We hope that many of you can join us for the Carol Singing Walk and the final Advent Window opening on Saturday December 23<sup>rd</sup>, starting at 9.30am at the Lock-Keepers salon and ending at Christ Church at 11.00am for refreshments.

## Hope has come!

Life brings many changes. What has been the biggest change in your life? It could be owning a property, getting your first dog, having a new set of teeth, the birth of a child, even a change of career or meeting your future marriage partner. We don't at first always realize the full impact of such a change, even if the immediate change was a really big shift in our worldview. Over time, differences emerge and have a knock-on effect on other people's lives too. How things once were are not how things are now, nor how things will be in the future.

Meeting Jesus changes everything. The bible describes this encounter as being the arrival of hope. So, in describing the change to the followers of Jesus in Ephesus the readers are reminded of life before knowing Jesus: 'remember that at one time you were separated from Christ, alienated from the commonwealth of Israel, strangers to the covenant of promise, having no hope and without God in the world' (Ephesians 2v12). Living without hope leads to some extreme actions being taken in order to try and make sense of life and give meaning to our daily existence. A lack of hope is directly linked to a life lived without God in the world. What will sustain us through hardships and trials? What enables us to endure?

The rest of the sentence highlights the arrival of hope that Christ brings: 'But now in Christ Jesus you who were once far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ' (Eph 2v13). It's an amazing sentence! We can know God. We can know the comfort and enjoyment of being in His presence. This astounding news is at the heart of what we celebrate at Christmas. We prepare for it with the help of our community Advent Windows project and then also at our special Christmas services. When Jesus was born in Bethlehem he was called 'Immanuel – which means God with us' (Matthew 1v23). That means hope has come. It's not wishful thinking that will soon be disillusioned by reality. It is not a fairy tale that we grow out of. This is the message direct from heaven to earth.

You are invited to join our celebrations to discover more about the hope that Jesus brings. Details of Christmas services are found on page 16.

Wishing you a merry Christmas as you learn more of this great hope.

## **Hospital Notes 6**

One of the fascinating aspects of being a Chaplaincy Volunteer is that I meet many people – each one different with a different story to tell.

Recently in conversation with a patient I was told...

"I am frightened and struggling with my faith. Why is it that I feel deserted by God at a time when I need Him most?"

That is quite a challenging question that is not easy to answer; especially in a way that doesn't sound trite (like saying 'trust in God, He's in charge') to someone who is having great difficulty physically, emotionally and spiritually.

The best response that I was able to make was to say...

"Yes, Jesus does understand what is happening and the feelings connected with the circumstances because He, Himself, has experienced the full range of emotions and struggles that anyone can ever go through. In particular, when on the cross in the midst of the agony and anguish of crucifixion He felt totally deserted by people and by God as He cried out...

'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' ...and later as He died

**'Father, into Your hands I commit my spirit'.**But remember Jesus wasn't forsaken – it's only that it felt that way."

When we had finished talking I prayed that the person might receive an assurance and an awareness of God's presence, care and love, and also for the peace that only God can give through Jesus Christ.

I felt inadequate in all this, but thankful when I was told that our talk and the prayers had helped and left the patient feeling more at ease.

As I moved on to the next person I was going to see, I reflected on how humbling it is to be allowed into the deepest parts of someone's thoughts and feelings at a most difficult time in their life.

	Kieran and Ashley McKnight are with Emmanuel Church in UAE. People in the Church come from many countries. Kieran of course was Youth Minister at Christ Church.
1 <sup>st</sup>	We have heard of no response yet to the request for Emmanuel Church to be registered officially. Kieran and pastor Steve have visited the palace. Please continue to pray. Recognition is essential for any permissions, bank accounts etc.
2 <sup>nd</sup>	Christmas in the desert is a strange experience, and Christmas Day is a normal working day. Pray for Keiran and Ashley to feel the significance of the day just as much as they would in Scotland or Ireland.
3 <sup>rd</sup>	Pray for Emmanuel Church, working mainly among ex-pats working temporarily in UAE.
4 <sup>th</sup>	Pray for good health for Kieran and Ashley. Medical treatment can be expensive and difficult to arrange.
	Barnabas Fund - Aid agency for the persecuted church
5 <sup>th</sup>	Please pray for God's guidance and protection on Barnabas Fund's new programme to free Christian bonded labourers in Pakistan's brick kilns. The families are lgally tied to their Muslim employer because of old debts.
6 <sup>th</sup>	A Pakistani Christian has been sentenced to death because of a WhatsApp message he sent. Nadeem James, a tailor, was accused of ridiculing Muhammad
7 <sup>th</sup>	The Islamabad High Court has suggested that Pakistan's National assembly should amend the blasphemy law by fixing a punishment for false accusation. The law is currently misused as a weapon by anyone with a grudge. Pray that this amendment will be passed.

