

## 6 **When someone refuses to forgive you...**

---

Ruptured relationships are stressful and distracting. The strained relationship may have started with a difference of opinion, or ill-chosen words to express a contrary view, or actions that were damaging to another person's standing or throws doubt on the person's character. It hurts. The resulting stand-off, or wall of silence, in damaged relationships are difficult enough to observe, but very painful to experience. Forgiveness is like a healing balm which avoids further rancour or bitterness.

What is the formula for this balm of forgiveness? It's hard to define the word 'forgive' without using the word 'forgive'. Try it and see! Forgiveness is when both parties recognise a genuine change of heart that makes reconciliation possible. Three ingredients make the balm: the restoration of an attitude of love, since wrongdoing is not a reason for not loving the wrong doer; the working through of pain, anger and alienation until both parties sense that the repentance process is satisfactory; the reopening of a future that is met with trust and good will which permits the risk and possibility of further failure of conflict.

Forgiveness is vital to making relationships work. If someone is unwilling to forgive you for a wrongdoing, then all that you can do is to forgive the other person's attitude and continue to pray for them. Yet, we must also recognise just how deeply a person has been hurt. We must consider with sober reflection what caused a loss of trust in us and maybe how there were other things that caused hurt.



Perhaps the unwillingness to forgive is due to the other person thinking that we've trivialised what they see as deeply hurtful. Maybe putting ourselves in their place and ask: 'How would I have reacted?' and also, 'how would I have wanted to be treated?'

We've recently been learning from Joseph's life of faith as recorded in Genesis. There are many sinful actions, tensions, and jealousies in the family. It is clear that Joseph must have truly longed to be reconciled over many years, since he was prepared when he met with his estranged family. The Psalmist prayed: *'Search me, God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts. See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting'* (Psalm 139v23-24).

If someone does not seem prepared to forgive us, then we must humbly come to the Lord with the same prayer as the Psalmist. We are not to give up praying for the other person, since only the Lord can change hearts and bring about reconciliation. In the meantime, we are to communicate our sorrow for our wrong to them. Meeting face to face may be a way off, or hard to set up, but writing a note can be significant in expressing our wrong.

Most importantly we are to seek the Lord's forgiveness for what we have done. He paid the highest price to make forgiveness possible: *'For Christ died for sins, once for all; the righteous for the unrighteous to bring you to God'* (1 Peter 3v18).

Let's pray that we show loving kindness to others and also to practise forgiveness when relationships are under strain.

	<i>Scripture Union—pray for work among young people</i>
1st	Scripture Union’s new resource “Shine your light” is now available, providing youth leaders and Faith Guides with practical ways to share faith with young people
2nd	Training courses on “Introduction to Schools Ministry” will be held during November
3rd	SU’s Mental Health Suite is designed to help with conversations about bereavement. Following the death of Queen Elizabeth, many people have expressed fears and doubts about death
4th	Pray for the Singapore SU team as they prepare for SUPA camps for primary age children in November and December
	<i>Stephen and Tabita Bell are planting churches in Croatia</i>
5th	Stephen and Tabita are working to establish regular church meetings in the nearby town of Novi Marof. £400 is needed each month to rent premises for the church. Some local people did attend church but meetings stopped during the pandemic
6th	Stephen writes “Emanoel and I have been motivated to write a book on the power of working together, with the view to encouraging people across denominations to co-operate wherever possible and, more to the point, refrain from criticism and competition.”
7th	Further integrated into the Varaždin church—Stephen and Tabita are now part of the leadership team here and are leading a housegroup
8th	Maria (refugee from Ukraine) now has a rented flat and lives there with her 2 children. The Croatian government pays the rent and ECM pays a small monthly allowance for food, heating etc
	<i>TearFund works with many poor communities across the world. They especially work through local churches and agencies</i>

