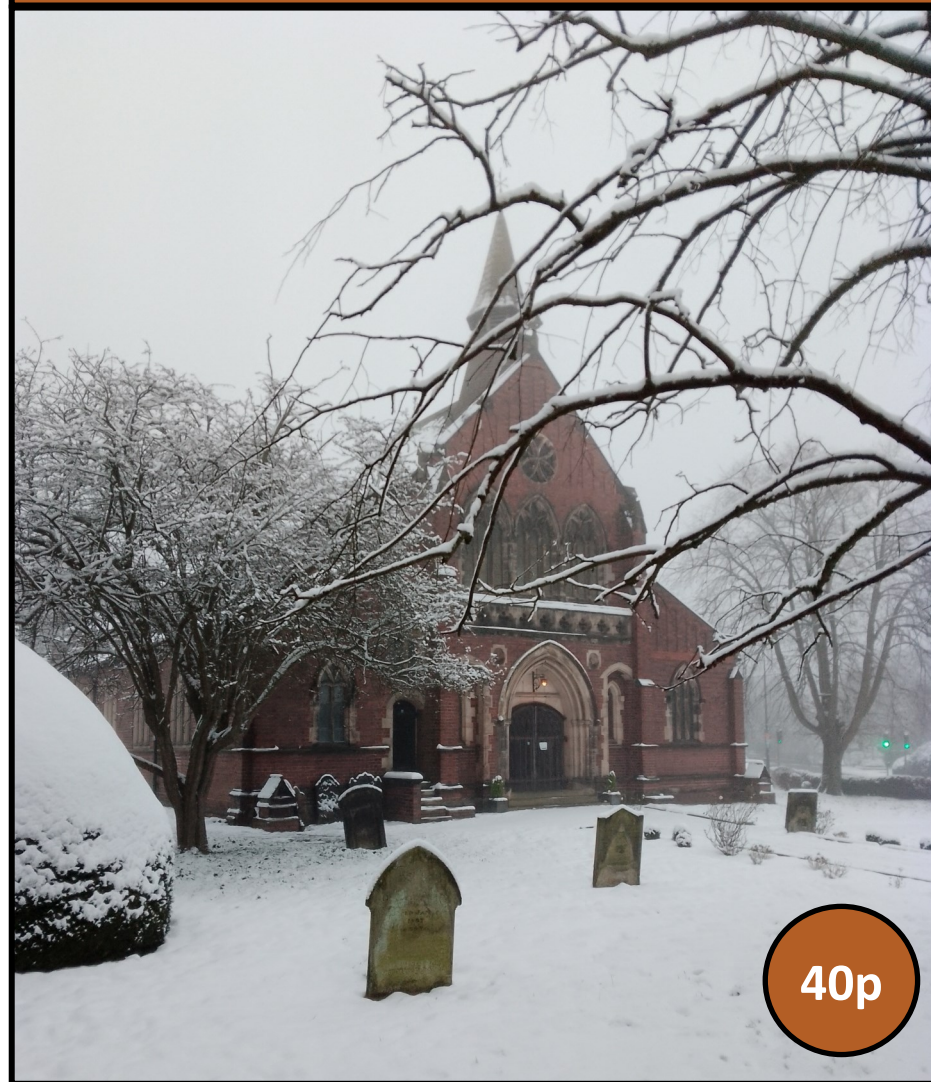

## 19 Carol singing at Royal Stoke Hospital

Before we left for the wards, the chaplain lead us in prayer, and we committed the singing to God, and our prayer was that those listening to the singing would hear the Word of God.

We sang for two hours from 6-8pm and visited several wards. We sang all the favourites, including O Come All Ye Faithful, O Little Town, The Holly & the Ivy, Away in a Manger, Silent Night and many more!

The singing was well received by the hospital staff and the patients, some patients and hospital staff joined in which was lovely. Some patients just listened intently, and some patients that were very ill, we still sang to them and hoped that they could hear us.

After we had finished singing at 8pm we were all met with mince pies and hot drinks in the chaplaincy!!

If you haven't had the privilege of singing at the hospital before, I'd encourage you to have a go at singing there next year! If you do decide to come next year, it can be very warm around the wards, so wear layers, comfy shoes (there's quite a bit of walking) and bring some water with you, as your throat gets dry with all the singing!!

Thanks to all who came to sing this year and a big thanks to Dave Rowlands for organizing us to go, we missed you Dave sorry you couldn't be there.

Muhammad was a blind Muslim and he carried Semir, who was paralysed and a Christian with dwarfism on his back. Muhammad provided the transport and Semir the directions.\*\*\*

We were updated with the latest changes and requirements for fire safety within the hospital.

Rachael, one of the hospital chaplains, led us in singing '10,000 Reasons'.

I have registered an interest in training to be able to visit patients receiving palliative care and to support them and their families.

I am not able to report on the carol singing around the wards as I was unwell on the day and could not attend it. However, I am told it went well and, with luck, you might read about it elsewhere in this magazine!

## Epiphany Tart

Victorian housewives used to vie with each other to produce the most complicated designs, using the greatest number of different jams, and winning the competition at Church Suppers became a point of honour!

8oz/225g shortcrust pastry

Approx. 4oz/100g jam, in various types and colours (the more the better)

Oven: 200°C/400°F/GAS 6

Roll out the pastry and line a 9 inch/23cm tart tin.

With the pastry trimmings make a lattice pattern across the tart base.

