Getting to grips with being '*in Christ*'.

Did you look in the mirror this morning? If so, did you have a 'Lenten face'? The term 'Lent' refers to the 40 weekdays leading up to Easter eve, during which time we remember Jesus' period of testing in the wilderness, and Christians have traditionally devoted themselves to fasting and repentance (a dismal look may result!).

But, what is repentance? Is it the same as saying 'sorry'? As we read the New Testament we realise that true repentance goes much deeper than that; it involves a complete turnaround and progressively affects all areas of your life. In the context of becoming a Christian, the Bible emphasises that repentance involves a change from being in the world to being '*in Christ*.' Listen to the apostle Paul: '*in the same way, count yourselves dead to sin, but alive to God in Christ*' (Rom 6v11); '*therefore, there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus*' (Rom 8v1); '*to the saints in Ephesus, the faithful in Christ Jesus*' (Eph 1v1b). This shows us that repentance is about our lives being caught up into Jesus' master plan for the world. So, it's about acknowledging Jesus as the Lord.

When we are '*in Christ*' we will recognise that Jesus rightfully reigns as Lord in all areas of life and so it revolutionises the way we live. All of us want to live our own way. But, if you decide to follow Jesus then this way of thinking has to be crucified. Relationships, work and lifestyle choices are all to be made in reference to the Lord Jesus. If this is not the case then we are not being repentant, which is a key characteristic of being a disciple of Christ.

So, what did your face look like this morning? '*Do not merely listen to the word and so deceive yourselves. Do what it says. Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like a man who looks at his face in a mirror and, after looking at himself goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like. But the man who looks into the perfect law that gives freedom, and continues to do this, not forgetting what he has heard, but doing it – he will be blessed in what he does*' (James 1v22-25). A Lent face is not what matters. What matters to Jesus is the state of our hearts. All who are *in Christ* are to be in transition.

Fairtrade - the story behind the mark

Christchurch is now a **Fairtrade church** - your Sunday morning tea/coffee is fairly traded! You can also buy a wide range of Fairtrade food products every 4th Sunday. These are supplied by Traidcraft - UK's leading Fairtrade organisation. They are a Christian organisation, committed to working with all people in the fight against poverty. They help the poor to trade more effectively by breaking down the barriers which prevent them accessing markets. They work with partners (usually small farmer co-operatives) to develop business skills and create the right environment for sustainable trade. Nationally and internationally Traidcraft advocates changes in rules to benefit the poor, and works to mobilise public opinion in support of fair-trade practices.

The **Fairtrade** mark is an independent guarantee that a product is fairly traded. Traidcraft uses this on product lines designed for supermarkets to help customers recognise the fairly traded products.

The Fairtrade mark guarantees:

- fair and stable prices to farmer organisations
- extra income for farmers and plantation workers to improve their lives
- greater respect for the environment
- a stronger position for small scale farmers in world markets
- a closer link between consumers and producers

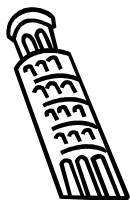
Coffee One of our most popular lines, most of the ground coffee comes from Costa Rica, Mexico and Nicaragua. Mario Hernandez from Nicaragua comments "Now I have money to buy clothes for my children and build my house. Day to day things are improving because of the better price."

Tea Our tea comes from East Africa - Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania. In Tanzania the major supplier is Kibena which has excellent wages and working conditions. Fausta Mwinami has worked at Kibena since 1993. He says "Since I've worked at the Kibena Tea Project, I've benefited a lot. I used to walk, now I have a bicycle and am able to travel up to 20 km."

Cocoa Growers in Ghana set up a co-operative of about 40,000 farmers. They currently sell about 650 tonnes to the Fairtrade market each year. They receive a social premium of \$150 per tonne, which is invested in water wells, health and education and other community projects. In 1997 the farmers launched their own chocolate bar, Divine, and set up The Day Chocolate Company (with help from various organisations eg Christian aid, Comic Relief). The farmers have an input into how Divine is produced and sold, and share in the profits. Josh Reynolds thinks it's a great product!

We hope you'll support our sale on **March 5th**, which will also include fairly traded craft items. Fairtrade goods are also available in Stone at **Wikijum** and at **Oulton Village Hall** on Monday mornings. Do support them too if you can!

From the Mission Field

Evangelism . . .by church-planting! On the first anniversary of the new church in Dubrava (19.2.2006) we can testify that God's hand has been seen in our midst. Praise God that 181 people came to the opening service and that these last few months approximately 40 adults and 10 children have been coming. There are now three regular house groups in the districts of Lower Dubrava, Higher Dubrava and Sesvete. The main prayer meeting takes place on Wednesdays, which is key to God's help and outworking.

Stephen Bell has sent us a copy of the first Annual Report of the New Church-plant in Dubrava, Zagreb, in Croatia.

Each month we hold an activity to be able to invite friends and interested people from our area. Amongst these activities have been: Concert "Damir Topić & Friends", ECM's Frank Bosch's "Family Show" musical, "Family Life" seminars, children's "Awana Open" outdoor club, the "Jesus Film" the children's choir "MjuziKids" and a barbecue on the grass near the church! The believers of the new church have shown readiness to evangelise and to engage in various ministries. Their enthusiasm has been seen in action.

