

From the Vicarage.....

The cost of peace

Two years have elapsed since the start of the conflict between Israel and Hamas in Gaza. Now, at the time of writing, a ceasefire has been agreed.

When the news broke who could but express relief? The five-point agenda for further talks covering the end of the war, prisoner and hostage exchange, Israeli withdrawal, humanitarian assistance and post war arrangements, had been agreed. It came into effect from 10^{th} October. The human loss has been staggering and world leaders spoke of the loss of lives as having reached new depths. All sectors of society have been affected, whichever side of the conflict. We also remember the death of military personnel and the families that they come from. For this reason, we hope and pray that the cease-fire will pave the way towards stability in a war-torn land. We are confused by the politics and long history of conflict in the region. We long to see peace. We acknowledge that the cost of (cont. p5...)

(cont. from p 4) peace is high.

As we approach Remembrance and Armistice Day commemorations, we are mindful of the cost of peace paid by our forebears. It is a sombre time of reflection for lives laid down for us. It is a time of thanksgiving for the peace we now enjoy. Many will gather at the memorials in town and at churches to silently remember the cost of peace. At the heart of Christian faith is the same theme of the cost of peace. The Bible likens our natural, fallen, human state, as being hostile to God. It even states that we were once 'enemies of God' (Romans 5v10). But the same writer in stating this is in fact on a roll celebrating how we can be reconciled to God: 'Therefore, since we have been justified through faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand. And we boast in the hope of the glory of God' (Romans 5v1-2). Reconciliation cost Jesus his blood as put so well by Charles Wesley's great hymn (1738),

And can it be that I should gain
An interest in the Saviour's blood?
Died He for me, who caused His pain?
For me, who Him to death pursued?
Amazing love! how can it be
That Thou, my God, shouldst die for me?

MISSION PRAYER DIARY WEEK ONE - African Pastors Fellowship

The vision of APF is to empower Christian leaders and enable effective ministry.

PRAYER POINTS

APF have created a unique mobile app called eVitabu that contains an entire library of text, audio and video resources for African pastors, and many are available in a range of languages.

Pray for the effectiveness of this new resource

Pray for the church in Africa which is growing faster than in any other part of the world today. Pray that God would equip leaders with everything that they need.

Pray for APF's "Let There Be Light Solar project" in Tanzania and Rwanda. Solar power is bringing free light to villages. Good quality light means pastors can work into the evening preparing for services or studying, as most work during the day.

Praise God for the church in North Eastern Uganda who have recently baptised 200 new believers in the local river, in addition a further 60 people also gave their lives to Christ on the same day.



WEEK TWO - Open Doors FOCUS - Afghanistan

Afghanistan is now the most dangerous place in the world to be a Christian.

PRAYER POINTS

- Christian minorities live in deep fear and face violent persecution if they are found. Please pray for the safety and protection of believers from being discovered
- Drug addiction has been rampant in Afghanistan for many years, and it has become much worse after the Taliban government has taken over the country. **Pray for healing and restoration** for many who are under the clutches of drug abuse
- Many people are forcibly evicted from their homes in various provinces if they are perceived to support the former government. Please pray for the families who have to leave everything behind as they flee to safety
- Please pray for the religious minorities, especially secret believers who live in fear of being discovered. May the Lord be close to them, provide for their needs with food, medicine and timely help, and protect them from harm



WEEK THREE - Mission Aviation fellowship (MAF)

Since 1945, MAF has existed to bring the life-changing hope of the gospel to people in hard-to-reach places.

PRAYER POINTS

Pray for David Holsten, (MAF president) as he continues to serve other organisations, helping to spread the love of Jesus

Pray that the airstrip in Boga, located in the Congo, will remain open after being closed for 2 years due to security issues.

Thank God that MAF is now working in Guinea, pray that more runways will be developed to reach the most remote areas,

Pray for the prayer convoys, planes carrying passengers who fly over and pray for specific areas.

Thank God for the men and women who have been called to be pilots for MAF, praying for their safety as they fly into hostile areas



WEEK FOUR - Hannah Goodman (UCCF)

UCCF partners with Christian unions across the UK to give every student the opportunity to hear the gospel. Hannah is now the staff worker, based in Keele, Staffordshire and Harper Adams Universities

PRAYER POINTS

Praise God for the number of freshers who have come to the first few meetings.

Praise God for the committee members. It has been good to see the gifts and skills God has given them to serve Him this year.

Pray that all the Christian unions can engage with freshers and welcome them in.

Pray that every student has a chance to hear and respond to the good news of Jesus.

Pray for the upcoming weekend away at the end of November and that students who attend will be equipped to share their faith this coming year and beyond.

