## Call my bluff

---

There was once a television game show entitled “*Call my bluff*”. Two teams of celebrities took turns to provide three definitions of an obscure word, only one of which is correct. The other team then had to guess which was the correct definition, the other two being “bluffs”.

What about the word ‘resurrection’? It might seem that the worldwide Christian church has devised a huge bluff. The historical record of the risen Jesus (the four Gospels) has been interpreted in three main ways.

1. ***Jesus didn’t die, but swooned:*** crucifixion was a gruesome method of execution and 100% effective. Roman soldiers faced the death penalty for allowing a capital prisoner to escape or bungling their execution. John’s eyewitness account notes that when the soldier’s spear was shoved into Jesus’ side a flow of blood and water came from Jesus’ pierced heart. It showed he was clearly dead (Jn 19v34-35).
2. ***Did Jesus die, but not rise:*** sightings of the risen Jesus have been dismissed as (a) conspiracy - but no corpse was ever produced to refute this; (b) hallucination - but the large number and varied nature of witnesses tells against this and, we might note, hallucinations do not eat! (c) myth - but the gospel had spread widely within a few years and its own claim is that it is not a myth: *‘We did not follow cleverly invented stories when we told you about the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we were eye-witnesses of his majesty’* (II Peter 1v16).
3. ***Jesus died, but then rose again:*** one of the disciples who had yet to see the risen Jesus said: *‘Unless I see the nail marks in hands hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe it!’* (John 20v25). A week later he got a face to face with Jesus who invited him to stick his fingers in the wounds so he would not doubt but believe: *‘Thomas said to him, “My Lord and my God”’* (Jn 20v28).



The first two possibilities don't hold up (I've only summarized here). The third possibility must be engaged with seriously. Followers of Jesus believe this and now are to live in the light of Jesus resurrection. He has demonstrated that he is the Christ, and that by believing we may have life in his name. He has called our bluff. We must now admit he is the victor, not in a game but over sin and death.

## **99th Bishop of Lichfield named**

---

The Right Reverend Dr Michael Ipgrave has been named as the new Bishop of Lichfield. He assumes responsibility for one of the Church of England's largest dioceses, leading an episcopal team with the Bishops of Wolverhampton, Stafford and Shrewsbury.

Bishop Michael (57), the current Bishop of Woolwich in the Diocese of Southwark, will be the ninety-ninth Bishop of Lichfield, in a line going back to St Chad in the seventh century. He succeeds the Right Reverend Jonathan Gledhill, who retired last year.

In his personal welcome message to the Diocese, Bishop Michael said:

“I’ve had twelve wonderful years in London but I am so looking forward to coming back to the Midlands. Lichfield is the mother church of the Midlands, and the city of St Chad, a man of great humility and profound Christian faith.”

The Bishop of Wolverhampton, the Right Reverend Clive Gregory welcomed the news: “A year ago on St Chad’s Day, Bishop Jonathan announced his retirement as Bishop of Lichfield. Today, on St Chad’s Day, we can share the wonderful news that Bishop Michael is joining us here in the West Midlands. He brings with him a rare combination of gifts, as theologian and teacher, pastor and mission enabler, which will greatly enrich our life as a Diocese.”

The Reverend Sarah Schofield, Vicar of All Saints, Wolverhampton, said “I’m excited that Bishop Michael is coming first to Wolverhampton, to see our diverse churches and discover the joys of the Black Country and its people.”

The Right Reverend Geoff Annas, Bishop of Stafford, said “I am really thrilled by the news of this important appointment. Our new Bishop brings a valuable wealth of experience and expertise, especially in the area of Inter Faith relations.”

The Archdeacon of Salop, the Venerable Paul Thomas, said “I have known Michael since we were both students at Oriel College, Oxford and I hold him in high regard as a person of deep integrity, high intelligence and wide-ranging interests. I believe he will bring both enrichment and encouragement to Christians in North Shropshire, and a genuine openness and attentiveness to people of other persuasions and perspectives.”



