

Recently there have been a number of sleaze stories in the media. One startling story after another has been publicised: the leakage of security information; inappropriate humour in public broadcasting; generous financial packages for outgoing heads of failing businesses; the serious neglect of residents in care homes; some surprising details of parliamentary ministers expense claims; the wayward e-talk of government employees. Whether it has been right to publicise such information or whether the media have crossed the line in terms of standards is being debated as people have reacted with a mixture of surprise and protest. We expect people to act responsibly.

In particular public office relies on earning the respect of the public. We instinctively know that things should not be this way. We know too that those who do act with integrity are not always given credit or an easy time for not compromising. At the end of the day bad behaviour tarnishes the reputation of those who govern us and leads to a disregard for an institution whose existence is for our good.

The church is not without fault. It too can be dogged by double standards. Yet it has a far greater responsibility to display integrity by living a Christ-like life as it upholds the Bible's teaching. The reason for this greater responsibility is that Jesus' followers are ambassadors for Christ. Sinful behaviour reflects badly on the risen and ascended Lord Jesus who reigns in heaven and is to be worshipped as the majestic king. Where there is a lack of integrity in the church it leads to cynicism or mistrust of Christians who are hypocrites.

The vital importance of Christian integrity is spelt out again and again in the Bible. Here's just one striking example that I reread recently: "Do everything without complaining or arguing, so that you may become blameless and pure, children of God without fault in a crooked and depraved generation, in which you shine like stars in the universe as you hold out the word of life" (Phil 2v14-16a). Followers of Christ are to display the glorious truth of the Lord Jesus in



the way we think, speak and act towards others. If our words and lifestyle match, then we will display integrity and this will encourage faithful devotion of others to the Lord Jesus.

I'm writing this one day after Easter. We have been pondering the death of Jesus – that great moment when God pushed us to one side and achieved salvation entirely by himself. And we have celebrated the powerful resurrection, when death itself was silenced.

Death then resurrection: that's the pattern. That's how God did it through Jesus, and that is how his followers are to live also.

Then Jesus said to his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, he **must** deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will find it." (Matthew 16:24-25)

This is the next verse in my little series on verses that, on the whole, are not *actually* believed by Christians in the West. We live in a culture that glorifies selfishness: chose the partner that makes *me* happy, follow *my* dreams wherever they lead, change church when it stops meeting *my* tastes, don't bother attending church when it doesn't suit *my* timetable.

Jesus says such an attitude is incompatible with being one of his followers. Ultimately, living to suit *my* life will result in me losing it. But if I trust Jesus, throwing away my interests and following his priorities, I will discover eternal life. In every decision, both great and small, a Christian is called to die with Christ – yet with complete confidence that Good Friday is *always* followed by Easter Sunday.

Unless a seed falls into the ground and dies, it cannot bear fruit. We have too many living people in the Church and not enough who are dead to the world. Dead people have nothing to lose in battle. They fight with abandon. They fight despite overwhelming odds. They fight with weapons that are not theirs simply because they own nothing of their own anymore. Therefore, God equips them with His weapons and His gifts. And those dead people change the world.

The cross is death to the self. And until we're dead, we're useless to the Kingdom.

It's the question that lies behind so much of our actions and behaviour: who am I? Who are You? We live in times when asking this question is as vital as ever, yet the answers seem in short supply. Enter "You: An Introduction" by Michael Jensen.

Over 15 short chapters this book explores different aspects of what it means to be human: such as having bodies or being children. This is a fun and fascinating read. *Fun* because Michael Jensen writes in a conversational way about topics of immediate interest. He is happy to quote well-known theologians The Red Hot Chili Peppers alongside some dead guy called Karl Barth. Like the title, even the section headings within each chapter cause a wry smile in the reader. *Fascinating* because he has clearly done his research (even interviewing body piercing afficionados!) so that he writes as someone who knows both the world and the Bible. Although short, in each chapter you will find serious engagement with issues of profound significance.

