Another disaster. Another appeal. Another set of pictures to pull at the heart strings. There is an ongoing need to help others in need. One statistic said that over 840 million people worldwide are chronically undernourished. Every day, 26,000 young children die due to poverty, hunger, and preventable diseases. With so many people in such lamentable condition, what motivates Jesus' followers to respond?

The simple answer is the compassion of Jesus: something he showed and something we are to copy. Compassion is a feeling of empathy with the suffering of others, the capacity to feel how others feel. The literal meaning is to suffer with: to enter the pain of another. Jesus showed this: 'When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd' (Matthew 9v36). Again, 'Jesus called his disciples to him and said, "I have compassion for these people; they have already been with me three days and have nothing to eat. I do not want to send them away hungry, or they may collapse on the way' (Mt 15v32). When aware of the need, we care about the people involved, and we are ready to act on their behalf. Having compassion on a needy person is proof of the love of God within us (I John 3v17); being kind to the needy honours God (Prov 14v31).

Compassion is expressed in three ways:

 <u>Charity</u> is an old word for love, to describe gifts of money, clothing, food; but it does not necessarily



involve an investment of our time and talents. Such giving shows a generous nature, but we can remain distant from the needy. So, Jesus' example and teaching are more demanding.

- <u>Service</u>: involves us face-to-face with those in need. It can change our natural state of self-centeredness into increasingly selfless people. Jesus puts service at the centre of his ministry: 'For who is greater, the one who is at the table or the one who serves? Is it not the one who is at the table? But I am among you as one who serves' (Luke 22v24-27). These words were spoken at the start of the Coronation of King Charles in his pledge to serve. This is swims against the tide of our desire to be noticed, affirmed, and to feel significant. But a servant is one who quietly and humbly serves the needs of others regardless of personal recognition and regardless of the status of those we serve.
- <u>Justice</u> transforms the social structures and systems which are producing poverty and suffering. While charity and service seek to heal wounds, it is justice that seeks to end the social structures that create wounded people (for no policy is perfect). Ultimately only the Lord can bring justice at his return "with righteousness he will judge the needy, with justice he will give decisions for the poor of the earth" (Isa 11v4).

This explains how Christians have always been involved with care for the poor and hungry, medical assistance and education as they share the good news of redemption with the needy world. The compassionate mercy we have experienced and give thanks for is to overflow to the wider world.

8 Trains in the Garden Saturday 13th May 2023 (1)

This year the Trains in the Garden event in aid of Jig-Saw Kids Ministries was earlier than usual to coincide with Tim and Kate Lee's visit. Unfortunately, it also coincided with two consecutive Monday Bank Holidays and so getting fliers out to groups like the Toddler Group was done only just in time. Offers of help and donations from those unable to attend started pouring in the week before and so we had already raised £70 before any train left the station.

The weather forecast on the day was for sunshine and no rain which miraculously turned out to be the case and so it went on. Railway and kitchen helpers arrived in the morning and got things ready. Looking at the 4 plates of cake on the table, I worried that there would not be enough and the miracle of Jesus feeding the five thousand crossed my mind. An hour later looking at a table laden down with plates piled with cake I hoped enough people would turn up to consume them all and wondered what we'd do if they didn't. Oh, me of little faith! From 2.30pm on, what started as a steady trickle of visitors gradually got busier as my kitchen team, Enid, Jacqueline, Christine, Gill, Sue and Sheila valiantly made copious drinks and washed-up crockery galore as the cakes gradually disappeared. There were a lot of visitors I did not know and for the first time I reckoned there were more non-church visitors than church members as people brought family and friends and neighbours. We reckon over 120 attended throughout the afternoon.

We did not charge for anything but asked for donations as people were able to give. In previous years we have raised several hundred pounds but this year because of the cost-of-living crisis we did not expect to raise as much. At the end of the day after the last visitor had left and we were able to sit down, it was time to count the money. Imagine our surprise and delight to find we had raised over £1,000 for Jig-Saw Kids Ministries. It was really humbling to realise people had given so generously in such a difficult time. Another miracle in what seemed like a day of miracles!

So many thanks to all those who baked cakes, loaned tea pots and kettles etc. Particular thanks to the helpers who gave of their time to ensure visitors were kept safe round the railway and fed and watered. Most of all a big THANK YOU to all those who gave so generously.

Earlier this year Tim Lee spent 3 weeks in Manila, working with the Jigsaw team. After 2½ years in lockdown, Jigsaw Ministries are slowly returning to face-to-face meetings. Jigsaw Kids' meetings restarted earlier this year, with their FROGS (Fully Rely On God) Holiday club.

During his visit, Tim reviewed Jigsaw's current situation and their plans for future ministry. In his latest newsletter Tim wrote: 'it became clear that as we entered our 20th year there was a need to both prune and develop parts of Jigsaw in order for it to move forward.'

A recent statistical review of Pilipino children living in poverty, highlighted one overwhelming problem: 80% of these children face sexual violence and bullying, mainly due to the rapid increase in Cyber-sex. Jigsaw is already helping children traumatised as a result of sexual abuse, but the question now is, what else should Jigsaw do to help combat this horrific and evil reality?