The Very Reverend Adrian Dorber, Dean of Lichfield, said “I’m extremely pleased to welcome Bishop Michael to Lichfield. He is a person of proven experience and wisdom, combining his many gifts with great approachability and personal warmth.”

The Bishop of Southwark, the Right Reverend Christopher Chessun, said “I rejoice that Bishop Michael Ipgrave has been appointed to the See of Lichfield. He will bring to his new role a heart for mission and a humble, gentle, yet purposeful manner which will be a blessing to the people of Lichfield Diocese. He will be much missed and we will all pray for him as well as the parishes and people of his new Diocese.”

#### About Bishop Michael

The Right Reverend Michael Geoffrey Ipgrave OBE, MA, PhD is currently Bishop of Woolwich in the Diocese of Southwark. He grew up in a small village in Northamptonshire. He studied mathematics at Oriel College, Oxford, and trained for the ministry at Ripon College Cuddesdon, Oxford after a year spent working as a labourer in a factory in Birmingham.

He was ordained Deacon in 1982 and Priest in 1983 in the Diocese of Peterborough. After more than twenty years’ ministry in Leicestershire and Japan, he became Archdeacon of Southwark in 2004. He was Canon Missioner at Southwark Cathedral from 2010 to 2012, Chair of the Southwark and London Diocesan Housing Association, and Anglican Borough Dean of Southwark. Prior to this he had been Inter Faith Relations Adviser to the Archbishops’ Council and Secretary of the Churches’ Commission on Inter Faith relations.

He was awarded the OBE in the New Year’s Honours List in 2011 for services to inter faith relations in London. Since 2012 he has been Area Bishop of Woolwich in the Diocese of Southwark. He chairs the Council of Christians and Jews, and is co-Chair of the Anglican-Lutheran Society and of the Church of England’s Mission Theology Advisory Group.

Bishop Michael has written extensively on inter faith issues, religion and human rights. He has edited six volumes on Christian-Muslim relations, is the author of *Trinity and Inter Faith Dialogue* (Peter Lang, 2003), and has contributed about thirty journal articles and book chapters.

Bishop Michael is married to Dr Julia Ipgrave, a Senior Research Fellow in the Department of Humanities at Roehampton University. They have three grown up sons, one with a German and one with a Russian wife, and are looking forward to the birth of their first grandchild in Germany.

Michael and Julia are enthusiastic about things Japanese. They enjoy walking, and are looking forward to exploring Staffordshire and Shropshire on foot. He is a supporter of Leicester City FC.

## Learning to dream again

The leaders of the Community of St Chad and diocesan officers have been getting excited by this book by Sam, Wells, vicar of St Martin in the Fields, central London, to the extent that the Bishop's Staff have caught the enthusiasm. Together, they are encouraging parishes to adopt the book as a shared Lent study experience across the diocese.

"This is a most readable and inspiring book" says Archdeacon Paul Thomas. "It leads the reader through various passages of scripture and enlightens. You'll end up saying 'I never realised that' time and again"

Revd Preb Chris Thorpe (Shifnal & Sheriffhales) has written a helpful booklet that includes both study notes for adult groups and short liturgies for Holy Week. The Online Pastor, Ros Clarke is producing devotionals on Instagram. And the Diocesan Adviser for Schools' Outreach, Libby Leech has a set of resources for following the same themes with children. The study booklet will be distributed with every paper copy of Spotlight this month and is also available to download, while the book itself, subtitled 'Rediscovering the Heart of God', which normally sells for £15 will be available for all clergy, lay ministers and up to 15 congregation members per parish at £5 per copy with further copies at £10. ## Diocesan Readers Day

---

On Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> February Mike Thompson, Dave Bell and I attended a day meeting for Readers at Yarnfield Park.

We were privileged to be led by Rev'd Lucy Winkett. Previously trained as a professional soprano, she is now vicar of St. James's church, Piccadilly. A truly engaging and inspiring speaker she is tipped by some to be appointed one of the first women bishops in the C of E.

The day was introduced by Bishop Clive (Wolverhampton). A particular comment of his which has stayed with is the answer he sometimes gives when asked about himself. He says "I am a member of the laity, that's church jargon for a person".