Apart from the last three, there is no need to read each chapter in order. This makes it great for dipping in and out of: ideal bed time reading. Yet from cover to cover Michael Jensen shows that the question of who we are is essentially bound up with the question of who Jesus is. Knowledge of Christianity is never assumed; instead, you will find a compelling portrait of Jesus and a convincing discussion of his relevance.

This is a great book to give to non-Christian friends, even those who tend not to read books. Or maybe for Christians in their late teens through to early thirties. Certainly anyone will find a great deal here to enrich your thought and conversation with others. Perhaps the best way to use it would be as a conversation starter – maybe by being used as the basis for group reading and discussion. "You: An Introduction" began life as a blog and each chapter concludes with some of the comments posted online, so you feel invited to continue the discussion wherever it leads. Best of all, whether you read it individually or with others, you will discover how Jesus is the answer to our deepest questions.

⁷ Bishops issue emergency appeal for Myanmar (Burma)

The four bishops in the Church of England's Diocese of Lichfield have tonight issued an emergency appeal for prayers and cash for the people of Myanmar (Burma).

The bishops of Lichfield, Shrewsbury, Stafford and Wolverhampton have written to all churches in the Diocese asking for special collections to be taken up in churches on Sunday 11th or 18th May to support the Bishop of Lichfield's Emergency Appeal. They are also asking church councils to make special one-off donations in response to the crisis.

In their letter, the Rt Revd Jonathan Gledhill, Bishop of Lichfield; the Rt Revd Dr Alan Smith, Bishop of Shrewsbury; the Rt Revd Gordon Mursell, Bishop of Stafford; and the Rt Revd Clive Gregory, Bishop of Wolverhampton; say: "Like us, you are no doubt watching the pictures from Myanmar (Burma) with a feeling of helplessness, and asking "What can I do to help?" It is difficult to know what to do when faced with a disaster on this magnitude: tens of thousands dead, 40,000 people missing and one million people homeless.

"But there are two things we can do which will make a big difference. We can pray and we can give."

The bishops are also asking youth groups in the diocese to consider staging special fundraising events, such as car washes and talent auctions to raise funds. Every penny received from the appeal will be used to aid the people of Burma, primarily through the Anglican Church in Myanmar working with the mission agency USPG: Anglicans in World Mission.

The bishop's say: "Some people have already given through the Disasters Emergency Committee. However, we wish to commend a way of responding further, following the lead of our companion diocese of West Malaysia, which has close ties with the Anglican Church of Myanmar. The Anglican dioceses in Burma are already engaged in long-term agricultural, educational and sustainable development initiatives. Local churches in the country are already deeply involved in the current relief efforts, but they are already looking to the rebuilding and replanting work that will be essential in the coming weeks and months.

"Our partners in West Malaysia have already sent an immediate cash gift to the Church in Burma, and Bishop Ng Moon Hing has appealed to his congregations for funds and also for two or three volunteers to go to Burma and report back on what more needs to be done.

"Of course, in addition to financial gifts, we also need to pray for the victims of the disaster – those who are bereaved, those who are injured, the homeless, the suffering; we need to pray for the leaders of Burma and for the international community – including the United Nations – that a way will be found for the international community to play a full part in the relief efforts; we need to pray for the Christian community of Burma, for strength and wisdom as they respond to the disaster around them; and we need to pray for international aid agencies, including British organisations such as the Disasters Emergency Committee, and its members, which include Christian Aid and Tearfund, as they consider how best to bring relief from the suffering."

They add: "Please respond positively to this disaster and demonstrate the love of God in a practical way to desperate people."

Sermon series starting in May

Mornings in Stone and Oulton:

Paul's second letter to his colleague Timothy was written from prison. It is literally Paul's 'last will and testament' as his own future is soon to end. Here Paul instructs his colleague about the foundations of the faith for the community of faithful believers. They must guard the good news by living and proclaiming it.