8 <sup>th</sup>	Aideen Strandsson is a well-known Iranian actress who has become a Christian and has travelled to Sweden. She may be deported back to Iran. Pray that she will be kept safe.

# 13Bows and Arrows Ministry in Gaborone and Francistown

Dear Christ Church,

How great to hear from you. Glad you are well and so many people can be in church for harvest.

We are well and still trusting God for each day. Ministry is as good as it can be. This year we opened an office in the second City of Botswana Francistown. The Coordinator is a missionary Pastor originally from Zimbabwe and married to a Motswana lady. He is Pastor Tafirenyika Usavi by Name. We have had two training Sunday School Teachers and Youth leaders. Its been exciting. We get on a night train on Friday leaving Gaborone at 2100 hours arriving at 0600 hours. We do training from 0800 to 1700 hours and get on the train at 2100 hours and arrive at 0600 in Gaborone Sunday morning. The train is like the bus with fewer bumps. We have mainly used the second class which provides more legroom than third class. We used third class once because there were no seats in second. We are praying we use the first one of these trips.

Francistown celebrates 120 years this year. It has always benefited from Zimbabwe especially for trade having more people across. Unfortunately it is a mining town but mines are closing. The Zimbabwe economy too is improving and both countries do not allow free trade. So some expatriates are moving back to Gaborone. We pray it is temporary.

Prayer item: 1. On November 18 and 19, 2017, we were back in Francistown using the same transport method for training and Launching of the ministry there Sunday.

- 2. We have also appointed coordinators for Ghanzi (700km West of Gaborone) and one for Maun (close to 1000km North). We may start training in Ghanzi in December 9, 2017 and Maun in January.
- 3. In Gaborone, we are introducing Foundations for Farming for children and Youth this year. It's main objective is to help children receive God's word in a context that touches them deeply unemployment, food security etc while they are still young. Pray for stronger partnerships.

- 4. The girls would like to come home early next year. Pray for logistics.
- 5. The car from the dealer is still available but still need to pay U\$1200 for even a better car than he had promised. Thank God Faith Car still moves at least around.

#### Heaven, How I Got Here...

The book is less than 100 pages in length, but once you start reading it is almost impossible to stop before you get to the end of the story. It was heart warming to hear of his slow progress, learning to walk by the age of 3 and now at 6 starting at school which he is enjoying. He now has a younger brother and sister who call him "No No", as they prevent him doing things that might harm him.

An inspiring talk which made us realise how a handicapped life can produce so much love and caring around it. Our grateful thanks to Andrea, and we will look forward to hearing more of Caleb's progress in the future.

## 17 The Topsy-turvy World of Christian Living!

Most of us have had one of those moments that we would rather forget...but can't. Flicking the duster round carelessly, you break the beautiful pottery vase that has been in the family for generations. In a hurry to get home on a clear road, you get caught by the Camera Safety Team (53 MPH in a 40 MPH area). I am sure you know the sort of thing I mean.

You then replay the event over and over again in your mind with phrases like "if only...", "what if I had just been a bit more careful"...and so on.

It's the "and so on" that's the real problem! The event is replayed in our minds like a continuous record. We try not to think about it, but it keeps coming back. It's a real battle.

In Revelation 12:10ff the writer describes the war in heaven and we read -

"Then I heard a loud voice in heaven say: "Now have come the salvation and the power and the kingdom of our God, and the authority of his Messiah. For the accuser of our brothers and sisters, who accuses them before our God day and night, has been hurled down".

