

It's that month! After all the feasting of Christmas comes the fasting of January. Some have renamed it 'Dry January' (soft drinks only) or even the more recent 'Veganuary' (meat and animal product free) for the whole month.

Just before you do so, there is a reason to keep celebrating! A lesser-known festival has inspired the church since about the year 200 A.D. It lands on 6<sup>th</sup> January and has been known to be an eight-day feast that was cut down to one day. Why celebrate?

The word Epiphany (from the Greek *epiphaneia*) means manifestation or appearance and is derived from a verb meaning "to appear." In the New Testament the word is used in reference either to the birth of Christ or to his appearance after his resurrection, and five times to refer to his second coming (his return at the end of the age). It is associated with the visit of the Magi (Matthew 2v1-12) when Jesus appeared to the non-Jewish, or Gentile, world.

The appearance of Jesus Christ to the Gentile world is a very big deal in the New Testament. The angels included the germ of this idea in Jesus' birth announcement, when they proclaimed to the shepherds that his birth was good news for the whole world, a Saviour has been born who is Christ the Lord. The welcoming of Gentiles stands out in the gospel accounts as the promise begins to be worked out on a much grander scale. By the time you get into the history of the early church in the Acts of the Apostles then the uniting of Jew and

Gentile (previously two hostile groups) is made possible through the cross of Christ. Jesus made a new covenant in his blood – a new way of approach to God was established through the death and resurrection of Jesus. The apostle Paul revelled in the fulfilment of many Old Testament promises, for example: '*Rejoice, O Gentiles, with his people'* and also – (continued)



'The root of Jesse will spring up, one who will arise to rule over the nations the Gentiles will hope in him' (Romans 15v10, 12 which quotes from the Old Testament). The Messiah (or Christ) is for Jew and Gentile alike. We are all to put our faith in him.

Will this year be the year that you will consider Jesus for the first time, or engage with the gospel message more deeply? Why not take the opportunity to make an appearance yourself at our Sunday services and begin to see more clearly the Christ?

May God grant you many blessings in the year ahead as you do this!

### Resolution

"Life with mixed emotions", that's how I would describe my life in 2017. It has been a life-changing year for so many reasons, lots of activities, events, experiences and exciting things to be grateful for. In some cases, life has been hectic, erratic, challenging, demanding, inspiring and joyous too. I could write a book. In the midst of all these, I can't recall a single day in the last 12 months where I had to pause and had a personal meditation and reflection. Obviously, I think through things carefully and talk to friends, relative, parents and pray about things, but setting few minutes aside for meditation and reflection has been a neglected area in 2017 for me. Therefore, my New Year's Resolution for 2018 is '*Meditation and Reflection Practice'*, the aim is to set aside time (10 - 20 minutes at least) each day to meditate and reflect on my daily, weekly or monthly activities that have occupied my life.

How I got motivated? To tell you the truth, I am not a New Year resolution person, I don't remember having one. During the month of November this year, my daily Bible reading from Word for Today has been focusing on the theme of meditation, the writer put the opening sentence this way: "Meditation isn't something difficult and mysterious that only scholars and 'spiritual' people do. It's just thinking deeply and continuously about a passage of Scripture, letting it take root, and 'owning it' until it becomes a life force operating within you each day. The point isn't how much Scripture you memorise, it's what happens to you in the process. It enriches your thinking and equips you by making you think different thoughts than if you were watching TV, for example, or texting, or talking on your mobile phone, or shopping. Meditating on God's Word is the cure for moral and spiritual weakness; for a life with no focus; for a lack of intimacy with God ... ".

I know there is scientific evidence as well that show the many benefits of meditation. To name just a few, meditating helps to improve your mood, it reduces stress, it lessens anxiety, and it even increases your brain's grey matter — which is involved in muscle control, sensory perception, decision making, and selfcontrol. In today's busy world, setting time for meditation is challenging, but once you get the hang of it, meditating is easy to do. *(continued)* 

### Resolution (cont)

My goal is not to help me improve my mood, or reduce work stress, or to be spiritually stronger or weaker, and it's nothing to do with those things that I have mentioned above. For sure they are a great motivation, but they are not my target goals as such. My goal is to experience that moment of quietness, and have that personal meditation to reflect on my daily activities for a full year or longer and hope it to be my habit. For sure I expect that a well devoted and planned meditation and reflection to have some sort of impact, but I am not sure what the impacts would be by December 2018, but one thing I know "I won't regret it". To get motivated and set a reminder, I am hoping to get something unusual, a prayer kneeler for Christmas, else I will buy one, that will be a good reminder for me on my daily, weekly and monthly meditation. Your prayers, tips, ideas, encouragements etc. are most welcome. Anisa

### An upcoming birthday

We don't normally mention birthdays, but in 2018 the church building will be 150 years old, and perhaps we can make an exception! An excerpt follows from the church website:-

"During the late 18th century and 19th century the Industrial Revolution caused an enormous increase in England's population, and coupled with an evangelical revival, St Michael's building was not big enough. In 1836 the Rev. Charles Simeon attended a conference at Meaford Hall with Lord St Vincent and the Rev. Francis Kitchin, a curate at St Michael's, and they decided to form a new parish to serve the north end of the town. The site was given by Lord Granville and the building money was raised by public subscription. The first stone was laid on June 28, 1838, by the Right Hon Mary Anne, Viscountess St Vincent, the same day Queen Victoria was crowned. The church took two years to build and was consecrated on April 23, 1840, by the then Bishop of Lichfield. Francis Kitchin was the first vicar at Christ Church or 'perpetual curate' as he was known and he held the living until he died in 1852".

