Also, PCC meetings, Care home communion, Alleyne's assembly, Fairtrade stalls, Sunday school, Everybody Welcome and other occasional activities.

Perhaps, at the times that these events would have taken place, we can pray for the people who are normally involved.

Cancelled events. Empty entertainment centres. Stockpiling. Social distancing. Illness. Death. Economic disruption. Lock down. Who would have thought this would be the stark memories of 2020? These things make us think again.

Thank God for being able to celebrate Jesus' resurrection. The one who is stronger even than death provides us with genuine hope. His resurrection is the basis for walking by faith rather than by sight at this difficult time.

We have become acutely aware of being weak in the face of disease: 'all humans are like grass, and all their glory is like the flowers of the field; the grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of the Lord stands forever' (1 Peter 1v24-25 quotes from Isaiah 40v6-8). Permanence is found in the word of the Lord, since what He promises He delivers. The incredible promise of Jesus rising three days after his death on a cross show that God's word is sure.

We have become acutely aware that we can't control our world. We might be able to change the temperature of our house, optimize the growth of crops, modify our appearance, eat a good diet to remain healthy, with the help of medicine we can even alleviate suffering. But we cannot control everything. The LORD God Almighty is the revealed name of God, since He alone is sovereign.

We have learnt a new term: social distancing. A shunning of those who are possible carriers of infection is socially painful. We were made in the image of God with dignity and the capacity for relationships. To be denied this hurts.

We have learnt of our need for God! The God of the Bible is our creator, sustainer provider and protector. We are fallen beings who are in need His forgiveness and strength to live His way. The risen Lord Jesus Christ provides these things when we turn back to Him, trust and obey: 'For you were like sheep going astray, but now you have returned to the Shepherd and overseer of your souls' (1 Peter 2v25).

Hospital Notes 23

Before Christmas I was asked if I would be willing to help with the Sunday Morning Holy Communion services at County Hospital. Although I am often busy in our own churches I agreed to give it a try.

And so on 16th February I turned up just after 9am. There was a surprising amount to be done. First the lists of people to be visited were allocated and I was sent off with 10 patients to see – the first of which had asked for Communion on the ward.

The last patient I saw had just been telling me about a favourite hymn (“In Christ Alone...” which generally brought tears to their eyes) when another volunteer came along with wheelchair transport to the chapel. Imagine my reaction when this hymn was printed out on a separate sheet for us to sing!

At 11am the worship began and we had a full service of Holy Communion including the 3 set lectionary readings, sermon and intercessions. I had been asked to read the Gospel and lead short intercessory prayers.

At the end I helped by returning one patient to EOU (one of the wards I visit on a weekly basis) and then my work was done.

I arrived back home at 12.30 after a very good morning at the hospital although the time commitment means I certainly won't be able to do this very often.

The Inn Ringers – 43 Years Young

The Inn Ringers are a group of handbell ringers who originally came together in 1977 practising in a room above the Red Lion in the High Street, Stone. Back then, most of the people in the team lived in Stone, today it's a different story – they now base themselves at St Luke's Church Hall in Tittensor and no members of the team live in Stone.

Musical Director Paul Mellor (originally from Stone) says 'I have no idea how it came about that all our Stone ringers moved on. We are in a situation now where we need to recruit some new ringers so we can safeguard the future of the team'.

Paul goes on to say 'like so many traditional art forms and past times, bell ringing is out of favour – people have busy lives and don't like the long-term commitment. I get that, but it is sad to hear about handbell teams disbanding or struggling to get people to join their ranks to make practise nights worthwhile'.

Over the last 43 years they have performed with their 116 handbells in concerts in many parts of the country, highlights being a performance at the Barbican in London and playing at the Victoria Hall in Hanley. The team have recorded three albums and made numerous TV appearances. They do an annual charity concert and a Christmas concert every year, these are the dates in their calendar they most look forward to.

Paul says 'Getting new members is a difficult task, without some new recruits the Inn Ringers will be forced to pack away their bells for good. We have to try to keep our traditional activities going – once we lose them, they will be gone for good'.