The Midland Women's Convention in Nottingham

The day we visited the Midland Women's Convention in Nottingham, was a wonderful day shared together with 9 of our Christ Church regulars.

Before we arrived, we were asked to decide which seminar we would each select to attend in the afternoon.

'Reading the Old Testament Today'; 'How God Guides Us' or 'Trusting Christ in our weakness'. There was also a youth seminar for 14 -18-year olds.

When we arrived, we didn't expect there to be over 500 women attending – fortunately the Cornerstone Church is large. The hospitality was also very good – offering a selection of tea, coffee, water and plenty of doughnuts!

A bookstall was open throughout the event, selling various publications, a Book Pack and books for children and Christmas themed titles.

The main speaker was Sophie Cornes, who works at Christ Church in Southampton helping to teach the Bible to women with a particular focus in student ministry.

This year the chosen Bible reading was taken from the Old Testament about Gideon.

Judges 6 v 1-40 The Chapter begins with the Israelites doing evil in the sight of the Lord, worshipping other Gods.

As a consequence, the Lord allowed the Midianites, along with the Amalekites and other eastern peoples, to oppress Israel for 7 years. These invaders would destroy Israel's crops and livestock, leaving the people impoverished and forcing them to hide in mountain caves and strongholds.


As a result of their suffering, the Israelites cried out to the Lord for help. The Lord sent a prophet to remind the people of their deliverance from Egypt and their failure to obey God's commands.

Then the angel of the Lord appeared to Gideon under an oak tree in Ophrah and declared that the Lord was with him, calling him to save Israel.

Gideon expressed his doubt, asking why all the suffering had happened if the Lord was with them. The angel then departed, and Gideon, realizing it was the angel of the Lord, then called the place - The Lord is Peace. The Lord then instructed Gideon not to



fear, promising that he would save Israel from the Midianites and be with him.







The Midland Women's Convention (cont)

After a short break, when we returned Sophie continued...
Judge 7 v 1-24. This describes Gideon leading a small, divinely selected force of 300 men to defeat the vast Midianite army by outwitting and surprising them. Gideon and his men surrounded their camp and, at his signal, blew their trumpets, broke their jars, and shouted 'A sword for the Lord and for Gideon!'

The Lord caused the Midianites to become confused and turn their swords against each other. Gideon's army simply watched as the army of Midian fell into panic, confusion and disordered retreat. Not one man had to draw a sword to defeat the enemy. Gideon's small army could never have brought about such a victory in their own strength. God wanted to demonstrate to Israel that victory depends not on strength or numbers, but on obedience and commitment to Him.

At the end of the day, when we started to leave to return home, we could also take an October 'Evangelicals' newspaper and a chocolate from an open selection box.

We would like to thank the Midland Women's Convention Committee and the musicians who also helped us to enjoy singing along to the songs.

Testimonies

Mrs Nichoson -Ward has shared these two testimonies from pupils at *Christ Church Academy*.

The first is from July 25 and the second from September 25: "At a recent retreat to Shallowford House, pupils were taking part in a reflective activity to create their own prayer bracelets. As part of the process, they drew out their designs, selecting the coloured beads they would use and their symbolic meanings. One child asked if they could share their plan with the group: a strand of dark grey beads running around half of their wrist that suddenly changed to become a riot of bright blues, greens, oranges and reds. She explained that it represented her own faith journey: the grey section being her life before and the rainbow of colour in celebration of coming to know Jesus. By taking part in Pursuit (our weekly extracurricular club) she had connected with others and had the chance to explore the Christian faith in more depth.

In a similar way, as part of our introduction to RE at the start of the new term, pupils were drawing out their RE learning journeys in the exercise books. They sketched out a road or river and plotted on significant topics and questions that they explored previously. They also used some of the space to note down their personal reflections on their skills and hopes for their development in RE this year. One pupil explained that she had also included how her own worldview had changed over the past year. She told me that she been so moved by our worship at Christ Church, Stone and at school that she was no longer an atheist and now is Christian.

At Christ Church, we aim to give all pupils the chance to explore faith in an open and invitational way. For many, this means being able to express their own worldview and develop the capacity to defend it eloquently.

For others, this is a chance to question and enquire. For these pupils, it has been about something really profound- developing a relationship with Christ. What a privilege to be a part of this journey." (Cont. on previous page 16)

Hi There,

What has been happening this month?

Well I guess the biggest event was in attending the Senior Waterways Chaplains' Conference at Sheffield from Monday 29th September to Wednesday 1st October. It is always good to meet up with colleagues from around the country—we have 15 hubs around the country with about 6 chaplains in each. As Seniors we support the chaplains in our hub and also try and fill in the gaps where we have no chaplains—doing the trouble shooting if you like. We liaise with bodies such as CRT (Canal & River Trust) and carry out talks for churches, groups etc.