On a snowy Sunday in Advent a little donkey stood all alone under a black plastic shopping bag in a garden. Inside he could hear people laughing, as they drank glasses of port and ate Portuguese Christmas biscuits. They were admiring a beautiful Nativity scene, and wondering if this was the 'Advent Window' they had come to see.

How could it be? An Advent Window should be viewed from outside a building. 'Was there no 'window' at the Mill this year?', they asked each other.

At 11.00am everyone was encouraged to go back outside to 'open the window'. The black bag was removed and there in the garden stood a little grey donkey waiting to carry Mary to Bethlehem... relevant Bible verses were read and then, standing in the snow, we sang:.

Been a long time little donkey Thro' the winter's night. Don't give up now little donkey Bethlehem's in sight...

*Little donkey, carry Mary Safely on her way* 

It never ceases to amaze me how beautifully each 'window' display illustrates the Advent story. Now in it's 8<sup>th</sup> year, the Advent Windows project has become an established part of the Christmas festivities in Stone. The enthusiasm and creativeness of the different groups of children and adults has not waned over the years. One of the greatest delights is overhearing a young child telling friends and relatives – 'I made that star... or angel... or donkey'.

Praise God for the opportunities we have to share the real meaning and purpose of Christmas with everyone in Stone.

# Turning over a new leaf?

No, this is not about New Year Resolutions. To be honest, I have never kept any for more than a few weeks and have now given them up entirely!

However there's a similar problem with lists of names that I write down for prayer. They are penned with enthusiasm and care, and for a week or two the list is a help. Then the prayer gets missed for a day or two and, to my shame, I have even been known to forget where I put the list!

Chatting with people about their prayer life, has led me to the conclusion that this is not only my problem.

So why not get out the scissors and cut that list up?

Not to destroy it, you understand, but to make each name into a separate slip of paper. These are then placed in one of two containers. Each day you take a slip of paper from the first receptacle; pray for that person and then put them in the second container, handing them over to God's loving care as you do so.

Don't pray for too many people each day, about three is a good number. Interestingly, if your list had about twenty names, at this rate after just a week everyone will be prayed for and you simply swap the bowls over and start again.

Using this method helps you to really concentrate on the people who suddenly, unexpectedly come before you, "out of the hat" as it were. Occasionally you may feel a particular concern for the person named on the slip of paper in front of you. This may nudge you into giving them a quick phone call.


It's not uncommon in these circumstances to find that the person you phoned is going through a particular crisis and is deeply moved that you have remembered them.

Is this just a co-incidence? If we believe that the Holy Spirit guides us and leads us maybe its far more wonderful than just chance.

If you are finding your prayer list a bit of a burden, why not give this method a try? Each time you randomly draw out a name, you could think of it as "turning over a new leaf"!

# Christ Church 132 years ago

We wish you all a truly happy and blessed New Year. May it be one of increased usefulness in the Master's service! Thus shall there be increased experience of the Master's blessing; only let us strive to do all things for His sake, and we shall never grow weary in well doing: the sameness of our daily life will lose its monotony in the freshness of each day's personal consecration to our Lord. We would draw attention to the increased facilities attending Holy for Communion. There will he two administrations in the month at 8am, one at morning and one evening services: also in the afternoon at Meaford whenever there is a 5th Sunday. Our object is to meet the special needs of all, while giving preference to the early Communion as that which is most desirable: it is then the spirit is fresh and the mind most free from weariness, and if we are engaged in any special work for the Master-it is helpful to begin the day with a service in which we are taught that we are not alone, but members one of another and co-workers. I would also hint that to the young Christian athlete, it helps to preserve from that bane of many a Christian's life, late rising on Sunday mornings. Let us in the New Year "Go forward". #### Temperance and Mutual Improvement Meetings

The first of the Monthly Meetings for Improvement and Debate was held in the Upper School-room, on Monday, January 11th. The subject being "Local Option". The attendance was large and most encouraging. A paper was read on the subject by Rev. A. Pearman, showing the importance from the failure of past legislation to check the great excess in drinking. The principle of local option (i.e. the control by the people over the licensing system, either by decreasing the present number of publichouses or in the granting of new licenses) has been endorsed by Parliament, the Lower House of Convocation and many eminent Statesmen. An animated debate followed, led by Dr. E. Fernie. The discussion was carried on with great spirits, and speaks well for the future of our Society. We were glad to see many ladies present to show their interest in our SO undertaking.

# **Charles Wesley's visit to Stone**

The below was found in researches by my Uncle, a Methodist Minister, whilst researching Wesley for work he is involved in at Gwennap Pit in Cornwall.

In Mrs. (Charles) Wesley's old age, she used to relate the experiences of these days (i.e. when she rode pillion with her husband on his preaching tours in their early marriage before the children arrived) with a great deal of humour. One day she and her husband arrived at Stone in Staffordshire, and she sat down to rest in the inn garden which adjoined the parsonage grounds. She was singing a Methodist hymn to herself when the Vicar and his daughters came to their side of the hedge and listened, complimented her upon her voice and asked for her help in the choir the following Sunday. She said she would be happy to sing if her husband might preach, but when the Vicar understood who she was, he declined to lend his pulpit, even with such an inducement.

No date is given in the book - but the visit to Stone would have been between April, 1749, when Charles Wesley & Sarah Gwynne were married near Brecon, and 1756 when he gave up being an itinerant preacher. The oldest child (of 8, only 3 survived), was John, born 1752, who died of small pox (caught from his mother) a year later. So that could mean Sarah was journeying with him for around three years only, i.e. 1749 to 1752
