Meeting with Jesus is what Easter is all about. But it isn't simply a historic event in the sense of being in the past rather than something that happens in the present.

At one of our schools, we have a beautifully simple phrase that the school says together. It's simple and profound, rather than simplistic. The words we use when we gather for an assembly, before our team bring another Bible story to act out for the school (using the scheme called 'Open The Book', courtesy of The Bible Society), have an important lesson to remember. The words as the assembly starts are as follows:

'With gladness are we gathered, to meet together here. With Jesus in the midst of us, unseen but very near. Amen.' [Used at Christ Church First School].

It's an easily memorable introduction to worship. Some might dismiss it as a quaint ditty to reel off each time just to let everyone know we are starting. It does let everyone know. But it is so much more important than that! For it reminds us of the joyful news of Easter that he is alive, and we can still meet with him today. Let me explain.

The first disciples got a very big shock. On the third day after Jesus had died, it was resurrection day! Jesus was very



definitely dead since the soldiers had checked, and they were experts at executions. Jesus was very definitely buried in a tomb, as the huge stone covering the entrance ensured and the special Roman seal and guards posted prevented tampering. But Jesus was very definitely alive! It wasn't resuscitation or revivification.

It was a resurrection! The great privilege for Mary of meeting Jesus was to be able to declare: 'I have seen the Lord!' (John 20v18). The rest of the disciples were also eyewitnesses of the risen Jesus and told Thomas (the one missing disciple) about this: 'We have seen the Lord!' (John 20v25). Thomas himself was sceptical about what they said and wanted to see and touch Jesus for himself. On meeting the risen Jesus, he said: 'My Lord and my God!' (John 20v28).

So, our short whole school introduction reminds us of a profound truth. We can meet with Jesus today because he rose again and lives forever. Is this something that you truly and genuinely believe? Will you consider the eyewitness testimonies? Will you come and join in our Easter events (see the cards posted in the parish detailing them). For it has huge implications in terms of daily life following him.

It's for this reason that we can join in asking for God's blessing as the fruit of such trust in him as used at the end of the school assemblies: 'May God's love surround us; may God's joy be in our lives; and may God's peace be in our hearts. Amen.'

Junior Heroes Holiday Club is a 4-day fun event for children aged 5 – 11 years run by volunteers from Christ Church, Stone and Oulton Church. We aim to teach the children some basic Christian values whilst having a great time together. To get the most out of it, the children are encouraged to come on all four afternoons, as the event follows a programme of Bible teaching and drama that follows through as the Club progresses, but children can also join in for shorter periods if they can't come every day.

The children can be safely left in our care; all volunteers have DBS certificates and parents are not required to stay. Each child will be placed into a small group, based on age, with dedicated leaders who will be responsible for him or her throughout the afternoon. However, not all of the time is spent in this small group, as there are some activities that all the children participate in together. During a typical afternoon we will have times of singing action songs, doing quizzes, learning together from drama, puppets and activity sheets, making things, playing games, and having refreshments. There is no time to be bored!

The Club culminates in a special Holiday Club service at Christ Church on the Sunday morning, preceded by a breakfast to which all family members are invited. During this service we will review what the children have learnt and get a flavour of the fun they have been having during the week. We do hope that your children would like to be part of this adventure!

Reflecting on our work as Chaplaincy Volunteers

On Tuesday 7th March I, along with about 15 others, attended a time of Fellowship and Reflection in the Chapel at Royal Stoke. As we had not met in this way since before the C-19 Pandemic it was an opportunity to reconnect with fellow Chaplaincy Volunteers. We were a mix of people currently working, returners after the pandemic and some new Volunteers.

We started by thinking about our hopes, reflecting on how seeds when planted need attention and nurturing to help them to flourish. Much the same is true about our hopes, especially in dark times.

Then we had a presentation on a method of "Reflective Practice" which involves taking time to think about our actions, consider how things went and could have been different. The aim of the process is to learn continuously how we can respond better next time we come into a similar situation and to grow in our understanding of patient experience, improve our ability to respond and develop our compassion and empathy. We then engaged in a reflective practise exercise using real encounters with patients or others. In the feedback we learned a lot about ways in which we can meet patients needs more effectively. Examples being... how little things can matter such a lot; how communication, especially with family, matters a great deal; how apparently similar situations can result in very different encounters and how memory loss in some patients can complicate our time spent with them.

It was encouraging to hear how our work fitted into the bigger picture of the hospital network in caring for the whole person and being made aware of some of the national guidelines under which we function. We were reminded of the SPaRC Day on 10th May when all are invited to come along and meet the Chaplaincy Team in the Atrium (which I've written about previously).

Our fellowship concluded with a closing thought and reflection.

In his pattern for prayer Jesus taught us to begin our relationship with God using the words "Our Father". (Matthew 6:9). Because we use the "Lord's Prayer" so often we can easily take those two introductory words for granted.

Our relationship with our human parents changes as we grow up. As infants and then young children we rely upon the care and protection that our parents provide. The psalmist writes about his relationship with God with these words "I cling to you; your right hand upholds me". (Psalm 63:9) As I read those words I am reminded of the strong, protective grasp of my Dad's hand when we encountered busy traffic in town.

However, as our teenage desire for independence grows, our parents may seem less loving as they try to discipline us. The writer to the Hebrews expresses this clearly (from Hebrews 12:7-11) "For what children are not disciplined by their father? If you are not disciplined—and everyone undergoes discipline—then you are not legitimate, not true sons and daughters at all....they (our parents) disciplined us for a little while as they thought best; but God disciplines us for our good, in order that we may share in his holiness".