This is where Pandita comes in. Tim had been given a book to read, Let the Earth Hear Her Voice – the life story of Pandita Ramabai, written by a friend of Tim's, Dr Keith White. Pandita was born in India, in the 1880's, at a time when women suffered horrific abuse. Her life's goal was to fight for the education and equal treatment of women and girls in India. Amongst other things, Pandita understood that this would take time and believed that it was about starting small, sowing seeds of change through teaching, and empowering abused women.

The Jigsaw team has been totally inspired by her example and have already started to create a teaching programme about the dangers of sexual abuse, as well as the responsibility of adults to love and care for children. Initially, this programme will be offered to existing Jigsaw ladies' groups. Another opportunity to use this programme may be with Jigsaw's very important monthly ministry to parents and guardians, when Jigsaw leaders facilitate discussions on parenting, childcare and bible texts. (continued)

The team realise it will take a long time to change the current culture, but they are trusting God to use them to effect changes that will empower children and protect them from sexual abuse.

Please pray for more inspiration, and wisdom, for the Jigsaw team as they prepare a teaching plan for the ladies groups, and new activities about love and care for Jigsaw's kids clubs.

God answers prayers

Paul and Elizabeth Makau, our new Mission Partners, serve as African Inland Mission (AIM) partners in Kenya. Paul lectures at the Africa Inland University (AIU) and has written teaching programmes, such as a Diploma in Missions (General and Islam options), to help pastors working with Muslims and other unreached people groups in Northern Kenya, and in other countries in Africa, including Southern Sudan, Uganda, DR Congo, and Tanzania.

Elizabeth and Paul are also committed to travelling to far away parts of Kenya to teach and support other mission workers. To enable them to do this they need to buy a car, but do not as yet have the funds for this. After much prayer and petitioning, God answered their prayers in an amazing way. As Paul writes in their latest newsletter: 'One of our fellow missionary family, who are in the same team with us have gifted us with their car to own and use it for mission work. Thank God for Matt and Bel and pray for them as they serve along with us. The car had been parked for about two years and we had it serviced, and the rear bushes replaced. We intend to use the car as we raise funds to part exchange it for a stronger off-road vehicle like a land cruiser/Nissan Patrol, to be able to travel far and remote areas to do training and discipleship.' On a missional trip to Korr-Log Logo and Marsabit, in February this year, Paul and Elizabeth saw the devastation caused by constant drought. The region had not had any rain for almost 5 years, it was extremely dry, crops had failed, and many of the animals, which are the indigenous people's only source of food and income, had died. In answer to much prayer, while Paul and Elizabeth were there, rain began to fall in most parts of the region. Unfortunately, the rain initially caused wide-spread flooding and more animals died.

In addition to their mission work, Elizabeth is writing her MA dissertation on missions/ evangelism; Paul is continuing with mandatory courses as part of his PhD course with Vrije University and Queens Foundation in Birmingham.

Please continue to pray for God's protection and guidance for Paul and Elizabeth; for the success of the outreach programmes; for completion of their studies; for better livelihoods for the indigenous people affected by drought and flooding; and for the security situation in the northern part of Kenya.

Encountering Jesus during CU Events Week

In his latest newsletter, Matthew tells us that he was very encouraged by the response to the UCCF Mission Weeks events, held on four different campuses.

The first Mission's Week was at Portsmouth University, where Matthew had been a student. Here he spoke at several different meetings. Amongst the students who attended the following encouraging encounters took place: One CU member noticed that the friend she had invited to an event was reading a copy of John's gospel under the desk, during lectures. A few weeks later, while they were discussing the questions in Uncover when the friend asked if she could go to church with the student. Another amazing response came from two Masters students from Bangladesh, together with their toddler son, who were seeking answers to some very big questions, like 'Jesus must be more than a man to do miracles, but how can he be God?'.

Keele University had one of their best Mission Weeks, with nearly 300 guests attending during the week. They were helped by CU staff from Birmingham and Ireland, and a Friend's International worker. Amongst the encounters experienced by students there were three that really stood out:

Firstly, a Japanese student, who had previously attended CU's international events, said that "everyone in Japan was an atheist, including himself... but now I've heard about Jesus, I think there might be a God out there." He started reading Uncover and was eager to learn more about Jesus. The second person, invited by CU student, considered himself agnostic. Matthew was able to share his own experience of Christianity, and 'how it's not true because it's good, but it's good because it's true'. This student has been meetings to CU regularly ever The third person is an international student, who attended some events later in the week and became intriqued by the Christian faith. He has read Uncover and is also going regularly to CU meetings.

Please continue to pray for God to move in the hearts of students who have yet to come to know Christ.

Also pray for the Summer Mission Team going to Bulgaria (5th-16th July) to work with the International Fellowship of Evangelical Students movement. Matthew and Midlands-SW Staff Worker Beth will be leading the team from the Midlands.

