As a family, we tend not to make many plans in advance of our holiday time. The one exception being the plan to make the beds as soon as we arrive so that we get some good rest! Unfortunately one recent holiday was spoilt by our struggle with a very hard mattress – a big disappointment. The bed did not deliver the expected comfort. The people of ancient times had a proverb to describe this sort of experience: short beds and narrow blankets.

The proverb found its way into the Bible when God spoke to His people about how foolish they'd been to make an alliance with Egypt. They did it to safeguard their future. The prophet Isaiah pointed out how would not deliver: 'The bed is too short to stretch out on, the blanket is too narrow to wrap around you' (Isaiah 28v20).

We live in an age where sub-Christian teaching is all too easily picked up from the market place of ideas. Alternatives appear to offer a more comfortable religion and one that fits well with society. There is a rising trend to flatten out the distinctive characteristics of Jesus Christ: we happily retain his inspiring example, but drop his unique identity, which sits awkwardly in the global village of ideas; we uphold his teaching on loving our neighbour as ourselves, but daren't suggest that it would be the loving thing to say that what a neighbour is doing is wrong. But, these ideas are nothing more than short beds and narrow blankets! They don't deliver the promises of knowing God and living according to his way of life and peace.

Isaiah told God's people that the Lord would demolish what was false in order to build what was true: "See, I lay a stone in Zion [i.e. renewed Jerusalem] a tested stone, a precious cornerstone for a sure foundation; the one who trusts will never be dismayed" (Isa 28v16). The words concerned a faithful remnant who would stand against the current trend, place their whole confidence in the Lord who would deliver them. The words are quoted in the New Testament and applied to Jesus Christ whose resurrection marked him out as the cornerstone (Acts 4v11; Eph 2v20; 1 Peter 2v6). Those who entrust themselves to him will be saved and not be put to shame.

So, why not take the opportunity this holiday to discover more about Jesus? Read one of the four Gospels. Or read *'The reason for God'* (Tim Keller). You'll be amazed at who Jesus is and what he has done for us. I hope you have a great summer.

Can you believe it has been a whole year since we arrived? We can't; I'm sure Christmas was only a few weeks ago! Even more shocking: in 18 months time I start conversations about where to go next. I can honestly say I'm in no rush to move on. Our first year has been a source of great joy and we are ever so thankful to God for the welcome we have received from you.

In 1 Samuel 7 the LORD rescues Israel from an attack of the Philistines, and Samuel marks the occasion by setting up a stone called Ebenezer. A few old hymns speak of Ebenezer, but I suspect most people today would not have a clue what it means. Samuel explains: the stone is named Ebenezer because "Till now the LORD has helped us" (verse 12) and, as the footnote explains, Ebenezer means "stone of help."

The stone was a visual memorial to God's faithfulness - future generations could look at it and be reminded of the way the LORD helped his people in the past, and promised to help in the future. I might not be setting up a large rock in the garden but maybe this is an Ebenezer article: God has been faithful and gracious in so many ways and we know he will continue to provide and lead.

Life as a church family includes testifying to one another of God's faithfulness - sharing our Ebenezers. As we share our stories we find one another encouraged and motivated to keep trusting Jesus Christ. How about resolving that each week we will think about how God has been faithful and share that testimony with someone else?

My first article included words from a song, so let me do it again; from "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing":

Sorrowing I shall be in spirit, Till released from flesh and sin, Yet from what I do inherit, Here Thy praises I'll begin; Here I raise my Ebenezer; Here by Thy great help I've come; And I hope, by Thy good pleasure, Safely to arrive at home.

The PCC met on Wednesday 14 May 2008 and the following matters were reported on, discussed and/or decided.

- Our recent Quinquennial inspection showed the church to be in a reasonably good condition. The most important issue to be addressed is the state of the current electrical installation in the church. This has already begun to be pursued.
- The proposed plans for the alterations to the access between the church and the centre were studied. It was agreed to submit a Faculty application in-line with the plans. A Public Notice is to be placed in the local newspaper for four weeks giving notice of work on the churchyard involving the removal of the memorial. A brief summary of this notice is also to be placed in the weekly notice sheet.
- A calendar of summer social events is to be coordinated by the Vasby-Burnie family. If you are willing to host an event, e.g. picnic, walk, open garden, speak with Tim or Caroline.
- · Various people were elected to serve the PCC in the role of specific officers.
- A draft 'Giving' booklet was reviewed. It was felt that there should be more detail on issues such as, our main areas of expenditure, average weekly cost of running the church, special projects that we are fund raising for and/or support. It was agreed to hold a 'Gift Day' on Sunday 6 July 2008 and annually thereafter in April.
- The mission task group presented a revised table giving details of the distribution in 2008 of the 10% freewill offering in 2007. This has enabled us to focus our giving to individuals rather than organisations.

