4 Victory Celebration

Trafalgar 200 celebrations have been countrywide and impressive. Stone's own Sir John Jervis, Earl St Vincent, secured an amazing victory against the odds at Cape St Vincent (hence the title chosen by King George), although he was out of office during the time of the Trafalgar victory under Lord Nelson.



Nelson began his naval career aged 12, he became a captain before he was 21, was a household name by the age of 39 and killed in action just weeks after his 47th birthday. The words *"kiss me, Hardy"* are attributed to Nelson as he lay dying in the cockpit of HMS Victory during the battle of Trafalgar on 21st Oct 1805. Historians inform us that his character traits played a large part in Nelson securing victory. Lord Nelson always led from the front and is said to have combined ruthless efficiency, strategic vision and tactical genius to end Napoleon's threat to Britain. It was a significant victory because it secured Britain's mastery of the sea and doomed Napoleon's domination of Europe. We're thankful to God for this victory and rightly celebrate it, as peace was costly but precious. Yet such peace remains vulnerable to being overthrown by new attacks.

For Christians such commemorations of victory recall Christ's ultimate victory. His victorious death is described as a work of destruction of evil: *'having disarmed the powers and authorities, he made a public spectacle of them, triumphing over them by the cross'* (Colossians 2v15). The cross of Christ stands in history as the point when evil was overthrown in principle - we await the final Day of Judgment when it will be overthrown in fact. On that day there will be the total eradication of all that destroys and is opposed to God's kingdom. The followers of Christ celebrate how he paid an immense price in order to secure us peace with God and a future in heaven.

This peace with God will never be taken from us. This is why we celebrate and share with others what Christ has done already and what he will one day finally do.








David, Stephen and Stuart Morton wish to thank many friends in Christ Church for the lovely cards and kind messages of sympathy on the recent death of Patricia.

This month it's Harvest so we're thinking about some of the things God provides for us.





welcomed onto the PCC in his position as our Youth Worker in the Benefice. He started here at the beginning of September. The PCC met on Wednesday 7th September 2005 and the following matters were reported on, discussed and/or decided.

• Plans for the **visit of the Boaters' Christian Fellowship to Stone** from the evening of Monday 19th September to the morning of Thursday 22nd September 2005 are now well advanced and PCC members were urged to pray and invite people to the various events, and to encourage others to do so.

• The Rock Café continues to attract 30-40 young people on a Friday evening. It stayed open over the holiday period at the request of the young people. The operational policy for the Café was accepted by the PCC as a working document for the first year and will be reviewed thereafter.

• Scaffolding is to be erected on 15th September 2005 to enable the **church roof** to be repaired where it has suffered damage due to louvres becoming detached from the belfry.

• The PCC is moving forward towards defining its **Mission Action Plan** – that is, defining what God would have us do as a church to reach out to those around who don't yet know Him. As we can't do everything, we are now praying about which group we should focus on, and how they may be reached.

• The Harvest Supper is to be on Saturday 1st October 2005 at 6.00pm in Christ Church Centre. It is a bring and share supper. and Christ Church are asked to provide savouries this year. Marylyn Hillman is co-ordinating catering and Mike West is MC for the evening.

The next PCC meeting takes place on Monday 17th October 2005

encouragement! We have needed it and been blessed by it! Here are some brief updates for your encouragement.

Stephen's Health The doctors have finally come down firmly on an illness and are confident of a solution. As we have moved house across town we have a new doctor - a key member of our large mother church in central Zagreb. It is a joy to go to his reception and see many tasteful Christian books and tracts and posters with peaceful pictures and helpful bible-verses. He sent me to the Dubrava Hospital (local to our churchplant) which is very modern and the doctor there told me I have 'rheumatic arthritis', am seriously ill and that I should come to hospital where 'he will heal me'. He gave me two injections into my wrist and knee. I was very encouraged and feel I am now starting the way to recovery... 6 weeks after it all started!

Tabita's well-being and our removal Praise God that Tabita's parents have been able to invest 6 days and nights of their holidays into renovating our new house... and taking me to hospitals etc. This has greatly encouraged Tabita, and new sinks, toilet, telephone lines, satellite, water in the kitchen etc, etc are now in place. Everything is also sparkling clean! Please continue to pray for Tabita that while I am in hospital she will be able to cope with all the extra stresses.

The children's adaptation Quiet wonderfully Sheona, Joshy and Benjy have been befriended into the lively group of children of the neighbourhood. About 20 children live in very close proximity to our cul-de-sac house and they now call on our kids to play-out. Please pray for good contacts and future conversions in our area.

Sheona's school is only 500 yards away and she already sits next to one of the neighbours, Michaela. She is enjoying school and it is modern with a seemingly good teacher.

Joshua and Benjy travel across town to the Montessori school, which has just moved into new premises. Everything is new, they have much equipment and both boys already have friends from our previous church in Malešnica. They are both very happy and Joshy is especially proud that he has many new books and writing/drawing equipment and that he has now started school (similar to English junior school).

The ongoing church-planting We are all encouraged. The *Summer-Sleep* as I call it is now at an end. We have an evangelistic concert at the turn of the month. A very famous band will play (most members from our mother church) and we hope that up to 100 key 'God-seekers' will come. Two weeks later we have missionaries from our previous church coming for 'Family-Life' (Croatian- "Obiteljski Život"), when we hope to invite folk for advice in family matters, marriage and children etc.

We will also be discussing and planning for the next 10 years (long-term) and for the next 1 year (short term) as a team, as a church, and most importantly we would like to discuss with the wider mother church. Please pray for one vision and God's initiative (as oppose to ours!).

This Saturday we have a team meeting for prayer and planning.

Dominic will be preaching on Hezekiah at Union Church on October 23rd. Please pray that he has productive quiet time with God and that he will deliver Gods message.