9th	Tearfund has provided toilets, showers, handwashing stations, water points and hygiene training in seven refugee camps in Democratic Republic of Congo.
10th	Kiganze camp in Ituri, DRC is home to 20,000 people. Pray for a strong sense of community and connection in the camps, restoring hope in a unified society
11th	Melodie and her family have lived in Tchaboba camp, DRC, since April 2021; “I thought showering was only for wealthy people”, she says. “I can now have a shower before I go to church and after working. I feel honoured”. Thank God for the way he is upholding dignity through basic amenities
12th	19 Nov is World Toilet Day. We focus on the fact that 1.7 billion people are still living without a decent toilet; this is unjust. Let’s stand alongside those who lack basic human rights
	<i>Our CMS Link Missionaries Tim and Kate Lee helped to set up JigSaw Kids Ministries in Manila (Philippines). Please pray-</i>
13th	School is back in the Philippines face-to-face. Jigsaw’s sponsorship children had an exciting day going to buy their uniforms, PE kit, shoes and bags. For most of the children this is the first time they have ever been in a shoe shop
14th	Jigsaw literacy school is Jigsaw’s first ministry that has re-started face-to-face. Praise God! Jigsaw runs several classes ranging from young beginners to older children who have never learned to read. Also evening classes for adults who can’t read
15th	For the last two plus years Jigsaw has not used any buildings for their ministry except Jigsaw’s central office. Now there is a big challenge to re-find spaces and buildings to use. In some places where Jigsaw worked the buildings we used or rented no longer exist. Prayers please.
16th	Distribution of weekly packs stopped for a month due to lack of funds. It is planned to start again in November and to include meal bags. Pray that funds will stretch to all 2000 children and young people

	<i>Jonathan and Robinah Beesigomwe live in Gabarone, Botswana. Their organisation is “Bows and Arrows Ministry”, and they work with older schoolchildren and young adults.</i>
17th	Due to UK charity law, Christ Church is no longer able to send money to the Beesigomwes. But individuals are free to do so— it is just a problem relating to reclamation of taxes by churches. Pray that funds will still get through
18th	Schools are still open to J&R’s ministry but some non-Christian views are also being taught in the schools
19th	A mission team from Uganda has been visiting the University of Botswana, working with Campus Crusade for Christ. Pray that students will hear God’s word
20th	Farming education work continues with a focus on growing potatoes for food, as well as Safflower for commercial purposes
	<i>Mission Aviation Fellowship fly medical personnel, supplies and missionaries to far-flung, often inaccessible settlements.</i>
21st	Recent flights to Chukudum, South Sudan, took Wycliffe Bible translators to deliver training courses aimed at overcoming fear of witchcraft and the lure of divination. Give thanks that Jesus’ light can never be extinguished
22nd	MAF pilot Steven Biggs has flown families translating the New Testament into local languages in Liberia. He and his wife Margot recently attended a ceremony celebrating the translation of the New Testament into Manya
23rd	MAF Kenya is delighted that, for the first time in 12 years, they have been able to resume regular evangelistic eye treatment safaris. Pray that Jesus will use these safaris to restore sight to the blind

24th	Give thanks for re-opening of some old airstrips in Chad, and pray for plans to open new airstrips in remote areas of Timor-Leste and Angola
	<i>The Bible Society's Bible-a-month club is delivering Bible resources in the Middle East</i>
25th	Bible Society in the Gulf will be distributing John's Gospel in 14 languages during the World Cup in Qatar, mainly to migrant workers and visiting football fans
26th	It has been reported that very many migrant workers died during construction work in Qatar for the World Cup. Pray that the plight of workers will be improved
27th	Migrant workers come from many countries in the East– India, Bangladesh, Nepal, Pakistan. Pray that migrant workers will come to faith and share that when they return to their home countries
28th	It is almost impossible to share the Christian faith with nationals in Qatar due to severe opposition to changing faith from Islam to Christianity. Pray that some will come to faith even though they may not feel able to speak openly about it
	<i>Mission workers</i>
29th	Pray for Pastor Mircea Pestean working with gypsy and other poor communities in Romania. Due to charity laws in the UK, Christ Church can no longer send money– but individuals can
30th	Pray for Ralph and Dagmar Baron, working at Hebron School in India. Ralph has suffered from health problems and they have a high workload as they teach several subjects to A level standard

## Encouragement in bleak times

---

*(extracts from Jigsaw's latest Update letter – October 2022)*

*Tim's next trip to the Philippines.* Tim was very excited for his trip to the Philippines which was due to be from the end of September till the end of October. The main purpose of the trip was to review all of Jigsaw's children and family development programs readying Jigsaw for full face-to-face ministry from January. However due to the death of Tim's aunt, the trip had to be postponed as he was next of kin, and with his sisters, was needed to organise his late aunt's affairs. After prayer and reorientation and putting the situation into God's hands we were all peaceful and a solution was worked out. All the work Tim was going to do on his visit with the Jigsaw team is currently going ahead very successfully (albeit very early in the morning!) via Zoom.

*Ongoing response to an emergency:* On September 25th 'Noru', a super typhoon, hit the Philippines some hundreds of miles north of Manila, causing huge damage and loss of life. The worst hit areas in Manila were where the poorest homes are situated. Fearful of the rise in water levels, Jigsaw managed to evacuate over 30 households in Area 4 into their literacy centre and offices. After much clearing up and help the community were able to return home. For many others however, north of Manila things were much worse and we hold them in our hearts and prayers.