In the morning Lucy spoke about "The church gathered and the church dispersed" (church together and out in the community) asking "What kind of people in what kind of world are we?" – a very challenging question! Below I list a few things she said which are memorable to me.

- We each have an innate dignity from which we tend to move away.
- Real hope imagines the future and acts as if that future is irresistible.
- Christians should be 'WALKING INVITATIONS' to others.
- We should have a self emptying ministry but to give our self away we must first know our self.
- The temple is important but most of the gospel is set in the hills and towns where people live and work. Jesus uses what is there.
- Church is to be a 'window pane to God – a bit like looking at the moon with a telescope'
- We have nothing to say that is new (she has preached 20 Christmas Day sermons) but no one has ever said it like you on that day.
- If the cost to you is higher then you will understand better.
- The Christian community should be one of celebration and forgiveness not emotional harmony.

In the afternoon, to prevent that after lunch drowsiness, Lucy led us through a fast moving interactive telling of the parable of 'The Prodigal Son' from the perspectives of the different characters, which made us both think 'outside the box' and contributed to a greater understanding of some of the different possible motivations for our actions.

### Respect for the Elderly

Age UK is calling for better energy efficiency measures as part of an awareness campaign. Cold Homes Week aims to warn older people about the dangers of living in a poorly heated home.

Age UK led a week of action to promote understanding of fuel poverty and winter related deaths. According to the organisation's figures, 40,800 older people in England and Wales died from the cold last year.

Now campaigners are calling for the Government to reform its energy efficiency schemes.

This would mean that two million low-income homes would be brought up to an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) Band C by 2020. By 2025, it wants all six million low income homes brought up to the Band C standard.

EPC ratings range from A, which is the most efficient, to G, which is the least efficient.

Making sure homes are as energy efficient as possible not only keeps us all warmer but it also reduces our energy bills and cuts carbon emissions too. If people live in the lower bands there can be a real danger to health, but there are steps that you can take to dramatically improve the situation.

Homes can be made more energy efficient through measures such as loft and cavity wall insulation but also by making sure your boiler is working as well as it can be.

## Christ Church 130 years ago

---

### The Education Department and Christ Church School

A meeting of parishioners of Christ Church parish was held on Monday evening to consider the question of new schools. The Rev W.J. Thompson presided. He stated that the Government report, received at the end of January, had been already considered by the Board of Managers, and they wished it to be generally known that the present schools were on the eve of being condemned as unfit for the purposes of education. He had intended calling a meeting earlier, but recent events at Stone had led him to postpone the question. It appeared that the lower schoolroom had long been a ground of complaint owing to its want of proper light and ventilation; the walls were damp and the flooring defective. He did not wonder at the remarks of the report, nor could anyone doubt that Her Majesty's Inspector was fully justified in saying that it was "altogether unfit for school purposes, and that he could not much longer recommend its recognition by the Department." The question he (the chairman) wished them to consider was how the need of new schools should be met. And here he would mention that there was a desire on the part of many parishioners that some memorial should be raised to the late Rev John Ford. With that desire he had full sympathy, and he felt sure that such memorial could take no form more in accordance with the late Mr Ford's feelings than schools, Mr Ford's last act before resigning, being to give £150 to the school fund. No parochial effort could possibly meet the cost, which could be not be too far short of £2,000. He wished for their opinion as to the probable amount which might be raised in Stone that he might lay the matter before residents in the district and learn the extent of their willingness to co-operate. If something like this were not done the alternative would be the formation of a School Board to supply the deficiency, and though he considered Boards might be necessary in large towns, he hoped this course might be avoided in a small school district like Stone:- A protracted discussion followed, in which all agreed as to the bad state of the schools, but there was a considerable difference of opinion as to the remedy. It seemed to some that the attempt was too much for voluntary effort, while others considered the estimated cost too high, and recommended the obtaining of estimates. -The Chairman stated he had taken the estimate from the average cost of voluntary schools throughout the kingdom, and though it might prove to be under the average it could not be much. The meeting was finally adjourned for a month.