Finances We are grateful to our "mother church" (Radićeva Baptists, Zagreb) for their great assistance for the first year. Their contribution, together with the regular sacrificial giving from believers has meant that we have no debts for the first year. Praise the Lord! Next year we will ask our mother church for only half what we received last year.

Equipment From the beginning we have seen God's hand in this. We were given chairs, sound equipment, and a digital video-projector. We were able to rent and renovate our church building!

Optimism We have seen great enthusiasm and optimism that has continued the whole year. The last few months have seen a growth in attendance and in the collection. There are also a few new Christians in our midst and we are looking expectantly to the Lord for two key events during February and March 2006.

Pro-Christ Evangelism Sunday 19th and 22-26 March The Gospel will be preached each evening in our church from 22-26 March by satellite from meetings in Germany, where Ullrich Parzarny will be preaching to Europe. On Sunday 19th we will also receive a satellite broadcast, which will be aimed at encouraging local Christians to "go active"! May God be glorified throughout Eastern Zagreb!

Who are . . . Tearfund?

Tearfund – the Evangelical Alliance Relief Fund – was born in 1969 out of early efforts by the Evangelical Alliance to support refugees through contacts with missionaries. Tearfund now works through partners (*local churches and Christian agencies*) to aid the world's poorest communities. Last year it supported 450 projects in more than 70 countries. The current International President, Dr Rene Padilla, says "I am especially pleased that Tearfund is engaged not only in convincing supporters to give money, but also in helping them to address some of the global causes of poverty."

When disaster strikes it's the poor who suffer most and Tearfund is on standby to provide emergency relief. During the winter's ongoing relief operation in Pakistan, Tearfund workers have been sleeping in tents and braving the cold with the homeless in the mountains of Kashmir. Many villages were inaccessible by road so staff faced gruelling journeys to reach survivors.

In Darfur, Tearfund emergency teams are working with local partner Fellowship for African Relief, providing food, water and health education to those who have fled the conflict. Recently 3 members of the African Union peacekeeping force raised £2,000 in a sponsored run in aid of one of the projects.

Tearfund also aims to *prevent disaster*, with an ongoing programme to help those in vulnerable places find better ways to cope with the unexpected. In Monze East, a village in South Zambia, local partner Evangelical Fellowship of Zambia (EFZ) was able to advise, equip and train 2,000 families last year to tackle the problem of drought. New techniques have meant a threefold increase in maize yield - the village has a grain store with 9 months food supply! This year EFZ will be able to help a further 2,500 families.

Tearfund believes that it's important to *support people*. Heed Bangladesh was able to provide a cheap loan to help Saleha from Northern Bangladesh start her own chicken farm. With the profits she was able to repay the loan and buy some land to grow rice – her family now has a year round secure food supply.

Tearfund also *speaks on behalf of the world's poor*, taking Proverbs 31:8 as its biblical mandate, "Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves." It took part in the 'Make poverty history' campaign, which did have some success - rich governments have pledged extra aid and debt relief.

March 5th is Tearfund Sunday; 83% of the charity's income comes from Christians in the UK and Ireland. Only 10% is spent on administration and fund raising so our support goes to where it is most needed - the poor communities of the world.

Hebron School Visit

Kelly Maltby and I have just returned from a trip to Hebron School in South India where we visited the three families living and working there who we support as a church.

We had a very good time and are grateful for your prayers. We were made very welcome and were able to spend time with Dom, Clare and Erica Joscelyne, Ralph, Dagmar and Simon Baron, and the Humphreys family, despite their busy work schedules. All send their greetings to the church and are very appreciative of our support. We gained a real insight into their situation and know much better how to pray. We plan to share this in more detail in next month's magazine and to have opportunity to show our photos and talk about our experiences at a session after a morning service or one evening.

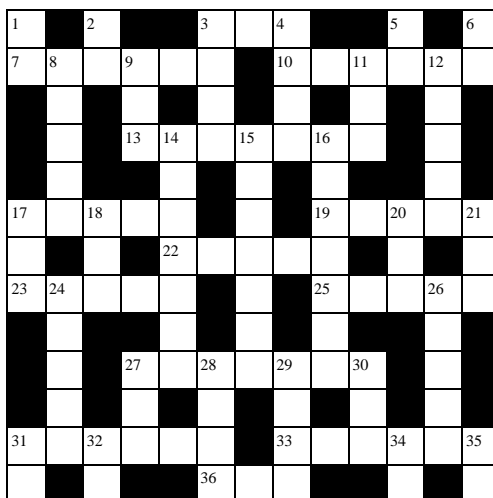
Clare's Head of Department is taking a sabbatical next year. Please pray (and ask around) that his position is filled by a technology specialist.

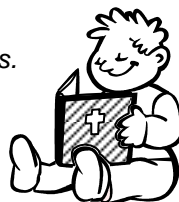

When we're facing a crisis (especially a life-threatening one), we would give anything to get through it. Money is no object! We can do the same thing on a spiritual level. But what happens when the crisis passes? The feeling of urgency about serving God passes as well.

If we could commit ourselves to doing one-tenth of what we're willing to do in those moments, we would rise to a new level of commitment, and be able to say with St Paul, "For to me, to live is Christ, and to die is gain." (*Philippians 1:21*)
