about our diet. Having enjoyed new recipes and luxury Christmas items over the last few weeks, we might have a twinge of conscience when we stand on the bathroom scales. Reality hits home as we contemplate the well-known rule of thumb: when we eat more than the energy we burn off, we gain weight. The short winter days make it harder to keep active, so it takes discipline to get fit.

Despite the time and effort invested in caring for our bodies, our physical well being isn't the most important aspect of life. The Bible teaches us to look after ourselves, which involves a certain amount of physical self-care. But something else is even more important, because of its long-term value: our standing with God and growth in godliness. The Bible puts it this way: 'For physical training [lit: gymnasia] is of some value, but godliness has value for all things, holding promise for both the present life and the life to come' (1 Timothy 4v8). How do you measure up? If you recorded the time spent on looking after your body, which is valuable for this age, how would this compare with the time given to growing in true godliness? To become more like Jesus Christ is of benefit both for now and for the future: its true value and reward will be fully and gloriously realised in heaven.

In January we hold a covenant service where we remember Christ's amazing commitment to His people. It provides us with the opportunity to pledge ourselves to the Lord Jesus and to his work. This is far more than turning over a new leaf as it is about growing in the new life found in Christ. As we meet we will encourage one another to follow Christ, to discover the wonders of his covenant love and to grow in godliness. Do come and start the New Year with the long term in mind.

Everyone a Marine

Recently I was reading the story of General Tony Zinni (Ret.), a US Marine who went from a lieutenant during the Vietnam war to Commander-in-Chief of US Central Command, and after that a peace envoy around the world. Half-way through this fascinating book, Zinni lists eight or so qualities of the Marines, qualities and values that make them a force to be admired. Over the coming months I intend to explore what Christians can learn from them.

'One: Our first identity as Marines is to be a Marine. We are not primarily fighter pilots, scuba divers, tank gunners, computer operators, cooks, or whatever. The proper designation for each Marine from privates to generals is "Marine."

In common use, the word 'church' means a building we go to on Sundays (and other days if we're especially keen) and 'Christian' describes our private beliefs, simply one of many words that might be used to describe people. On www.into-stone.co.uk you will find 'Places of Worship' listed in the 'Lifestyle' section (between 'Pets' and 'Pubs & Bars'!). Yet, for Jesus and his early followers, being baptised meant taking on a new identity that eclipsed all others.

"You are all children of God through faith in Christ Jesus, for all of you who were baptised into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." (Galatians 3:26-28)

Being "in Christ" means that every Christian is a member of God's people, the Church. We don't go to church, we *are* the Church. This doesn't mean going to every meeting that's held, but it does mean our relationship with other Christians must be of primary importance. How many of you are regularly sharing life with other followers of Jesus, studying the Bible and serving *together*? Do we live as a *fellowship* of people united by allegiance to Jesus, the King of Kings and Lord of Lords, or are we merely a *collection* of individuals who opt in and out of varying degrees of commitment?

This is a challenge, but there is also comfort. Sharing Jesus' identity is a glorious privilege! Children of God, brothers of Jesus Christ, saints, a chosen people, the household of God... Let's begin the new year by celebrating what God has made us to be. And let's do it together.

The PCC met on Wednesday 21 November 2007 and the following matters were reported on, discussed and/or decided.

- The crèche for children under 3 years of age is now in operation during the Sunday morning service
- At a recent meeting of the Governors at Christ Church First School the lack of a nursery class was discussed. The school is unable to extend and has insufficient space inside to make alterations to be able to accommodate a nursery class. The PCC agreed that we approach the school to offer them a room in the centre for this. If they are interested further details will be discussed.
- Production of the accounts is proving easier with the new software package. However there was a plea for more volunteers to be part of the finance task group. Anyone interested should contact Kevin Reynolds or Ian Hawley.
- The centre management task group are to revisit the terms and conditions for booking the centre to establish a clear policy on Saturday evening bookings.
- · An expression of interest has been received in the youth worker post. The PCC supported further investigation into this in principle.
- A report on the future of the Stone Deanery was tabled at the meeting of the Deanery Synod on 14 November. The proposal is to merge the Stone and Eccleshall Deaneries. This is to be discussed at the January meeting of the PCC.

The next PCC meeting is on Wednesday 16 January 2008.

