## Wise Words...

#### Pushing the boat out.

This month we are taking some bold steps of faith. We are pushing the boat out on a number of fronts inspired by the following Bible verse: 'One generation will commend your works to another; they will tell of your mighty acts' (Psalm 145v4).

First of all we've appointed a youth outreach worker who will help us to engage more fully with the rising generation. We live in a society where many have lost touch with the truths found in the Bible and are searching to know the living God. They need to discover the purpose of life, but they've not heard how we can only discover through Jesus' death for our forgiveness, which gives us access to our Heavenly Father. How we long to introduce the next generation to God's wonderful character and great promises that have sustained generations through the sorrows and joys of life! This takes time and patience as we call on the Lord God in prayer and take the opportunities that arise in daily life.

We are not only concerned about children and youth, even though our attention in the last year has concentrated on developing this aspect of our life and witness. Or if you can't come then could you pray at the same time wherever you are? As we call on the Lord in prayer we can expect him to be at work to transform the hearts of stone to flesh.

## Introducing Thomas Nash - Youth Worker

I was born in London but have lived in Sevenoaks, Kent since I was four years old. I come from a Christian family and have been to church ever since I was born. I am the oldest of five children and have three brothers and one sister. I went to primary school in Sevenoaks and secondary school in Tonbridge.

I would always have called myself a Christian but aged about fourteen I had lots of questions and thrashed them out during confirmation classes in which we went through the Two Ways To Live gospel outline. At school I was known as a Christian but wasn't particularly vocal about it. I understood the gospel but did not realize that all of my life was to reflect it.

I've spent the last five years in Durham. I went to do a BA in theology at the College of St Hild and St Bede. I then did an MA in theological research during which I studied Hebrew and theological bioethics amongst other things. Over these four years I have grown lots as a Christian and benefited greatly from a church and Christian Union that sought to proclaim clearly the gospel. For the last year I have been working as an 'apprentice' in a church in Durham working mostly with students and young people (fourteen to eighteen year olds). This has been great fun and taught me a lot about working in a church.

It was also in Durham that I met Clare (my wife from 9<sup>th</sup> August 2005). I was in my third year when she started university and we were courting from the end of her first year. We got to know each other through the Christian Union and through church. She studied Natural Sciences and is wonderfully godly and fun.

My interests include following and playing rugby and, in fact, pretty much all sports. I am looking forward to coming to Stone and the opportunities that it presents to be teaching young people the Bible and seeing them respond to the good news that Jesus Christ is Lord and died to rescue them for his kingdom and glory.

#### Diakonia in Durham

It was four years ago, while attending the World Assembly of DIAKONIA in Brisbane, that I heard the next Assembly would be held in England, hosted by the Diaconal Association of the Church of England (DACE) & Methodist Diaconal Order (MDO).

The 19th World DIAKONIA Assembly held in Durham in July 2005 gathered Deacons and Diaconal workers from all parts of the world, among them our own **Ann Butle**r.

Deacons are among those in all Christian traditions who are called to help the church live out its service in the world ('diakonia' being the Greek word for service). They often work in difficult situations addressing social, welfare and justice issues. On welcoming over 400 of us to the Cathedral, the Bishop of Durham reminded us that Jesus calls us to seek the way of service, the way of Jesus' atoning death.

Some 35 countries - from Fiji to Finland, from the Netherlands to New Zealand, from Scotland to South Africa - represented the worldwide federation. We took part in workshops based on the theme 'Diakonia at the Margins - Challenge and Hope', visited diaconal projects in Newcastle, Jarrow, Sunderland and Gateshead and shared in small groups.

One evening we were treated to a sparkling performance of 'Celtic Fire' by the Northumbria Community. I shall never forget delegates bursting out of Durham Cathedral on Sunday after World Praise, dancing the conga!

My role as college host at St. Chad's was a joy. Our Hospitality Group which numbered around 15 people had been together for nearly three years in preparation for the Assembly, so we knew one another quite well. I also had the willing help of llse my German colleague at St. Chad's who was constantly on hand to translate for our German sisters who could not speak English.