*Financial worries:* Tim writes: 'Christian faith ministry is so hard in one respect, trusting God fully and trying to keep our personal thoughts and anxiety out of it'. These last two months have been a struggle financially for Jigsaw. Funds coming in have been reduced, exchange rates have plummeted, costs have gone up, and more and more children and families are being pushed into severe and life threatening poverty. To cope with their lack of funds, the Jigsaw team has chosen to prioritise their health and well being ministry, literacy school, and staffing and administration costs.

*(continued)*

It was agreed we couldn't afford to make the usual weekly activity and food packs for the 'clubs at home' programme. Instead each community ministry team scheduled a month of visiting and spending time with individual children, young people and their households. The staff were met with smiles, hugs, tears of joy and thanks and they were able to build and strengthen relationships whilst talking and sharing about Jesus as they went. This has led to the idea of having a week each month, or every two months, as a visiting week.

*Back to School:* School is back on in the Philippines face-to-face. In August Jigsaw's sponsorship children (using discrete funding) had their most exciting day of the year, going to buy their new school uniform, PE kits, bags and school supplies. First stop was shoes and trainers for school and PE. For most of the children this is the first time they have ever been in a shoe shop to buy shoes.

*Lack of literacy* is one of the biggest problems in urban Manila and Jigsaw literacy school works to combat this with four literacy programs each week. Despite the lack of funds, Jigsaw still runs several classes ranging from young beginners through to older children who have never learnt to read and write. There are also evening classes for adults.

Tim and Kate end their Update letter by asking us to continue to pray for God's wisdom and guidance for the Jigsaw team; and to praise God for prayers answered for Jigsaw's program and ministries, especially the visiting initiative.

### *Encouraging news from Matthew Leung*

At the end of August, UCCF held their annual student conference, Forum 22, for Christian Union (CU) leaders from across the UK. The seminars and talks were designed to encourage and challenge the participants, as well as equipping them with fresh ideas for evangelistic events. During the conference Matthew led a series of 3 seminars on Mission & His Diverse People, looking at God's big picture for diversity, how Jesus should inspire us to pursue it and the practical outworking of this in CUs.

Matthew writes: 'While it was a challenging and sensitive topic to approach, it was a genuine encouragement to see how helpful it was to so many students across the country. In particular I had a conversation with an Asian student from Bristol CU about her own struggles with a lack of diversity in CUs that I could massively relate to and thus work through those issues with her. While it can often be a challenge to be one of the few non-white Staff Workers in UCCF, I realise my experience has actually uniquely equipped me to help students who struggle with this issue of diversity.'

At the beginning of every academic year, CUs across the country welcome tens of thousands of new students onto University and College campuses. At Keele University, new International students were welcomed by members of the CU who helped them to move in. Following which, they were invited to a free meal with a talk looking at "Why Christianity Isn't Just A Western Religion". More than 60 attended.

It's been a big goal of Matthew's, ever since starting as Staff Worker at Keele, to establish a regular ministry for International students. The Midlands CU's International Co-ordinator, Alex, is now pioneering a regular Global Café for these students. For the rest of the new students, all 3 CU's (Keele; Stafford & Harper Adams) ran a mixture of evangelistic and social events to both help build relationships but also start sowing seeds for the gospel. *Please continue to pray for Matthew and his CU teams as they strive to reach out to students and share the love and good news of Jesus Christ.*

### **Harvest Donations 2022—Tearfund**

As usual, on Harvest Sunday, our churches supported Tearfund . This year the Harvest campaign was 'Help communities to flourish again.' This focused on the effects of the climate crisis on food supply in the developing world - either due to drought or flooding. The case study was Nepal, where crops are failing & families are going hungry.

We have been able to send £840.17 to Tearfund. This includes envelope donations & proceeds from the Harvest Supper. Our donations will help Tearfund partners to train farmers in new farming techniques so they can free themselves from poverty.

Oulton & Moddershall have also supported the International Food Bank project 'food.gives'. We collected specific dried goods from 18th September – 9th October. These were chick peas, lentils, rice, salt & wholemeal flour. The goods are collected by courier & taken to the depot. The food will then be distributed to hungry & persecuted Christians worldwide via Barnabas Fund's church partners. Countries which have received food in 2022 include Pakistan, Tonga, Ukraine & Zimbabwe. Thank you everybody for giving generously to our Harvest Projects this year.
