#### From the Vicarage.....

#### The unpredictable, and the reliable

We live in a world that lurches from one crisis to another. But some things are as regular as clockwork or else we'd not survive. If you talk with a farmer, you will hear quickly what is happening on the ground. Food production has always been a key part of life for us all, but for those at the cutting edge the changing seasons play havoc with plans. This year stored grass for feed later in the year had to be used during the extremely hot weather. Further feed must be sought for the months to come. This will impact food prices, due to increased production costs. Yet on the other hand we have all seen bumper fruit harvests: apples and plums have been in abundance!

What gives regularity to the world? It is the verry promise of God: "While the earth remains, Seedtime and harvest, Cold and heat, Winter and summer, And day and night Shall not cease" (Genesis 8v22). All the components that we need to produce food are provided by the gracious hand of God. The sowing of seeds leads to the miraculous growth of a crop that can be harvested. The cold earth and warmth of the sun lead to hormonal changes that lead to germination and eventually we see the process of ripening. The alternation of day and night provide energy for plants and life following a regular daily cycle as the earth spins on its axis around the sun giving us our twenty-four hour days and twelve months of the year. What an amazing world!

We have much to be grateful for as October progresses and we reflect on God's provision. So, we say thanks to the generous God for the harvest we enjoy! We are also to reflect God's character in our generosity towards others. That's why we share with others and contribute to our local food bank but also we contribute through "Food.gives" (a dry goods relief project managed through the Barnabas Fund) which provides relief for those facing extreme hardship overseas.

Our harvest services are over. But our thanks to God is daily. For in amongst what seems unpredictable we hang on to what is reliable. The promises of God.

Last month we had a lovely visit from Paul and Elizabeth Makau for one of our morning services, they brought us lots of encouraging news of the work they are involved with as well as some entertaining videos especially of a new sizeable congregation that meets under a large tree near their village as they have no permanent meeting place yet, the joy of faith expressed in their infectious singing was so evident to all.

Paul also spoke about the need to continue to reach people groups who have never heard the Christian message or even the name of Jesus. One of the tools they are finding to be very effective are digital bibles, about the size of a small mobile phone or iPod with the bible recorded in their own language or dialect, this is particularly useful as many people are unable to read, these devices can be used by individuals or groups and are charged by solar power and don't rely on the internet or phone signals which can be unreliable.

Paul and Elizabeth are one of our supported mission partners and appear in our prayer diary for this month.

#### Didn't we have a luverly day ....?



Please continue to pray for Gary as he continues his formal studies, and as he lives a life of study and growth living in the knowledge and love of Jesus. (Article by Shirley)



#### A Wealth of Historical and Rational Evidence

'Jesus: The Evidence' exists to present a rational and historical case for the life, death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth. It is designed for those who are sceptical of religious claims, curious about Jesus or simply searching for truth in an age of doubt. Whether you're an agnostic, atheist or believer seeking a firmer foundation for your faith, this project is built to engage you respectfully and thoughtfully.

Rather than assuming faith, Jesus the Evidence begins with the question: Did Jesus really live, die, and rise from the dead? Using ancient sources, historical records, and reasoned logic, the project invites readers and listeners to explore the evidence and draw their own conclusions.

#### 4.00 to 5.45 p.m. on Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> October 2026

The event will start at 4.00 p.m. sharp, and we will be having two live presentations to discover what evidence is available for us to scrutinise. We will have a short break for refreshments halfway through. The speaker will provide a free booklet with material that is in greater detail for those attending to take away. Donations of any size towards the speaker's expenses will be gratefully received.

Our speaker, Derek McIntyre, was a former agnostic, but felt compelled to explore whether there was any credible evidence for the central claims of Christianity. This presentation grew out of what he discovered.

on September 14th was the highlight of this month for us on the Waterways. A great event featuring historic boats, many stalls, live music and lots to eat. Even the rain did not deter us!









# If money talks, let's listen together to what it's saying to Lichfield Diocese

Ever noticed? People who are at ease about big money talk about 'a sum north of ...'. Although confusingly mixing compass and currency, it reveals a deep truth: a large sum of money might bring a polar chill: the burden of choices and the risk of temptations and dissension. It needs skilled handling to bring blessing.

The additional £400 million extra over three years across 42 dioceses being released from the Church of England's historic assets, an amount of arctic proportions according to the popular yardstick, could, rather should, bless us. A good first response might be gratitude, caution and reaching for a calculator. Caution is valuable because it stops us from falling into two traps: imagining where we would spend the money for our own benefit rather than for the Kingdom, and, worse, imagining where we would spend the same sum twice. Thankfully, the calculations are being done by Lichfield Diocese's very skilled finance team.

Gratitude to God is the gateway to asking God what divine and loving purpose it is there to fulfil, because money calls us into a future plan. This money also comes with wonderful timing. The ten goals of Seeking the Kingdom can guide our efforts, there is the opportunity to use the extra money to fund new activities, especially in parishes where there are identifiable possibilities for growth but resources are short. Much of our focus in Seeking the Kingdom is rightly on our parishes.

We are relieved of some choices but have to make others. To ease the costs of a substantial 11.1% increase in clergy stipends to support the well-being of clergy and their families in every parish, part of the extra money is specifically for our 25% least well-off parishes. We can all warm to this proposal: well-being, financial and

otherwise for clergy, is our collective responsibility. Better still, the whole church family and all those who contribute so generously the lion's share of the costs of clergy, buildings and mission will benefit too: more funding for less prosperous parts of the diocese gives us the opportunity to reduce the amount of mutual support needed. Well-being is at the heart of the direction and goals of Seeking the Kingdom, our plan for 2025-2030. Churches that flourish and people that flourish do so because they are immersed in the common activity of building the Kingdom of God and building the Kingdom brings more flourishing: it's a virtual circle.

Questions will arise about how the rest of the money that we will receive is to be used and our diocesan decision-makers will be taking a look at next year's budget starting this Autumn with consultations in each Episcopal Area, taking proposals to Synod in October. The additional money over which we have a choice has the power to call us all into a new future. It is tapered over nine years, so we can't simply spend it on business as usual as it won't last. Can we all gather round the idea that it is there to give us hope in a sustainable future and to address the challenge posed afresh that we are sustaining ourselves at present using a diminishing pot of reserves?

#### Thank you....

Halfway between Stone and Stafford lies MOD Store No. 6, part of RAF Stafford. In 1643, on this rather unspectacular site, the Battle of Hopton Heath took place between the Parliamentarians led by Sir John Gell, and the Royalists under the Earl of Northampton. Having earlier taken Lichfield, Gell had turned his attentions to Stafford. The Royalists were determined to stop this advance and brought up the legendary 'Roaring Meg' an immense cannon capable of creating all sorts of mayhem. Each side fielded around 2000 men and after several hours of fighting, both sides withdrew exhausted.

Neither side had conclusively won, although Parliamentary losses far outnumbered Royalist losses — around 500 men captured or killed as compared to 45 Royalists {although this included the Earl of Northampton}. Both sides lit their campfires overnight, but in the morning, the Parliamentarians had disappeared — the Royalists had held Stafford. Subsequent to this, Prince Rupert retook Lichfield which remained Royalist for the rest of the Civil War. No such luck for Stafford however and a surprise attack later that year meant Parliamentary rule for that town.

There is an interesting information board on the site of the battle accessed by a footpath about 400 yards from the minor road between the County

Showground and Hopton. Quite how the MOD managed to get permission to build a warehouse on the site of an important battle will remain one of life's mysteries.