Owen & Tracy Humphreys, with their younger two sons, Steffan and Jonathan, live and work at Hebron School in South India. Hebron is a Christian, co-educational, boarding school situated in the beautiful Nilgiri Hills above the town of Ootacamund, or Ooty as it is known. The School's entrance is just inside the Botanical Gardens where one turns right up a long, steep, windy driveway to the School buildings. One quickly gets out of breath walking up the drive, as the School is 7,500ft above sea level so the oxygen percentage is lower. This affects the children as well as the staff until they get acclimatised!! Ben, Owen and Tracy's oldest son, has stayed in the UK for a 'gap year' before going to university next academic year.

(The following are edited extracts from Owen & Tracy's latest 'Humphreys News'. A full copy of the News is in the red folder on top of the cupboard under the Overseas Mission notice board in the Centre.)

Whereas Tracy and the two younger boys, returned to Hebron in August for the beginning of the school term, <u>Owen</u> stayed behind in the UK to do deputation work and to help Ben to settle. He returned to Hebron in October and joined the Department of Enhanced Learning. While home in the summer, Owen attended a course on teaching English as a second language, so now he is working with almost a dozen children who have English as a secondary language. He is very much enjoying this role though he feels he has a lot to learn. He is also taking ten lessons of year 7 Maths which is a new experience for him. He asks us to pray that he will be a blessing and encouragement for all the students with whom he is involved in these new roles.

Ben is working in a large shop (JJB Sports) selling sportswear and goods. It used to be his favourite shop but that may have changed now!! He is boarding with Christian friends of the family in their home town of Oswaldtwistle. Owen and Tracy ask us to pray for Ben over Christmas. It's not the easiest thing being away from your family at this time of year. Because of him only getting two days off work at Christmas, and being reliant on 'public transport', it will be difficult to visit any family as they all live some distance away. Also living with another family is a time for re-adjustment for all involved, both Ben and the family!

<u>Jonathan</u> has recently captained the Under 14 hockey team and has also represented the School in recent months at football, basketball and cricket. he enjoys his sport. His parents have been encouraged by his recent desire to attend the voluntary student prayer breakfast at 7.20am every Tuesday morning. His new Swedish friend, Lukas, whose parents are medical workers in Bangladesh, is a positive influence in the sphere of Christian activities. Please pray for Jonathan, Lukas and the other Year 9 boys that they would each grow in their faith. A recent scare that a known cyst in Jonathan's brain may be starting to grow has proved unfounded. A CT scan showed no increase in the size of the cyst.

Charles Wesley's visit to Stone

The below was found in researches by my Uncle, a Methodist Minister, whilst researching Wesley for work he is involved in at Gwennap Pit in Cornwall.

In Mrs. (Charles) Wesley's old age, she used to relate the experiences of these days (i.e. when she rode pillion with her husband on his preaching tours in their early marriage before the children arrived) with a great deal of humour. One day she and her husband arrived at Stone in Staffordshire, and she sat down to rest in the inn garden which adjoined the parsonage grounds. She was singing a Methodist hymn to herself when the Vicar and his daughters came to their side of the hedge and listened, complimented her upon her voice and asked for her help in the choir the following Sunday. She said she would be happy to sing if her husband might preach, but when the Vicar understood who she was, he declined to lend his pulpit, even with such an inducement.

No date is given in the book - but the visit to Stone would have been between April, 1749, when Charles Wesley & Sarah Gwynne were married near Brecon, and 1756 when he gave up being an itinerant preacher. The oldest child (of 8, only 3 survived), was John, born 1752, who died of small pox (caught from his mother) a year later. So that could mean Sarah was journeying with him for around three years only, i.e. 1749 to 1752

I wonder if anyone can shed any light on the Pub concerned!

¹² Favourite Hymns of George and Mary Holden

(George)

There are many things in my life I accept without questioning, although, my wife Mary might well question that statement. It was only when David asked me to write about my favourite hymn did I sit down and reflect on why this particular hymn meant so much to me.

This is a hymn which has not 'grown on me,' but has grown within me. It's difficult to say when the seed was sown. I guess it was in my earlier years as a chorister at St Mary's church in Penwortham in Lancashire.

It was fascinating to learn that it was introduced to America and the world in Madison Square Garden in 1957 by the prominent singer/songwriter of gospel music, George Beverly Shea. Not only do I share with him a love for this wonderful hymn, 'O Lord my God, when I in awesome wonder,' but also we share the same Christian name and birth month. Originally written in 1886 by the Rev Carl Boberg this Swedish song was translated into English in the 1920's.

I love singing. This particular hymn opens a door to my emotions allowing me to be at one with heart and voice.

