the move from vacation to vocation

Time away often means charting the unknown. We might use a real map, rely on the Satnav's relentless instructions, or even trust our own intuition. In all cases it is important to know where you are and where you're going. Even though I've got a reasonable sense of direction, it really does help to know where I'm starting. The words, "You are here" are very helpful, as they makes a big difference to the route to our planned destination.

Jesus instructed his disciples to make disciples. By his resurrection he won victory over the world and so has ultimate authority. Now he commands his disciples: 'Therefore go therefore and make disciples of all nations...' (Mt 28v19). This is to be our first priority. It's not wrong to develop systems in church that enable things to run smoothly. It is not wrong to serve others in the community. It is not wrong to give practical help to the needy, enjoy social events, or run a bookstall. Many such things enable us to be outward looking rather than self-absorbed. It is not wrong to make our services the best that we can. These things are good and important. But they are not our first priority.

Jesus entrusts us with the mission of making disciples of people from all nations. That is his call. The local church's mission is to make disciples who make disciples. Everything we do should do just that. This is the vocation for all who follow Jesus Christ.

To this end we have a three-term programme starting this autumn. The first term called 'Discipleship Explored' provides a time in which to attend more closely to our own walk with Jesus. Subsequent terms provide opportunity to encourage

others to follow in the way of Jesus: whether they have simply lost touch with the church, had a season of being away, or simply are on the edges of belief and want to know more.

This may be uncharted territory, but I hope you will join us on this journey of exploration and discovery.

Christ Church will be streaming the enthronement service of the Rt Revd Michael Ipgrave as Bishop of Lichfield live in the church centre on Saturday 24th September beginning at 10.45. All will be welcome to watch the service

We are awaiting dates from the builders for the commencement of work to the Blower House and stonework at the front of the church

During the Summer Holidays we will be trialling activity sheets for the children to complete during the service.

The budget for the Mission Giving, for the next year, was agreed which consists of 10% of our income.

The PCC thanked Kieran McKnight for all his work as Youth Minister over the last 5 years and wished him and Ashley well with in their mission work in Fujairah, United Arab Emirates

The next PCC meeting is on Wednesday 21st September 2016.

For you, I am a bishop; with you, I am a Christian. Those words of St Augustine will be the first words that (provided all goes to plan) I speak after being placed in the episcopal chair, the *cathedra*, in Lichfield Cathedral on Saturday 24th September. And I will say them in response to a child who will just have reminded me: 'Bishop Michael, never forget that first and foremost you are a child of God'. It is a crucial message for bishops to remember, and really Augustine's words should be in the reverse order: to begin with, a Christian, among Christians, and only then a bishop, for Christians.

It is not only bishops who need to remember that. We talk a great deal about ministry in the Church of England, and so we should: we have rightly rediscovered the ministry of the whole people of God, and the many and varied ways in which the Lord equips so many, lay and ordained, for specific tasks of service in church and world. But before some of us are called to particular ministries, all of us are called to be disciples, to be people who follow Jesus, and who invite others to come along with them and follow him too.

If we forget that, we can become so focused on what we think we have to offer God and his church, on the many different respects in which we are the best thing since sliced bread, that we fail to grasp the starting point of the whole Christian faith, which is not what we reckon we can do for God but what God has done for us - and that is not less than everything. We need to keep coming back to the faith of a child of God to remember that. If I forget that, and become too bound up in being a bishop for you so that I forget that I am a Christian with you, please tell me: remind me that first and foremost I am a child of God, like you. And please pray for me, as I will pray for you. From 15th to 23rd September, I will be travelling around this great diocese to nine different churches where we can pray together; and on the evening of Friday 23rd we will be renewing the vows of our baptism which declare us to be the children of God. We will do that at St Chad's Well in Lichfield, where my predecessor baptised the Mercians of his time. May God bless us and renew us in our following of Jesus now as he blessed them and renewed them then. Bishop Michael

Harvest Sunday - 25th September

Each year at Harvest we support the work of Tearfund. Tearfund is a Christian aid and development agency. Its core belief is that aid must be given regardless of race, religion, nationality or gender.

This year their Harvest campaign focuses on the food crisis in the Sahel region of Africa. It is estimated that 5.9 million children in the region will suffer from acute malnutrition this year. The case study is the village of Hille Bar in Chad. The struggles of the community have been made worse by very high temperatures and a lack of rainfall, leading to crop failure.

Giving envelopes will be available on Sunday 18th. It features Jumana and her daughter Yasmin, Jumana says Yasmin is 'too hungry to play'. You can find out more about the family on the website tearfund.org/yasmin

Please pray for children everywhere whose childhood is marred by hunger.

A story told in One Voice (Tearfund's prayer email) in August.

Since the Syrian conflict began in 2011, refugees have been flooding across the border into Jordan. At the end of July, the UN estimated that there are 660,000 registered Syrian refugees in the country and many more unregistered.

The experiences of refugees were highlighted at the Olympics by Team Refugee.

Their members had survived terrible tragedies and the positive outcomes for them should be celebrated.

For refugees in Jordan, the future is not so positive and a new future for them is just a dream. It is illegal for refugees to work in Jordan so it is impossible for them to make a settled, permanent life in the country.