Many thanks to those of you who cross-stitched the bookmarks to be given as presents to the delegates as a reminder of their visit to England.

#### What About A Book Harvest?

Harvest is a great time for remembering the needy areas of the world, and we are going to have the opportunity this year to give, via Tearfund, to the relief of famine in Niger. In addition this year, we are going to have the opportunity to relieve **book famine** via an organisation called **Book Aid.** 

In Britain, where we are surrounded by so many books, it is hard to imagine the devastating **book famine** which exists in other places. For instance, Christians in many African countries yearn for English-language books to help them grow in their faith.

**Book hunger** hurts and has long-term effects on a nation. Harvest time provides an ideal opportunity to move the mountain of surplus Bibles and Christian books from Britain to **book famine** areas.

An organisation called 'Book Aid' sends container-loads of books to countries such as Northern Ghana, Malawi, Uganda, Barbados, Cameroon, Nigeria, India – areas where English is spoken but there are very few Christian books, or they are too expensive for ordinary people to afford. Once received in the country, the books are used to stock Christian college libraries, and taken to Christian bookshops and churches where they are sold at affordable prices.

#### What kind of books are needed?

- · All kinds of Christian books
- All kinds of Bibles in good condition, please
- All kinds of 'Ladybird books' in good condition (spines intact)
- Not required daily (dated) Bible notes and school books

#### Please start now looking out books you might give

From mid-September onwards, there will be notices telling us where to place the books we wish to give. The books will then be transported to a Book Aid collecting point from where they will be taken to their main centre where they will be sorted, packed into containers, and sent to countries in need.

## Who are those missionaries...?

In brief, we have been shown around places and Christian ventures in and around Ooty as part of a 'new staff' induction program and are now into the thick of the school term trying to get our

heads into the new roles we have been assigned. We thought that we would share with you here in the magazine some of our thoughts, achievements and challenges.

The feelings we have swing from feeling that this is the most wonderful place we could be and loving everything about the culture to getting over emotional over trivial things such as 'the dirty nappies have not been collected again'. This apparently is perfectly natural and appears to be the similar experience of our other 'new to India' colleagues. Books we read about culture shock recalls people having similar experiences of total euphoria followed by low points and confusion. "But we are seasoned travelers; we've both roughed it on cheap student holidays and of course experienced hardships of carrying water on our narrow boat", we say. According to our reading this does not seem to make the transition easier. Culture shock is not exclusive to but is more prevalent in those facing long stints of three years or more. This explains why the International Guests on short term stints appear to be experiencing less of the transitional difficulties of the longer term workers.

Dominic whilst being tempted to reflect on what was left behind career wise and what the future might hold was lead to read the story of Lot's wife in Genesis 19 and specifically verse 26, 'But Lot's wife looked back, and she became a pillar of salt'. Dominic felt strongly that God was telling him not to look back and to trust him for the future. Our job is only to be obedient and God will take care of the rest. He was then lead onto Matthew 10:39. Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it.

Do not feel too sorry for us as we are sure that we are in God's will and this really is a fantastic place to work. We look out over the beautiful Nilgiri hills every day and the school backs onto botanical gardens. The students are good fun and the staff caring and helpful. Erica is very contented and happy and is thriving in this highly stimulating environment. She has made lots of friends and receives a great deal of attention. There appears to be no problems with transition for her.

We were also encouraged by a talk delivered in one of our devotional times about the choosing of the seven in Acts 6:1-7. This helped us to put a context to what our mission involves. The seven (including Stephen) were chosen to carry out work in order that the apostles could go out and evangelise in order that the Church could grow. The parallel being: that the parents of the children at Hebron school serve the Lord all over Asia and Africa. They are involved in a variety of Christian works and witness including front line evangelism. We are extremely honored to have the privilege of being a part of educating and caring for their children to enable them to do the work to which they are called. We are the, 'table waiters'.

Be encouraged in the part to which you have been called and no matter how small you think it may be, be encouraged by Stephen's calling to wait on tables and what the Lord eventually accomplished through him through his humble obedience.