As we look back in adult life, we see that the reason underlying the painful restrictions and discipline from our parents in our teenage years was their loving desire for our own ultimate good and happiness.

I left school and immediately spent a "gap year" working in the rolling mill of a steel works near Sheffield. When I returned home as a young adult my relationship with my Dad had changed yet again. Now we enjoyed a pint together and although he was still my father we were more like companions. The word "companion" is derived from two Latin words "com" and "panis", which literally mean "with bread".

Holy Communion is at the heart of Christian worship where we share bread and wine, as our Lord commanded us. In Communion God our Father is indeed our "companion".

Towards the end of their lives parents sometimes rely on their children for support. Our heavenly Father guides and trusts us to carry on His work for the Kingdom in our own small way. So we see that our loving relationship with God summed up in those two memorable words "Our Father, can be worked out in our lives in several different ways.

However the comparison must not be pressed too far. In the first place Our Heavenly Father is not constrained by the passage of time. He can be "Our father" for us in any of the four ways I have illustrated at any time. For example, He can discipline us when we go wrong, and at the very same time guide us by his Holy Spirit to some positive kingdom building action and, if the task is difficult, we may well sense his "right hand upholding us" (Psalm 63:8).

Secondly, Jesus told us to start our prayers saying "Our Father", not "my Father". The word "our" is hugely significant. When siblings meet together they talk about "our" mum or dad. When we pray or meet together as Christians we acknowledge that we are indeed members of a wonderful earthly and heavenly family as we say "Our Father, who art in Heaven"

For the past 20 years Jigsaw Kids Ministries have been sharing God's love with impoverished children and needy families living in the slums, and on the streets, of Metro Manila. During this time, thousands of children, some with disabilities, others without family to care for them, have had their lives changed dramatically – physically, spiritually and socially. Surrounded by God's love many of these children have also come to know Jesus as their Lord and Saviour.

Looking ahead, Jigsaw is preparing for another 20 years of sharing God's love with even more children and families living in extreme poverty in Metro Manila. One of Jigsaw's priorities is to engage more fully in community education and advocacy. A particular challenge is online child sexual abuse. Many of the children who come to Jigsaw's clubs are in danger of being caught up in this dreadful practice.

In order to achieve these goals and fulfil their vision, Jigsaw needs our help and continued support. 'Jigsaw's affordable giving campaign' is one way in which the Jigsaw team hopes to increase the number of individuals willing to give an affordable gift of £5 or more per month. If each of their 10 supporting churches could find 10–15 new individuals willing to join this scheme, then Jigsaw would be able to continue its regular and emergency work, as well as expanding to serve the increasing number of children being pushed into extreme poverty, with all the terrible risks and suffering this brings for them and their families.

Transform Trade is the new name for the Fairtrade charity. Each April, until 2021 Ruth made a payment to the charity. This was from any profit made on the sale of Traidcraft goods, together with other donations she'd received.

Thank you to all who supported the Coffee Morning at Oulton Village Hall on 27th February. It was also the first day of Fairtrade Fortnight & gave us the opportunity to talk about the work of Transform Trade. Ruth has sent £200 to the charity, including £180 from the Coffee Morning. Another Coffee Morning will be held in the summer.

At the beginning of March, Transform Trade launched The Producer Fund. The fund will support small producers & social enterprises in the developing world. This is in response to the closure of Traidcraft. In 2018, when Traidcraft downsized, 33 producer groups were supported. All are thriving in 2023. Kazi Yetu who supplied Traidcraft's own brand tea was one of these groups. The fund will invest in things such as equipment, training, product development & access to new markets. Sadhna, a garment business in Rajasthan, employs women artisans from some of the most vulnerable backgrounds in India. It's one of the inspirational businesses that will receive investment through the Producer Fund.

The Revd Zoe Heming represented the Church of England's General Synod at an historic gathering with The King.

Representatives from 27 organisations gathered at Buckingham Palace to present their Loyal Greetings to The King. Together, these organisations which have helped shape the UK's diverse society are known as The Privileged Bodies. This long-held tradition dates back as far as the seventeenth century and takes place to mark significant Royal occasions.

As well as serving as a Lichfield Diocese clergy representative on General Synod, where she also chairs debates, Zoe is Vicar of St Andrew's in Church Aston, Shropshire, and the diocese's Enabling Church Advisor.

"It was such a privilege to be part of the General Synod delegation hosted by the King at Buckingham Palace with others involved in public life," said Zoe. "It was heartening to hear so many affirming their commitment to working together to face the Climate Crisis and improve equality, diversity and greater inclusion of all citizens in our work for the good of the many."

The Privileged Bodies are culturally significant organisations and institutions that reflect the United Kingdom's diverse society, drawn from the education sector, as well as incorporating science, arts, and religious institutions. Traditionally, the Privileged Bodies are given the opportunity to present Loyal Addresses to the Monarch, representing the key role they play in British society. This year, to mark His Majesty's Accession, the 27 Privileged Bodies presented their Loyal Addresses to The King, serving to emphasise and reaffirm their loyalty to the Monarch.

As part of the upcoming Coronation celebrations, Churches and communities across the country are invited to take part in the Coronation Big Lunch on Sunday 7 May and the Big Help Out, focusing on community volunteering on Bank Holiday Monday 8 May.

The Parable of the Ten Virgins Matthew 25:1-14 "At that time the kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins who took their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five were wise. The foolish ones took their lamps but did not take any oil with them. The wise ones, however, took oil in jars along with their lamps. The bridegroom was a long time in coming, and they all became drowsy and fell asleep. "At midnight the cry rang out: 'Here's the bridegroom! Come out to meet him!' "Then all the virgins woke up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish ones said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil; our lamps are going out.'