Shayma (not her real name) and her seven children have been living in Jordan since they fled from Syria in 2012 when their home was destroyed. The family have received emergency supplies from Tearfund but their uncertain situation means Shayma is always nervous and can't rest. She has attended counselling sessions with a Tearfund partner to help her to deal with her situation. She says 'I have felt better and more rested and my relationship with my children is improving – I'm talking to them much more.'

Please pray for people like Shayma and her family. May they find a place that they can call home and build a future for themselves.

Dear Partners, greetings from Botswana.

Boy who brought Salvation to his household through 17 Stories. Told by the mother Mrs. Babopeng Baratedi:

One day my son Tefo five years six months old came home from school and asked me if I knew Adam and Eve. Before I could check my memory lane, he started telling me the story and how they ate the fruit which God told them not to eat. He told me this was sin. I wanted to know what sin was. He told me; "Sin is the things we do, the things we say and the things we think that make God sad." This brew my mind. I wanted to know more.

He would narrate verses from the Bible like: Trust in the Lord with all your heart, do not depend on your own understanding..... (Prov. 3:5 - 6), "Don't worry about anything, instead pray about everything... (Phil. 4:6) and a lot more every time he came from school. These were words that I wanted to hear due to the challenges we were going through.

Tefo would ask questions about these verses, but I, not knowing the Bible would not have answers. Sometimes I would try to dismiss the questioning by telling him to go away but then I would feel guilty for my failure to have answers for my baby as the mother. Then I went to buy a Bible and started reading it for answers. I would prepare for him by noting down the books from where he quoted verses because he would never stop asking until he got the right answers. *(continued)*

Then one day, Tefo came home with several small cards with pictures about the Bible stories. He would look at the picture on the cards and not wanting to embarrass me, he would tell me what was happening in the picture. These cards are very precious to him and to me that I keep them in my purse like I would currency.

One day, Tefo asked if I knew Jesus and where he stays. He then told me that Jesus stays in his heart and keeps it clean and would clean mine too. He also said if we went to Church we would make God happy because staying home on Sunday makes Him sad. This was a great challenge to his father and I. We then started looking for a Church.

This is when I went looking for teacher Robinah at my son's school who was giving him these cards to tell me where I can get the story book. I also wanted to know how I can get Jesus into my heart. She showed me how and I received Jesus Christ and my life has never been the same. Now we love reading the Bible. Our home is indeed blessed to have Tefo as our priest.

With an escalation of violence, it's been a rough ride for people in poverty-stricken South Sudan. With more than 300 more lives lost, and tens of thousands more displaced from their homes, the humanitarian crisis is deepening.

We remain committed to bringing help, hope and healing to those in desperate need, and your prayers are vital.

What flights have we done recently?

Over the last few weeks, MAF has carried out more than 230 hours of relief and emergency flights in South Sudan. Recent flights include:

- Evacuating NGO and mission staff from violence hotspots.
- Flying emergency supplies to areas that have been cut-off, including four tons to a remote village for Tearfund enabling pregnant women, young mothers and malnourished children to receive nutritious food.
- Taking aid workers and emergency supplies to the growing South Sudanese refugee camps across the border in Uganda including Adjumani.
- Bringing supplies for a solar generator to a peace village in Kuron – a Christian initiative that's helped people from different tribes to live in peace and harmony.
- Enabling Every Village's short-term teams to provide help and Christian hope to isolated communities.
- Facilitating a very cool delivery that will help protect nearly 50,000 lives MAF flew a consignment of measles vaccines to Aweil in the north of South Sudan, enabling our partner Medair to vaccinate an astounding 49,483 babies and children and halt the spread of a large-scale measles outbreak that was tragically claiming many young lives. Looking at the six large coolers securely tied down in the back of our Cessna Caravan, MAF Pilot Chris Ball said these were the biggest coolers he'd ever seen. The coolers, measuring 3 feet long by 2 feet high, held thousands of vaccines to immunise between 40,000-60,000 children.

'It was,' Chris said, 'a pretty amazing sight.'

Alicia Morcombe, Medair's Health Manager, explains how the need for the vaccination campaign had become apparent. 'Medair came to Aweil for a multi-sector assessment, and it became clear very quickly that health needs were a huge priority.

'The more communities we visited, the more people told us of children dying of measles. We even heard about one community that was burying children every day who had died from preventable diseases, including measles.'

No time to lose

Children rarely die of measles in the UK because they are routinely immunised against a range of childhood diseases.

It is a level of provision that is rare in South Sudan, where conflict and an under-funded health system – coupled with high rates of malnutrition and poor living conditions – leave children even more susceptible to this highly contagious disease.

'There was no time to lose after our assessment,' Alicia recalls. 'We were able to launch the measles campaign in a week. Medair contacted MAF to request a flight from Juba to Aweil to deliver the vaccines as quickly as possible. level of provision that is rare in South Sudan, where conflict and an underfunded health system – coupled with high rates of malnutrition and poor living conditions – leave children even more susceptible to this highly contagious disease.

'It was imperative that the measles vaccines were kept cool. Along and bumpy trip on insecure roads was out of the question. The vaccines wouldn't remain cool enough.

Going village to village

Just three hours after take-off, Chris landed in Aweil and unloaded the huge coolers of vaccines. Over 40 Medair teams consisting of 290 local staff then travelled village to village, providing measles vaccinations to thousands of children.

At each vaccination site, hundreds of mothers lined up with their little ones, eager for their sons and daughters to receive the life-saving vaccines.