#### **Mission Aviation Fellowship**

For nearly 60 years, Mission Aviation Fellowship has been speeding physical and spiritual help to many of the world's most isolated and suffering people. Without its light aircraft, countless thousands of men, women and children would today be

**MAF** are regularly in our prayers, but who are they? And what do they do? Read on!

without adequate food, clean water, medical care and Christian hope. For they are cut off by the difficult terrain beyond which they exist, and deprived of basic necessities for a full and healthy life.

Only aircraft able to land on the most rudimentary airstrips can make practical help available.

From the first twin-engined four-seater Gemini aircraft which took off from Croydon Airport to survey Africa and find out whether a mission in the air was worthwhile, MAF has grown to today's worldwide fleet of over 130 aircraft operating in more than 30 countries.

#### **Best of skills**

Since that very first take-off, MAF has always been determined to meet urgent needs using the best of specialist skills. Pilots of course, landing up to 15 times a day on rough airstrips. But also vital ground staff: engineers, radio technicians, accountants, bookkeepers and administrators.

Working alongside aid and development agencies, missions, national churches and other local groups, MAF carries dedicated workers who bring healing and relief for body, mind and spirit. Penetrating into remote areas by flying across deserts, jungles, mountains and swamps. Giving hope to far-flung communities which often could take days or weeks to reach by land, where roads are non-existent, or totally impassable for half the year.

Sometimes, an MAF plane is even converted into an air ambulance to be a vital link in saving a precious life.

#### **Visionary work**

Every five seconds, someone somewhere in the world goes blind. Every minute, a child goes blind. Of 45 million blind people worldwide, and 135 million visually impaired, 90% live in developing countries. And 80% of global blindness is avoidable. In many countries of MAF's operations,

flights carry dedicated eye teams to remote locations where they perform sight-saving surgery.

The Nuba people of Sudan waited four decades to see an eye doctor as ongoing fighting prevented eye teams visiting the area. But an MAF flight took a Christian Blind Mission team for two weeks to run eye clinics.

'Looking out over the multitudes of people, I felt overwhelmed and I prayed silently: God, give me strength and skills to be able to help these people in the best possible way.' This was Dr Sture Nyholm's prayer as he arrived in the Nuba Mountains. Some people waited for more than two weeks with eager anticipation for the team's arrival in the MAF plane.

Despite operating on an average of 36 patients each day, the queue continued to grow. The team screened 770 patients with 100 seen in the last day. Now, many have new sight. One patient exclaimed, 'Thank you for not forgetting the Nuba people.' This gave the team strength to work a 14-hour day.

Dr Nyholm reflects, 'Our minds are filled with impressions. We think about the 323 operations. We think about those Arabic Bibles, the *Shukuru Yesu* hymnbooks, left with the Presbyterian Church. May your Word have an impact among these people.'

MAF's vital work is enabling thousands of men, women and children to receive both physical and spiritual care.

The head of the other christian, the Skipper, appeared smiling in the hatchway, "You're enjoying yourself up there, aren't you?". "Yes", I replied, "I am rather!" Two old guys in a 32-foot yacht on a lively beat from Southampton to Lymington, just having fun.

Which only goes to show that, while there really is nothing so much worth doing as simply messing about in boats, it helps if you are a bit crazy. And some are more crazy than others. Me, I'm a sucker for the lure of the endless blue - that magic time when the land has dropped below the horizon and you are alone with the sea and the sky. Not all people in boats are so antisocial. The 'Cowes Week' crowd seem to look on sailing as a way to cure the hangovers that result from their earnest social activities ashore!

Our local waters of the 'Trent and Mersey' support their own diversity of water-borne folk, many of them really nice people. You probably know some of them, or may even be one yourself.

With the visit by members of the Boaters Christian Fellowship this month you will have the opportunity to meet some people who, while they use their boats for pleasure, also put them to another extremely good use.



That is, spreading the Gospel, and you can't really get a better use for a boat (or anything else for that matter) than that. Come and meet them; you won't need a lifejacket, but what they have to share with you could save your life, forever!
