

## Faith in our families

Christian festivals and camps are popular for bringing people together with a common faith in Christ. It chimes with the Biblical practice of large gatherings at special times in the year to recall God's goodness in the past and to celebrate. For many they seem like a foretaste of heaven where there will be thousands gathered around the throne of the King of kings and Lord of lords. These boosts are followed by a return to the more mundane local church.

The festivals are not the key to faith being grasped or growing. God has given the family as the place where faith is developed, both our blood relatives and our church family:

Give ear, O my people, to my teaching; incline your ears to the words of my mouth!

- <sup>2</sup> I will open my mouth in a parable; I will utter dark sayings from of old,
- <sup>3</sup> things that we have heard and known, that our fathers have told us.
- <sup>4</sup> We will not hide them from their children, but tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the Lord, and his might, and the wonders that he has done.
- <sup>5</sup> He established a testimony in Jacob and appointed a law in Israel, which he commanded our fathers to teach to their children,
- <sup>6</sup> that the next generation might know them, the children yet unborn, and arise and tell them to their children,
- <sup>7</sup> so that they should set their hope in God and not forget the works of God, but keep his commandments' (Psalm 78v1-7).

This summer provides more time for families to do just that. May I challenge those who are Christians to take time to read a chapter of your Bible each day and pray about it? (continued)

How about making time to do this with your children, grandchildren or godchildren? We often feel hard-pressed for time together, but let's make our holidays more like their original intention as holy days. We will then return refreshed spiritually, no matter how good the weather or whether we had a dream or disaster time away!

#### Failure or Success?

This is the time of year for school exams and end of term speech days. Many will be successful in their exams this summer but some will not get the results they want or need. Some students will receive prizes at speech day but many will not. I still remember the feelings of failure at messing up my A Levels 38 years ago and not achieving the results that were expected of me.

We may be tempted to think that 'successful people' are those who are always successful, who seem to sail through life moving from one achievement to the next. However, that is usually not the case. Winston Churchill, as Prime Minister, boldly led Britain to victory in World War II. However, 25 years before that, as First Lord of the Admiralty, he championed a World War I military attack that ended in disaster—Gallipoli. Churchill believed that he had the solution for breaking the impasse of the trench warfare in Northern France by opening up a second front away in the Dardanelles in North West Turkey. The Battle of Gallipoli, however, became a slaughter and quickly morphed into a stalemate just as bloody, just as pointless as that on the Western Front. In the first month after storming the peninsula, the Allies lost 45,000 men. The ill-fated Gallipoli Campaign lasted nine months before the evacuation of the last Allied troops in January 1916. Each side sustained 250,000 casualties with 46,000 Allied troops and 65,000 Turkish troops dead. Gallipoli was a disaster and in May 1915, Churchill was demoted to an obscure cabinet post. He remained haunted by the failure of Gallipoli for decades but somehow he did not allow it to defeat him. When he took the office of Prime Minister in 1940, he wrote, "All my past life had been a preparation for this hour and for this trial." That included Gallipoli. Later in life, Churchill would say that 'success is going from one failure to another without giving up'.

This would seem to be true in Christian discipleship, too. It is well documented how Peter made a mess of following Jesus and disowned him in a cowardly manner when Jesus needed him most. Peter misunderstood much about Jesus but there was one thing he really understood: he knew that Jesus was one who forgave sins. That one thing he learnt and it meant that Peter was able to keep on and on, after failure.

He never, finally, gave up. Peter fell at all the fences but he just picked himself up and struggled on, blinded with tears and covered in mud. It was this quality that Jesus must have seen in him – this refusal to ever accept defeat. After his resurrection, Jesus put Peter back together again and even re-commissioned him as leader of the apostles.

### 22 new curates in the Lichfield Diocese

Twenty-two new curates were ordained at Lichfield Cathedral during the first weekend of July, reflecting the rise in interest in exploring vocations across the Diocese.

The curates – 14 women and eight men - marked the end of two or three years of training when they were ordained as deacons by the Bishop of Lichfield, the Right Revd Dr Michael Ipgrave, at special services on Saturday and Sunday.

This year's number of ordinations doubled 2016's total of 11 – all of whom went on to be ordained as priests at services across the Diocese a week earlier.

The new deacons will start their parish ministry in a variety of places and roles, including five who are taking on non-stipendiary roles.



Although the news headlines may have largely moved on from the refugee crisis, the reality is that the situation is more desperate than ever.

This is **one** portrait of a refugee from the prayer section of the Tearfund website.

Name: Ghassan

**Country of origin:** Iraq **Country location:** Jordan

**Stat:** 53% of the world's refugees come from just 3 countries – Syria, Afghanistan & Somalia

One of Tearfund's partner organisations in Amman, Jordan has been running exercise classes for refugee men from Iraq and Syria. This has been a big hit and has brought some surprising benefits.

The class ethos is based on teamwork, camaraderie and encouragement. Participants range from a 3 year old boy to a man in his 70s. There is a joyful atmosphere and it is easy to forget this is a room full of refugees.

Many who have come to Jordan struggle with depression. Few of them are able to find work and they are often dealing with the trauma of the conflict from which they've fled.

\* **Ghassan** is 52 and a refugee from Iraq. He says 'These classes have given all of the participants self confidence and to have hope in life. There are other organisations that support us with food, but for me my soul is as important as food. The class helps me to be more at peace. When I talk about my former life, I feel pain but when I go to the classes I forget my problems - the coach is like my brother and it helps me get better.'

**Please pray:** Lord Jesus, give us more of your compassion for the plight of refugees, soften our hearts to their situation and help us to follow your lead in seeking justice on their behalf. Pray for an end to all wars, poverty and human rights abuses that drive desperate people to become refugees in the first place. Amen