All you need to a member of the Inn Ringers is commitment, enthusiasm, a sense of humour and a sense of rhythm. You don't even have to be able to read music - the Inn Ringers have their own music notation that can be picked up in minutes. The commitment is attending a weekly practise (Monday evenings at St. Luke's Church Hall in Tittensor) and honouring the concert bookings we get. The team often get together socially and generally enjoy the camaraderie of being part of a team. It is great hobby to become involved with.

With the potential for school closures hitting the headlines, let us celebrate what has been managed to teach children about Jesus in the schools these terms.

We are a few weeks away from the Easter Holidays now, and so it's been nearly two whole terms of the Trekkers clubs in both Oulton First School, and Christ Church First School.

And what an exciting opportunity it has been!

We have been exploring the parables that Jesus teaches us in the Bible, unpacking what they might mean to our lives. And we've covered quite a few! From the Lost Sheep, to the parable of the two servants, to the parable of the Sower, we've learnt lots about who Jesus is and how he can teach us how to live, as well as who Jesus says that we are.

We've learnt about forgiveness and kindness, and remembering to pray to God and being sorry when we've done things wrong. I have been blown away by the wisdom and maturity that the children have shown when discussing and responding to stories that deal with these themes.

We've also played many games! Wink murder has become a particular favourite with the children at Oulton, and both groups have loved the treasure hunts to find items or words relevant to the story we are looking at that week.

And who could forget the crafts. While there have been many messes (the sponges and water session to represent Jesus washing us with his forgiveness led to a certain amount of spilled water and soap!) the children have often managed to take away colouring in and crafts relevant to the story. They particularly enjoyed the cotton wool sheep last week!

We've had lots of fun in these clubs over the past few weeks. But we've also always looked at a story about Jesus in the bible, and examined what we think the passage is saying that could help us in our lives. As is said in the book of Matthew: 'Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."' (Matthew 19:14) Hopefully despite the volatile situation, there will still be the opportunity in the future to let the children hear and learn about Jesus because the kingdom of heaven belongs to them too. *Peter*

Hello again, We hope you are well and thank you once again for joining with us in the evangelism and encouragement for Croatia and the Balkans. Your endeavours are by no means in vain. The Dubrava Church is now FULLY PLANTED, Praise the LORD! October 1st 2019 our new pastor Teofil and his wife Petya moved into their new apartment in the church as Teofil took over as the pastor of the Baptist Church Dubrava, Zagreb. As we experience their style and ministry these last 3 months we can only say, "Hallelujah, God has given us a great couple". They have over 20 years of experience and are enthusiastic and very much "hands on". The building project has also come to an end and is looking sparkling clean. This church, God willing, will now go places. Congregations are on the up and optimism is in the air. So, it should be, with our God.

Stephen & Tabita are moving on... Study Leave in UK and relocation to Varaždin We started the Dubrava church back in 2004, together with another missionary couple and the central 1st Baptist church in Zagreb. Now it is a fully fledged church, with its own building and at our request, we appointed the new pastor. Now our church-planting task is completed and we are free to move on. The pastor has taken over preaching and teaching, we have handed the youth work over to be led by the youth themselves and Tabita will hand over the children's work and church worship group. As our son Benjamin finishes his Grammar School in Croatia this year, it is "The Great Opportunity" for us to take some study leave and fully recharge our batteries in preparation for the next decade of ministry. Thus September 2020 we both study at Capernwray Bible College, together with Benjamin. We will be living out, as he moves on campus with the other students. Thanks to all who provided for Benjamin's fees, now pray that we (God) would raise money for our fees and accommodation totalling £10,000. Varaždin – We are moving Sept 2021 to this town 50 miles north of Zagreb and we already have a great relationship with Pastor Jonatan (Tabita's cousin), the leadership and the Brazilian missionaries. They have small churchplants in two nearby towns and want to open 3 other towns for the Gospel. There will be plenty of work!