Matthew ends his newsletter with these words from the book of Habakkuk – words of faithfulness despite hardships: "Though the fig tree does not bud and there are no grapes on the vines, though the olive crop fails and the fields produce no food, though there are no sheep in the pen and no cattle in the stalls, yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will be joyful in God my Saviour." As a keen and prolific maker of preserves, I was intrigued many years ago to hear about the World's Original Marmalade Awards, devised and organized by Jane Hassell-McCosh at Dalemain Mansion in Cumbria. This festival of homemade and artisan marmalade-making attracts entries from around the world and raises money for the hospice movement in the process. Awards are given in a number of categories, some of which are related to the product itself (for example Seville Orange Marmalade, clear or whole fruit; Dark and Chunky Marmalade; Merry Marmalade – containing alcohol) and some of which relate to the maker of the marmalade (for example Children's Marmalade, Man Made Marmalade, Gardener's Marmalade). I can't remember when I first entered a jar to see how it would fare, but certainly I have entered at least one category every year since 2010. Marks are given for: presentation, appearance and colour; texture, peel size and set; flavour, aroma and harmony, up to a maximum total of 20 points. In my experience, those points have been getting harder and harder to achieve as the years have progressed and the competition has intensified! Most years my Seville Orange Marmalade has been awarded a Silver certificate (19/20), with plenty of lovely comments from the judges - but oh! that final point has always eluded me! My peel has not been quite soft enough, or sufficiently evenly sized or distributed, or my jar has not been filled high enough, or I have caught a bubble in the shoulder, and so it has gone on.

This year I was determined to try again. I devised a new way of cutting the orange peel so that the pieces were practically all the same size; bought some jazzy new lids decorated with oranges, and matching labels, and filled my jars as high as they could go with my usual delicious recipe. But there was a snag: marmalade entered into the Clear Seville Orange category has to be made with only four ingredients – oranges, sugar, water and lemon juice. I always include the lemon peel in mine, partly because it makes more, and partly because I think it improves the flavour. (continued)

What to do? I made a special batch or two without lemon peel for that category. But still, I thought my usual marmalade was better. Luckily for me there is a category entitled Campanologist's Marmalade, for those who, like me, ring church bells (I ring at St Michael's), and you can enter whatever recipe you like there. So I sent in my entries and waited.

What joy then, in 2023, to have been given a Gold Award for my Seville Orange Marmalade in the Campanologist's category, with a perfect score of 20/20 at last! There are a few jars left to buy at the bargain price of £2.50 (all proceeds to the Benefice Youth Fund as usual), but I suspect they won't be there for long, so please let me know soon if you want one. And the jar I entered into the Clear Seville category? It was awarded Silver again: clearly the peel does make a difference!

Our Struggling High Street

Have you noticed how a lot of our shops in the High Street have, or are now closing down?

Before Covid the building occupancy rate in the High Street was very high - not any more. Even the Charity Shops have commented that trade is slow. During the day, cafes and food shops are kind of ok. In the evening the Bars and Pubs are holding their own, but even then, it's only the weekend trade that keeps them going.

It's now the independent shops that are really struggling and sadly not sure if they'll be able to survive, or even reach the end of the year. Yes this is part of a National problem that started through Covid then the awful Ukraine war, which has left most of us going through a cost of living crisis and a lot of people with a lot less money to spend. Perhaps people might like to know:

- * One shop in particular found that the heating and electricity bills had gone up from £8,000 to £30,000, but they will lose less money by closing the shop down, yet still pay the rent.
- * People might say the landlords need to reduce their rent. But some landlords are still having to pay their mortgage on the building.
- * Lots of people from further afield would like to continue to go into Stone and the High Street, but cannot, because either they can no longer drive or their bus rota has changed.

Is there anything we can do?

Support the activities that are taking place in Stone. The 'Stone Trader's Group' - that have liaised since 2018 with Stone Town Council and Stafford Borough Council and have produced another leaflet this year, which lists all the different activities already organised throughout the rest of the year.

Their leaflets can be found in lots of different shops with events that could appeal to the different age groups. The Puppet Festival, Stone by the Sea, the Music Festivals and a Classic Car Event to name just a few.

Garden Fete 22nd June 1933

If I were to describe this event in my best journalistic style, I should say that "a most successful Garden Party was held in the Vicarage on June 22nd, which, in spite of the thundery weather, raised an excellent total of £33 for the Organ Repair Fund." In the more exact—if vulgar—rendering of colloquial speech, I should say that it was literally a wash-out. To mention the bare fact that a complete thunderstorm broke over Stone about 3-15 p.m. is to give an utterly inadequate idea of what really took place. There was a deluge of rain and the "bottles of heaven" emptied themselves over us without a moment's relief for about four hours. All the preparations which had been made in the Vicarage Garden were abandoned at the last minute. The hardy adventurers who presented themselves at the gate were huddled into the house for a picnic tea in dining-room, study, kitchen and hall. The contents of the stalls were carried laboriously to the Parish Room, where an impromptu programme was provided by the Guides and Brownies and a Sale took place.
