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Wisdom from the Apostle in isolation

It was hard to foresee the lockdown. Although some spoke about it years before. For example, following the Ebola outbreak in 2014 it was suggested by Bill Gates (former head of Microsoft) that it was time to put all our good ideas into practice, from scenario planning to vaccine research to health worker training. For the next global catastrophe would not be a bomb, but a virus. Sketching out a disrupted world is not quite so new, as the English author James Ballard wrote in the sixties about environmental disaster. What do we do now?

The main strategy has been to stay home and stay healthy. What is primarily a global health disaster has seen alarming figures of infection and the proportion of deaths that have resulted is larger than we feared. Public support for our health workers, who have given their all, is heartening. But the ramifications on mental health, unresolved grief and the challenge of future conditions (both economic and social) have yet to be seen. *(continued)*

Apparently the first point in a disaster manual is the reminder that the disaster will eventually pass. Perhaps that will be the case when you read this. But we need a lot more to sustain us than knowing there is a finishing tape to break through.

The writers of the Bible faced huge difficulties and severe trials, but were inspired by God to deliver his word. It is this word which is precious for today. The Apostle Paul spent time in the isolation of prison, where he wrote many letters to sustain others in their own struggles. To the church at Philippi he encouraged them to rejoice in the Lord in all circumstances. We sometimes say, "count your blessings" and might even decide to write on paper things we can thank God for during the day to use later on in a time of prayer.

But Paul also gives an instruction that is like opening the window for fresh air: 'Whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things. Whatever you have heard or learned from me or seen in me – put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you' (Phil 4v8-9). We can fill our minds with good and uplifting things, or with things that unhelpfully lead in a downwards spiral. When we fix our eyes on God's gifts then we will be sustained, but also inspired to continue to pray and serve where we can at this time of national emergency and beyond.

It makes challenging reading at this time of rapid and severe climate change. She argues strongly and convincingly how people and the natural world were created to work together in harmony. Our dominion over the earth really means to care for and give back to nature rather than to help ourselves without regard to the consequences. Pillaging the planet to satisfy our want and greed is no longer acceptable.

I listened to an American author being interviewed about the current situation on the radio recently. Her opinion was sought about the assertion being made that when life returns to a more normal state that there will be a transformation in the way we live, work and travel. Her answer surprised me. **“No”, she replied, “In the States we said life would never be the same again after 9/11 but when things returned to normal we carried on as before and nothing has changed for the better”.**

How terribly sad that the human race never seems to learn from experience.

So what should we do? Well, of course, we can all do our best to live responsibly with due regard for others of every race, creed and colour; we can do our bit for recycling and conservation; we can even sew scrubs to help the NHS at this time of shortage but none of this will solve all the problems.

So what I do, alongside all of that, is to put my faith and trust for the future in God who created me and says to me...

“Fear not, you are mine, I will always be with you because I am your Saviour and I love you”

2nd	Pray that cancellations will not stop work going ahead, maybe now through other routes and methods instead
3rd	Pray about Go Wild (May 22), and the SU conference scheduled for the beginning of June
4th	Inspire on Facebook gives daily sharable Bible engagement videos. Join in if you can (see page 17)
	<i>Stephen and Tabita Bell are planting churches in Croatia</i>
5th	On Sunday 22nd March, Zagreb was struck by an earthquake at 6:24 am, 5.4 on the Richter Scale.. Pray for the 27,500 people whose homes were damaged, that repairs might be possible at this difficult time.
6th	Croatia is in a “lockdown” much stricter than we have in the UK. Pray for the church as everyone is confined to their house.
7th	Varaždin – We are moving Sept 2021 to this town 50 miles north of Zagreb and we already have a great relationship with Pastor Jonatan (Tabita's cousin)
8th	There are 2 small churchplants in Varaždin and the aim is to open 3 other towns for the Gospel
	<i>Tear Fund works in many countries to support poor people and show God’s love in practical ways.</i>
9th	Pray for Venezuelan refugees in Colombia, that they will be able to access food during the pandemic and be able to feed their families.

18th	We now have a proper partnership with Scripture Union and need more space to start trainings. Things are moving really fast and we thank God
19th	Pray for the new pastor in Jonathan’s local church, as the church tries to reach people despite “Lockdown”

Coronavirus and Earthquake

We, the Bell family, are all well here in Zagreb and all the people we know. Thank you for your prayers and well wishes. I believe the correct terminology is "shaken, but not stirred" The Corona Virus is making its Mexican Wave throughout the world. As it greets every country, similar scenes are repeated. May we just say that the Croatian government and authorities are top notch and we thank the Lord for them that they have been responsible, firm and loving all at the same time. Immediately after having returned from UK March 9th , I was placed in house isolation, with a threat of £1000 fine if I ventured out, which was highly motivating. Joshua flew in a few days later from Germany to embrace a similar situation. The last month, Tabita and I are together with Sheona, Joshua and Benjamin and it is a privilege for us all. Chaos around, but joy and family all together. Then at 6.24 AM Sunday morning our world exploded, shook and trembled. 5.4 on the Richter scale may not sound much to some, but when it is all happening directly underfoot it is rather different. I was in the kitchen and the walls suddenly vibrated, seemingly 20cm (8 inches) left to right. The floor seemed to come upwards and I was already outside within seconds. Then I raced upstairs and coaxed the other 4 from their shock to get dressed and wait outside in safety. All Zagreb was awake. We survived well.

One 14yr girl died, 27,500 had serious damage to their houses and 2000 buildings were not usable. 400 people were displaced into the Student Dorms.

All this on top of the Corona Crisis was enough for all the people of Zagreb, and indeed, for all Croatia. Zagreb is on a real Lockdown and all access to the Adriatic islands is blocked to non-islanders. As 25% of Croatian GDP comes from tourism, the crisis will outlive Corona.

So, like a lot of people, the car is spotless inside and out, the garden is tidy (wish I could say "weed free") those neglected areas are no longer neglected and 'put off' decorating is now up to date.

We're the fortunate ones though, we have a house with enough room to 'social distance' should we want to, a lovely garden for fresh air and relaxation, access to open spaces and we're able to take a stroll from our front door and easily avoid close contact with people, and we have the equipment to keep in touch with friends and family including access to the wonderful weekly church services, which, at a time when it's hard to tell what day it is, have made Sundays feel, well, like a Sunday should.

I'll be glad to get back to normal, whenever that happens, but I'll miss the lazy get ups and the slower pace of life.