The problem we face is that the accuser will keep at it "day and night". However, we must remember that the fantastic news is that accuser has no real power. Jesus Christ has the controlling power and he willingly lets us share in it.

Now, when these recurring, accusatory thoughts occur, use them as a springboard for a specific prayer which you repeat as soon as the thought comes back into your mind. For example in the case of the smashed vase you could pray for someone you know whose life is broken at the moment. Every time you remember what <u>you</u> did <u>they</u> will be prayed for!

So the bad memory becomes an aid to prayer, and if the accuser has anything to do with the ongoing nagging self recrimination, transforming the memory into a specific prayer in this way, will soon remind him that ...."The accuser of our brothers and sisters, who accuses them before our God day and night, has been hurled down."

It may seem a "topsy-turvy" idea but it has the effect of diminishing the power of the guilty memory, and at the same time moving us on in prayer. Our Tearfund Appeal at Harvest supported the South Asia Floods Emergency Appeal.

£871.50 was raised (including gift aid). Thank you for your donations.

The catastrophic flooding in August left more than 1,200 people dead across India, Bangladesh and Nepal. It is estimated that 41 million people have been affected by the devastation.

Tearfund and its partners were quick to respond as nearly 750,000 homes were destroyed or damaged. Crops and livestock were washed away. Now that the floods have receded, they are continuing to bring help to where it is needed.

In Bangladesh, a nation also coping with a large influx of refugees from Myanmar, partners LAMB and Baptist Aid gave out essential life saving items. These included water bottles, water purification tablets and hygiene kits for women and adolescent girls, as well as medical support.

#### **Case Study**

During the flooding in Bangladesh, Bibha's house was washed away. The family were able to shelter in a neighbour's house. She and her eldest daughter fell ill with a fever but the roads had been destroyed so they couldn't get to the health centre for help. Bibha watched her daughter slowly deteriorating. A LAMB medical team set up a camp in her village and they received treatment. Bibha says 'Now we are both fine – I thank LAMB for their generous and timely support. Without them I couldn't have saved my daughter.' (Cecilia set up a nurse training course at LAMB hospital.)

Tearfund plans to provide more assistance to help households recover. This includes provision of seeds and fertilisers to farmers, cash grants to buy foods and house repairing materials, educational materials for schools, portable stoves and ovens and safe drinking water points.

## **Christ Church 132 years ago**

#### **RE-OPENING OF THE ORGAN**

A special service was held on Friday, December 11<sup>th</sup>, on the occasion of the re-opening of the Organ. Prayers were read by the Vicar and the Rev A. Pearman; the Lesson by the Rev N. Poyntz, Rural Dean, and the Archdeacon, Sir Lovelace T Stamer preached a very appropriate sermon upon Psalm xlvii 7. The offertories then and on Sunday amounted to £13, which has been given to the Church Restoration Fund. At the conclusion of the Service, Dr Taylor, F.C.O (of St Mary's, Stafford), gave an Organ Recital which was listened to with much interest and pleasure by the congregation.

The Organ, as our readers are aware was originally given by Mrs. Foden, and it is through her liberality that the several additional stops have been placed in the organ, and the extra cost of the oak frontage to the chancel has been defrayed.

## CHURCH EXTENSIONS, 1885 (from the history by Rev J R Line)

The Rev W J Thompson introduced a scheme for the restoration of the church. The issue of this movement was the building of a new chancel, the re-seating of the organ (the gift of Mrs Foden, of Edge Hill) from the gallery to the chancel, the erection of a new pulpit, and other minor improvements. This work was effectually carried out in 1885. A brass lectern was presented by Misses Masefield, and a font was given two years later as the children's memorial of the Queen's Jubilee in 1887. About this time also the Stonefield School was enlarged, and a new wall erected fronting the Vicarage and Churchyard in Radford Street.

The Rev W J Thompson, supported by a succession of curates, re-organized the pastoral work of the parish, and for 12 years took the lead in many branches of pastoral, social, and evangelistic work, until, in 1894 he left for Holy trinity, Leicester.