Moddershall & Evenings:

We look at a large swathe of Jesus' teachings in his hometown and its surrounds and the mission entrusted to his disciples. There is opposition to the truth leading to the rejection of Jesus in Nazareth. Only those whose eyes Jesus opens respond with faith. Here we learn of Jesus and his followers: what characterises their identity, their call and their mission. *Ian Hawley* was born on 10th April 1939 in S.W. Sheffield and died on 30 Mar 09 aged 69 in Stone. Ian was a lifelong supporter of Sheffield United and Vauxhall cars!

His working life began with a business apprenticeship at a steel firm in Sheffield. He studied and qualified as a Chartered Secretary before training as a lecturer in Huddersfield where he met his wife Sheila. Ian lectured at Aston College in Birmingham until 1972. They moved to Trentham when Ian got a post at Newcastle College in North Staffs. Ian joined Barlaston golf club and by his own admission 'played with much enthusiasm, but not much success!' He was delighted to be club President in 2002. He was treasurer at Trentham church (1993-2002); treasurer for the golf club; then, when they moved to Stone in August 2003, he was assistant treasurer at Christ Church and secretary to the Stone Deanery. Ian applied himself with persistence and was a great servant of the Lord Jesus despite his poor health. He will be greatly missed, but well remembered. Revd Paul Kingman.

A Lineage of Grace, by Francine Rivers

Have you ever wondered what motivated Rahab the prostitute to hide the Isarelite spies? Or how it felt for Ruth to lose her father-in-law, brother-in-law and husband? What it was like for Bathsheba bringing up her sons in King David's household? Or how Mary felt when Jesus disappeared for 40 days after his baptism?

In this book, Francine Rivers enters the lives of five women who are mentioned in the genealogy of Jesus, and fleshes out the Biblical accounts in a way that brings them vividly to life. Yes, it's fiction, but the stories are firmly rooted in scripture and the historical context of each is faithfully researched. I found that, while reading them, I was constantly prompted to flick through my Bible and check out the validity or plausibility of the narrative, and was often surprised at how my understanding was broadened by what I discovered. Each story also comes with a "Seek and Find" study section at the end; I didn't use these myself, but they might be useful for group discussion.

This publication is the omnibus edition of five independent novellas, each available separately. I bought the full version because it was cheaper that way, but I'm glad I did, and I've already recommended it to lots of my friends. May I recommend it to you too? Sue Kingman

Meaford School (1885)

A new teacher (Miss Dukes) was appointed to the Meaford School in July 1885. The vicar, Revd Pearman, took the opportunity to write a few words in the magazine concerning the education of children.

Many parents seem to think that if a child is *sent* to school there is an end of the whole matter, and all responsibility is discharged. There are *three* things laid down which would be well if parents would bear them in mind. They are (a) Attendance, (b) Demeanour, (c) Progress. Now just to take these one by one—

(a) *Attendance*. This should be *regular* and *punctual*. An irregular child is a hindrance to a school. Yet how many children are kept away half days for the most trivial reasons. Then they should be *in time*. A late mark is a *lost* mark and a *lost* lesson. Parents can do much in this way to help forward the teacher's work. (b) *Demeanour*. Good behaviour and tidiness, neatness in dress and appearance, all very necessary habits, and are amongst the best lessons a child can be taught, (c) *Progress*. If the first two are attended to, then you may leave this to the teacher.

It is sure to follow.

Whether you are new to the Stone area or have been living here for some time you are welcome to come to this church. The church is made up of adults and children who want to know more about the living God, who has supremely revealed Himself in Jesus Christ and continues to speak to us through His Spirit-inspired word, the Holy Bible (which can be read online at <u>www.biblegateway.com</u> and we recommend a modern translation e.g. the New International Version or English Standard Version).

We are part of the Anglican church, the basis of its Trinitarian belief is summarised in the Book of Common Prayer with its 39 articles, though we unite in Christ irrespective of denomination. We are an Evangelical church, as we see that the Bible is God's word for us and so is to inspire all that we do. This church was established with the help of the renowned Charles Simeon.

Our church meetings help us to grow in our understanding of what the Bible tells us about God, and this is something that we encourage others to investigate especially through our *Christianity Explored* course (see details on the national website <u>www.christianityexplored.com</u>).
