

#### **Down this hole frightened** [solve this anagram].

Churches have fashions. That might result in a picture of a vicar wearing the latest clerical garb flowing down the aisle to start a service. The likelihood is that few are aware of the change of emphasis from one decade to another in terms of which topics get airtime. There are core beliefs to be proclaimed to each generation, but a shift of weight from one to another over time.

The event called advent means arrival or coming. There are two arrivals that are remembered during the season called Advent (the four Sundays before Christmas). The first is the birth of Jesus Christ, his arrival on the first Christmas. The second is his future return. Both require preparation. Have we almost air-brushed out his second coming? Previous generations had a much stronger emphasis on how Jesus shall come to judge the living and the dead, as the Apostle's Creed puts it.

There may be more emphasis on how God changes the here and now: perhaps its a result of our being wealthier or simply wanting more. It could be that we have sought a deeper experience of joy in worship, thinking that if we drop the difficult hymns and focus on the more touchy-feely words we will achieve just that. But, where there is real hardship the idea of Jesus putting wrongs right is part of the good news. Justice is a good thing. Have we thrown the baby out with the bathwater? The old street preachers used the placard "the end of the world is nigh" (the anagram solution). Would we laugh at this in the High Street today?

We're to prepare for the return of Jesus as our judge when he will also sweep away evil and the effects of sin. Jesus said that he will divide the sheep from the goats, giving eternal life to those who trust and obey him, but banishing those he does not know. Just as ancient Israel prepared for the coming of Jesus the Messiah, 'Immanuel' (God with us), so we are to long for Jesus' return when his people will rejoice when at last our eyes shall see him.

So, let's get ready to celebrate Jesus' birth. But let's also get ready for his return! Do come and join our Christmas celebrations as we look with hope for his return.

#### **Celebration of Reader Ministry**

On October 29<sup>th</sup> a day of celebration for 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Reader Ministry was held in Lichfield Cathedral. Bishop Michael Ipgrave had taken a day off from his holiday in Ireland to lead the day at which approaching 200 Readers were present.

We started with the seemingly obligatory coffee over which many Readers took the opportunity to renew acquaintances and friendships, some with others whom they had not seen for a long time.

Our new Diocesan bishop then outlined his thoughts on the future of Reader ministry in the diocese. He was well placed to do this as, in Southwark Diocese [whence he came], he was Warden of Readers.

He thanked the Readers for the <u>TIME, ENERGY, PRAYER & COMMIT-MENT</u> which they freely offered to their work, and he then described how he saw the twofold core of their ministry.

It is <u>VITAL</u> – no longer being supplementary to the 'real' ministry of priests but an office in its own right with "parity of esteem with ordained clergy"

It is **DISTINCTIVE** - with responsibility for

READING [LEADING] services, banns of marriage, preaching and teaching

VISITING the sick and exercising a pastoral role.

DISTRIBUTING Holy Communion to the people.

He encouraged Readers to maintain enthusiastic engagement with scripture through the <u>RHYTHM</u> of worship, to be at home in the <u>LANDSCAPE</u> of scripture and to have a <u>DIET</u> of scripture. Read, mark, learn and digest it while encouraging others to do likewise.

He then answered questions on a wide range of issues including

Helping Reader ministry to flourish.

Lifelong and Distance learning.

Church attendance numbers.

The funding of work with young people.

Communication.

Future numbers of Readers and priests.

Licensing of Readers to Deaneries rather than parishes.

After a short break the cathedral precentor, [leader of the singing], presided over a service of Holy Communion.

In the afternoon I was joined by Dilys, Helen and John at the service of celebration at which Bishop Michael preached on Isaiah 52 and Romans 10 focusing on the theme – "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news...". (continued)

If we are to be <u>sent out</u> with the <u>good news</u> we must first be <u>called</u>, we are being sent to <u>bring</u> the message of God's <u>love</u> and <u>grace</u>. Readers are trained and qualified to do this in the context of contemporary life when 'Preaching and Teaching' become 'Guidance and Encouragement'. And the sufficiency for all of this comes to us through the Holy Spirit, God present in us today.