Literally, being close to the earth as a potter, I have a strong feeling of God's presence in nature, amplified by a simple choice of words which conjure up such wonderful images. They act as a overture to the reception that awaits us when we can echo those words of proclamation: 'My God, how great thou art!'

When I was asked which was my favourite hymn I had great difficulty naming just one as I have so many. Through my life certain hymns have represented different emotions and occasions.

As I journey as a Christian I gather up new 'favourites' along the way. There is one, however, which stands head and shoulders above the rest. It is believed to have been written in Germany in 1644 by Martin Rinkart, the music by Johann Cruger in 1647.

It was translated into English in 1856. The hymn is 'Now Thank we all our God, with heart and hands and voices'.

When I was at school we had a huge organ in the assembly hall and the organist, our music teacher, was a tiny wisp of a woman with a shock of white hair. She played that organ thunderously and I can still hear that hymn in my mind with Miss Manson pulling out all the stops to the singing of 900 girls on Founder's Day. The hairs stand up on the back of by neck to this day when I sing or hear it. I think that was the only thing about school that I really liked.

The hymn has always been a favourite of my family too. My parents had it at their wedding as did George and I. It was also sung at both my parents funerals. It is such a glorious hymn of praise which says it all, whatever the occasion.

What shall I read next? Try these!

Two short paperbacks were on my shelf for years. Both have been a gripping read!

The first is called 'I dared to call Him Father' by Bilquis Sheikh. This Pakistani woman was from a privileged background. She was married to a high-ranking government official until he left her. Bilquis retreated to a family estate to live a more peaceful existence. Her interest in the life of Jesus Christ began with what she read in the Quran and then by reading the Bible. She reached a crisis point and became a Christian. But her conversion led to increasing isolation from her family and danger to her life. An updated version has just been published with more details about what has happened since. Published by Kingsway.

The second is by Steven Masood: 'Into the Light' (OM Publishing). This charts the journey of a young boy from a poor background with an unhappy family life. Masood had a strong desire to know God. He diligently read the Muslim scriptures, but he had many questions unanswered. His life took several downturns. At the age of about 20 he reached his lowest ebb and made an attempt on his life. Some kind Muslim people cared for him. His quest continued as he read the Bible and came to know the living Lord Jesus and came into the light. It is a wonderful read. Steven is now Professor of Comparative Religion at Columbia University and has written several books.

Shallowford House is currently aiming to raise £1.5 Million to build new accommodation and a new chapel; over the last few years, increasing numbers of visitors have had to be turned away because of lack of space, and the time has come for us to make room for everyone.

We were lucky enough to receive 50% of this year's Lent Appeal from the Bishop of Lichfield - but we have a considerable amount more to do to make Shallowford House the best possible resource for the community and church.

Bishop Alan Smith, Chairman of the Trustees of Shallowford House, the Diocese of Lichfield's Retreat and Conference Centre, located in Stone, Staffordshire, announced earlier this year the launch of a major upgrade and development scheme, to include breathtaking new chapel and concourse buildings, and a substantial upgrade to existing meeting rooms, bedrooms and other facilities.

"For nearly seventy years, Shallowford House has served the Diocese of Lichfield, an area covering Staffordshire, Shropshire and much of the Black Country," Said Bishop Alan, "and the time has now come for us to renew it for the next seventy years. We're very confident that this plan will meet the needs of the many thousands of people, both Christians and non-Christians, who come to Shallowford for relaxation, learning and business. The planning application for the new buildings has been submitted, and we are very much hoping that the outcome will be favourable."

"We've got a lot of hard work to do to raise the money it will take to make these exciting plans become reality, but we're positive that we've got the right scheme for Shallowford's future; we're also delighted that the Bishop of Lichfield, Jonathon Gledhill, has selected Shallowford house as the UK recipient of his Lent Appeal." 

The extensive renewal programme entails significant additions to the existing 1880s country house. A new chapel/meeting room will be constructed in the grounds, accessed via an enclosed linked walkway. A new concourse entrance will be built between the existing wings of the house with glazed flat roof and pitched tiled roof entrance with glazed screens. The new concourse will be used as a meeting place, a reception room and a comfortable lobby for guests. The old Chapel will be internally modified with the introduction of a new first floor and converted to ground floor meeting room and first floor en-suite bedrooms. The floor plan attached to this document gives more details of the extensions.

External pavings and landscape will be developed to reflect the new setting, with an enclosed terraced garden created between the new meeting room and the existing house.

Whether you are new to the Stone area or have been living here for some time you are welcome to come to this church.