We mainly talked at the conference about our future! For the last few years the Church Army (the evangelistic arm of the C of E) have been both funding us and overseeing our work—providing admin support and providing accountability through the Church of England. However, they now find themselves in financial difficulties and are having to re-think their mission, vision and priorities. Waterways Chaplaincy will not now be part of that so we will lose our funding and support. Sadly the Church Army have had to make many redundancies from their own staff.

Our Lead Chaplain is working hard to try and secure new funding streams, particularly from the boating industry itself, but as a charity (we only have 3 paid staff—the full time National Lead and 2 part time Regional Leads) looking after just over 100 volunteers who, in turn, support the many boaters on the many miles of the waterways, we have to find new ways to continue the good work. Lots of prayer needed!

We need support from churches throughout the country and here locally I am hoping that WWC can be one of Christ Church's Mission Partners.

Light and Truth

Much as I'd prefer not to think about Christmas presents and cards until the week before Christmas, the reality is that as soon as Bonfire Night and Remembrance Sunday are over, I must procrastinate no longer! Poor Advent. It's lost in the mists of time, its season of spiritual preparation for Christmas overtaken by ever exotic Advent Calendars, their numbered windows promising expensive 'treats' to help us to get through the stress of Christmas preparations. I've even seen a cheese-a-day Advent calendar. Seriously, who thought of that one?

Instead of moaning about the commercialism of Christmas, here at Lichfield Cathedral we do all we can to keep the Sundays of Advent special, beginning with the hauntingly beautiful Advent Carol Service. But then we go 'full bling' with the Christmas Light Show and the Christmas Tree Festival. They're ever popular, a seasonal 'must' in many people's diaries. And at the heart of both, is a search for the light in the midst of the darkness. Physical light in the long nights of winter. And spiritual light in a world which feels chaotic and dark.

One of my favourite worship songs is 'Christ be our Light' by the Roman Catholic songwriter Bernadette Farrell. It's beautiful. If you don't know it and have access to the internet, do search for it. You'll soon be singing along to its gentle tune and meaningful lyrics.

Longing for light, we wait in darkness. Longing for truth, we turn to you.

This is why, I think, so many people turn to the Church at Christmas, on the shortest days of the year. Our ancestors prayed that the sun would return. We search for the Son – the one who is the Light of the World. Even those who don't yet know him for in the

themselves. But light and truth are in short supply at the moment – and Church we know both.

Many the hearts that yearn to belong. Let us be servants to one another, making your kingdom come.

So many people are lonely at Christmas. So many are searching for somewhere to belong. As Christians we belong to one big family, made brothers and sisters through our baptism. There is also a monument in the crypt at St. Pauls Cathedral. Although his nickname was apparently 'Sour Crout' because of his temper, he was thought of as a very fair man who contributed considerable sums to charities.

PS Rumour has it that Jervis was partially responsible for the re – routing of the canal which used to pass quite close to Meaford Hall. He apparently disliked the foul language used by the boatmen!!

PPS There is a large plaque outside the Library commemorating his deeds. Why has it been effectively covered up by a large plant trough?

John Jervis— Viscount St Vincent of Meaford

Visitors to this area are often confused by some rather odd pronunciations of local features – Joules (or Jowells), Meaford (or Mefford), Sideway (or Siddaway) for example. Even Stone's most famous past resident insisted that his name was pronounced Jarvis.

Born in 1735 at Meaford Hall, young John was educated at Burton Grammar School, but ran away to sea in 1749. Joining the Royal Navy as a common sailor, he spent a considerable amount of time on ships chasing pirates in the Caribbean before returning to England to excel in various exams and being given command of his own ship in the Seven Years War against France. He played an important role in the capture of Quebec by General Wolfe and later distinguished himself in the American War of Independence.

Peacetime saw him expand his horizons and he became an MP for Launceston and later Great Yarmouth and Chipping Norton. In 1794, he returned to the sea as Commander in Chief of the Leeward Islands and then Admiral of the Mediterranean Fleet – Nelson was one of his subordinates. The Battle of St. Vincent resulted in a famous victory and Jervis was made Baron Jervis of Meaford and Earl St. Vincent – songs were apparently written about his deeds. In 1801 he was appointed First Lord of the Admiralty and Viscount St. Vincent of Meaford.

Retiring from active duty, he then undertook an anti – corruption review of naval practises and managed to fall out with various establishment figures including the Prime Minister and most of the Royal Navy. Despite travelling the world in the course of his career, Jervis still regarded Meaford as his home and he is buried in the family mausoleum at St. Michael's Church. (Cont on previous page 26......)