#### **Sermon series for December**

Here is a summary of what is coming up at our services as a way of helping to benefit from our church services. Rather than arriving spiritually unprepared and then struggling to engage, a time of prayer and looking over the Bible readings is very helpful.

#### Mornings at Christ Church, Stone & Oulton:

'The Story of Salvation' (Luke 1-2).

We learn that Luke was a doctor who became a follower of Jesus. In his Gospel account of the life of Jesus he records the events leading to the birth of Jesus and the reactions to the news. He double checked the information and wrote it in an orderly way, so that readers could know the certainty of things taught. The text is bursting with songs and prayers of praise. A great lead in to Christmas!

# Mornings at Moddershall & midweek at Christ Church: 'Songs that teach' (Psalms 42-52).

The Psalter provides us with a hymn and prayer book all rolled into one. They are full of anguish and overflow with joy. Life has not changed much. The Lord has not changed and invites us to continue in faith, hope and love. This is a spiritual feast for hungry souls.

#### **Prayer meeting: Saturday 3rd December**

We hold a once per month prayer meeting followed by breakfast. This is usually on the first Saturday of the month (when there is a farmers' market which makes it easier to remember) from 8.30-9.00 a.m. We invite you to make this a priority as we commit our plans to the Lord and ask him to make our ministry fruitful and glorifying to him.

#### **Pastoral Care and Prayer Support**

Within a large church such as Christ Church there is a huge amount of Pastoral and Prayer support that goes on informally – we are a church family so people help and care for each other, pray for each other, do visiting and offer practical help. It is great that congregation members care for each other so well – asking after people who are not there, visiting the sick and befriending those who are lonely. Much of this support seems to happen naturally which is how it should be – we all need to watch out for each other and be Christ's hands and feet in our ministry to others.

However there is also a need for some more formal work to happen and so the Pastoral Support Group is a small group which meets regularly to ensure that the more formal aspects happen as they should. The group arranges for cards to be sent on the  $1^{\rm st}$  anniversaries of formal occasions – after baptisms, weddings and funerals to remind people that even though they might not be regular attenders we are still thinking about and praying for them and we can give support when needed. *(continued)* 

Follow up phone calls are made to the recently bereaved to check if they need our help in any way. The group also reviews the prayer list (read out in church most Sundays) to check if it up to date and if any follow-up visits or phone calls are needed to stay in touch, especially with those who have been on the prayer list for a long time, due to long term health issues. At the group we also offer prayer for any current situations. This group also takes an active part in the annual Christ Church service for the recently bereaved and their families – this is a quiet reflective service held in the Autumn each year – those who have been bereaved in the last 12 months are invited to give thanks for their loved ones and support each other through prayer and quiet time, followed by tea, cake and a chance to talk.

The Pastoral Group are also responsible for our Prayer Circle. The Prayer Circle is a pro-active and quick response group that respond to immediate prayer needs quickly and with great energy. Any acute need for prayer is telephoned around a group of 25 prayer volunteers. Anyone in the circle can initiate the prayer request - the request is passed by telephone to the next on the list, who then passes it on until it completes its way around the full circle. This means that 25 people are praying into the situation, which has to be good news! The prayer situation is confidential to the members of the group and we do not need to know all the details, just a name and what prayer is wanted - a short message gets round the circle more effectively! If anyone would like to be part of this prayer circle then have a word with one of the Pastoral Group Coordinators - Ann Butler on 818160 or Jeanette Rowlands on 816713. If you have a prayer need and would like the members of the circle to pray than please get in touch with Ann or Jeanette.

Church intercessions are also very important - If you would like (with their permission) for someone to be on the prayer list, which is read out in the morning service, then get in touch with the church office on 811990.


The Annual Sermons on behalf of this Society met with better support this year, more than £11 being collected at the Services and Meeting.