Warm the jams slightly and spread into the spaces in the lattice-work.

Bake for about 25-30 minutes, until the pastry is cooked.

Serve with custard or single cream.

Words spoken at the start of a New Year can be powerful when carried through. There may be a change of intention and plans. Who hasn't pledged to slim down by cutting the calories, or to beef up by spending time at the gym? Once you say it then the spoken word can be energising. Also, others might hear you say it and hold you to account!

The Holy Bible has truly wonderful words from God to us. They have inspired many generations. We read of courageous endeavours against the odds to bring the good news of Jesus to other people. Just think of missionaries sailing to Africa or China unsure if they'd last the journey and with a short lifespan once on land. We see it in action when huge sacrifices are made to serve the needs of others helping with health care, tackling addiction, or caring for orphans, all motivated by a love of the Lord. Think also of the many Christian emergency aid programmes that spring into action to relieve people facing natural disasters or those that result from war, showing mercy and enabling others to survive and thrive.

Simeon's words are inspiring for the year ahead. Now old he'd been praying for the people of God to be liberated. He bumped into Joseph and Mary at the temple. As he held Jesus in his arms he said: *"Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all nations: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel."* (Luke 2:29-32). Simeon had now seen the greatest wonder of the world, so was ready to die. For Jesus would bring light and life to all who believe and trust in him, changing hearts at a deep level and able to unite

Jew and Gentile. It is good news for those who wholeheartedly respond with faith and so receive him as Lord and Saviour.

Yet, this same Jesus reveals what is deep down in our hearts. Simeon added: *"This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel,*

There are few emotions more powerful than hope. It's a spark inside you that brings a smile to your lips; a light that shows on your face; a feeling that lifts your head and pulls you forward. Hope is what keeps us alive. But these days hope often feels hard to come by! Yet real hope is what the Christian faith claims to offer: a joyful expectation for the future, based on true events in the past, which changes everything about my present.

**Hope Explored** is a new three-week discipleship course developed by *Christianity Explored Ministries*. It looks at the four titles that are found in Isaiah 9—Mighty God, Prince of Peace, Everlasting Father, and Wonderful Counsellor—before showing how these were fulfilled in Jesus' life, death, and resurrection. It shows the Bible's story of "promise and fulfilment" in history and invites us to put our hope in the promises of Jesus that are yet to be fulfilled.

Each week's topic touches on a real "hope" that we're all looking for, and which Jesus meets. The three sessions being:

- Session 1: Hope / Mighty God.
- Session 2: Peace / Prince of Peace.
- Session 3: Purpose / Everlasting Father and Wonderful Counsellor.

Each session will involve:

- A short, 5 minute introduction to the theme.
- An opening discussion question.
- A 10-15 minute Bible talk on video.
- A simple Bible study in Luke's Gospel.

This will be held at The Vicarage, Bromfield Court, Stone ST15 8ED from 7.30 p.m. on Tuesday 9<sup>th</sup>, 16<sup>th</sup>, and 23<sup>rd</sup> January 2024.

## **Christ Church First School Update**

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Autumn Term 2

The second half of the Autumn Term always seems really long but the children have been busy. When we returned after October half term, we welcomed Ali from Youthnet into school to run a Sacred Spaces workshop on the theme of Remembrance for children in Years 3 and 4. This was a fabulous afternoon full of reflection. The children really enjoyed all the activities which were well designed and engaging. In the same week, staff and pupils from CCA visited the school as part of their "Arts on Tour" initiative. The children made clay figurines and got to try their hand at African drumming. This was a really enjoyable afternoon for all. On 11<sup>th</sup> November, children from school took part in the Remembrance Day Parade in town, laying a wreath for Christ Church and Oulton First Schools.

On Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> October, the PTFA arranged a "bag packing" event at Morrisons in Stone. This was to raise funds for Rusty (the school dog). Parents, pupils and staff turned out to take turns as packing or running a stall and we raised valuable funds to ensure that Rusty remains cost-neutral to the school.

The choir took part in the Stone Lights Switch-On on 23<sup>rd</sup> November. This is always a lovely community event (even if it does always rain!) We thoroughly enjoyed singing with all the schools in Stone.



### November 2023

The days are getting colder so its gloves and scarves as I cycle and walk along the towpath. I am certainly getting to know the route

from Aston to Wedgwood well and recognise boats that are permanently moored and those that come and go. Mostly the leisure boaters have gone now and the stoic live-aboards are stopping at winter moorings as the weather gets colder and stoppages prevent so much travel.

I continue to support J down at Great Haywood Marina as he slowly recovers from his accident – very frustrating for him as he is a nomad by heart and being stuck in one place does not feel right for him. I supported him to find a temporary GP and took him to have his COVID jab. Please pray for him and for P, P, S and G who all have varying difficulties.

Queries have been around benefits and licence fees, cost of living allowances and worries about health and finance. I am getting good at signposting the boaters to the right places and we are very blessed in Stone to have the CAB experts, the Community Hub and Food Bank to support people.

Also please pray for the boaters to be safe – the cold and dangers of slippery towpaths, especially around locks, are many, especially for those who live on board alone.

You never know who you will meet - I met a fellow, very active, Christian on the towpath up at Wedgwood last week who was full of praise for the WWC but was also involved a lot with Stoke City FC, Christians-in-Sport and sharing the gospel with young people – he suggested we might collaborate on something so who knows what may happen! He was currently arranging an event with 'Nello' and Lou McCari so obviously has good connections!