The next PCC meeting is on Wednesday 16 July 2008 at 7.30pm.

Two events dominate the media as I write this. The first is the horrifying discovery of the crimes of Josef Fritzl, in the Austrian town of Amstetten: he imprisoned and abused his own daughter, and several of the children he fathered through her, in a soundproof underground cellar beneath his own house for 24 years. The second is the local election results, in which Labour have suffered their heaviest losses for many years.

These two events have more in common than we might think. It's easy to demonize Josef Fritzl. And it's certainly hard to imagine a more monstrous or revolting crime. The publication of photographs showing him sunbathing in Thailand while his helpless daughter and several young children were locked in his basement is bound to make us ask: how could anyone do such a thing?

And yet Josef Fritzl represents merely the most extreme form of a very common philosophy of life: I will do what makes me happy, and if that causes others to suffer, hard luck. In fact you could argue that, by our refusal to face the truth about climate change, we are as guilty as he is — we are in effect locking our children and grandchildren into a world with no future and throwing away the key. We are right to be disgusted at these crimes. But mere disgust is too convenient. There are lessons for all of us to learn.

And what about the local elections? The decline of one large political party need not in itself be bad news, whatever your personal preference: bad results can often galvanize politicians into doing better. More worrying is a widespread sense of drift: pollsters report increasing numbers of people who feel disaffected with all the mainstream parties, and either don't vote or vote for the BNP instead. Again, it's easy to disapprove. A wiser course would be to consider how to promote a better alternative.

And this, surely, is where Christianity comes in. The Bible is full of stirring visions of a new cosmos - not just a new church, but a new world. Revelation 21 is one example; Jesus' Sermon on the Mount is another. A third is Isaiah 65:17-25, in which God promises to build a new Jerusalem in which ill-health will be unheard-of, everyone will be properly housed and employed, and even animals will live together in peace.

A fantasy? That depends on us. And anyway, we need good and attractive fantasies which will draw people away from the sick perversions of a Josef Fritzl and the empty slogans of so many politicians.

For a really compelling dream or vision draws people together in a common cause. As I write, one other event has hit the headlines. Stoke City have been promoted to the Premiership; and the whole of North Staffordshire is celebrating - as I'm sure they are down the M6 in West Bromwich too!

But if football can draw people together, so can faith; for God has entrusted to us a tremendous vision of how the world can be remade in obedience to Jesus Christ. The best response to the moral decay and political apathy we see around us is to offer, and live, Christ's vision for a new and better world.

Mark was deeply affected by the love and care shown to him in the two months he was with Jigsaw. **Pray for Mark**. He is now in the care of God. Doing the Lambeth Walk!

The Lambeth Conference is one of the global Anglican Communion's Instruments of Communion. It takes place every ten years at the invitation of the Archbishop of Canterbury and is an occasion when bishops can meet for worship, study and conversation. Archbishops, diocesan, assistant and suffragan bishops are invited.

Also invited are bishops from other churches 'in communion' with the Anglican Communion, bishops from United Churches and a number of ecumenical guests.

The Lambeth Conference runs from 16th July to 4th August. Traditionally, bishops attending Lambeth visit English dioceses for a few days before going to Canterbury and this year the Diocese of Lichfield and our companions in Malaysia, South Africa and Canada, and in the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Mecklenburg in north-east Germany, have planned the highlight of CrossTalk, their two year mission-prayer twinning programme, to coincide with these pre-Lambeth visits.

From 1-15 July churches in towns and villages across the Lichfield Diocese will host visitors (and bishops) from their prayer-link churches. The visits will culminate in the international CrossTalk Conference, the CrossTalk Festival, a youth conference and a special pre-Lambeth international service of friendship and partnership in Lichfield Cathedral.
